





In the stable the well-fed





#### For Decorations **Inexpensive Paper Mache Objects**

Paper mache is an inexpensive material that can be molded into wonderful shapes, and objects made from it are practically unbreakable.

To make paper mache, however, takes a little preparation. First you must soak newspaper or paper towelling in strips, not more than 3/4 of an inch wide, overnight in hot water. The next day squeeze the paper between your fingers until it is almost dry. Now add a paste which you make yourself: Add enough cold water to ½ cup flour to make a thin creamy mixture. Boil this mixture for 5 minutes over a low flame. Stir constantly. Allow the mixture to cool, then thin with cold water if necessary. For a pleasant fragrance and to prevent spoiling you can add oil of pepperment or oil of wintergreen.

Now you can add your paper strips which have been soaked overnight to the paste, and begin forming objects for the Christmas tree, for a centerpiece or decorations for other areas in your holiday house. Be sure the paper and the paste have been mixed until you have a heavy "dough'







Not only in the United States is this tradition honored . . . but all over the civilized world. From the Bethlehem "cave" of the Syrian youngsters to the Jeslicky in Czechoslovakia, to Mexico where the people are setting up their Posada, all are sharing in a ceremony of reverence and love.

In the crèche are all the Nativity figures: the Holy Mother, Mary; Joseph; the Wise Men; the shepherds and their flock . . . the cattle, the donkeys, the sheep, the lambs and all the creatures which inhabited the stable area . . . all gathered around the Baby in the manger.

Throughout most of Europe from earliest Christian times the custom of recreating the Nativity scene has spread. Often the figures were delicately carved of wood, precious to the owners and handed down from generation to generation. A tender link of

The first crèche, according to earliest records, was made in 1223. In Italy presepe is the name for the crèche. There have been many wonderful presepi. In Rome there is one in the Church of Ara Coeli containing a Bambino said to have been carved from an olive tree from the Mount of Olives.

The presepe which is considered the most famous Christian Crib in the world is also in Rome, housed in the Basilica of Saints Cosmas and Damian. The scene covers an area of 45 x 21 feet and shows the manger scene, the palace of Herod, and farmlands and villages in living, realistic panorama that actually reflect the customs of the 17th century. Hundreds of wooden figures have been handcarved by famous artisans.

In Spanish, posada means an inn or lodging place, but it has come to mean more specifically the inn of the Nativity story.

#### Ideas For Your Outdoor Tree

It is not necessary to have an evergreen tree on your lawn to have an outdoor Christmas tree. Almost any small tree can be decorated to look pretty, even in the daytime. When decorating with lights, try using a two-color scheme with the lights, and your tree will stand out from others in the neighborhood. If you don't use lights, but do have trimmings, perhaps you can rig up a lighting arrangement to throw a spotlight on your tree. Heavy cord, double sockets, and a metal gooseneck lamp can turn your lawn into a stage.

Besides lights, other decorations can be hung from your outdoor tree. Silver foil ornaments or aluminum sheet cut-outs are pretty. Little twinkling stars and birds cut from blue aluminum sheet would be beautiful. White plastic balls studded with sequins, tacks, and other sparkle, help to brighten an outdoor tree. A Christmas tree decorated especially for the birds can serve two purposes. It can serve as a helpful restaurant for the feathered friends, and as a different decoration for the humans. Gay red cranberries, white popcorn balls, both lend color, and with other things birds like to eat, attract them to their Christmas dinner. Suet strings, or suet cakes are a treat for them. For the cakes take suet or other fat and bird seed and mix the seeds in the melted fat. Breadcrusts, sunflower seed and nuts can also trim the tree.



The Wassail or Warsail bowl is regarded as of such antiquity that it said to have been known by the ancient Britians. It has been a favorite Christmas beverage for centuries. An old recipe for "wassail" as it used to be made at Oxford is as follows:

Put into a bowl half a pint of sugar, pour on it half a pint of warm beer; grate a nutmeg and some ginger into it; add four glasses of sherry and five additional pints of beer; stir it well; sweeten it to your taste; let it stand covered up for two or three hours, then put three or four slices of bread cut thin and toasted brown into it, and it is fit for use. #### Lights In Window Comes from Ireland The placing of lights in win-

dows has become very popular in our holiday festivities. It originated from an Irish custom. The Irish place lighted candles in their windows on Christmas Eve as a guide and an invitation to all who, like Mary and Joseph on their first Christmas Eve, may be wandering about unable to find quarters for the night. In Ireland poor wanderers and tramps are welcomed everywhere. They are given a good meal, a place to sleep, and are sent on their way in the morning with a bit of money in their pockets.

#### Pomander Balls Easy-to-Make Gift

Pomander balls are easy-tomake gifts - and inexpensive too. Stick whole cloves into large, firm oranges until completely covered. Cloves may be inserted more easily if holes have been made with tines of a fork. Roll in a mixture of equal parts orris root (purchase in pharmacy) and ground cinnamon. Use about 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tablespoons total for each orange.

Wrap it in tissue. As pomander dries and shrinks, it develops its spicy fragrance. Remove tissue, shake off loose powder and pomander is ready for use. These are wonderful for closets and dresser drawers.
