Margaret Crosslin placed second and Becky Francis fifth in the Triple Jump.




These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injur ed.

Nationwide Survey To Be Launched **On Farm Costs**

During March and early April, the U. S. Department of Agriculture will conduct a survey to determine the goods and services farmers bought in 1973 to raise crops and livestock.

The survey will obtain information on what items were bought, the quantities, and the costs of the production items. James Griffin, who is executive director of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says that the nationwide survey will be conducted by the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service (SRS). The survey results will provide current reliable data on which farmers, ranchers, managers, and ag-
