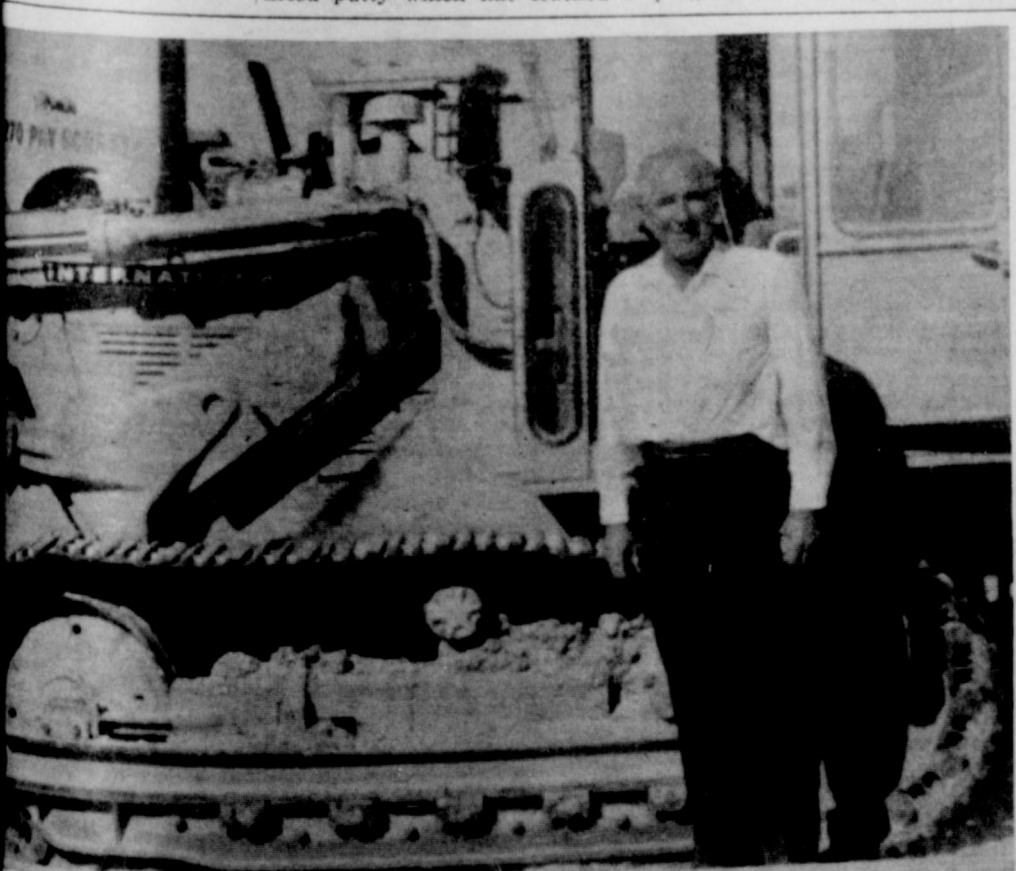

Claude Hands Owls 32-8 Defeat

Friday the thirteenth wasn't a lucky day for the Owls or for Senior Tri-Captain John Burson. The Claude Mustangs scored twice in the first quarter and once in each of the other periods to defeat Silverton's Owls 32-8. Burson, an outstanding Owl lineman, was probably lost for the rest of the season with a knee injury.

The Owl offense, statistically, was the best so far this year, but was no match for the 477-yard offense of the Mustangs.

The Owls gained 140 yards rushing and 67 passing, making 14 first downs. The Owls made only five first downs against Petersburg and six against Wheeler, and this total against Claude does show an offensive improvement.

Claude made 225 yards rushing and 252 passing, getting 21 first downs.

Each team was intercepted twice. The Mustangs were penalized 110 yards and the Owls had 15 yards marked off against them. Silverton ran 60 offensive plays, while Claude ran 64.

Claude received the opening kickoff and after five plays John Burson intercepted a Mustang pass at about the Owl-35. Silverton was unable to convert the opportunity into points, and four plays after the Mustangs received the punt on their own 19, they scored on a 20-yard pass from Quarterback Greg Forbes to End Ricky Jones. With 5:10 remaining in the quarter, Coy Johnson kicked the extra point, and Claude led 7-0.

The Owls penetrated only to the Claude-40 on the next series of plays, and punted into the end zone for a Mustang touchback. On first down, Quarterback Forbes passed to End Larry Bell for a touchdown with 24 seconds remaining in the first frame. The kick was no good, and Claude held a 13-0 lead.

In the second stanza the Mustangs put on a sustained drive, making five first downs and scoring from the one-yard line on a run by Gory Lovelady with 1:44 remaining in the first half. The pass for extra points was incomplete, and Claude held a 19-0 half-time lead.

Silverton's only serious threat of the first half came in the waning seconds on runs by Scott Hutsell, Ken Wood and David McCoy. The Owls gained to the Claude-10 before time expired.

Claude came out strong in the third frame, driving to the Silverton-23 before Tri-Captain Terry Culwell intercepted a Mustang pass in the end zone for a touchback. On their next possession, the Mustangs came on strong again and with 2:34 remaining in the quarter, Lovelady made a 20-yard effort through the Owl defense, hardly touched on the scoring play. Mike Campbell's kick failed and the Mustangs held a 25-10 lead.

Silverton's lone score came with 8:42 remaining in the game on a pass from Quarterback Ken Wood to Terry Culwell. The play covered 40 yards. Craig Culwell's kick wasn't good and the score read 25-6.

The next Owl drive was nipped in the bud in the Claude end of the field by a pass interception. Then with 5:02 remaining to be played, Forbes passed to Mike Campbell for a 45-yard touchdown. Coy Johnson added the extra point, and the score was 32-6.

The Owls mounted a drive that carried deep into Mustang territory, but a pass interception on the Claude-10 killed it. The Owl defense played it tough and when the Mustangs were forced to punt on fourth down, Tri-Captain Mark Hutsell blocked it and Tommy Bullock recovered it on the Claude-4. The Owls weren't able to

Second, in Tulsa.

Everyday, or so it seems, the contemporary seamstress finds new sewing products on the market. Among these is a "new breed" of fabrics which make sewing at home more exciting and more demanding. Fake fur, velvet, leather and vinyl rank among those fabrics which require special attention.

The Swisher County Extension Service is sponsoring the workshop designed to help the home seamstress with sewing on these four contemporary fabrics.

Miss Suzanne Greene, Educational Representative for Unique Zipper Company, will be the guest speaker.

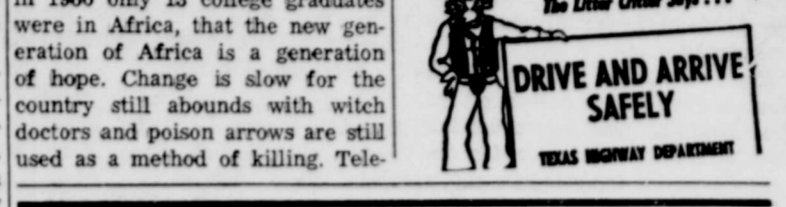

DPS SEEKING APPLICANTS FOR UNIFORMED SERVICES

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants to fill the ranks of its uniform services. The training school for cadet patrolmen will begin November 28. This announcement was made by Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this area.

QUALIFICATIONS
Applicants must be males between the ages of 20 and 35; a height of not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; a weight of not less than two pounds nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no less than 20/40 correctable to 20/20; at least 30 semester hours of college credit; in excellent physical condition; good moral character; and a citizen of the United States.

EMPLOYMENT
Applicants are urged to contact any Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an application. After completing the application take it to the nearest regional, district or sub-district Texas Department of Public Safety office for verification and certification. If all is in order then the written test will be administered which will qualify or disqualify the applicant for further consideration. Successful applicants will be given an agility test, a character investigation, and a physical examination. Those accepted for employment will be notified prior to the beginning date of the next training school.

TRAINING
Cadet patrolmen will be assigned to the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, Texas for a 12-week training period. The training is designed to equip the cadet to handle any of the various situations he may encounter as a patrolman. The training of a patrolman is a test of an individual's intellectual, emotional and physical stamina. It is also an educational process which prepares him for a rewarding career in law enforcement.

ORDINANCE NO. 260 CONCERNING METER CHARGES FOR THE CITY OF SILVERTOWN

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE CHARGES FOR AND CONDITIONS OF A FEE TO BE PAID BEFORE A WATER TAP CAN BE MADE TO ANY CITY WATER LINE, PROVIDING EFFECTIVE DATE, CONTAINING A REPEALING CLAUSE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Silvertown does not now charge for making a meter tap to the city water lines; and

WHEREAS, the City's cost for making a 3/4 inch water tap is approximately \$80.00; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest and welfare to set a fee for a person to have a water tap made;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SILVERTOWN:

SECTION 1: That after October 9, 1972, no person shall tap or have tapped a City water line, without first appearing at the City Hall in Silvertown, Texas, and obtaining a permit from the City of Silvertown and paying all due fees therefor.

SECTION 2: A fee of \$80.00 shall be charged by the City for a 3/4 inch meter tap, and any person who requires a meter tap larger than 3/4 inch shall be charged an additional fee, which additional fee shall be the difference in the cost of making a 3/4 inch meter tap, and the cost of making the size meter tap requested.

SECTION 3: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

SECTION 4: All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict only.

SECTION 5: WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective at once; therefore, upon the passage of this ordinance by a vote of at least five members of the Council, it shall be effective from and after the date of its passage.

Be careful about stores that regularly advertise "lowest prices in

town" or "never undersold." These could be legitimate deals, but remember you usually get no better quality than you pay for.

Keep in mind that Texas law makes it illegal to deliberately deceive customers. Governmental agencies exist to protect your rights.

PAYNE NAMED TO DIRECT 1973 BRISCOE SPELLING BEE

Charlie M. Payne, principal of Silverton Junior High School, has been named to direct the activities of the 1973 Spelling Bee for Briscoe County.

The 1973 Regional Bee—the Silver Anniversary Bee—co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University—will climax in Amarillo on April 28, 1973 with the naming of the Golden Spread Champion.

More than 11,000 students in the eighth and lower grades are expected to participate and the area includes 46 counties in the Panhandle. There are 26 Texas counties, 10 in Oklahoma, four in New Mexico and three in Kansas.

The rules of the National Spelling Bee stipulate that any boy or girl who has not reached his 16th birthday or passed beyond the eighth grade by June 1, 1973, is eligible to enter.

Each county director has complete control over the respective county and may conduct the contest as a verbal "battle of the words" or it may be by a written test. However, the regional bee in Amarillo will be conducted verbally.

The study book, compiled by the National Spelling Bee, New York City, contains more than 3,000 words, many of which have been used in the annual national contests. New in design and context, the booklet is available from the Amarillo Globe-News, P. O. Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79105. The price is 25c.

The 1972 champion from Briscoe County was Susan Grabbe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warner Grabbe. She was a student in the seventh grade in Silverton Junior High.

The only secondary contest conducted within the areas of the National Spelling Bee is also sponsored by the Amarillo newspapers and the University.

To acquaint boys and girls in the sixth and lower grades, a junior division contest is conducted. These county winners are special guests of the sponsors on Bee Day in Amarillo. Unless they hold a dual title, they do not speed.

The 1972 junior division champion was Domingo Castillo, jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Domingo Castillo

of Quitaque.

A list of prizes to be awarded will be made available at a later date.

The deadline for all county contests is March 31, 1973.

The grand winner will receive an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D. C. June 4-8. In the nation's capital the lucky youngster will compete in the 45th National Spelling Bee along with other boys and girls from all over the United States, as well as Guam and Puerto Rico.

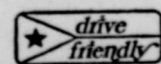

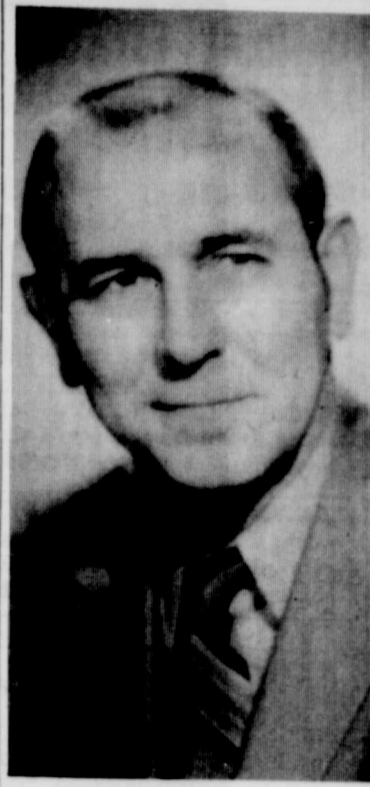

New Reform Measure Introduced By Christian

A new reform measure has been introduced to the Texas Legislature by Representative Tom Christian of Claude.

The bill is designed to prohibit a member of the Legislature from sponsoring and voting on legislation involving instances of conflict of interest.

The measure, which the governor has been requested to include for consideration in the current special session, provides that no member of the Legislature may sponsor or vote on any legislation which directly affects a person from whom the member receives salary, a retainer fee or other compensation.

The bill further states that a person who violates this act is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is punishable by a fine of not more than \$500.

"This bill will correct an area which has been subject to much abuse," Rep. Christian said. "It is essential that we have guidelines that legislators can follow in performing their duties as responsible lawmakers."

INSIDE THE LEGISLATURE WITH REP. TOM CHRISTIAN

Twenty-seven subjects—led by competitive insurance rates and gubernatorial fiscal authority measures—have now been submitted to Texas lawmakers in the present 30-day special session.

Governor Smith opened the call of the special session last week to 16 additional subjects. Among new legislation to be considered is a bill of which I am a co-sponsor dealing with the allowance of spraying cattle for scabies control rather than the current mandatory dipping regulation.

In the Senate, the first bills of the current session were passed, giving the governor emergency budgetary funds. These bills now come to the House for consideration.

Prospects dimmed for the Governor's proposed insurance reform as the Senate Economic Development Committee voted down Dallas Senator's Mike McKool and Oscar Mauzy's competitive care and home insurance rate bill.

Texas lawmakers are struggling through their fourth special session in two years, attempting, among other things, to unravel the intricacies of competitive auto insurance rates.

The Texas Legislature has been called into special session 17 times in the past 15 years to enact emergency legislation such as this.

Special sessions can be languorous. Because of the governor's power to open the call to subjects of his choosing, the session can become a political football, as was the case recently when the Governor offered to open the call to pet projects of key legislators in return for Bob Bullock's confirmation to the state insurance board.
