Lanham, Brown Win Contested Races

Johnnie Lanham, a former Briscoe County Sheriff, was elected Briscoe County Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1, in Saturday's Democratic Primary Election here. Lanham received 287 votes to defeat Barbara Pigg, who was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Gary Hunt. She had 258 votes.

Incumbent County Commissioner Roy S. Brown polled 120 votes to defeat challenger, Bryant Edleman, who polled 60 votes.

Bess McWilliams was unopposed for the Democratic nomination for district and county clerk. Mrs. Mildred Reid was renominated as county treasurer without opposition on the ballot, as were M. G. Moreland, county judge; Josephine Anderson, county surveyor; Orval Cobb, commissioner, Precinct 2, and Lewis J. Bedwell, jr., justice of the peace in Precinct 2.

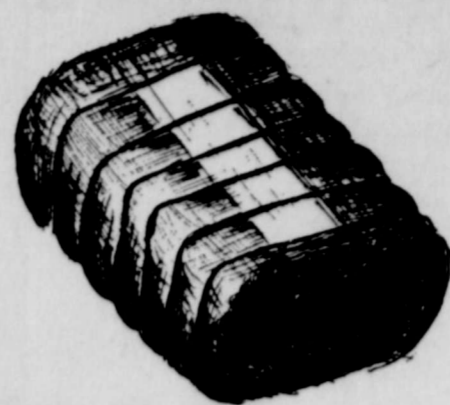
Infant Buried Here Wed. Afternoon

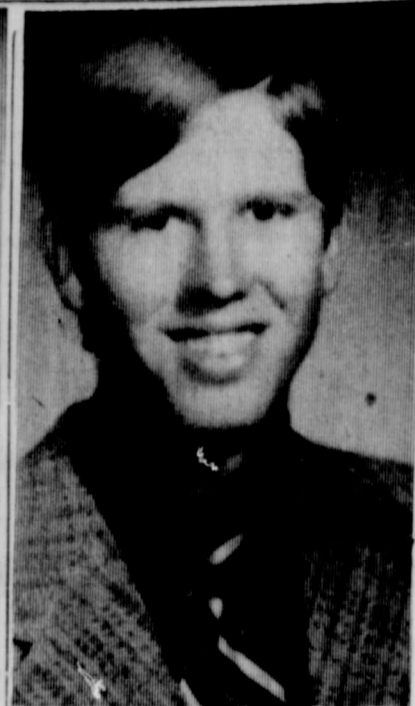

BREAD COSTS EXPLAINED

Consumers deserve an explanation on the costs that make up the price of bread, contends a Texas A&M University agricultural economist.

Looking at a 47-cent pound-and-a-half loaf, here's the cost breakdown: Farmer, 8.5 cents; miller, 2.5 cents; baker, 28 cents; retailer, 8 cents. The baker's cost includes such items as profit, transportation, advertising, overhead

and packaging. The pound-and-a-half loaf contains a little less than a pound of wheat. For this loaf to cost \$1 as some bakers have recently speculated, the price of wheat to the farmer would have to jump more than 60 cents, to about \$30 a bushel, compared to current price of \$4.58 a bushel.

"WHOSOEVER SHALL CALL . . ."

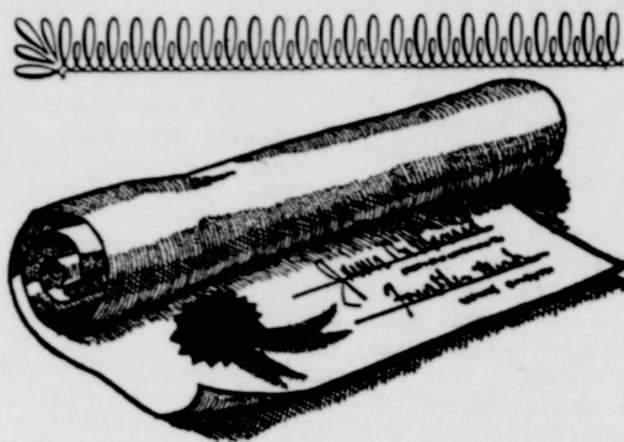

HOW GRASSES GROW

About 95% of the plant food is taken from the air—5% of the plant food is taken from the soil.

Leaves are the food factories of the plant. In the presence of sunshine, they combine carbon dioxide from the air and water, nitrates, and minerals from the soil to make plant food. The roots gather raw material, water, nitrates and minerals which are converted into plant food by the leaves. Roots also serve as storehouses for food. This food is essential for regrowth.

Nature gives you about 50% of the total volume of growth of a plant for the production of livestock and livestock products. The rest belongs to the land and the plant for grass insurance. This insurance provides for erosion control, soil fertility maintenance, water conservation, stabilized soil temperatures, plant development and reproduction. Overgrazing will destroy both the leaves and the roots resulting in loss of plant vigor and future forage production.

A healthy, vigorous, "well fed"

plant always grows larger than a weak "under fed" plant. And half of a large plant is always more than half of a small plant—and often more than all of a very small plant.
