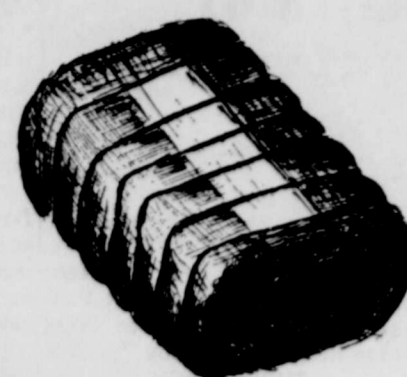
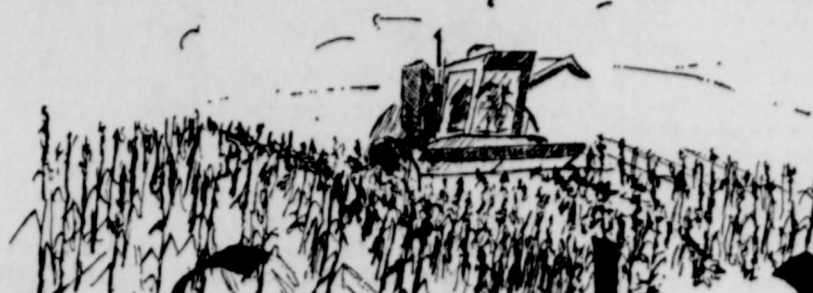

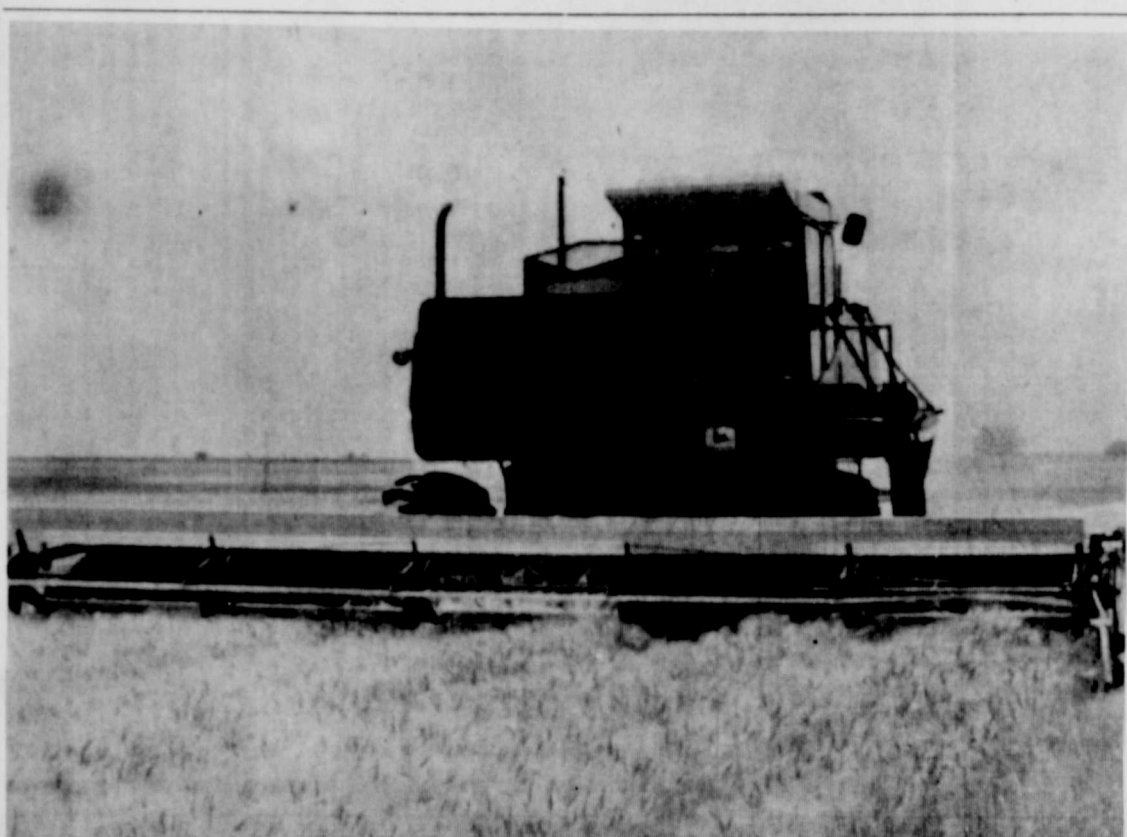

Born in Hopkins County on December 20, 1889, Mr. Gregg came to the Quitaque area of Briscoe County with his parents, W. S. and Emily Gregg, when he was only six months old. The trip, made by covered wagon, took more than a month and the family homesteaded three miles west of the present site of Quitaque.

That first home was a three-foot deep dugout covered with three feet of cottonwood logs cut by the family.

When the family moved into a house four years later and W. S. Gregg had become a county commissioner, the house served as the station where the mail wagon stopped to change horses on its daily run from Clarendon to the "F" Ranch in Briscoe County below Quitaque. At the ranch, the mail was dumped in an empty Arbuckle coffee box, for area residents to claim.

Mr. Gregg liked to tell the story of the Indian scare that caused his mother to take all the children to the "F" Ranch for several days. "Some man passing through reported that the Indians driven out of Palo Duro Canyon and into their reservation in Oklahoma were on the rampage," he said. No Indians ever showed up.

He used to talk about the plentiful game in the region, recalling that corpses of buffalo lay everywhere in the area when he was a boy. White settlers killed the buffalo, skinned them, and sold the hides, he said.

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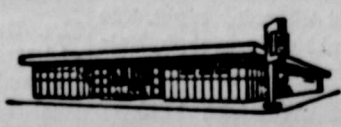
