## Archeology Project To Begin In Tule Canyon

With Mackenzie Dam scheduled to begin holding water by early October, archeologists will begin a crash digging program on archeological sites threatened by the proposed rising waters.

The sites—some 18 of them will be under the lake—had threatened to forestall completion of the dam, but spokesman for the Gilvin-Terrill Construction Company of Amarillo and Goodnight now say they expect both can be done without delay.

Dr. Jack Hughes, head of the anthropology department at West Texas State University in Canyon, will head the digging project, aided by Billy R. Harrison, archeologist with the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

The scientists' work will be financed by \$35,000 in state emergency funds, recently allocated by Governor Dolph Briscoe.

The \$35,000 represents half of Hughes' estimate of the total cost of exploring the sites which will eventually be flooded by the new lake.

The \$8 million dam—the largest locally-financed dam in the country—will provide municipal water for Tulla, Silverton, Floydada and Lockney.

Hughes said the digging teams will focus first on the 18 sites which will be flooded during the first year of the dam's existence, hoping for future funding to allow them to stay ahead of the water.

Hughes said the sites in question are mostly open camp sites of both historic and prehistoric Indians. There is some evidence of a sedentary culture which may have occupied the area in prehistoric times, and such sites are included in the initial study.

He said there is a chance that the diggers will unearth remains of the prehistoric creatures which lived in North America in the canyon which provided wood, shelter and water for men who hunted on the adjoining Plains.

Hughes said there are some 70 sites in the immediate area of the dam, and these range from the Paleo-Indians up through early habitations of the area's earliest Caucasian settlers.

## Seven Accidents Reported During Month of August

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of August, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

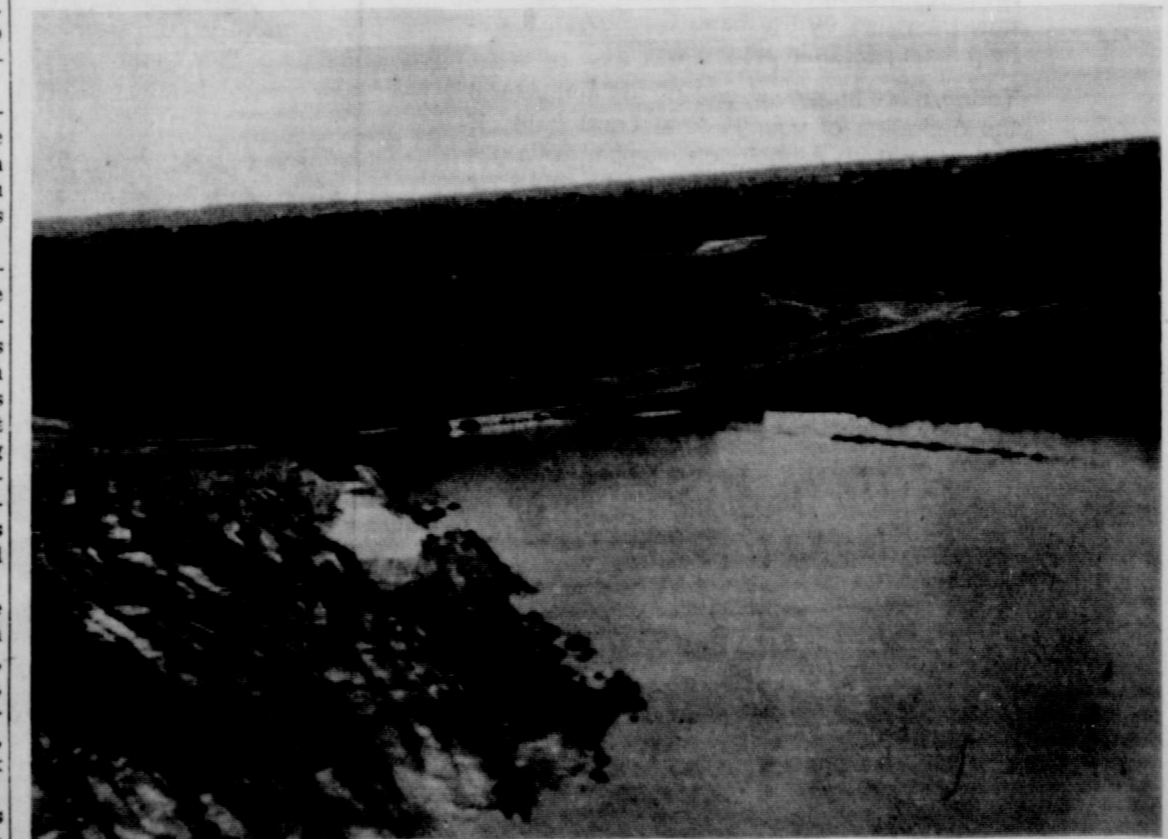
These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1973 shows a total of 33 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August 1973 shows a total of 586 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 328 persons injured as compared to August 1972 with 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured. This was 7 less accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 31 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of August 1973 occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Armstrong, Castro, Dallam, Swisher, Baylor, Clay, Wise counties, two each; and Deaf Smith, Donley, Parmer, Haskell Lubbock and Lynn counties, one each.

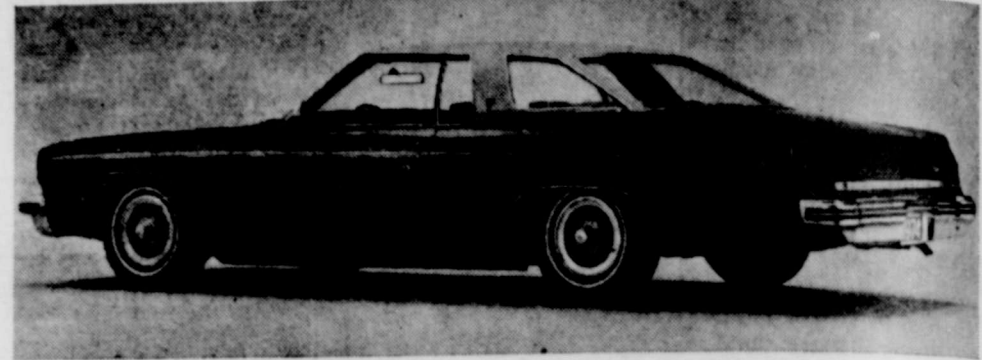
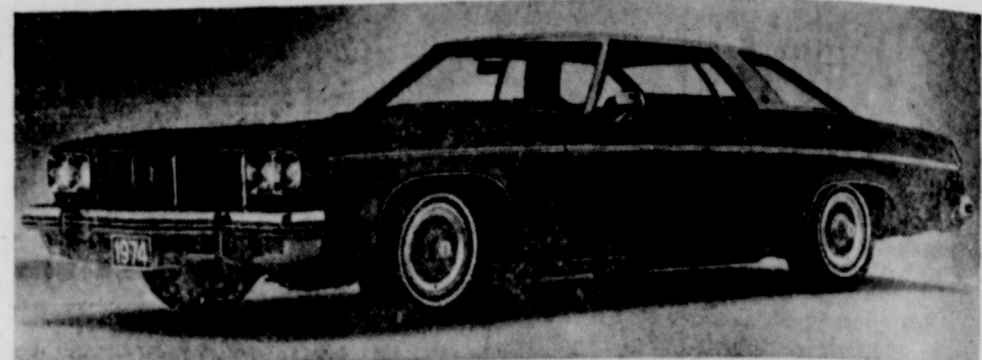

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September 30 Is  
Special Day For  
Mrs. Gladys Welch

September 30 is a day that holds many memories for Mrs. Gladys Welch of Silverton. On that day in 1943 she had the pleasure of christening a ship for the California Shipbuilding Corporation of Wilmington, California, the S. S. Orson D. Munn.

Mrs. Welch was a member of the women's workforce that was employed at the shipyard. She worked as an electric welder there, and later managed a Safeway store in Taos, New Mexico. She was also a yard clerk for Southern Pacific Railroad at Tucumcari before coming to Silverton and working for a number of years for Nance's Food Store.

You couldn't get in to the christening ceremony on Terminal Island without an identification badge due to the national security surrounding the shipbuilding industry. No children under 15 were permitted to attend.

The money for the S. S. Orson D. Munn was raised in a War Bond drive. In her christening speech, Mrs. Welch said: "I am sure if all the American people could but see these marvelous ships that are being built here and fully appreciate the good that they are doing, more bonds would be sold. Good luck to the S. S. Orson D. Munn and her crew. May the fuel oil she will carry help propel the machines of war paid for by your hands."

An official of the shipyard was



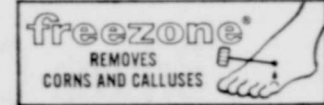

standing by to break the bottle of champagne in case Mrs. Welch missed in her attempt to christen the ship, but the bottle broke, splashing champagne on those nearby. "The sailors didn't like to go to sea on a ship that hadn't had a champagne bottle broken on its hull," Mrs. Welch said.

Welch was made to hang in the cabin of the ship. A picture of her, as the ship's sponsor, was to hang as long as the ship was in service.

Mrs. Welch was conducted on an inspection of the ship prior to the christening, and following the ceremony she was taken to dine at the Brown Derby in Hollywood.

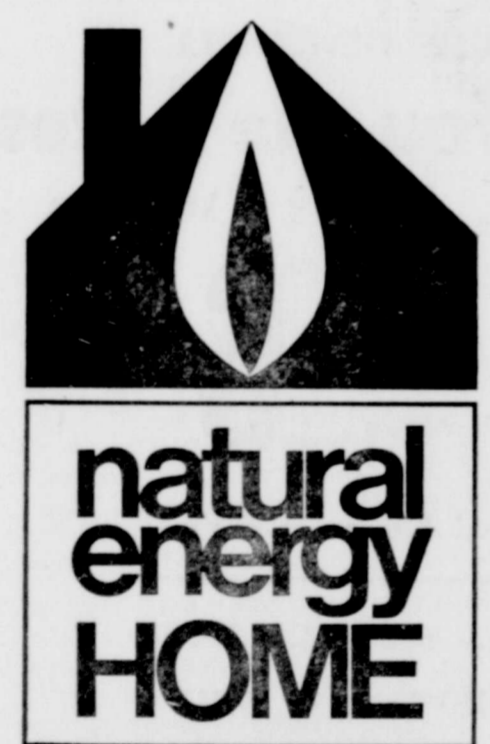

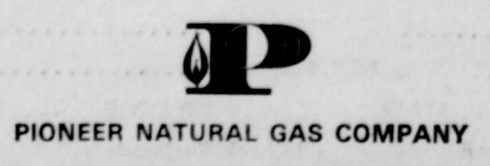

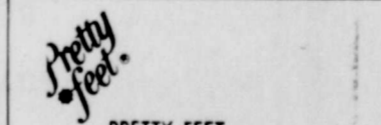

## PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)**

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session; Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)**

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)**

Article XVI, Section 59 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)**

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)**

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)**

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million; Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)**

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding limitations on total tax rates, to levy such additional valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)**

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

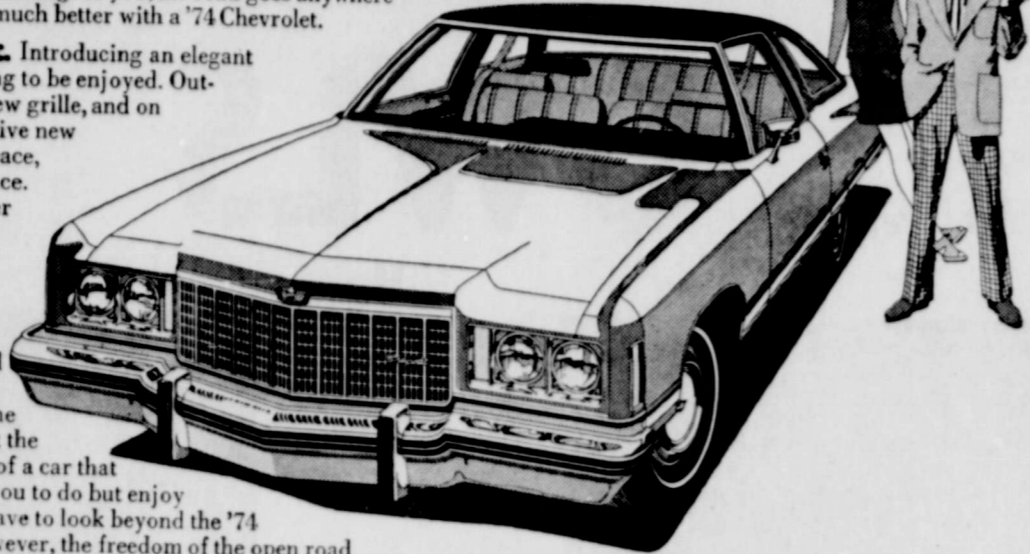
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

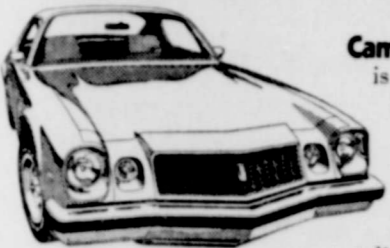

Q. I'm working full time and so is my husband. We have three children under 10. I want to know if our children could get social security payments on my earnings record under the same rules that apply to their father's earnings?

A. Yes, they can get payments if either you or your husband becomes entitled to social security payments or if one of you should die after working long enough under social security.

If a child becomes entitled to benefits on the record of one parent, he may receive monthly checks even though the other parent continues to work.

#### FROZEN INGREDIENTS

Recipes often call for chopped, grated, diced or minced ingredients.

Do this time-consuming work ahead of time—then freeze the various ingredients until needed, suggests Mrs. Dorothy Powell.

For example, grate cheese a pound or two at a time. One pound makes about four cups grated cheese. Measure it in one-cup units—or in the amount wanted most often.

Place cheese in air-tight containers or wrap in moisture-vapor-resistant plastic wrap, and freeze. American process cheese freezes well.

Chop a pound or two of onions at a time, either with a knife or in

a blender for finely chopped pieces. Wrap in 1/2-cup or 1/4-cup units in air-tight plastic wrap.

Place packages in a glass freezer jar that can be tightly closed, to keep the onion odor from escaping, and freeze.

Green peppers also can be chopped and frozen. Mince parsley and then put in the freezer. Both should be packaged in convenient-sized units, then placed in air-tight containers.

Keep bread crumbs on hand in the freezer, too. Save bread heels until you have several. Crumb them in the blender, or between two sheets of wax paper with a rolling pin.

Store in an air-tight freezer container. If preferred, lightly butter

the heels before crumbing to make buttered crumbs.

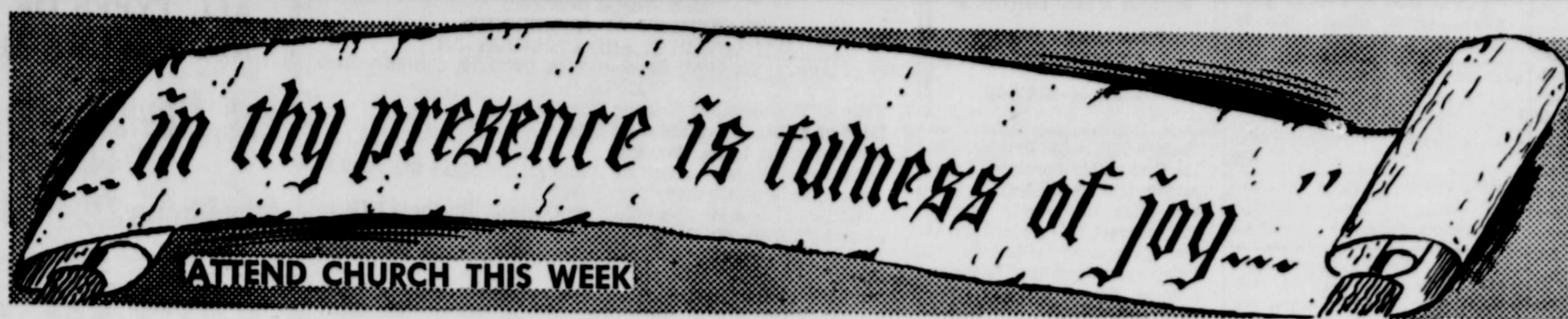
