


More fertilizer can be applied to heavy clay soils than to light sandy soils because heavy soils hold nutrients better. Crops grown on sandy soils will respond to light, frequent applications of side-dressed fertilizer, points out

Additional fertilizer applied as a side-dress application should be of a form that is readily available to growing crops, adds Vanstory. The most common forms are ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) and ammonium nitrate (33-0-0). Most home grown vegetables will respond to light applications of nitrogen but show little benefit tilizers containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

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
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
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
