Teams In Hale Center Tourney

Finnell Announces Candidacy For Texas Senate Post

State Representative Charles Finnell of Holliday (Archer County) announced today as a candidate for State Senator, 30th Senatorial District, vacated by Jack Hightower of Vernon who has announced plans to run for the U. S. Congress.

Finnell praised Hightower's work and said that their team efforts over the past eight years "have given me an understanding of the needs of the entire vast area of our district." The senatorial district, which includes Briscoe County, covers most of northwest Texas.

Finnell was honored by friends from throughout this area last week with an appreciation dinner in Holliday which attracted more than 500 supporters.

Finnell, a veteran of four terms in the Texas House of Representatives, promised to wage an active campaign in all 29 counties of the district—even though he will be busy in Austin as a delegate to the Texas Constitutional Convention this spring.

"The opportunity for meaningful public service in state government is greater today than ever before," Finnell commented.

"I will address myself to the problems confronting our state as a whole," Finnell said in his announcement, and "by doing so I hope to bring into perspective the problems and common goals of this district."

Finnell, who has never missed a day during his entire legislative career, was first elected to the House in 1966, carrying every county in the district, was elected in 1968 and 1970 without opposition, and won his fourth term last year by defeating three opponents without a runoff.

During the last eight years, Rep. Finnell has represented eight northwest Texas counties: Archer, Baylor, Clay, Jack, Montague, Throckmorton, Wichita and Young.

A native of Holliday and a member of a pioneer Archer County family, he attended the University of Texas in Austin and St. Mary's University School of Law in San Antonio. He and his wife Merrill attend the United Methodist Church in Holliday.

Finnell, who has served on the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee since 1966, is presently Chairman of the subcommittee studying agricultural equipment shortages. He is also Vice-Chairman of the important Elections committee. His colleagues chose him Vice-Chairman of the West Texas Delegation to the Texas House of Representatives.

Electric Company Now Member Of New Power Pool

Southwestern Public Service Company has become a member of the Southwest Power Pool, according to H. O. Hodson, vice president of engineering and construction for Southwestern Public Service Company.

The Southwest Power Pool is an organization of approximately 32 electric utilities in Texas, New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri and Louisiana and is one of nine power pools covering the nation. Transmission facilities of the SPP member companies are intertied so that electric power can be moved back and forth within the pool area and to the other seven power pools serving the eastern one-half of the United States.

"Our membership in the Southwest Power Pool is an outgrowth of our 230,000 volt intertie with the Public Service Company of Oklahoma and will afford our customers even more electric power should the need ever arise. In addition, through membership in the pool, Southwestern Public Service Company will make available any surplus capacity it might have to help other parts of the country with electric power in the case of emergency," Hodson said.

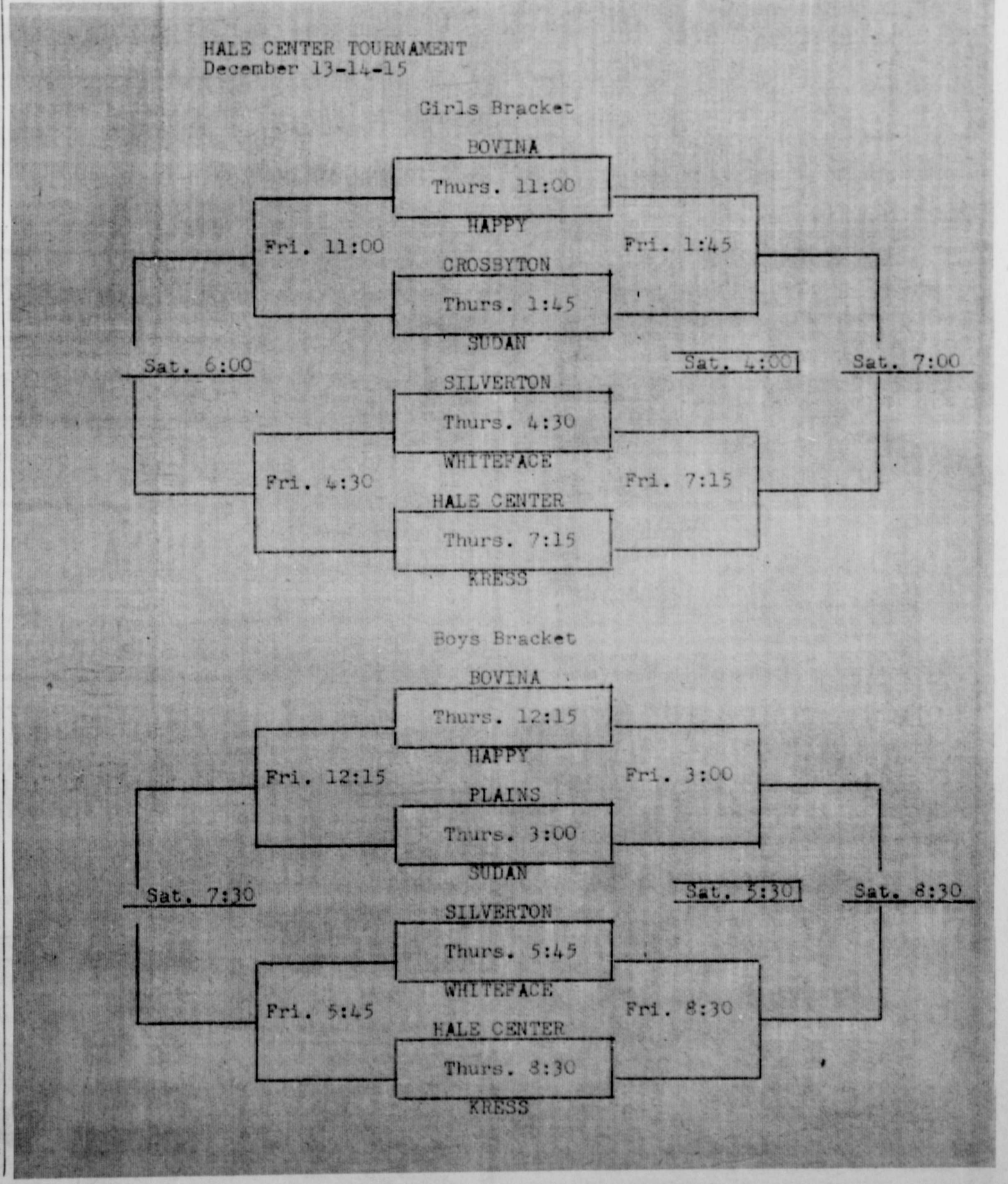

Farabee Seeking Election To State Senate Seat

Ray Farabee, a Wichita Falls businessman and attorney, has announced his candidacy for the Texas Senate in the 30th District. A Democrat, Farabee will seek the state seat being vacated by Jack Hightower who has announced for U. S. Congress in the 13th District.

The 41-year-old attorney expressed his concern over the growing lack of confidence in government and stated his belief that citizens care must become involved in order to reverse the trend.

"Although I have not sought any office before, I am willing to enter public life at this time because I believe I can offer all the people of the 30th District the mature, effective, common sense type of leadership that they expect and deserve.

"Good government needs the involvement of citizens who know the daily problems of working for living and raising a family. I have experienced these problems. I would like to use my abilities and knowledge to see that the interests and priorities of West Texas continue to be effectively represented and respected in Austin. I believe I am able to continue the type of quality leadership that Jack Hightower provided."

Farabee is a partner in the law firm of Fillmore, Lambert, Farabee Purdie. He holds degrees in business administration and law from the University of Texas in Austin. He attended Midwestern University and graduated from Wichita Falls High School.

Active with the State Bar of Texas, Farabee serves as co-chairman of the Responsible Citizenship Committee. He is a member of the Legal Aid Committee. His past service to the State Bar includes the Legislative Committee and the Special Task Force for Law Enforcement Problems.

He is a past vice president of the State Junior Bar and has served as president of the Wichita County Bar Association.

Farabee is a member of the First Baptist Church and an active member and past president of the Southwest Rotary Club. He is on the Board of Directors of Texas Bank & Trust in Wichita Falls and is secretary of Glass-Tex, Inc., a manufacturing firm in Electra.

He helped organize the North Texas Estate Planning Council and has served as its president.

Currently Farabee is president of Wichita Falls Educational Transactor, Inc. This is a non-profit organization which recently succeeded in bringing educational television from Dallas to Wichita Falls and the surrounding area.

The candidate is a member of the North Texas Citizen Advisory Committee to the Constitutional Revision Commission.

A former Air Force Intelligence Officer, Farabee and his wife, Helen, have been married 15 years. They have two sons, Steven, age 12 and David, age 10. They live at 1512 Buchanan, Wichita Falls.

Farabee concluded his announcement remarks by saying, "I believe that an effective senator is important to the continued development and prosperity of this district. I will welcome the opportunity to work for the people of West Texas and for the values that they and I deeply believe in."

Meeting Slated For Swine Producers

Swine producers in Northwest Texas will have an opportunity to consider a mandatory check-off on market hogs during a series of educational meetings in Lamesa, Canyon, Pampa and Vernon in December.

According to County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstory, the Texas Pork Producers Association (TPPA) may conduct a state-wide referendum and election if producers view as favorable the mandatory check-off program.

Educational meetings already have been held in Llano, Brenham and Lubbock, says Vanstory.

Meetings scheduled for the West Texas area are as follows: Lamesa, December 18, 7:30 p.m., Chamber of Commerce Building, 307 North Houston Avenue; Canyon, December 19, 7:30 p.m., Randall County Farm Bureau Building, 1714 5th Avenue; Pampa, December 20, 7:30 p.m. at the Courthouse Annex, ¼ mile east of Pampa city limits on Miami Highway; and Vernon, December 21, 7:30 p.m. at the Wilbarger Auditorium, 2100 Yamparka Street.

Swine producers in these areas, says Vanstory, are encouraged to attend one of these meetings, since the referendum would affect any swine producer regardless of the number of hogs he markets.

Participants in the meetings will include Marvin Sartin, area economist-management, Gilbert R. Hollis, area swine specialist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock; John Fair, executive vice-president, TPPA, and Bob Gray of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Norman Brints, Extension area economist-management at Vernon, will attend the discussion in Vernon in place of Sartin.

If the mandatory check-off program is viewed favorably by most producers, the TPPA will petition the Commissioner of Agriculture for certification to conduct the state-wide referendum and election.

The balloting would result in the election of fifteen (15) directors, from as many areas of the state, who will administer funding for research, education, promotion, and disease and insect control. By this system money taken from mandatory check-off on market hogs will be used to improve the production and marketing of swine, says the Agent.

All swine producers, he added, will be affected by the outcome of these meetings. It will be to their benefit to share their concerns, both pro and con, with other producers at these meetings.

Delegates Return From Seminar

New Registrars Are Appointed

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas has announced the appointment of new registrars for Selective Service in each Army National Guard Armory in Texas and in each County Court House.

Mrs. Bertha Pavlicek is the new registrar in Silverton.

Glantz reminds young men of their duty under Federal Law to register with Selective Service at age 18. Timely registration may be completed within a 60 day period beginning 30 days before the young man's 28th birthday.

The State Director announced the appointment of a registrar in each Army National Guard Armory through the cooperation of Major General Thomas S. Bishop, the Adjutant General for Texas. These Armories are located in all parts of Texas.

Glantz noted that with almost 200 Guard Armories and 254 Court Houses now having Selective Service registrars, registration with Selective Service is now more convenient than ever before.

Registration can be completed at any Selective Service System Area Office, at many high schools, and now at every County Court House and Guard Armory. The man should have some positive means of identification, like his drivers license, his Social Security Number, and should be able to give the names and addresses of at least two people who are not members of his immediate family who will know his whereabouts.

Any question about Selective Service should be taken to a Selective Service System Area Office, where compensated Selective Service personnel are located.

The appointment of these new uncompensated registrars for Selective Service is for the purpose of registration only.

Glantz urged all young men to comply with the law by prompt registration with Selective Service at age 18.
