Five Accidents Reported In June In Briscoe County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of June 1974, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this

area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1974 shows a total of 23 accidents resulting in one person killed and 12 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June 1974, shows a total of 466 accidents resulting

in 19 persons killed and 261 persons injured as compared to June 1973, with 559 accidents resulting in 27 persons killed and 331 persons injured. This was 93 less accidents, eight less killed and 70 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

THERE IS ONLY ONE WAY TO SEE THROUGH A CAMERA

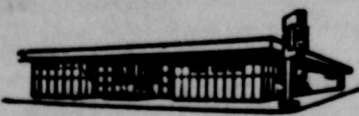

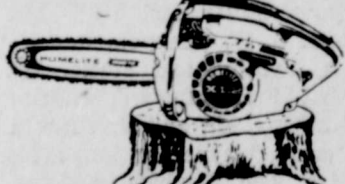
