



Section 6: Exempting farm tracfarm equipment or implements of husbandry from the requirement of two headlamps, red lights and red reflectors when operated during daylight hours.

Section 7: Exempts farm trailers, farm semi-trailers and fertilizer trailers from the extra lighting requirements covering vehicles presenting a hazard on the highway.

Section 8: Removes the brake requirements from all trailers up to 10,000 pounds gross weight if they satisfy the braking requirements set out in the statutes which are the ability to stop vehicle and trailer within 50' from speed at 20 miles per hour. This section adds a grandfather clause making the provision effective only on trailers sold or manufactured after January 1, 1973. Farm trailers | Whole or farm semi-trailers are exempt if their gross weight does not exceed 15,000 pounds-the limit in the old statute was 10,000 pounds. The section referring to cotton trailers is deleted, as raising the provision covering all farm trailers to 15,000 pounds would make it redundant. This section legalizes surge brakes on trailers and semi-trailers whose gross weight does not exceed 10,000 pounds.

Section 9: Exempts farm trailers, farm semi-trailers and fertilizer trailers from requirement of activating flashing lights when parked in a hazardous situation on the side of the road.

Section 10: Requires the slowmoving-vehicle emblem to be displayed on cotton trailers when such trailers are moving at a speed of 25 miles per hous or less, and requires such emblem to be removed from the trailer or covered when such trailer is traveling at a speed greater than 25 mph.
