When I voted in the Democratic Primary last spring, I pledged myself to support the nominees of my Party's Primary. 

In the fourth quarter, Halfback Paul Hanna scored from less than a yard out and Halfback Dan Ford crossed the double stripe from about half a foot out with 15 seconds remaining to be played in the game. Each PAT failed.



Holland Is New Briscoe County Extension Agent

Eddie Holland of Brownfield was named the new County Extension Agent for Briscoe County effective November 11, 1974, by the Commissioners Court in a special called meeting October 21, 1974. He was introduced and recommended by District 2 Extension Agent Billy C. Gunter and Briscoe County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstony. Holland comes to Briscoe County with a strong dedication to agriculture and programs.

Holland received his bachelor's degree in Animal Science Production and a teaching certificate in Vocational Agriculture from Texas Tech University in May of 1972. He has been serving as Assistant County Extension Agent in Terry County for almost 2 1/2 years. While in Terry County, he worked primarily with the 4-H, swine and beef cattle programs.

Holland was born in Burnet and reared in the small community of Bluffton near Llano. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Holland of Bluffton. The elder Holland is a United States Postmaster, grocery store owner and rancher.

Holland, who is 25 years old, is a member of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents and of the State Association of Texas, Brownfield Noon Lions, Texas National Guard, and the Church of Christ.

Holland's wife, Peggy, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hudgins of Hartley, who are engaged in farming. She graduated from Texas Tech University in May of 1973, with a bachelor's degree in child development. Mrs. Holland has been employed the past year and a half in the Brownfield Public School System as a migrant and head start program teacher. She is a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and First Baptist Church. The Hollands will be moving to Silverton in the near future.

Hail covered the ground Wednesday morning at Rock Creek, according to reports, although only a trace of moisture and no hail had fallen in Silverton Wednesday morning.


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Junior High Owls Play At Home Today

 The Owls scored first and held the Clarendon Broncho Colts scoreless for a whole quarter here last Thursday. After they grudgingly gave up the first score and the Colts went ahead on the conversion points, the visitors rolled on to a 24-12 victory over the much-smaller Owls.
 Dave Francis scored first on a 60-yard run around right end. Doug McJimsey's conversion run failed.
 The Owls kicked to Clarendon, and on second down, Randy Elmore recovered a Colt fumble. The Colts weren't able to get anything going offensively, but Dave Francis made two good defensive plays after the ball went back to the Colts, and Tommy Perkins recovered a Clarendon fumble on the Silverton-20.

Clarendon ran a touchdown from the 10-yard line in the second quarter and added conversion points to take an 8-6 lead.
 The Owls lost the ball via the fumble route on their second play after the kickoff, and Clarendon came back with a 30-yard touchdown run around right end. After making the running conversion, the Colts led the Owls 16-6.
 Silverton made a first down after Doug McJimsey's good kickoff return, but the Owls were forced to punt on fourth down. The Colts fumbled and Tommy Perkins recovered for the Owls on the Clarendon-35. The Owl offense was unable to move again, punted, the Colts made a first down on their own 46, and again Tommy Perkins recovered a Colt fumble.
 After kicking off to the Colts to open the second half, the Owls were unable to prevent a series of first downs which ended in a two-yard quarterback keeper for another Colt touchdown. The two-point conversion was successful, and the Colts held a 24-6 lead.
 In the fourth quarter, penalties stalled the Colt drive and Kirk Durham recovered a fumble on the Clarendon-20. Doug McJimsey carried the touchdown, but Doug was unable to cross the double stripe for the two extra points, and the Owls trailed 24-12.
 Silverton fumbled and Clarendon recovered on the Colt-10, and the Colts intercepted a Silverton pass and ran to the Clarendon-43 before the game ended.
 Clarendon made 10 first downs, as compared with four for the Owls. The Colts also led in the penalties, being whistled for 75 yards, while the Owls had only 10 yards stepped off against them.







NEWEST FARMERS HOME PROGRAM MOVES AHEAD

J. Lynn Futch, State Director for Farmers Home Administration, Temple, Texas, has announced the promotion of Ormel I. (Jack) Boyd to Chief, Business and Industrial Programs (B&I). Boyd has served as B&I Specialist for the past

year, assisting with implementation of new guaranteed loan authorities assigned to FmHA by the Rural Development Act of 1972, Public Law 92-419.

Activity in the new program of providing loan guarantees to aid in business and industrial development in towns and cities of up to 50,000 has exceeded expectations according to Futch. He noted that eight conditional commitments to guarantee loans of \$29.2 million were authorized in the past fiscal year. Since July 1, 1974, ten commitments for \$1.6 million have been issued. Futch said 58 requests for loan guarantees of \$16.6 million are presently being evaluated or applicants have been advised to complete formal applications for final feasibility determination.

Boyd has been a member of the State Director's staff since 1968, serving as Community Programs Specialist until 1973. He completed 20 years federal service in 1974. All his service has been with FmHA except for military duty in World War II. Boyd

received special recognition in 1967 for his work with rural groups and communities on rural water systems. During 1967-68 he served as Assistant County Supervisor in Richmond, Fort Bend County. Prior to employment with FmHA, Boyd taught vocational agriculture for eight years.







Christmas Mailing Dates Recommended

Postmaster Fred A. Strange recommends the following dates by which residents of Silverton should deposit Christmas mail to the points indicated below.

Surface mail to Armed Forces in Japan, Korea and other Far East areas—October 28. Surface mail to Germany, France, etc.—November 27.

Parcel Airlift (PAL) to Japan, Korea and Germany—November 27.

Airmail parcels and cards to Japan, Korea, Germany, etc.—December 2.

Surface greeting cards within the U. S.—December 15.

Surface parcels within the U. S.—December 10.

Airmail cards and parcels within the U. S.—December 20.

Strange also offers the following tips on how to prepare the Christmas parcels for mailing.

A single item in a package should be cushioned with paper or other suitable cushioning material.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four sides of the container should also be padded with cushioning material.

All packages should be secured with strong twine, and it should

be knotted at several intersecting points to keep it from loosening.

Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom the package is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address inside is assurance that it will be received, even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on all packages and cards going out of Silverton. Also be sure that you address the packages and letters correctly, legibly, and with the correct Zip Code.

Be sure that you put only one address on the outside of a package; DO NOT put the address on more than one side.




