

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The reg-ular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period

not to exceed 30 days; Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular

Provide that no appro-priation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated rev enue rather than biennial The wording of the pro-
