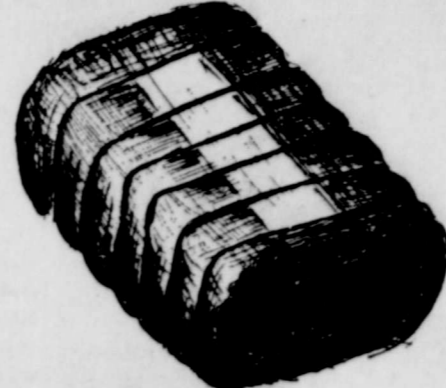

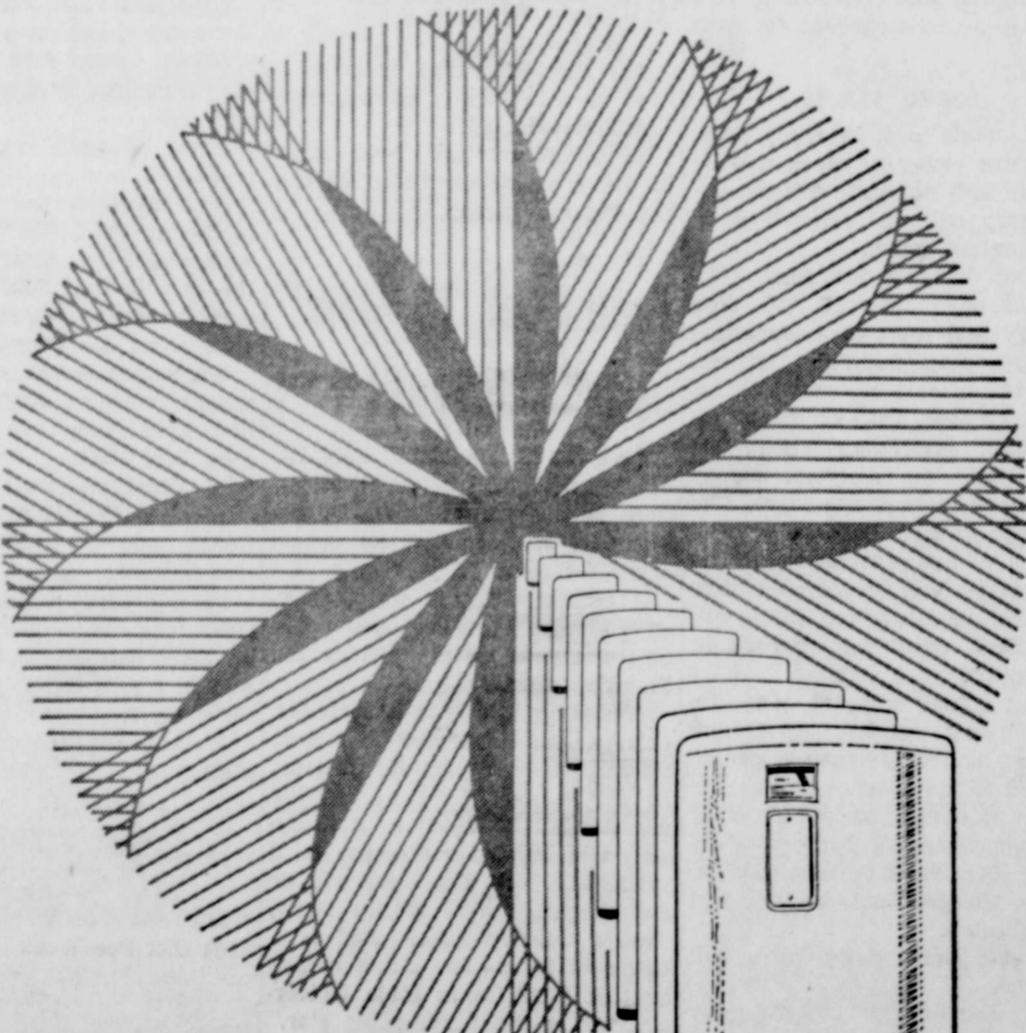

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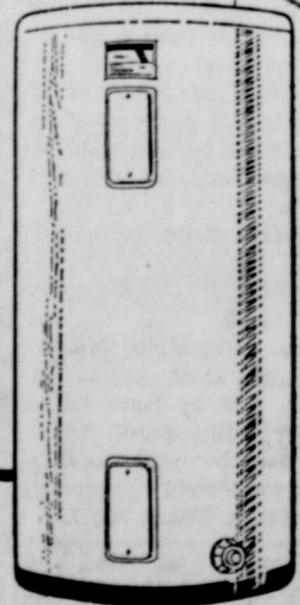

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"BRING HOME THE BACON"  
Hunters in Texas brought home more than \$16.5 million worth of venison during the 1973-74 hunting season, according to statistics from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.  
Hunters killed 10,260 mule deer and 366,033 white-tailed deer.  
The average mule deer weighed 90 pounds when it was field dressed and produced an estimated 45 pounds of boneless meat.  
White-tailed bucks averaged 78.5 pounds field dressed and produced approximately 39 pounds of boneless meat, and white-tailed does averaged 56.6 pounds field dressed and produced about 28 pounds of boneless meat.  
Based on the price of ground chuck beef (\$1.20 per pound) at the time of the hunting season, the mule deer meat was worth \$554,040 and the white-tailed deer meat was worth \$16,013,738.  
The department estimates there were 50,000 bow hunters and 560,000 firearms hunters during the last deer season. The estimated mule and white-tailed deer popu-

The total amount of tickets sold during the hunt was 3,622,000.

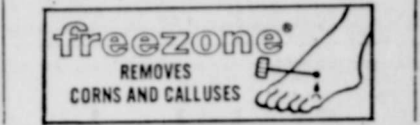
