### Count To Ten Or Join A Club

When swamped with family living problems, you can always count to ten and hope they vanish, or you can join a home demonstration club.

"Home demonstration clubs are open to all homemakers who would like to learn better ways to tackle chores and improve both home and community life," Mrs. Dorothy Powell, county home demonstration agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said.

Mrs. Powell explained that the Extension Service sponsors the clubs as part of a statewide educational effort to bring the latest information to all families. Local clubs focus on the needs of homemakers in the county.

"Members decide what their group will study," the home demonstration agent said. "They participate in discussions and community projects sponsored by the club, plan recreation and even teach lessons."

"Dues aren't required, so cost is minimal," she adds. "The major investment is time to learn and share new information."

New information covers discovering what's new for your home and family, learning the "how to's" of homemaking plus exploring what you're interested in. Information also comes from educational and research resources of Texas A&M University, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and other universities, agencies and industries through Mrs. Powell's office.

**From The County Agent's Desk**

Diseases have taken a heavy toll of some South Plains cotton this season. Yet, due to work done at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, losses have been kept down.

Some of these research efforts in cotton disease control will be explained to visitors attending the 63rd Annual Field Day and Open House at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock on September 12 beginning at 1:00 p.m. This particular phase of research is headed by Dr. Earl Minton, plant pathologist with the USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

Verticillium wilt continues to be the number one disease problem in cotton on the South Plains. Wilt incidence is highly related to cool, wet weather so we've had quite a lot of the disease this season.

A special "Vert" nursery has been set up at the Center where their efforts are directed to testing commercial varieties and new strains of cotton for wilt tolerance. This nursery has been in operation since 1960. They are also selecting plants with bacterial blight resistance in this plot. The nursery has been specially treated to create high levels of Verticillium wilt. They have applied various cultural practices that encourage wilt development. These are the things that producers should not do if they want to avoid serious wilt problems in their cotton.

At the Center they are rotating cotton with barley, wheat or oats, grain sorghum, castor and soybeans. They have found that cotton can generally be grown without too much wilt for as many years as a field is rotated after the disease shows up. For instance, if a wilt infested field is planted to wheat for three years, then they can expect to grow cotton for the next three years without too much of a wilt problem. The three-year rotation has been most effective in reducing wilt.

Studies are underway to determine how various row spacings affect the incidence of wilt in cotton. Studies show that wilt decreases in susceptible varieties as row

spacing decrease. In other words, there is less wilt in cotton planted in narrow rows.

If producers have a severe wilt problem in their fields, the research recommends planting a tolerant variety, and using all of the known cultural practices which control the disease.

In addition to wilt and bacterial blight, other cotton diseases to be discussed at the field day include seedling disease, leaf spot, and wet-weather blight. Wet-weather blight was especially destructive this year as it damaged about a half million acres over the area.

Other field day highlights will include drip irrigation, oilseed crops, cotton varieties, narrow-row cotton, soil fertility, vegetable crops, and grain sorghum breeding and insect control.

Field day visitors will be able to spend as much time as they desire at any of the particular field plots.

Special discussions on weed control and the weather will be conducted at the Center headquarters. Exhibits and displays will also be featured.
