Storm Warning System To Be Checked Today

Silverton's storm warning system will be checked at 7:00 p.m. today (Thursday), weather permitting.

The practice alert is necessary to make sure that the equipment is working properly.

As a review of the way the system works, when a tornado alert is issued for the Silverton area by the weather bureau, four or more blasts of the fire alarm system will be heard. At the same time, the tornado air horn will be sounded at short intervals and the new warning devices will be operated on their siren sound. This warning should alert residents to watch the clouds and be prepared to move to a place of safety.

If hooks, funnels or tornadoes are sighted which are considered by the weather bureau, DPS or private citizens to be potentially dangerous to the City of Silverton, the fire alarm and air horn will be sounded with a continuous blast, along with the yelpers. This will warn residents not only to watch the clouds, but also to move to a place of safety.

The fire siren is sounded three times for a fire. One blast of the fire alarm calls firemen to practice on the first and third Thursdays.

**Lack Of Cooperation Threatening  
Diapause Boll Weevil Program**

Lack of cooperation from a few cotton producers located below the Caprock north of the Middle Pease River in Motley, Floyd, Briscoe and Hall counties may cause this general area to be excluded from the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program in 1974. That is the action recommended by the program's Technical Advisory Committee, made up of the nation's leading entomologists in the field of weevil control.

Farmers have refused to allow as much as 15 percent of the cotton acreage in key locations within this area to be treated with insecticide in accordance with the schedule recommended by program entomologists, and this voids the primary principle which provides the basis for the program's success, reports Ed Dean, Field Service Director of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the

organization responsible for coordinating the program.

"Orderly treatment of all infested acreage in an area designated as part of the 'control zone' is a prerequisite to an effective control effort," Dean said, "and when for any reason it becomes impossible to treat virtually all acreage, it is no longer feasible or consistent with the objectives of the program to continue treatments in the general area where cooperation is lacking."

Officials of the program express regret that the area described will have to be dropped from the control zone, but are confident that by intensifying treatment of cotton acreage adjacent to the Caprock west of the described area as migration occurs, the overall effectiveness of the program can be maintained.

"And of course," Dean adds, "should the level of producer cooperation improve to the extent that effectiveness can be regained in the questioned area, the decision to exclude that area will be reconsidered."

**Nationwide Survey  
To Be Launched  
On Farm Costs**

During March and early April, the U. S. Department of Agriculture will conduct a survey to determine the goods and services farmers bought in 1973 to raise crops and livestock.

The survey will obtain information on what items were bought, the quantities, and the costs of the production items. James Griffin, who is executive director of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says that the nationwide survey will be conducted by the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service (SRS).

The survey results will provide current reliable data on which farmers, ranchers, managers, and agricultural planners can base their decisions.

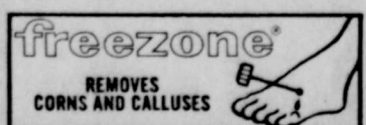

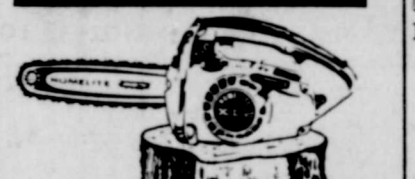

**Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election**  
Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tatro, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.  
The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.  
Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.  
Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.  
Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
