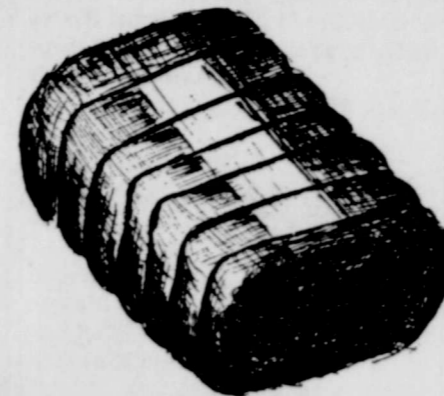

# Silverton Ready For County's 82nd Birthday Celebration

## Two Dead As Result Of Shooting Incident

The shooting deaths last Thursday afternoon of Gregorio Ortega, 36, and his ex-wife, Lidia, 34, was apparently a murder and suicide.

Law officers said Friday that Ortega apparently shot himself after shooting his ex-wife. The shooting occurred in the home occupied by Mrs. Ortega and the couple's five children.

Mrs. Ortega was shot above the heart and in the head and Ortega was shot behind the right ear. Both were apparently shot with a .38 caliber pistol, Briscoe County Deputy Sheriff Pete Stockton said.

Ortega, who had worked for an irrigation pipeline company, was the recipient of the Carnegie Hero Commission Award in 1965 for saving the life of a co-worker who had suffered electrical shock.

Ortega saved the life of Henry Juarez of Silverton when the ditching machine Juarez was operating came into contact with a power line. Ortega pulled Juarez away from the electrified machine.

Both Ortega and his ex-wife were pronounced dead on arrival Thursday afternoon at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulla where they were taken by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service.

Deputy Sheriff Stockton said the couple's five children were in the house at the time of the shooting.

Officers found Mrs. Ortega in the east bedroom of the house and Ortega in the kitchen.

Funeral services for Mrs. Ortega were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Monday in Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church here. The Rev. Rex Nichols of Plainview officiated, and burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Mrs. Ortega was born December 10, 1939, and was married to Gregorio Ortega October 8, 1958. They had been divorced for about

Ortega, a farm laborer, was born August 28, 1939 in Mexico. His body was returned to Mexico for burial.

His survivors include two daughters, three sons, all of Silverton; his mother, Mrs. Francisco Ortega, two sisters and four brothers, all of Mexico.

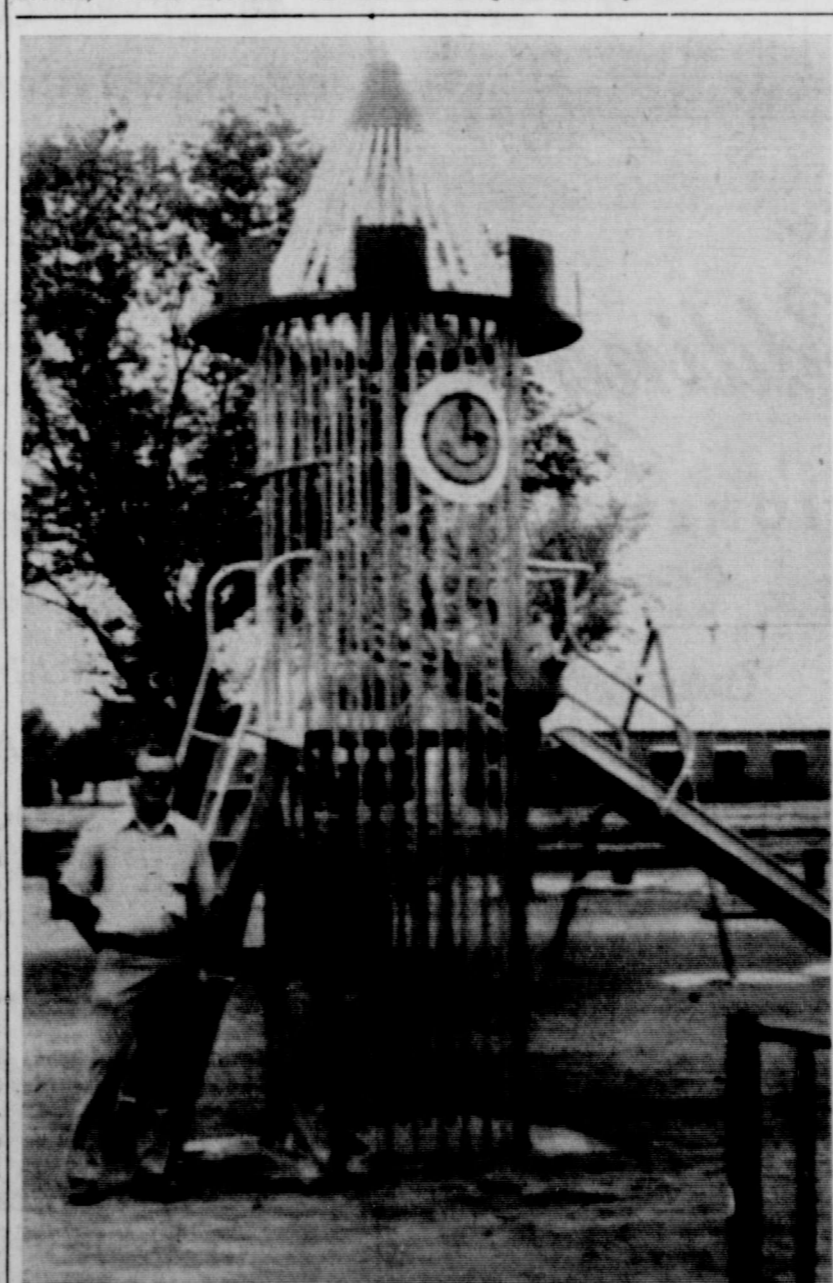
The first 30 contestants will be accepted for each of the rodeo events, which include tie down

## All Around the Town

The murder and suicide which took place here last Thursday afternoon points up the problems we have with our local law enforcement. In this case, two lives might have been saved if lawmen had been on the job.

Children of the family involved came to the Malt Shop an hour before the shooting (about 4:30 p.m.) and asked for help in calling lawmen. In this case, the Sheriff was out of town and the City Marshall - Nightwatchman, who works from 9:00 p.m. until 5:00 a.m. each day, was not on duty. The City Marshall was contacted about twenty minutes before the shooting, but by the time he took his grandson home and got his gun, it was too late.

This incident positively shows that the Briscoe County Commissioners need to do something to provide for local law enforcement when the Sheriff is out of town. I am not saying that the Sheriff doesn't deserve a vacation — only that we need protection here while he is gone. And we need it now. It is too late to prevent the death of a woman who was busy rearing five children; it is too late to prevent these children from being left without parents; but it is not too late to prevent this sort of thing from happening again. Our people must not be left unprotected!

While on the subject of law enforcement, I'd like to add that people expect too much of our City Marshall. He is working hard to do a good job, but people are calling him at all times of the day and night to get livestock off the highways, to work wrecks and for other things. During the day he is sleeping or enjoying some time with his family, and the City Marshall has no jurisdiction outside the city limits and should not be called for problems occurring outside the city.

**Cattle Need To Be Treated For Grub Control**

Cattlemen who are faced with grub infestation in their stock ought to be considering control measures now, according to County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstory.

In the High Plains region, says Vanstory, heel flies have laid their eggs on cattle and the grub larvae have enlarged the rodeo arena and are getting ready for the celebration. These young men have spent a great deal of time and money in preparation for the annual event. Have you planned to participate? L. O. A. have penetrated the skin, beginning their migration through the body. Since these larvae are more effectively controlled when they are small, cattlemen should be stepping up their treatments now.

Cattle grubs damage the animals in a number of ways, Vanstory says. Cattle infested with grubs may produce less milk which in turn results in less weight gain of calves. The affected animals are more restless and excitable, generally causing a breakdown in the normal health of the cattle. Grubs usually reach the back of the animal in late summer, fall or winter, forming breathing holes through the skin and developing a "cyst" just under the skin. This penetration damages the hide and depreciates the value of the animal on the market.

Although cattle grubs can be killed after they reach the animal's back, Vanstory adds, earlier control is best, particularly in beef cattle.

Systemic insecticides, he recommends, which are administered as sprays, dips, pour-ons or feed or mineral additives, are distributed through the animal's body by the circulatory system, destroying the grubs by contact action.

Grubicides suggested for control are coumaphos (Co-Ral), crufomate (Ruelene), prolate, trichlorfon (Neguvon), famphur (Warbex), Fenitrothion (Tiguvon) and ronnel. All of the grubicides are animal systemics, the agent recommends.

Treating for grub control and drenching the animals should not be done the same day, he emphasizes. Sick animals or those under stress should not be treated.

The label on treatment containers should be checked carefully before application for instructions on treating various cattle breeds. Precautions and directions should be adhered to strictly.

Vanstory says that information on grub control is available at the County Extension Agent's office.

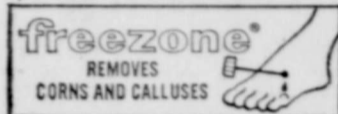

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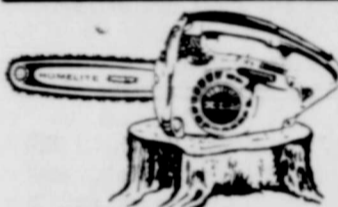

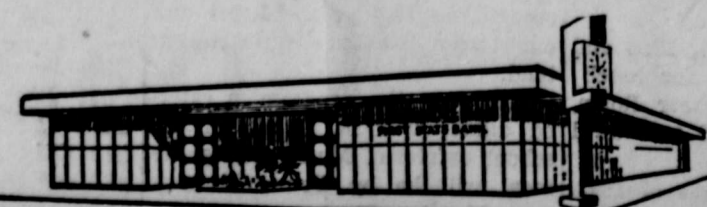

of doctor in your community. "I have been here in Houston for the past four months working as surgeon's assistant in the operating room of the Spring Branch Memorial Hospital, because as of now I still have no license to practice here in the United States. I took the ECFMG examination (Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates) here in Houston last July 24 and I expect to receive the result on the first week of September.

"I love working in rural areas cause I was engaged in this kind of physician's job when I was still in the Philippines. I was told that some states allow foreign doctors to practice in rural areas by giving them temporary permits or the equivalent of a state license, especially if there is a community or county that will sponsor or petition such doctors. 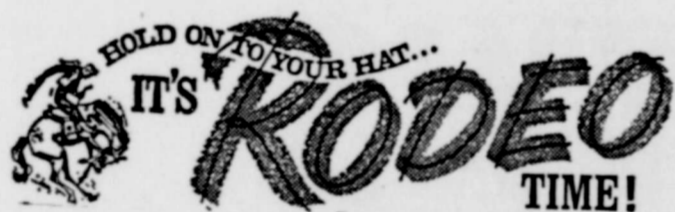

### Silverton Plea For Doctor Being Heard Near and Far

Silverton's doctor shortage has received widespread publicity, with clippings having been sent from Houston, Dallas and El Paso newspapers, and word of television coverage from New York City, California and other points across the nation.

Local residents have reason to be hopeful about some of the replies that have been received. A letter has been received regarding a physician in Germany who would like to come to this country, a Dallas doctor who would like to relocate, and a doctor from the Philippines who wants very much to come to Silverton.

Mrs. Bonnie Lesley sent the following article which she clipped from the El Paso Herald-Post:

"Silverton, Tex. (UPI) — This small town on the predominantly agricultural high plains of West Texas has a new \$76,000 clinic, the

money to equip it properly, the normal amount of disease and broken bones in Briscoe County—but no doctor.

"Jack Robertson, owner of Jack's Pharmacy downtown, decided an advertising campaign was in order, and so he created one with \$30.00 and a little effort.

"Maybe it's just a hairbrained idea, but we've already got some response," he said. "How else are we going to advertise across the country?"

"Robertson decided on a bumper sticker, red, white and blue paste-ons, which say: 'We Need a

Doctor—Silverton, Texas.'

"There isn't a person who leaves town now, on vacation or to go to see some relatives, who doesn't have one of these stickers on his car," Robertson said.

"They're being seen all over the country. One of the women here—Mrs. Winnie Smith is her name—who has a sister in San Diego said her sister called and said she had seen a television program on these bumper stickers.

"I've gotten two letters about them and maybe they'll lead to doctors. One lady in New York has a brother in the Philippines

who is a doctor and the letter said he might be interested in moving to Silverton. I'm going to write him a letter. And the other letter is from a lady in Ohio about her brother-in-law who is in Germany; he's a doctor and she said he might want to move down here.

"More people are going to hear about it. We figure if we can keep hounding the right people long enough, they'll get tired of us and pretty soon they'll send us a doctor."

"In addition to the bumper stickers, the 1,000 citizens of the town and 3,000 residents of the county have appealed to the Texas Medical Association, doctors associated with the Texas Tech School of Medicine in Lubbock, the Texas Osteopathic Association and the Health Division of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

"The crisis began in April when the town's doctor was appointed to a position on the State Medical Association. He said he would have to spend 75 percent of his time with the new job, and so decided to become a partner with another doctor in a clinic in Eden, Texas, located in south central Texas several hundred miles away from Silverton.

"I know we're not alone with this," Robertson said. "It seems like it's getting increasingly difficult to get a doctor to move into a small community. There's a lot of towns in our shape."

"What do the people do for medical aid now?"

"We scattered to the four winds," he said. "The closest doctor is 30 miles away, and there are three others within 40 miles. People essentially have to scatter out wherever they can find one. It works some hardships. You wind up spending a half day or a day just to see the doctor."

"Maybe this problem is brought closer to home to us because we just now completed the clinic. The other doctor helped us design it, but then he left. It's such a shame to just let it go to waste."

"The clinic is a brick structure with a pitched roof, making it look more like a residence than a clinic. It is big enough to accommodate two doctors and has a waiting-business room, two consultation rooms, four examining rooms, a laboratory, an emergency room, X-ray room and darkroom and various restrooms and closets.

"We haven't bought the equipment for it yet, but we have the money set aside to buy the equipment," Robertson said. "We didn't want to go out and buy this piece and that piece and all of the material and then have the doctors come in here and tell us we haven't got what they need."

"So we're waiting for a doctor to move down here and then he can buy what he needs. That's not such a bad proposition, is it?"

#### ALFALFA WEEVIL STUDY

The alfalfa weevil, the most destructive insect of this important hay crop, is under close study by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Research on controlling the pest has included the use of 10 different insecticides along with the introduction of four natural parasites of the weevil. The insecticide carbofuran was more effective than trichlorfon and diazinon at seven days after application, but there were no differences among the insecticides 14 days after treatment.

### School Teacher Is Cowgirl

A Lamesa High School teacher is a cowgirl who is leading West Texas cowgirls in barrel racing winnings this season.

She is Mrs. Lynn Schmidt, wife of Gene Schmidt, who is the grandson of Mrs. J. M. Thompson of Silverton.

Currently Mrs. Schmidt is holding the lead for first place in the West Texas Barrel Racers Association. With luck she can hold that lead and claim the organization's grand prize, a two-horse trailer, at the end of the barrel racing season. As of last weekend, she had accumulated winnings totaling \$1,509, \$300 more than her closest contender.

The attractive 24-year-old teacher says she looks forward to summer as much as her students do since it gives her more time to spend working with her horses. She said she rode her first horse when she was two and a half years old but it wasn't until she was around ten that she started riding on a consistent basis. Since then her love of horses and equestrian sports has continued to grow.

Despite her winnings, she admits that barrel racing is an expensive sport. "With gas prices like they are the money is eaten up real quick—plus the wear and tear on a pickup—we've already traveled 20,000 miles this year and the season is just half through."

But she adds that there's a lot of fun in barrel racing; "It's a real

pleasure—not just winning—but the competition and the people you meet who are interested in the same things."

She says that this will probably be the last year she pushes hard in competition, adding that it demands a tremendous amount of time and patience to make all the shows necessary to be in the winner's circle at the end of the season. However she adds that she and her husband hope eventually to include raising and training horses commercially as a part of their future. Even now they raise the animals they ride since her father-in-law, Durward Schmidt, breeds his mares to good "big name" quarter horses.

She also maintains that there's a lot of difference in horses; each performs differently. But the fact that the Schmidt's have good horses is emphasized by the fact that they have qualified a young horse to perform in the World's Championship in Louisville, Kentucky this fall. She explains that horsemen maintain that you'll only have one really good horse in a lifetime; she says she's still looking for that horse and asserts that she hopes to find it by raising it herself.

Her husband used to do a lot of cowboying, roping in rodeos and similar events but hasn't had enough time to enter many events recently because of farming commitments. However he accompanies his wife to most shows; "He's the coach, you might say," explained the barrel racer, who says that they've pretty well restricted themselves to contests in the West Texas area. She also explained that she has received all types of different times in running the barrels, mainly because of the differences in the size of the arena and the soil type. Ideally, the first two barrels should be set 35 yards apart with 40 yards separating the second and third barrels.

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**Naman Challenges Farm Bureau Leader**

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman has challenged the leader of another farm organization to meet him in a series of public discussions on farm policy throughout the major agricultural producing areas of Texas. Naman issued the challenge in a letter to the President of the Texas Farm Bureau, J. T. Woodson, sent this week to the Farm Bureau leader. In his letter Naman states that

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as there are substantial variances in the two organizations policies toward the current farm crisis, farmers should be invited to hear both organizations' positions and question their impact on the current crisis. Naman continued, "Farmers are desperately concerned about farm prices, accelerating costs and the many problems which make them anxious about the future. It is an appropriate time for us, as farm organization leaders, to discuss our recommendations publicly, and to give farmers an opportunity to question our views. If we are to represent our members and to give the Administration and Congress an accurate appraisal of how farmers feel about the situation, I feel that it is important that we make public an exchange of our views as soon as possible."

Naman said this series of meetings was prompted by action which the Farm Bureau took at a recent meeting in Dallas. Naman said the policy which was proposed by the Farm Bureau is exactly that which is followed by the Administration and is responsible for the crisis. "The seven point plan advocated by the Farm Bureau adds up to a 'do-nothing' policy," emphasized the Farmers Union President.

Naman has proposed a series of 5-6 meetings during August beginning on the Gulf Coast and moving through Texas to the High Plains. Naman said he is urging producers and members of Congress

alike to attend the meetings to enable the Congress to get an accurate view of the situation from the producers' standpoint. The Farmers Union President called on Woodson to help him in scheduling the meetings but pointed out that if the Farm Bureau leader did not respond that he would schedule the meetings and be present to air the Farmers Union policies and programs.

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
