Each of the Patriot players, managers and coaches received beautiful individual plaques; the All-Regional girls received handsome individual trophies, and the team received a huge trophy for being the Region I Champs, further assuring that the trophy cases in the new Valley High School will never be empty.

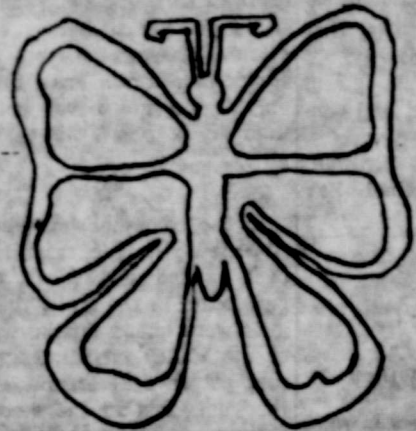

Before shopping, set priorities and analyze reasons for each purchase.

This advice comes from Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

"True, earning money is important—but spending it can be critical," she said.

"Consumers today are faced with seemingly endless products and multi-services. Therefore, purchasing decisions must be selective.

"Buying is always a matter of making choices," she continued. "Choices must be made between wants and needs, one product and another, and between saving or spending money.

"Although wise decisions require much thought, time and effort, they are definitely worth it. Wise decisions, based on priorities, can eliminate much emotional spending," the specialist said.

She offered some guidelines for setting purchase priorities.

"First, determine whether the product is really needed — and worth a sacrifice. Is it in line with the overall family spending plan?"

"If the item isn't necessary but is important to the person wanting it—and if he's aware of his reasons for purchase and willing to pay the price — there's nothing wrong with the decision to buy it.

"However, after close analysis of reasons and cost, a less desirable item may be selected.

"Knowing why an item is needed can help in understanding motives," Mrs. Myers pointed out.

"There's a big difference in need when an item for work is considered—rather than one for pleasure."

Another consideration concerns expectations—how long is the item expected to last or be in use? Quality and durable products last longer.

"On the other hand, if the item isn't used often, it doesn't have to be as durable as one used constantly."

Mrs. Myers emphasized another factor—whether the item is purchased simply because it's on sale.

The 'sale' sign or bargain idea attracts many shoppers. As a result, unneeded items often are

Selection Of Trees Shrubs Is Best Now

According to County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstory, now is the time to find the best selection of trees or shrubs at garden centers and nurseries.

Trees and shrubs are generally sold in three forms: balled and burlapped (B & B), container-grown and bare roots.

For the B & B type, a ball of soil, in proportion to the top growth of the plant, is wrapped in burlap and pinned. In handling, the plant should not be lifted by its stem or trunk. Rough handling can loosen the ball of soil and endanger the plant.

"B & B plants are usually larger than container-grown plants of the same price. They are usually field-grown and may be better adjusted to conditions in your landscape," says Vanstory.

Container-grown plants are continuing to gain popularity. The most common sizes are one and five gallon containers. Two distinct advantages of plants grown in containers are that there is less shock during transplanting and less chance of damage due to rough handling.

Metal cans are usually cut with special shears by the nurseryman so that the plant can be lifted out of the container with a minimum root disturbance. Some of the new plastic containers are designed to allow the ball of soil to slip out without cutting the sides. Plants should never be planted with the container intact.

Many fruit and nut trees as well as some shrubs and vines are offered for sale with bare roots or with roots packaged in sawdust or similar material. Such plants do best if set out during the dormant periods of late fall and winter.

"When setting out bare root plants, two things are important. First, never allow the root system to dry out or be completely submerged in water for long periods of time. Second, pruning at transplanting time is essential," cautions Vanstory.

The amount of pruning differs purchased.

"Some people have gone broke buying so-called bargains. Inexpensive items—if not needed—are too expensive to buy.

"Compare qualities as well as prices," the specialist continued. "Fantastic" deals are often just that—too unrealistic to be true.

"Don't forget to ask about the cash price of the item.

"Also find out what credit is available. Does the business offer 30, 60 or 90 day charge accounts? If so, these are interest-free conveniences when the total is paid by the time allowed," Mrs. Myers explained.

"If a major purchase will involve an installment plan, determine annual percentage rate and total amount stated in dollars—before deciding to buy," she concluded.

among species but generally a third to a half of the top growth should be removed. Any damaged roots should also be pruned back to healthy wood.

Regardless of the type of tree or shrub you plant, be sure to dig the hole large enough, at least 1 1/2 times larger than the diameter of the ball or root spread. Set the plant at the same depth it grew at the nursery and work plenty of humus material into the soil. Tamp the soil and then water thoroughly. A good mulch on the surface, along with adequate water, will insure maximum growth during the establishment period. A small amount of fertilizer may be added when new growth begins.
