





Meeting Slated For Swine Producers

Swine producers in Northwest Texas will have an opportunity to consider a mandatory check-off on market hogs during a series of educational meetings in Lamesa, Canyon, Pampa and Vernon in De-

According to County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstory, the Texas Producers Association (TPPA) may conduct a state-wide referendum and election if producers view as favorable the mandatory check-off program.

Educational meetings already have been held in Llano, Brenham and Lubbock, says Vanstory.

Meetings scheduled for the West Texas area are as follows: Lamesa, December 18, 7:30 p.m., Chamber of Commerce Building, 307 North Houston Avenue; Canyon, December 19, 7:30 p.m., Randall County Farm Bureau Building, 1714 5th Avenue; Pampa, December 20, 7:30 p.m. at the Courthouse Annex, 1/4 mile east of Pampa city limits on Miami Highway; and Vernon, December 21, 7:30 p.m. at the Wilbarger Auditorium, 2100 Yampar-

Swine producers in these areas, says Vanstory, are encouraged to attend one of these meetings, since the referendum would affect any swine producer irregardless of the number of hogs he markets.

Participants in the meetings will include Marvin Sartin, area economist-management, Gilbert R. Hollis, area swine specialist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock; John Fair, executive vice - president, TPPA, and Bob Gray of the Texas Department of Agriculture.
