Keith Marshall Is Citizen Of The Year

"I am speechless for the first time in my life!"

That was the exclamation of Keith Marshall, Silverton Church of Christ minister, after he had been announced as the recipient of the first annual Citizen of the Year Award presented Monday night by the Silverton Merchants

Association. Stan Fogerson, president of the businessmen's club, made the presentation during the Silverton Lions Club Ladies Night which was attended by approximately 100 Lions and their ladies and other guests in the Silverton School Cafeteria.

The Citizen of the Year for 1972 has been involved with young and old in Silverton, both as the minister of his church and as a member of the community. He is described as a person "with whom you could discuss your problems whether or not you are a member of his congregation."

He and his wife, Mary, are parents of three children: Rod, who is a student at South Plains College, Levelland; Tim, a senior in Silverton High School, and YoVonna, who is in the fifth grade. Both Mr. and Mrs. Marshall have been active in the 4-H Club program, she having been an adult leader and he having given programs and other assistance to the young people.

Marshall coached the Pee Wee baseball team that won the league championship with an undefeated record last summer. Each of the Pee Wee teams had eleven players, and Marshall was instrumental in re-writing the ground rules so that all the boys present could play in every game. Sometimes a team with eight players played a team with ten players, but everything always seemed to come out alright. Marshall's philosophy is: "I don't mind two boys sitting in the dugout together, but I don't want one boy to sit in there by himself." He also assisted with the Pee Wee and Little League All Star teams that participated in the Floydada Tournament, and the team for which Rod Marshall was in charge won the sportsmanship trophy.

Silverton's Citizen of the Year also works with the Boy Scouts, and is their assistant scoutmaster. He has served this year as president of the Booster Club, giving encouragement to young people and their coaches in this capacity.

He is a member of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Association, having taken the first aid course and being actively involved as an ambulance attendant. He assists with the gathering of wood, preparation and serving of the Silverton barbecue during the county's birthday celebration. He is an active member of the Silverton Lions Club, serving this year as song leader. He was instrumental in the organization of the Briscoe County Industrial Board.

Boss Lion James Griffin was master of ceremonies for the Ladies Night, and welcomed those present, after which the invocation was given by Marshall.

Shoplifting "Rip Off" Boomerangs

(Editor's Note: This is the first article in a series on consumer and merchant behavior—both helpful and harmful—and its cost in dollars to the public. As the holiday season approaches, prospects for crimes in stores throughout the United States increase and promise to hit hard at consumer pocketbooks. Still other victims of these crimes will be the criminals themselves—often ill-informed youth "following their crowd." This article views shoplifting costs to the shoplifter.)

Shoplifting—or "rip off," as it's termed by some recently—costs each American family about \$30 every year and totals some \$8 million each day, but the real victim is the shoplifter himself.

According to Dorothy Powell, County Extension Agent, this crime won't put the merchant out of business, but it may cheat the shoplifter out of a future.

"A person with a shoplifting 'record' frequently will have trouble getting a job that requires a license or the public trust—even that of a bonded stock boy," she noted.

A person with a "record" has trouble getting loans to buy things like a car, house or other major purchases. These people often become victims of unscrupulous lenders. College scholarships may be denied—one boy was refused military academy admission because he stole three cases of soda pop.

"If someone is convicted of shoplifting goods worth \$50 or more, the law says he has committed a felony. Thefts of \$50 or less are misdemeanors—subject to lesser penalties.

Jobs which a convicted felon will have difficulty getting are many—some are beauty operator, school teacher, real estate salesman or barber.

Also insurance agent, architect, certified public accountant, optometrist and undertaker.

"A broad range of occupations are closed to people with criminal records. They include police officer, stock broker, lawyer, security guard, fireman, private investigator and civil servant, such as postal employee.

"Convicted felons will be severely limited for a long time in attempts to secure employment from state, local or federal governmental agencies.

"It's impossible for a convicted felon to get into the National Guard and some branches of military service," Mrs. Powell said.

The agent urged those tempted with the crime to compare the value of an item with his or her future.

Gift Shopping By Mail

Gift shopping by mail can mean many advantages to customers as Christmas draws nearer.

Holiday buyers may save time and money shopping by mail—but first certain precautions are in order, according to Mrs. Dorothy Powell, County Extension Agent.

Wise shoppers will compare prices and goods at other kinds of stores—discount or wholesale stores and department stores—before buying by mail. A catalogue price isn't necessarily the lowest price available.

Also, the customer must order well in advance. Goods may suffer damages, be the wrong merchandise (not what was ordered), or not arrive at all. They even could be unsuitable due to misleading advertisements.

A checklist for the consumer buying by mail is as follows:

*Use a familiar company or ask

the Better Business Bureau for it.

*Follow mailing instructions carefully; write your return address clearly.

*Know shipping charges and handling fees in advance of the post office, United Parcel service or REA offices).

*Use checks or money order—don't mail cash.

*Know company policy on returns and substitutions.

*Keep records of order date check was mailed, and goods ordered.

To report problems or complaints, write the company in plain in detail. If this doesn't satisfy results, write the National Mail Advertising Association, Mail Order Actionline, 220 Avenue, New York, New York 10017.
