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City Manager vows all-out cleanup effort

There's a new city manager in town vowing to clean up this place.

Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher Tuesday annouced during a regular City Council meeting that he is planning an all-out effort to enforce local ordinances against what he termed "weedy and junky lots."

"If we want to see this city grow

and prosper, we have to make all efforts possible to make it beautiful," Fisher said.

Fisher also said that local ordinances are enforced, but the city will now be more aggressive in how it handles these cases.

Complaints will be filed with the city judge, who will assess fines for lots that are in violation of local ordinances.

The council also addressed what they consider another nuisance, smoking in public buildings. A new anti-smoking policy for all city owned buildings is currently being considered by members of the city council.

"Employees should have the opportunity to work in a smoke-free environment," Mayor Robert Montgomery said. "Non-smokers should not be subject to cigarette smoke when doing business with the city."

Most of the discussion on the new smoking policy focused on where the new policies would be enforced.

Mayor Montgomery told the council that he has been approached by members of the Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department who do not wish to have smoking banned in the fire station, which would be included in the new policy.

"It is difficult to regulate different buildings in different manners," said Councilman Cliff Black.


head like a cocker spaniel, listening intently as he searches for the right cord.

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


touchdown run and 35-yard pass scoring.

Mules flatten Plains, 87-73

Alfonso Mendoza led five players in double figures Friday with 21 points as Muleshoe romped to an 87-73 win over Plains in a non-district game at WJHS gym.

It was the Mules (2-0) second-straight win and helped avenge an embarrassing 96-60 loss to the Cowboys last year.

MHS (2-0) led by 23 points after outscoring Plains, 30-11, in the third quarter. Mendoza had two 3-pointers and 13 points in the quarter.

"We were putting a lot of pressure on them and it was wearing them down," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "It usually starts taking hold late in the second quarter and into the third quarter."

Muleshoe shot 63 percent from the field (31 of 59) and 43 percent (6 of 14) from 3-point range.

Dustin Cleavinger (11 points, 10 rebounds, 6 blocks), Matt McClanahan (11 points, 8 assists), Corey Williams (11 points, 5 rebounds) and Carlton Lewis (10 points, 4 assists) joined Mendoza in double figures.

"We're getting good balance in all areas and as a coach that's what you're looking for," Mason said. "We've been able to take advantage of our depth and keep fresh legs on the floor."

Joe Luna led Plains (0-1) with 22 points and Tanner Blount added 19.

McClanahan had six points in the second quarter and Williams and Layne Kemp five each when Muleshoe turned a three-point deficit into a 39-35 halftime lead.

"We've got to a better job of finishing off the game," Mason said after Plains outscored MHS, 27-18, in the final eight minutes.

Muleshoe committed 27 turnovers while forcing 22.



classic Bob Wills songs, plus a few originals.

Morrell's friend and fellow Western Swing aficionado Snuffy Elmore plays fiddle. Elmore has toured with many of the top names in country music for years, including Mel Tillis and Reba McEntire, and is considered one of the best fiddlers in the world.

Elmore too has grown weary of "commercialization" of his talents.

Western Swing is heavy on rhythm tracks and long on improvisational solos.

"It's like jumping off the deep end and hoping you survive," Morrell said.

Morrell and his group, the Time-warp Tophands, have recorded nine albums in five years and developed a following of hardcore fans who appreciate his dedication to

helping keeping Western Swing alive.

Western Swing, which incorporates jazz, blues and the big band sound, was created by Bob Wills of Turkey in the 1930s.

Morrell remembers being introduced to the steel guitar, one of the signature sounds of Western Swing, when he was just a youngster growing up in a suburb outside Dallas.

A company called the Trickle Brothers National Institute of Accordion & Guitar was selling lessons.

Morrell was intrigued.

"I didn't have any designs on become a star or anything, but it sure beat studying and going to school."

Morrell described his life as a typical country song, full of boozing, pickups, a dog and ex-wives.

Stories about the man

"Hell, I was cold," was Morrell's simple answer.



DENVER CITY - Denver City's Heather Trout had Muleshoe reeling in the first half when she poured in 16 points.

The Lady Mules shut down Trout in the second half, but couldn't catch Denver City, losing its second-straight game, 60-55, Saturday morning.

Trailing 46-34 in the third quarter, Muleshoe rallied to within four late in the game. Trailing by four, the Lady Mules had four chances to cut deeper into the Lady Mustangs' lead in the last two minutes, but came up empty.

Trout finished with 19 points after scoring 35 in her first outing against Andrews. Fellow 5-10 sophomore Jenny Woosley added 16.



the Plains, which serves Bailey County, in August.

Hospice organizations provide services that allow terminally ill patients to return to their homes where they can live their final days with dignity and in comfort.

"I remember eating cheeseburgers and drinking chocolate shakes while I read comic books," Reese said.

As Reese grew up in both the Muleshoe and Odessa areas, he soon began to see similarities in the two cities.

"When the wind blows in the right direction, you can smell the money," Reese said, referring to Muleshoe's cattle experiences growing up in Indiana.

When her father was diagnosed with a terminal illness, married, James was working she was forced to withdraw from school to help care for her family. Due to her father's illness and the families dwindling finances, the whole family felt the strain.

During her later years, Carol realized that her father's care failed to address the impact of industry.

"In Odessa, you smell the money in a different way," he said, a reference to the oil industry of the Permian Basin.

Bailey County is among 18 counties served by Hospice of the Plains.

Family Hospice was founded by Reese and his wife,

Carol, in 1988. Carol was influenced by her own teenage the illness on the entire family.

When the Reeses were first as a stockbroker and Carol was employed as a nurse. Together, they recognized the need for a professionally managed hospice company. They also realized that current hospice programs could not provide a wide range of programs because they were small, non-profit organizations that were dependent on volunteers.
