**WVSDA 1974 Program Announcement Made**

In order to assure adequate supplies for domestic and export markets, the Secretary has announced there will be no government purchase of land for 1974.

The maintenance of an established conserving base will not be required as a condition of eligibility to receive price support or program payments.

The effect of this announcement will be to free farmers to go all-out to produce feed grains, soybeans, wheat and cotton. This announcement will also permit farmers to begin making plans for 1974 crops.

Producers with existing CAP or CCP agreements which continue through 1974 and subsequent years will, at their option, have the opportunity to terminate such agreements. Specific instructions regarding handling CAP agreements which may be terminated will be announced later.

**4-H County Camp Is Scheduled July 27 - 28**

All Briscoe County 4-H members, 4-H leaders and their families are reminded that County Camp will be at Palo Duro State Park July 27-28.

**Riding Club Wins Second Place Trophy**

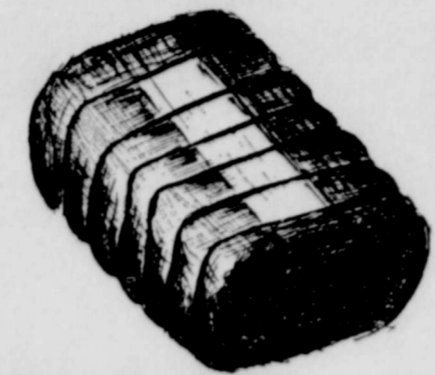
Silverton Riding Club went to Dallas and participated in the parade with 14 members Saturday, July 21. The club won second place.

### Young Farmer From New Zealand Visiting In Briscoe County

Members of the Silverton Young Farmers, Young Homemakers, several businessmen and guests and their families gathered at the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank in Silverton Tuesday night, July 24, to meet John J. Ryan of Christ Church, New Zealand, who is visiting in Briscoe County for two weeks.

Everyone was extremely impressed with the slides Ryan showed depicting the scenic beauty of New Zealand as well as the farming practices, animal production and dairy industry.

Ryan is in the United States with the IFYE (International Farm Youth Exchange) Program, for a six months stay, living with families in different areas of the country to learn the cultural habits as well as the farming, farm management and ranching practices here. He has been in Texas for about two and a half months, visiting in the areas of Junction, Brady, Dimmitt and Silverton. He will be leaving Monday for Beaumont where he will stay for three weeks before going to Maryland.

Ryan is a young man of 25, a graduate of the Agricultural School at the University of Christ Church with a degree in agriculture and farm management. He lives on a farm just 12 miles outside the city of Christ Church, and farms in a corporation with his father and 23-year-old brother.

These false alarms could cause some property owner to have a tragic loss due to slowness of the firemen or the truck being out of town on a hoax call. The firemen want to do their best, but someone is interfering with their efficiency.

To report a fire please speak clearly when they answer (there are usually 10 or more persons on the fire line and it helps if you speak up distinctly). Give the firemen your name and the location of the fire. By identifying yourself clearly you will not be mistaken for a prank caller.

And unless you can afford the fine, better think twice before you make a false fire report.

### PREVENTATIVE ASTHMA DRUG IS APPROVED

American Lung Association of Texas today reported that the first preventative aid in the management of allergic asthma has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in the United States. The Christmas Seal group stated that the new drug, chromolyn sodium, is now available to be given to allergic asthma sufferers.

"The new drug represents a major advance in that it is given when the person is free of asthma in order to prevent an attack," a spokesman said. "It is particularly useful in seasonal asthma due to pollen."

Chromolyn sodium, he said, is intended to be taken on a regular basis to prevent attacks, and has no role in the symptomatic treatment of acute asthmatic episode. It will be marketed under the name of Intal by Fisons Corporation, the developer, and Aarane by Syntex Laboratories.

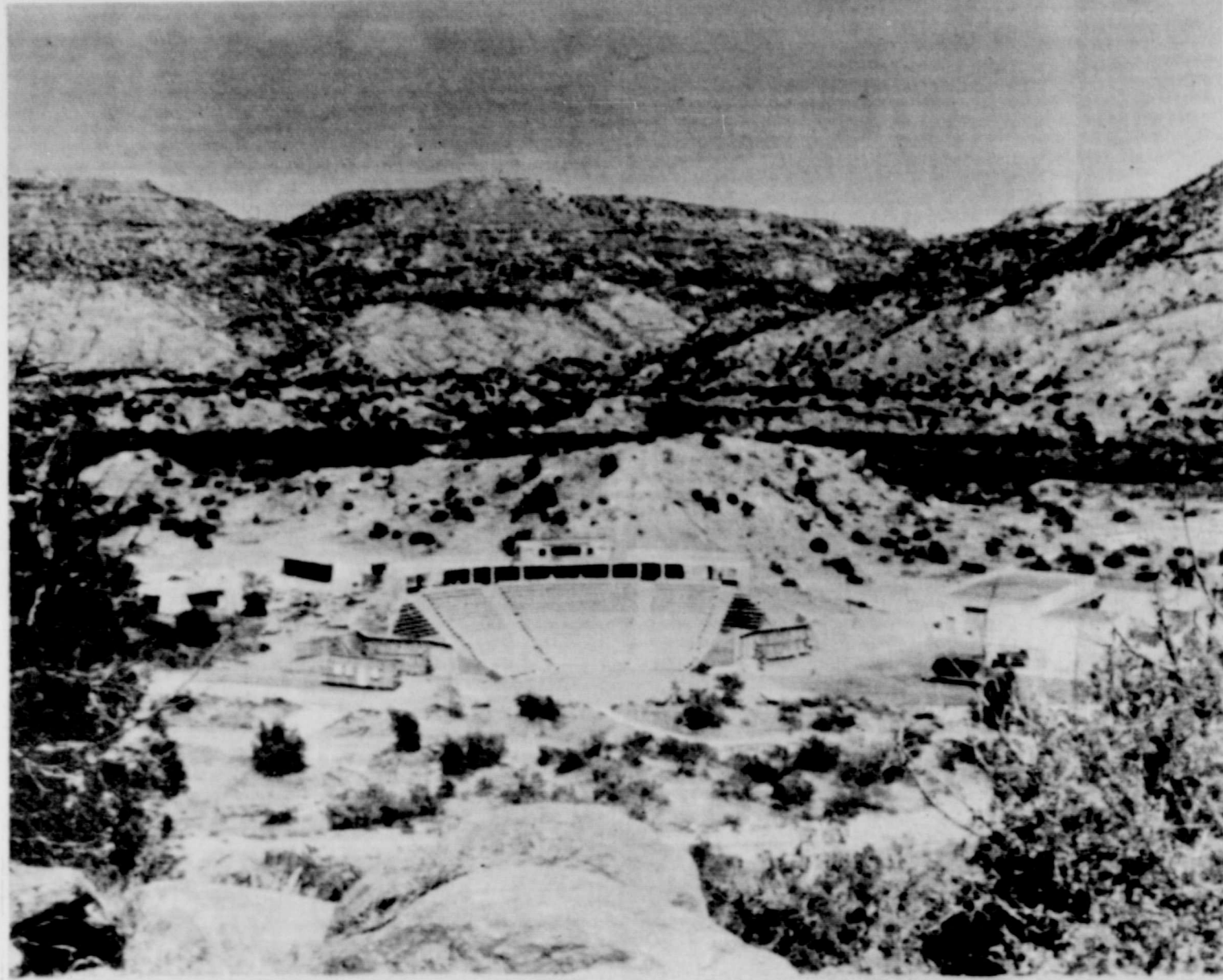

**Consumer Complaints**

Consumers have the right to complain—and to expect adjustments—on purchases that fall short.

They also have the responsibility of making justified complaints—not those stemming from consumer negligence or abuse, Mrs. Dorothy Powell, County Extension Agent, noted.

Consumers can follow several guidelines to insure better products and services.

Make a habit of keeping receipts, hangtags, warranties, and care labels in one convenient place so they're available if needed for merchandise returns.

Before buying, read instructions carefully concerning use, storage, washing, oiling and other general care for a preview on what to expect from the product. After buying, follow instructions.

This may eliminate the need to return merchandise.

When returning merchandise avoid making returns near closing

**TRACTORS CAN BE SAFE**

Competent operation, use of protective equipment and proper maintenance could prevent most tractor and farm machinery accidents, says Jimmy Vanstory, County Extension Agent.

National Farm Safety Week (July 25-31, is a good time to review farm safety and to take preventative action where necessary.

The National Safety Council, which sponsors National Farm Safety Week along with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, estimates that tractor accidents claim from 800 to 1,000 lives and cause thousands of injuries annually.

More than half of all tractor accident fatalities involve overturns. Rollover protective cabs and frames could eliminate more than 90

percent of the fatalities, points out Vanstory. Many farmers do not have rollover protection on their equipment due to the investment it requires. However, such protection is important and is being considered as a possible requirement under the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

To avoid hazards of farm machinery operation, Vanstory advises operators to:

- Stay clear of ditches, embankments and holes to avoid upsets.
- Cut speed when turning, crossing slopes and rough, slick or muddy surfaces.
- Watch where you're going at row ends, on roads and near trees; watch for and avoid obstacles and be sure everyone is clear before moving.
- Stay off hills and slopes too steep for safe operation.
- Don't overload; engage the clutch slowly with a heavy load to avoid backward tip.
- Hitch loads only to the drawbar (if the drawbar is on a three-point hitch, set it no higher than the fixed drawbar); use front weights to balance the tractor.
- Keep PTO shields in place; shut off PTO before unclogging, adjusting or servicing equipment.
- Set wheels as wide as practical for better stability.
- When stopped, put tractor out of gear, firmly set brakes and use the park lock; remove the key.

time or during rush hours. If leaving an item for repairs—or if a refund will be mailed to you—be sure to get a receipt for the item.

In making a complaint be calm and courteous. Be friendly, but firm, and don't be sarcastic or abusive.

Let the facts speak for themselves. State the facts clearly—where and when the product was purchased, its model number (if any), brand name, price and what is wrong with it.

Try to explain what went wrong, when and how the defect appeared.

If telephoning complaint, ask name of person receiving complaint. If writing a letter, include your name, address, zip code and telephone number on all correspondence and keep carbon copies. Company addresses appear in "Poor's Register of Corporations, Directors and Executives" or "Moody's Industrial Manual" in most libraries.

If a company doesn't respond to a first letter within two or three weeks, send a second letter. If there is still no response, refer the matter to Consumer Protection lawyers in the nearest regional office or the state attorney general.

**Kitchen Carpets**

Kitchen carpets promise convenience in return for careful selection and a little extra daily care, according to Patricia A. Bradshaw.

"Daily care means removing spots and spills quickly, then sponging carpet—along with frequent vacuuming," the housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said.

She brought up several points for selecting kitchen carpeting. "For practical use, multicolors or tweeds show soil less than solid colors.

"Medium to fairly dark colors tend to stay 'fresh' longer—deep dark shades show lint and surface dust more readily, and light areas show spots.

"Good quality kitchen carpeting should consist entirely of man-made fibers because they aren't subject to mildew or rot. The face should be a non-absorbent, easy-to-clean fiber such as nylon, acrylic or olefin. Olefins are the most stain-resistant.

"The carpet should have a water-resistant barrier to help prevent liquids from soaking through and causing mildew or rot. "It should have a short, dense, loop pile that will suspend crumbs and spilled substances on top of the surface for easy cleaning.

"Kitchen carpet requires less scrubbing and no waxing, absorbs much kitchen noise, and lessens the danger of breakage," she added.

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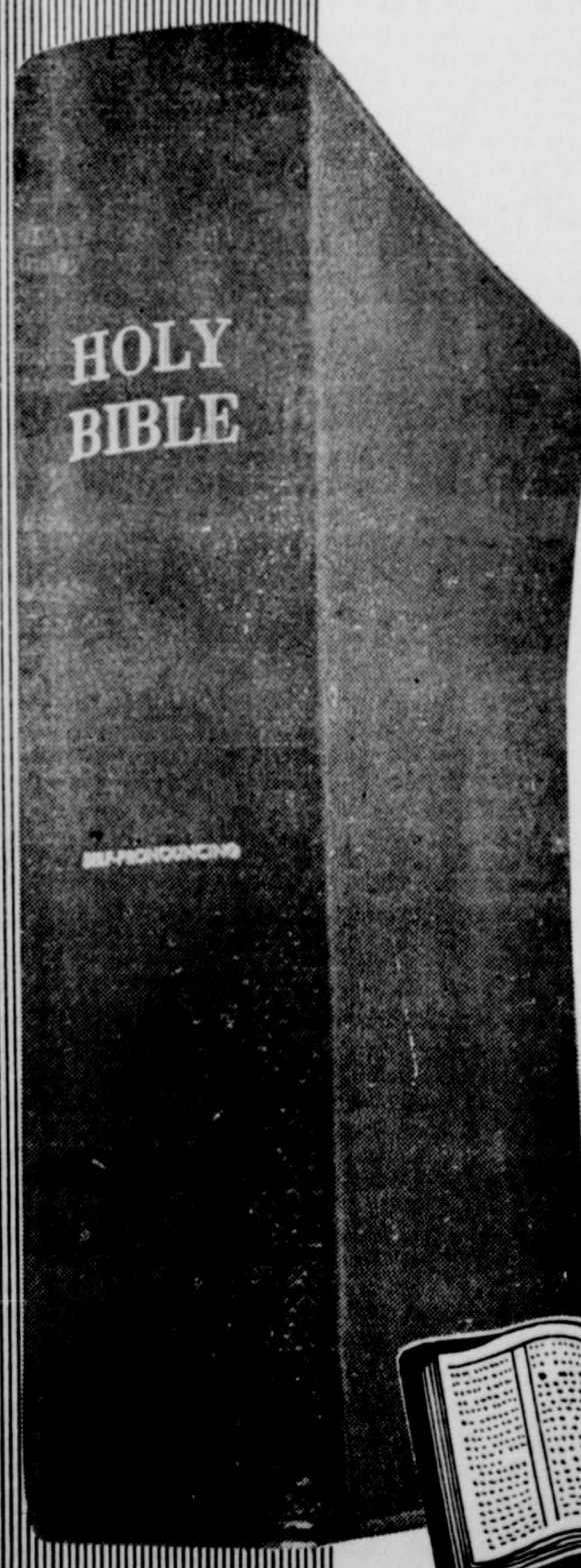

The bible, itself, is not worshipped, but is respected, for it is the story of God and his relationship to man. It is man's guide for worship and daily living.

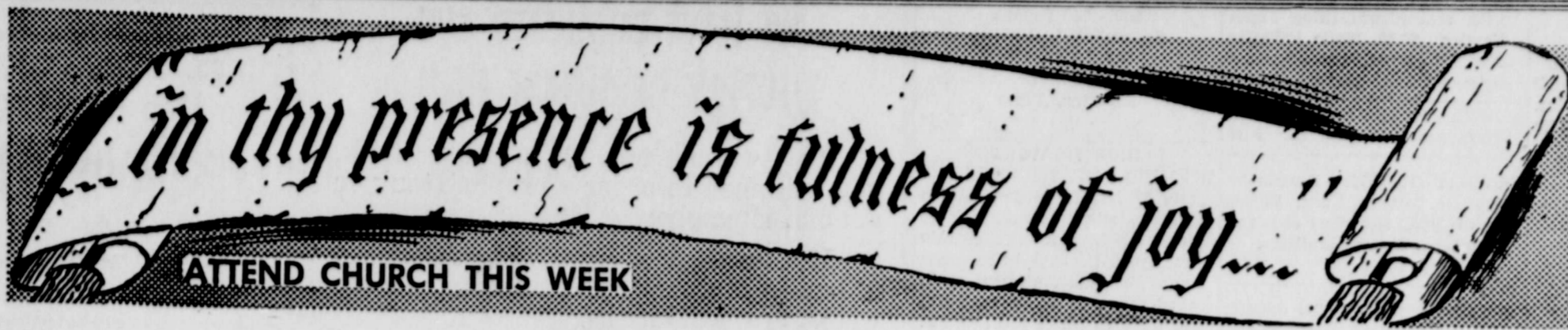
Attend church regularly, study, and seek God's will in your life.

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
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
