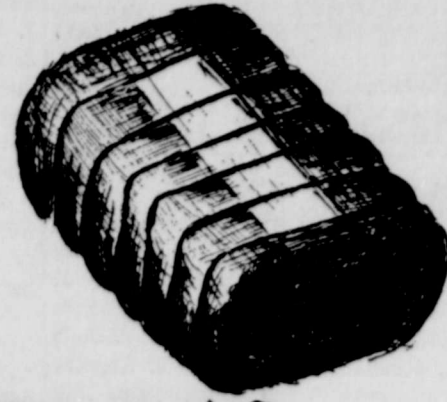

Donations Needed On New Rodeo Arena

Calvin Shelton, president of Silverton Young Farmers, has issued a plea for donations to help defray the expenses incurred in building the new rodeo arena. The Young Farmers have bills totalling about \$10,000, and surely do need some help.

BANK NEEDS YOUR PENNIES

One of the most patriotic acts Americans of all ages can perform today is emptying the family piggy bank, according to Jack Strange, president of First State Bank in Silverton.

Strange said the nation faces a penny shortage that costs taxpayers millions because people are withholding some 30 billion pennies from circulation.

This means that nearly half of the 62 billion pennies the U. S. Mint has produced in the last 15 years are in hiding, Strange said. The Mint is still producing one-cent coins at a rate of 35 million a day, he added, yet there still aren't enough pennies to go around in many areas of the nation.

Strange urged that families start gathering those pennies that are hiding in pickle jars, old socks and piggy banks and bring them into the bank so the nation can get Mr. Lincoln back among the people where he belongs.

June has been declared Penny Redemption month by the Mint in an effort to cure this artificial shortage, Strange said.

"For every \$25 worth of pennies cashed in at the bank, the U. S. Treasury is going to award an Exceptional Public Service certificate to the individual or group responsible," Strange said.

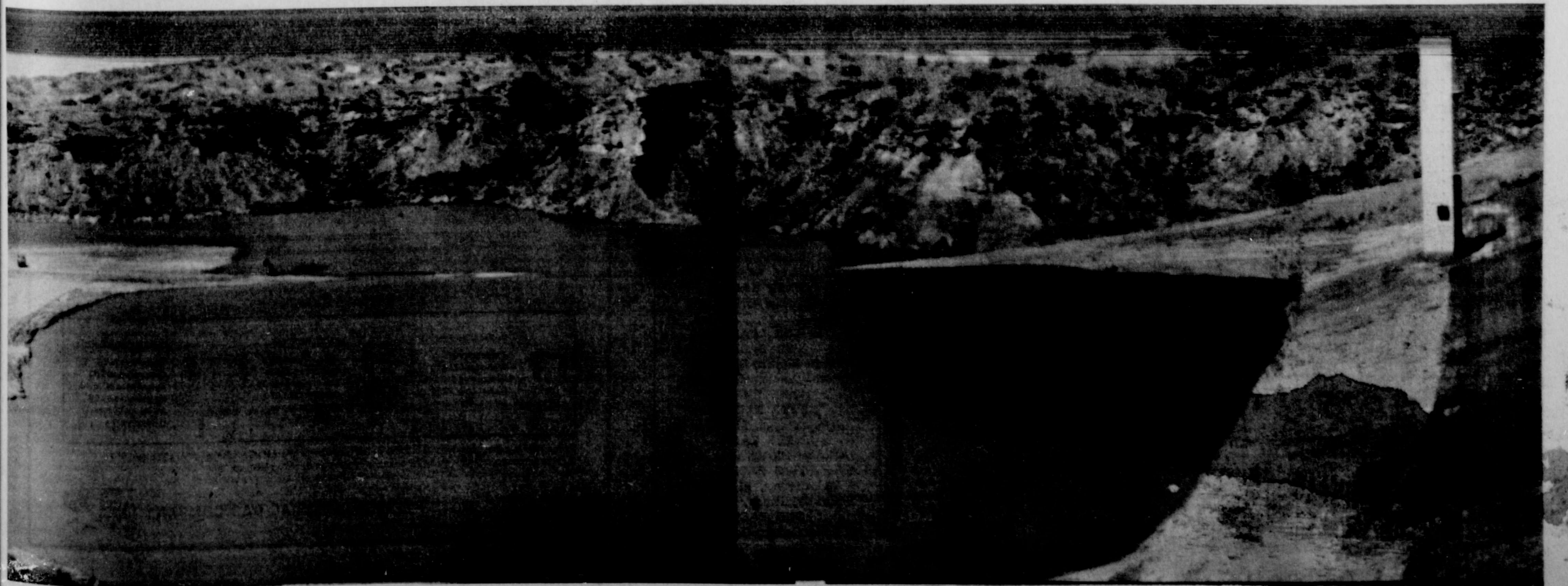

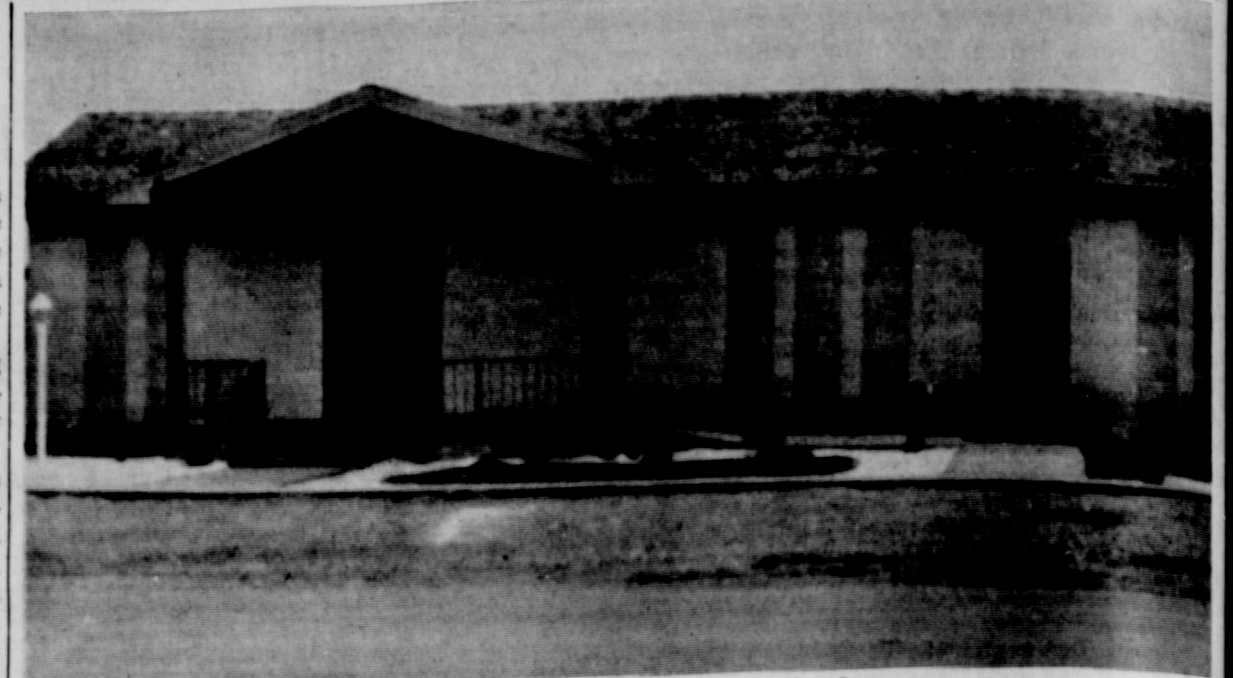

With home gardens making good progress in most areas, now is the time to consider additional fertilizer applications.

According to Jimmy Vanstory, Briscoe County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, most vegetable crops will respond to additional fertilizer. Soil type, type of fertilizer, row spacing and the particular crop will determine the amount of fertilizer used.

More fertilizer can be applied to heavy clay soils than to light sandy soils because heavy soils hold nutrients better. Crops grown on sandy soils will respond to light, frequent applications of side-dressed fertilizer, points out Vanstory.

Additional fertilizer applied as a side-dress application should be of a form that is readily available to growing crops, adds Vanstory. The most common forms are ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) and ammonium nitrate (33-0-0). Most home grown vegetables will respond to light applications of nitrogen but show little benefit from applications of complete fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

Apply fertilizer between the garden rows and work it into the soil if possible. Be careful to avoid root damage and do not place the fertilizer too close to the growing plants, cautions Vanstory.

Leafy crops such as lettuce, cabbage and greens can be fertilized at about twice the rate used for fruiting crops, since more foliage growth is needed, points out Vanstory. Begin side-dress applications after several sets of character leaves have formed and repeat at two-week intervals. If plants are making satisfactory growth, reduce the rate but continue bi-weekly applications.

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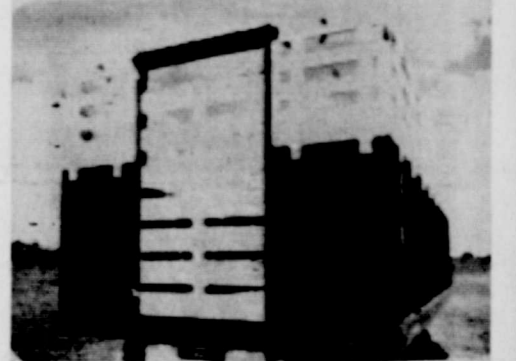
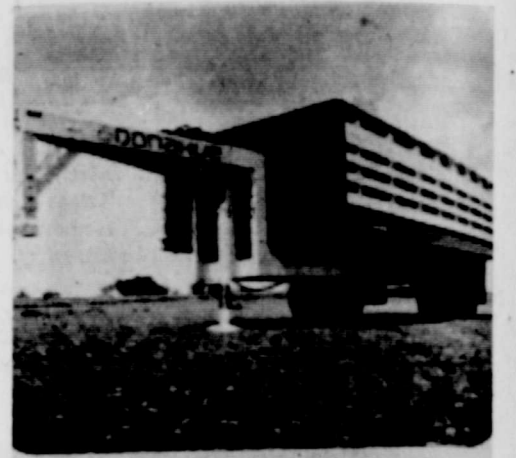
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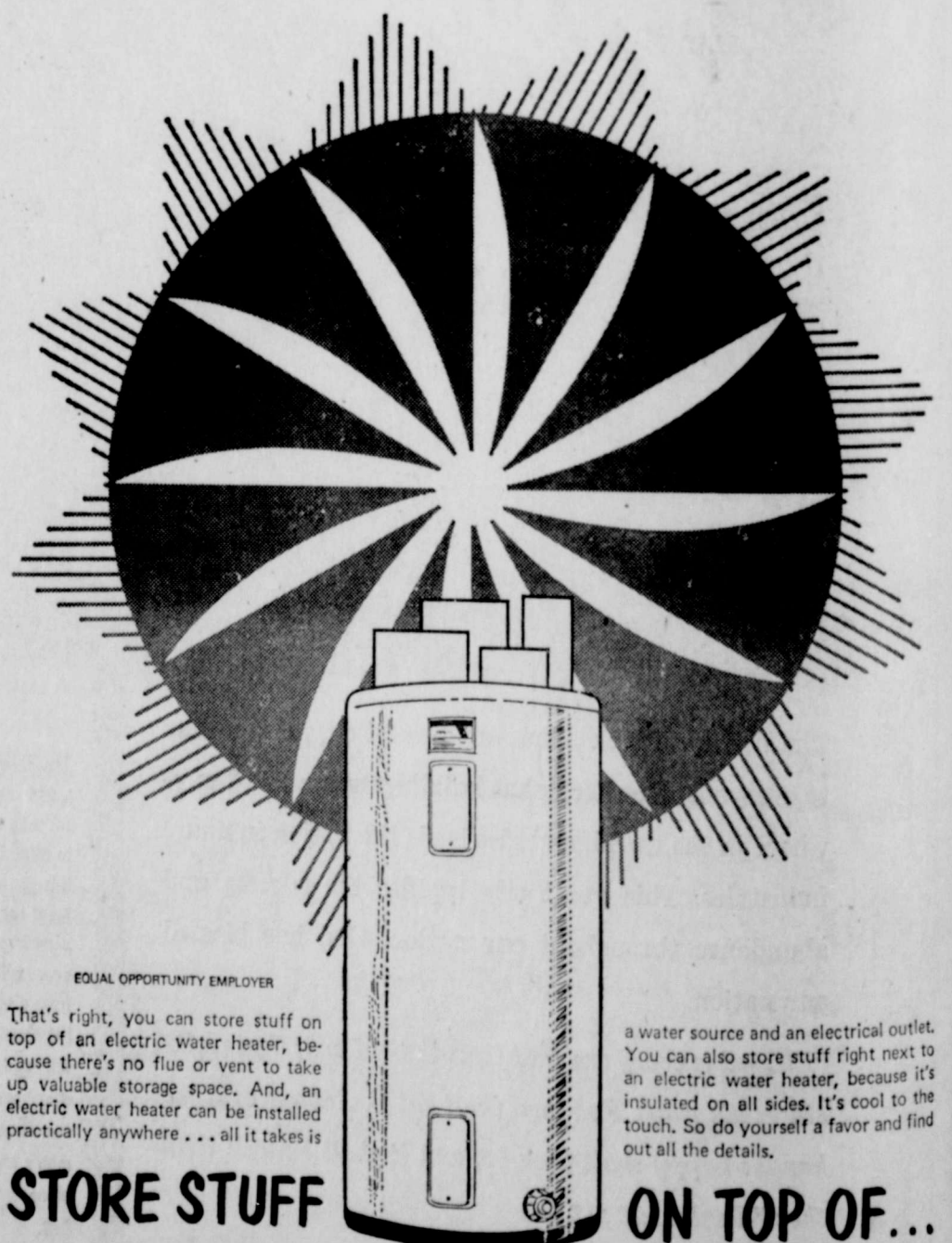
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
