### Silverton Firm Gets Water Line Contract

Rhode Pipe Company has been awarded a contract to complete the final two phases of extending water pipelines to property owners in an eight-county area.

Rhode's low bid was \$552,889.10. Phases III and IV of the Thirsty Water System include extending lines north and northwest of Childress into the Union Flat area and work in the Community Center, Kirkland, Goodlett and Medicine Mound areas and in Foard County.

The Red River Authority buys water for the Thirsty Water System, its subsidiary, from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, which secures its water from Greenbelt Lake near Larendon.

Most grants and loans have been secured through the Farmers Home Administration in Childress, of which Chester Sinclair is superintendent.

When the system is completed, slightly more than 500 miles of water lines will have been extended to property lines, serving an additional 1,000 customers.

The project work is in the following counties: Wilbarger, Hardeman, Childress, Cottle, Hall, Donley, Collingsworth and Foard.

The nearly \$1.8 million total cost amounts to about 75% of what the federal government has allotted to be spent on rural water systems in the state of Texas.

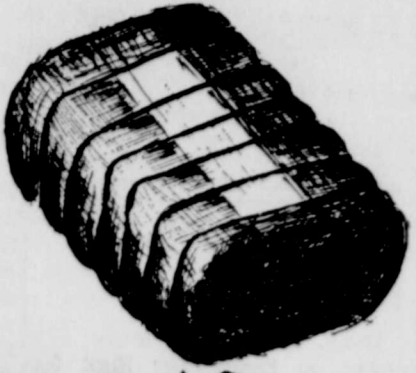

Silverton: Heart Of The Scenic Caprock

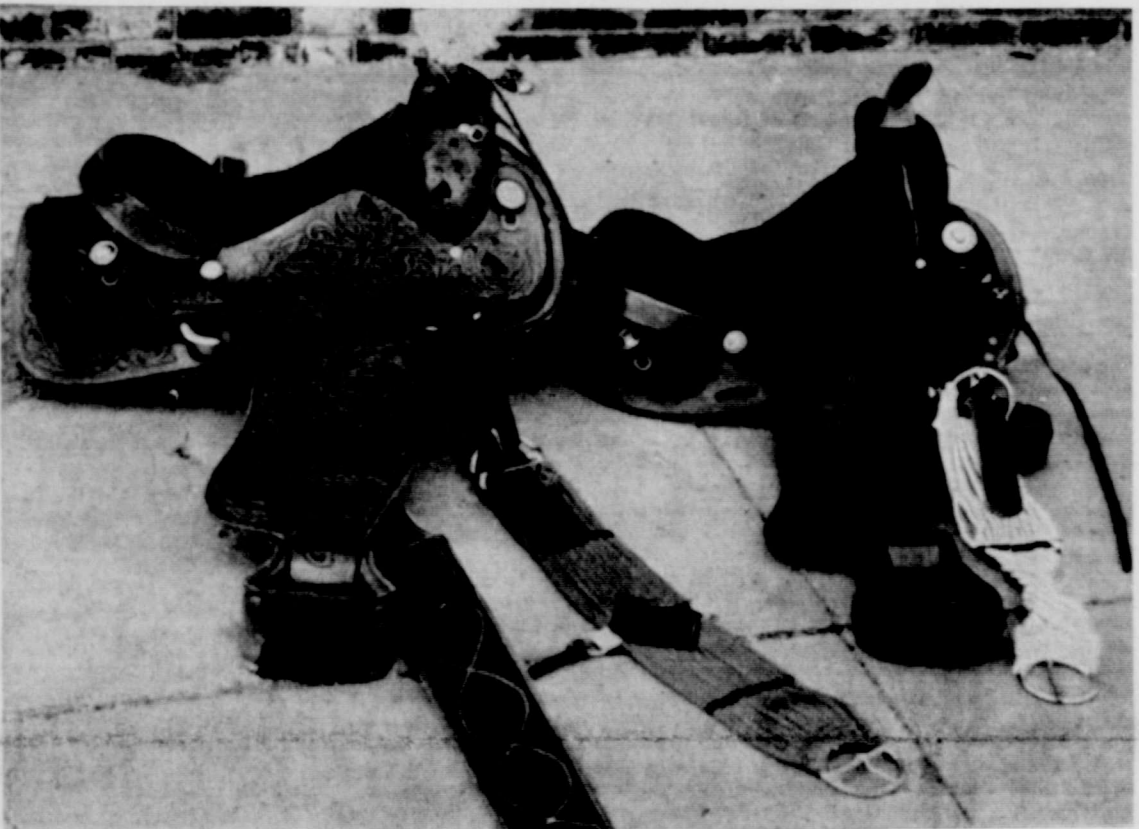

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### Disaster Loan Program Has Been Reopened

Protest petitions, court action, and political pressure paid off for farmers this week when the Farmers Home Administration announced the reopening of the Disaster Loan Program. Hundreds of farmers in over two hundred Texas counties who suffered crop losses as a result of drought between January 1 and June 19 of 1972 are now eligible to apply for the \$5,000 Disaster Loan at a low interest rate with a forgiveness provision.

Texas Farmers Union president Jay Naman of Waco hailed the announcement of the program reopening as a "great victory for farmers." Naman said that farmers were successful in accomplishing the reopening of the important

program because of their organized efforts using political pressure and court action. "Hundreds of family farmers who were stricken by disaster last year will now have a new lease on life and will be able to get the financing that they need to continue farming," Naman said.

"Farmers Union never gave up when President Nixon announced the cancellation of the Disaster Loan Program. Texas farmers organized petition campaigns to show the Administration and members of Congress the need to restore the program. Minnesota Farmers Union coordinated successful legal action that was brought by a group of farmers in that state against the Secretary of Agriculture and Farmers Home Administration officials. The court action plus the organized political effort of farmers was responsible for the restoration of the Disaster Loan Program.

"We urge that all farmers eligible for a disaster loan make application at their county Farmers Home Administration office before the May 8 deadline. We want to be sure that all farmers who suffered losses from disaster circumstances to take advantage of the program," Naman said.

### DPS Investigates Four Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of March, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no deaths and two persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1973 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in one person killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region 5 for March 1973, shows a total of 468 accidents, resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured as compared to March 1972, with 420 accidents, resulting in 23 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 48 more accidents, four less fatalities and 45 more injured in 1973, at the same period of time.

The veteran officer reminds you that springtime is approaching, the weather will clear up, but the highways will become more congested.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of March 1973 occurred in the following counties: four in Gray and Moore, two in Hale, Terry, Hall and Potter, and one in Wise, Hutchinson and Randall.

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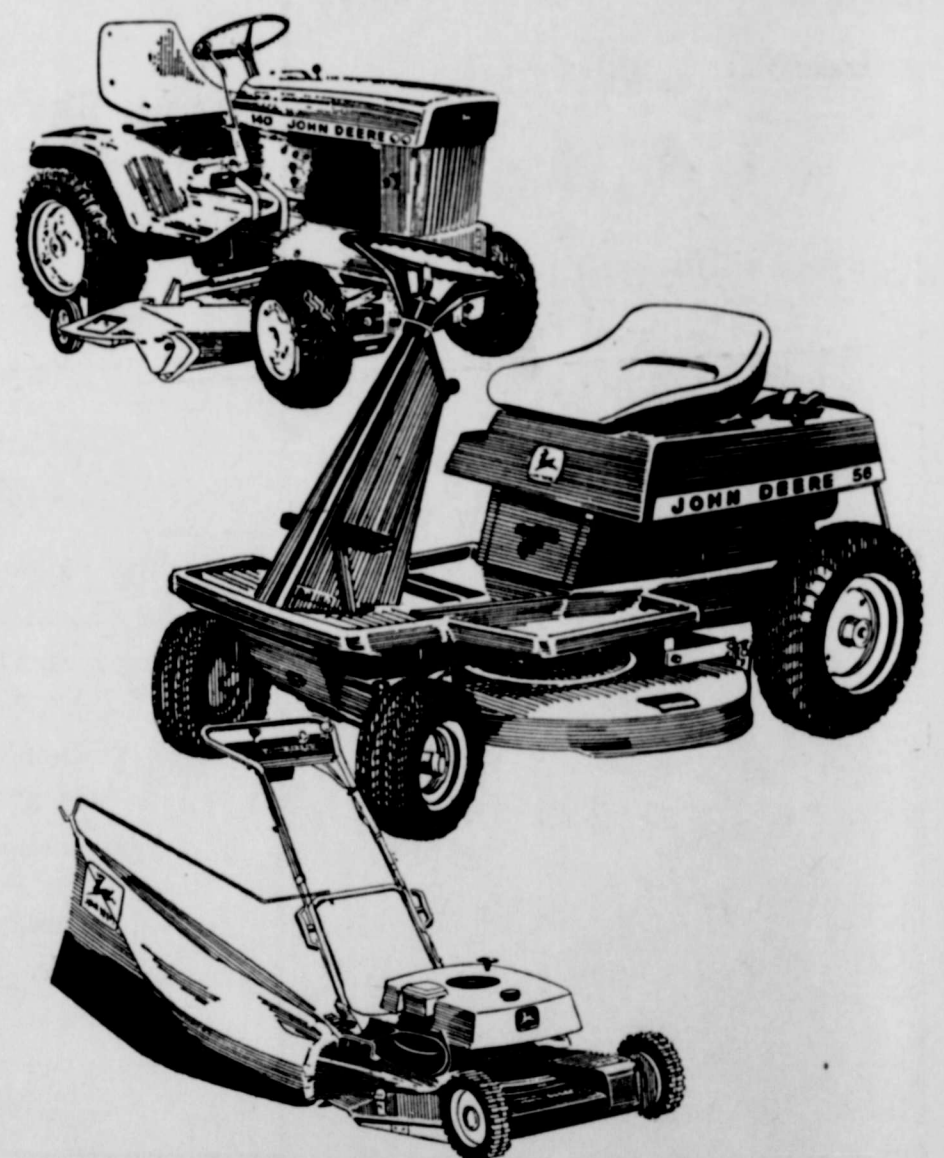
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
