

Crop Reports Needed From Farmers in July

In early July, over 24,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage production questionnaire from Charles Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone -agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.



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
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
