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

# **Commission lowers** speed limit on selected county roads

#### By SAMUEL VILLARREAL Journal Staff Writer

The Bailey County Commissioners Court Monday lowered the speed limit on two county roads.

The speed limit was reduced in response complaints from residents in the area about cars that were driving at what they deemed as excessive speeds near their homes.

"I was nearly run over (Sunday)," said area resident Felicia Green. "Someone just came barreling down the road and almost hit me."

Other residents who spoke at the public hearing were J.C. Pearson, Douglas Tennell, Tommy Green, and June Green.

Commissioners decided to reduce the speed limits on two stretches of dirt roads north of town from 60 to 45 miles per hour. The current speed limit for all unmarked county roads is 60 miles per hour.

Roads affected by the new speed limits are county roads 163 and 1038. The speed limit on county road 163 will be reduced from its intersection with U.S. highway 84 north for 1.5 miles.

The speed limit for county road 1038 will be reduced be-

ginning at its intersection with Texas highway 2079 east for 1.5 miles.

Commissioners felt that a speed limit of 45 miles per hour was reasonable considering the large number of families living in the area.

In other business, the Court hired

Clint, which won the Region I title in Lubbock last week handily, edged Ingram by three points. Clint finished with 77 points and Ingram with 80.





than other demographic groups. Less than 60% of the students in both groups passed all levels of the exit level white students.

that while scores by Hispanic and economically disadvantaged students are lower than other demographic groups, they have risen compared to previous years. The percentage of Hispanic passing all sections of the exil level TAAS rose from 28.2% in 1995 to 58.3% in 1996. Ecomically disadvantaged students improved to 54.8% in 1996, up from only 20% in 1995.



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

Mendoza completed the scoring with a 47-yard run that was set up by a long punt return by Kyle Atwood.





Preminger — Anatomy of a Filmmaker

Preminger — Anatomy of a Filmmaker is a revealing look at the life and work of prolific and controversial filmmaker Otto Preminger. The program features interviews with many of the actors, writers, and behind-the-scenes players who worked with the mercurial producer/ director during the 50 years of his remarkable career.

Preminger was the first filmmaker to declare independence from the Hollywood studio system. His films dealt with controversial subjects previously taboo in Hollywood movies: drug addiction, racial prejudice, rape, homosexuality, and political corruption.

Otto Preminger was born in Vienna in 1906, the son of the attorney general of the Austrian Empire. While earning a law degree, he became involved in the theater. After stints as an actor, director, and producer, he came to the United States in 1935 to direct a Broadway play. He then went to Hollywood to work for 20th Century-Fox. Preminger broke from the traditional Hollywood studio system and became an independent producer in the early 1950s. His bold and provocative talent left a legacy of "freedom of expression" for modern filmmakers. Preminger died in 1986






