CONY ISLAND IS SWEEPED BY FLAMES

New York's Famous Pleasure Resort Suffers Most Destructive Fire in Its History. Fire Originated in Amusement Park. Between Two and Three Million Dollar Loss.

Coney Island, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—Coney Island suffered from the worst fire in its history today. The fire originated in The Dreamland, its largest amusement park, which was completely wiped out and also four adjoining blocks were quickly consumed by the raging flood of fire.

The loss is estimated at between two and three million dollars and two thousand concessionaries are rendered homeless. There were no lives lost though at first it was thought that six Dreamland incubator babies had been killed.

The burned area represents one third of the entire amusement city. The fire started at two o'clock this morning in an attraction called "Hell Gate" twenty minutes later Dreamland's ten acres of gaudy buildings were one big blaze and in an incredibly short time were a smoking mass of debris.

Most of the danger was due to the effort to remove animals from the Dreamland. Several man-eating lions were taken out, one man killing a lion in an effort to remove it. The beast howled wildly and leaped at the crowd while the mounted police shot him time and time again and when dead the crowd tore him to pieces for souvenirs. A leopard and baboon that also escaped among the crowd were shot by one policeman.

Rulings at Austin

Austin, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—It was discovered today that the acts of the 32nd legislature becoming effective 90 days after adjournment, will be effective June 10 instead of June 11th, as heretofore supposed. The attorney general's department advises that the Terrell law relative to six months residence in the county applies the same in the statewide election in July. Many Texas cities are affected by a ruling of special courts in the attorney general's office that one person cannot hold offices at one time, such as city and county health

DALLAS STREET CAR STRIKE

Motor Men Go Out to Force Resignation of Superintendent Harris

Dallas, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—Dallas has a wave of excitement this morning in the way of a street car strike and all cars remained in the barns because nobody would run them and thousands of Dallas people had to walk this morning to their places of business. The carmen went on strike because Superintendent Harris had refused to resign in obedience to their demand. Harris had a fight several days ago with a motorman and the police court imposed a fine upon the motorman and Harris was released. This angered the car men and they demanded Harris' resignation. Harris stood firm till this morning but finally filed his resignation and the strike ended.

RECEIVES EIGHT YEARS IN PRISON

Insurrecto Leader Receives Severe Penalty for Deserting in Face of Enemy

Auga Prieta, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—A court martial this morning tried and sentenced to eight years imprisonment, Red Lopez for desertion. Lopez was one of the famous insurrecto leaders in many of the severest battles of the revolution in North Mexico, but was charged with desertion in the face of the enemy during the present battle here, for which the severe punishment was meted out to him, by his former companies in arms.

FORCED SALE OF TENNESSEE COMPANY

Is Evidence Given by John W. Gates Before Investigating Committee

He testified that this trust company secured a large block of the Tennessee Coal and Iron Company's stock in 1907 in New York as collateral. It was the securing of this block of stock that gave testimony that this trust company had control of the Tennessee Co. Mr. Gates said that he considered the deal a forced sale.

LONDON CORRESPONDENCE

Discussion of Issues That Affect the British and the British Empire

London, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—While the stress of politics in recent months has claimed many victims among the leaders of the parties it is amazing to find the oldest of them all, Viscount Morley of Blackburn, reviving his youth and assuming duties which his juniors in years have had to abandon on account of illnesses brought on by overwork. When John Morley, a Radical among Radicals, was raised to the peerage in 1908 and the Conservatives chaffed him on entering a chamber, which he had attacked as useless, the Government organs explained that his advancing years—he was then 73—made it necessary, if he was to continue as Secretary of State for India, that he should be transferred to the Upper house, where he would not be called upon to take active part in politics that members of the cabinet in the Commons necessarily do. Later his age was again given as the cause for his retiring from the Secretary of State and his assumption of the office of President of the Council to which no arduous duties are attached.

With the, at least temporary, retirement of his successor Earl Crewe as a result of serious illness, Viscount Morley is found again assuming the burdens of the Indian office and besides that the leadership of the House of Lords and for a few weeks, during the absence of Sir Edward Grey, the position of Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. For younger men, even one secretary of state, is not considered a very easy role to fill but Viscount Morley, throwing off the mask of age, entered heartily into the work of his triple office and from the front bench led the little party of Liberal peers and answered questions about India and the foreign policy of the Government as though he enjoyed it.

Hon. Richard B. Haldane, secretary of State for War, was raised to the peerage to assist Viscount Morley but thus far the newest Liberal Viscount has found that the affairs of the war office occupy most of his time. When the Parliament Bill reaches the House of Lords, however, Viscount Haldane will take a leading part in supporting the Government policy. He had a way in Commons of overcoming the opposition of the Government's critics and had a reputation of getting his way more often than any other member of the cabinet. This characteristic will make smoother his progress in the Upper Chamber.

Viscount Haldane's ambition is to become Lord Chancellor. If the extreme Radicals had their way he would be given that position immediately. Lord Forster, the present occupant of the position, an old-time and still staunch Radical in most respects, has given offense to the Liberal members of rural districts, by the discussion of the whole question, points Conservatives to the magisterial bench, ignoring the claims of Liberals to these positions, which are greatly coveted by the country magnates. The Government appointed committees in

BERLIN CORRESPONDENCE

Political, Scientific and Social Topics as Viewed by the Germans

Berlin, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—The Reichstag which resumed its sessions this month is still busy with important legislation, including the bill to consolidate the three systems of workmen's insurance which was taken up on second reading after a long year in committee. The forthcoming elections, however, overshadow every other interest and deliberations are being conducted and speeches made, according to the German phrase, "through the windows," with reference to their effect on the impending struggle. The elections, which a few months ago, were promised for this spring, have been repeatedly put off and according to present intimations will now be held at the latest possible date late in January, the present Reichstag being permitted to live out its entire constitutional term. It has had a most checkered career, beginning its existence under the auspices of the Liberal-Conservative "Unholy Alliance" of Conservatives, Antisemites and National Liberals, devised by Prince von Buelow to oppose the long dominant clerical centre, and carried on, after the collapse of this block upon the financial legislation of 1909 and the fall of Buelow, by the Chancellor, von Bethmann-Hollweg, with a loosely-jointed coalition of Conservatives, Clericals and Antisemites. This arrangement has worked fairly well, in spite of predictions of an early breakdown and dissolution two years ago.

For several months, the various parties have been nominating their candidates and arranging alliances with other organizations. The National Liberals and the Radical Progressive party, have arranged to support common candidates in the so-called "two-front" basis, in other words, opposing the Conservatives and Clericals in one direction, and the Socialists in the other. The Conservatives and Clerical in direction will pull together, avoiding useless nominations where they can secure the election of the other party's candidate by assistance on the first ballot. Bebel has announced the policy of the Socialists to be the nomination of a candidate in every district, in order to get as imposing a general vote as possible, but in ballots his party will evidently assist the Liberals as against the Government parties. It will be a hotly contested election.

In order to solve or make less vexing, the household servant problem in Berlin, a composite committee representative of the interests of mistress and maid has been selected under municipal auspices at a mass meeting. It will draw up a formal agreement to serve as a general basis for the relations between employer and employee. Some of the questions usually leading to strife which are to be dealt with are those of wages, payment of board during employer's absence, hours of liberty, compulsory references, summer vacations, treat-

Rebel Leader, Garronze, Chosen Governor of Coahuila. Citizens of Saltillo Beg Insurrectos Not to Attack the City. All Depends on Madero.

Juarez, May 27.—(Special to the Signal)—Francisco I. Madero received a telephone today from the provisional president, De La Barra urging him to start for Mexico City at once. It is understood that Madero will leave today for Mexico City traveling by the way of San Antonio and entering Mexico at Laredo.

Word has been received here from Soltilla that Venustiano Garronze has been elected provisional governor of Coahuila and that the citizens are begging the insurrectos to suspend the threatened attack on them. There are a number of threatened uprisings in various parts of the republic and everything depends upon Madero's ability to handle the situation.

the various counties to advise the Lord Chancellor on these appointments, but despite this more Conservatives found their way to the bench than did Liberals.

Hon. Neil Primrose, the younger son of Lord Rosebery, is leading the attack on Lord Loreburn and has been trying to get the persistency with which he appointed to a day for the Lord Chancellor has created a rather uncomfortable position for the Government, by, in his usual brusque way, declaring that the appointment of magistrates is the business of his office and practically intimating that if the Radicals are displeased they have the privilege of trying to dislodge him. This is the aim of Mr. Primrose and the anti-Loreburn party.

In England particularly, but in the other parts of the Kingdom as well, the great theme of politicians during the annual Fall campaign, will be Home Rule. The Unionists are preparing to impress upon the people the arguments against the granting of Home Rule to Ireland.

The Irish Unionists Alliance and the Ulster Unionist Council are working in conjunction with the Unionist League of Great Britain and a large number of speakers have proffered their services. On the other hand, the Liberals are organizing a counter campaign and the whole Nationalist Party have placed their services at the disposal of the Ministerialists. Already 5,000 meetings have been arranged.

Labor members of parliament, following the example of John Burns, the first labor leader to become a British cabinet minister, have started a temperance campaign among the workers. The campaign was opened with a series of meetings at Browning Hall, Walworth, addressed by ten Labor members. Incidentally, the speakers expressed a hope that the Anglo-American arbitration treaty would be concluded.

Bryan on Oil Decision

Mr. Bryan is grievously displeased with the recent Standard Oil Decision and sees in it the long planned scheme to bring about just what the trusts have wanted and that this court made law provides the very immunity that the legislative department would not grant.

Speaking of the Court's definition of "Unreasonable restraint" the Commoner says:

"The real meat of the decision is to be found in the amendment of the anti-trust law to meet the demands of the trusts. For several years the trusts have been demanding the very amendment that the court has read into the law. There will be rejoicing in Wall street, but there will be sadness in the homes of the masses who are now compelled to begin a campaign for the enactment of anti-trust law so clear and explicit that the court can not repeal it by construction. The decision explains several things. First, it explains why Justice White was made chief justice instead of Justice Harlan. Second, it explains why Governor Hughes was made a justice in the supreme court. Third, it explains the discriminating care exercised by the president in selecting democrats who would help the republicans out of a hole by making the democratic party bear some of the odium of a decision that builds a bulwark around the predatory corporations. And, fourth, it explains why Wall street went over to Mr. Taft in March or April of 1908 and then coerced their employees and the business public into the support of the republican candidate in November.

ment during illness and the settlement of State insurance dues.

Leonard Digges, an Englishman, and not Galileo nor any of the Dutch claimants, is put forward as the real inventor of the telescope by Count Carl von Klinekowitz, a Munich scholar, in a report just published. In it he gives quotations from a manuscript, discovered by him in the British Museum, written by the mathematician William Bourne, about 1575 and citing quotations showing that Digges made use of the telescope at least forty years before Galileo or the Holland scientists. Bourne cites a lost treatise, published at London in 1571, entitled "A Geometric Practise, named Pantometria," in which a full description of the lenses used by Digges is given.

Texas Industrial Notes.

Ground is being broken for the erection of a plant of the Waco Sash and Door Company at Waco, which will cover seven square blocks.

Texas City, Texas, is to have a \$50,000 hotel. Work was begun on the structure last week.

Nacogdoches county has voted a bond issue of \$90,000 for the purpose of erecting a new court house.

The Cotton Belt Railway has broken ground for the construction of a new passenger depot at Comanche.

Work has commenced on the stack for the mammoth 1,200 ton per day Sugar Mill at San Benito. The stack will be 140 feet high and 20 feet square at the base and is built of re-inforced steel and brick.
