TO REPEL ASIATIC CHOLERA

Strictest Quarantine to be Maintained by New York Officials Against the Plague

New York, July 19—Health officers of New York are making every effort to repel the threatened invasion of the Cholera.

Five cases of the dread disease are being carefully guarded against and healthy persons who are carriers of the germ will be strictly quarantined and duly guarded against after being released from quarantine.

Dr. Doty, health officer of this port is conferring with Dr. Wynman, United States health officer to plan protection against carriers by instituting a system of general observation, which shall keep the carrier duly quarantined to avoid the spread of the disease.

HAS DISCOVERED VACCINE WHICH IT IS CLAIMED IS FATAL TO LEPROSY

THE GERMS ISOLATED

Discovery Made by Federal Investigation at Honolulu

San Francisco, Cal., July 19—Experiments that are now being made under the direction of the Federal Authorities at Honolulu have resulted, so the investigators declare, in discovering a germ or vaccine that is fatal to leprosy.

According to Moses T. Clagg, Assistant Director at the experiment station at Honolulu, the germ itself has been isolated.

The discovery if true, is the greatest in all the annals of time.

HEAT WAVE IN FAR NORTH

GLACIERS MELTED AND DESTRUCTION OF LIFE IS THREATENED

THE TEMPERATURE 98

Streams Fed by Ice Gorges Are Rising With Dangerous Speed.

Valdez, Alaska, July 19—A heat wave struck this far northern point today and is playing havoc with the glaciers.

The temperature is now 98 degrees and is still rising.

Glaciers are melting rapidly under the fierce heat waves that come with the force of a tropical sun and the melting ice is producing streams that are rising with dangerous rapidity.

Gangs of men are at work in an effort to save the bridges that lead to the mines.

Repeated efforts were made today by the Lorimer Investigating committee to get at the truth of the statement alleged to have been made by millionaire L. C. Wyche on a train last March when he said that he contributed ten thousand dollars towards electing Lorimer. B. A. Johnson, who testified that Johnson made no such statement, is being cross examined today.

ADMIRAL NOGI TO VISIT RUSSIA

JAPANESE HERO TO VISIT HIS FORMER ENEMIES

NOTED VETERAN OF WAR

Will Make a tour of the United States During Journey Around World.

London, July 19—General Nogi, the Japanese hero, who captured Port Arthur from the Russians and assured the success of his country in the battle of Moukden is about to visit his former foes.

The General, a veteran of many battles with less of the reticence that distinguishes his fellow countrymen came to London as a member of the special mission from Japan to the Coronation.

The head of the mission, Prince Higashi-Fushima with the Princess Higashi-Fushima after having almost made up his mind to return home through America, finally decided to go by steamer as he came.

Admiral Toga, the naval representative on the mission is going to America at the invitation of the American government after he makes a tour of England, while General Nogi goes to Russia.

The General, when seen before his departure seemed rather pleased with his prospective trip. He first visits Turkey, doubtless to see what the Germans have done with the Turkish soldier. Then he goes to Berlin for an audience with the emperor and from there to St. Petersburg. His host in the Russian capital is to be General Stoessel, who defended Port Arthur against Nogi and who was court martialed for surrendering.

The last time the two warriors met was on the day the Russian flag was hauled down and Stoessel handed his sword to the man who he has now invited to visit his home. The meeting must be an interesting one.

General Nogi is also anticipating with much pleasure an audience with Emperor Nicholas.

Both he and Admiral Togo were very popular in London and received ovations wherever they went. They were among the few who drove to the coronation ceremony at Westminster Abbey in an open carriage and were cheered all along the route. Admiral Togo is quiet and has little to say even to his countrymen. General Nogi on the other hand is a good companion, and talked continuously of what he had seen and what he hoped to see.

FATAL SHOOTING AT MARSHALL

AGENT MARSHALL AND EAST TEXAS RAILROAD SHOT FATALLY

FAMILY TROUBLE CAUSE

L. G. Gwyne Shot by F. V. Patton Who Later Surrenders to Authorities.

Marshall, Texas, July 19—While selling tickets this morning Lewellyn Gwyne, agent for the Marshall and East Texas railroad was shot four times and perhaps fatally wounded by F. V. Patton who fired twelve times.

Gwyne ran about one hundred and fifty yards into the woods before falling.

Family troubles are said to be the cause.

Gwyne's mother lives at Sapulpa, Oklahoma. Patton is from an old family here. Patton surrendered.

REMARKABLE INVENTION

GUN THAT WILL PRODUCE APPARENT DEATH FOR BRIEF TIME

WORK OF A GERMAN

Believed the Device Will be Important to Policemen in Handling Rowdies.

New York, July 19—An inventive German has recently taken out a patent for a pistol for producing apparent death for a brief time.

It is loaded with a bullet, made of a chemical composition to which is added enough powder to propel it. The bullet explodes and causes a thick cloud of vapor, which envelops the victim, makes it impossible for him to see, renders his breathing difficult and he finally falls into a swoon that lasts from ten minutes to a half an hour. It is believed that the new pistol will be of importance for policemen as they may be able to overcome rowdies or even unmanageable crowds effectively without killing any body.

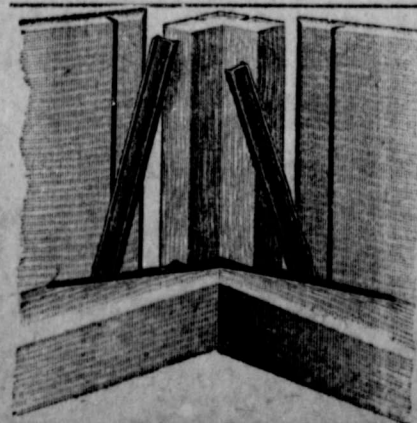

CEREMONY

Investiture of Britains Future Ruler in Historic City of Crnervan Amid Quaint Welsh Surroundings

Special to Signal.

Carnarvon, Wales, July 15—The most interesting event ensuing on the coronation is to occur on July 15—namely the investiture of the young Prince of Wales amid quaint Welsh surroundings and at the very birthplace of the first English Prince of Wales, Edward, son of King Edward I and Queen Eleanor.

Tradition connectd with the ancient Welsh castle of Carnarvon, where the ceremony is to take place, says that after Edward the First's conquest of Wales, the Welshmen refused to obey any prince appointed by the king as regent of the principality, unless he was born on its soil. Queen Eleanor shortly afterwards gave birth of a son in the castle of Carnarvon and thereupon the King, calling the chiefs of the Welsh nation together, asked them whether they would obey a prince nominated by him, as he was compelled to leave the country. They replied in the affirmative on condition that the prince was a Welshman. Edward then named his own son born only a few days before and the Welshmen were satisfied.

The prince was afterward shown to the nation, or as many of them as could get near enough to see him, from what is known as Queen Eleanor's gateway.

It is from this gateway of the castle, which had been prepared for the purpose, that the new prince of Wales, after his investiture today, shows himself to his subjects who are to gather to the number of 15,000 or 20,000 in this vicinity.

The king and queen with the young prince are to travel from Ireland to Holyhead in the royal yacht and afterwards by special train to a small station two miles from this city where they might There, a number of State carriages are to be waiting them and a procession escorted to the city by cavalry forms.

Entering the walled city by the north road they pass through the main street to the great castle where the mayor and civic officials receive them and present loyal addresses.

The royal party then separate, the Prince of Wales preceding his parents to the castle by a few minutes and enters the ancient fortress by the water gate. As he enters the castle his standard is

hoisted on the Eagle's Tower, where it is said the first prince of Wales was born although the story has only tradition to support it.

The King and Queen follow almost immediately and on their appearance at the water gate, the royal standard takes the place of that of the prince of Wales.

Two suites of apartments supposed to have been occupied long centuries ago by Edward I and his queen has been prepared for their majesties and the young prince and to these they retire in order to robe themselves for the great State ceremony.

The public assemblage is seated on specially erected stagings

erected around the interior of the castle walls. A great body of troops is also to be drawn up surrounding a platform in the center of the immense court yard. The Royal Welsh choir consisting of four hundred voices, performs the musical part of the program with a selection of Welsh airs.

The Royal party having robed, forms two processions in their apartments the King and Queen with their suits in the first and the Prince of Wales with his supporters in the second.

The King and Queen thence proceed to the raised platform in the court yard and as they appear in the open air the choir sings "God save the King."

Then follows the procession in which the prince was the central figure and as he approaches the royal parents, the choir sings: "God Bless the Prince of Wales" and the public gives a salvo of ringing cheers.

The formal ceremony of investiture is then carried out, the prince bending down in his surcoat, cloak and mantle of crimson velvet while the King places the crimson velvet cap ornamented with ermine on his head. His majesty then crowns him with a coronet as a token of principality, puts in his hand a golden verge as an emblem of government and circles his middle finger with a golden ring as a sign that he is married to his country.

At the same time letters patent are handed the prince authorizing him to hold the principality of Wales in trust for the King of England, out of whose possession, Wales must never be allowed to go.

Then the bishops of St. Asaph and Bangor assisted by two Welsh non-conformist ministers, conduct the beautiful service of consecration and the processions then reform and march to the Queen's gate of the castle where the King following the example of Edward I, presents the Prince of Wales to

the people of the nation or rather to the many thousands of them assembled outside. The Prince, in order to show the people that he intends to keep their interests at heart, addresses a few phrases in Cymric.

After this second presentation the processions unite and make to gether a complete circuit of the castle walls on the outside, returning by the main front entrance and passing to their apartments to disrobe and prepare for their journey later on to Holyhead.

The Eagle's Tower of the castle, whose part in today's ceremony is so important is a prominent feature of the old fortress. Its walls are of enormous thickness and out of them is the dimly lighted stone chamber where Queen Eleanor is said to have given birth to the first Prince of Wales.

The revival of the ancient custom of investiture of the Prince of Wales in the historic city of Carnarvon promises to be one of the most interesting features of the coronation period.

Taking them and picking up the box in which the silver was kept, I went downstairs. The burglar was waiting for me. He turned his light on what I brought him and remarked that there was a good lot of swag. Then he ordered me into the kitchen and, taking a clothesline hanging against the wall, tied me to a heavy table. In vain I begged him to let me go to my mistress. "Oh, no!" he said. "You'd call the police."

He went away, and I began at once trying to free myself. My joints were very supple, and I soon slipped my hands out of the rope, after which it was no great work to free myself. 

Judge Walter Bordwell suggested that the matter be compromised by setting the trial for some time in September or October and this suggestion probably will be carried out.



Opportunities of the South

Dallas News: The cotton crop is exclusively a Southern crop. In time scientific men may develop a cotton plant that will thrive and fruit in the northern latitudes, but the possibilities of such things are so few and remote that the cotton raisers of the South are not even interested in such future competition. In addition to all the other crops, the Southern states raise melons, sweet potatoes and various fruits that will not grow far north. Even the Indian corn barely gets through and sometimes fails to get through in time to escape the frosts in many of the northern states. It has to be canned green. According to present prices and figures, the cotton crop of the Southern States though only one of the many paying crops will soon be worth nearly a billion dollars annually and already provides more than one third of the total of the exports of the United States.

Mr. Edmond's editor of the Manufacturers Record, Baltimore speaks of our greatest crop as follows: "The net profit of the cotton growers of the South on last year's crop probably exceeded the total output for the same year of all the gold mines in the world. The total value of last year's crop was \$963,000,000, the largest on record."

In view of the high prices prevailing it is quite safe to estimate the net profit of over \$4,000,000.

Between 1891 and 1901 the low price period when the South lost money on every crop, the average value of its cotton crop ran from about \$350,000,000 to \$400,000,000 or scarcely as much gross product as the net profit of last year.

For the last four or five years the value of the South's cotton crop has been running from about \$750,000,000 up to the magnificent total for the crop of 1910-11 of \$963,000,000. The influence of the South's cotton crop not only upon the financial interest of the United States, but upon the commercial interests of the whole world can scarcely be overestimated.

The total value of cotton and cotton products exported from the United States during the fiscal year ending with June will be over \$700,000,000, or considerably more than one third of the total exports of the United States.

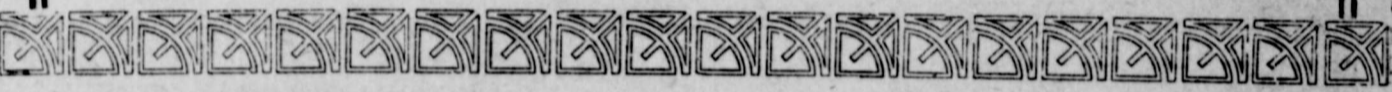

A Town and Its Paper

Speaking of how a newspaper must paddle up stream while it is boosting its town and people where the merchants do not advertise, a case in point may be noted. One weekly paper, a good one—published in a certain County Seat town carries eighty inches of home advertising and one little patent medicine ad. All this patronage probably brings in \$75 a week. The paper carries a column of county, lodge and church directory, which of course goes free and this issue has a four column ad of a picnic, probably thrown in as a free boost, yet the editor says he has great faith in the enterprise and public spirit of the people of the town. There is not a dry goods ad in his paper and only one grocery man shows up and that is to tell where a foreign tea house has its goods on sale. When a town shows up like that in the only paper in the place, prospectors will feel like it is just as well to stay in the old grave yard as to hunt a new one.

Towns and Their Papers.

A newspaper can never very creditably represent a town whose business men do not advertise. He may howl himself hoarse bragging about the vim, energy and enterprise of his town, but if his declarations are not backed up by the liberal amount of advertising by the business men of the town the world will be slow to take this statement as true. It takes more than the unsupported testimonial of the local newspaper man to prove to the world that his town is the best on the market and the best place on earth to buy goods. His evidence needs corroboration. State Press, who sees a small mountain of newspapers every week is downright sorry for the courageous souls who edit some of them—a few of them. These pap-

ten editorials and snappy paragraphs boosting their respective towns and each telling what a stirring, thriving, promising little city it is published in. A glance at the advertising pages or the pages where advertising ought to be, shows that the space is given over to plate matter or miscellaneous repair, and that most of the merchants are dead or asleep. Now this much is certain and does not admit of controversy. Every good town maintains a good newspaper, and the appearance of the paper indicates its condition. If the paper looks half starved granting of course that it is the representa-

tive paper of the community, then the town is full of tightwads and a town full of tightwads is a town full of the kind of people who will never do anything to improve conditions except to squeeze usurious interest out of needy borrowers. This is an advertising age, the age of printers ink; and the merchants who have not found that out are not ordinarily keen enough to pick up bargains for their customers.—Dallas News.

Early Deep Plowing is Necessary

"There is no question but that Summer or early fall plowing will pay. Deep plowing will pay far better at this time than shallow work.

"We have learned by experience that our deep plowing must be done as long before planting time as possible to plow deep just before planting time often means failure for that season. Practically all of our crops require a firm seed bed, therefore we must plow early enough to give the ground time to settle before planting."

July and August planting is advisable. The question is asked "Why is early plowing advisable?" This has several answers. The question might be asked Why do we plow at all? "We plow to kill weeds, conserve moisture, better the physical condition of the soil, make plant food available, give to the plant roots larger area to draw from, etc."

"By discing small grain ground as soon as possible after harvest the moisture can be saved so that the plowing can be done at any desired time thereafter."

"July and August, deep plowing will do more to insure crops for us than any other method or time of tilling. It is at this time of the year that plant food is manufactured faster than any other time. This is especially true of soil that is well worked and kept in proper condition. We must remember that plant food is manufactured in our soils in the presence of good cultivation with moisture, heat, sun light and good ventilation.

"If your ground has been plowed four inches deep a year or two ago, make it at least six inches deep this time; if six inches, then make it eight inches now. This makes slower work and will take more horse power than many of our farmers favor, but we must remember that to a certain extent, the depth of the furrows is the depth that we plow. Ask yourself the question 'Can I raise as large crop on a farm that is three and a half inches deep as on one that is eight inches deep?' Our best experience-

ed farmers will answer emphatically 'No.'"

"This deep plowing should be packed as fast as plowed. This can be done with a sub-surface packer, or by using plenty of horses in connection with a common smoothing harrow, going over the ground at least twice.

This packing is very necessary it keeps the ground from drying out as deep as plowed and establishes a moisture connection between the solid sub-soil and the plowed surface. Later this plowed surface must be kept free from crusts and weeds.

INDICATIONS POINT TO BUMPER CROP IN HISTORY OF COUNTY

GROUND SOAKING RAIN

Crops Generally Free of Weeds and Ready to Receive the Moisture

Not since Scurry county came under sovereignty of the man with the hoe has the prospects been brighter for a bumper crop of both small grain and cotton.

This statement is based on personal observations in part, but more largely upon the statements of conservative farmers from almost every section of the county.

The maize crop was dwarfed by the long continued dry spell, but the yield will be in excess of that of last year, and the outlook for Kaffir corn is exceptionally fine.

Cotton received a good start from the winter rains and has never stopped growing.

The plant is now liberally fruiting and only worms can prevent an enormous yield. One favorable condition of all kinds of crops is the good stand that was almost universally obtained from the first planting.

This added to an increase in acreage over previous years will give the county the greatest harvest in its history.

The statements that had gone forth to the world that Scurry county was in bad shape, especially the condition of the cotton crop was never further from the truth. The goddess Ceres site enthroned here and Cornu Copia will contribute largely to her behests when harvest time comes.

COUNTY IN PRO COLUMN

LEAF WORMS DEVASTATING COTTON

Farmers Unable to Obtain Means For Combatting the Pest

Austin, Texas, July 14—A general shortage in the supply of Paris Green may mean a loss of millions of dollars to Texas cotton raisers, according to a statement from Entomologist Schell. He says the leaf worm is raging in South Texas cotton fields to an extent heretofore unknown at this time of the year and that farmers are powerless because they cannot get Paris green. Northern dealers say cannot fill the orders now on file before the end of the month.

Schell will try to devise a plan to find a substitute for Paris Green.

Deneen Read Lorimer Proofs

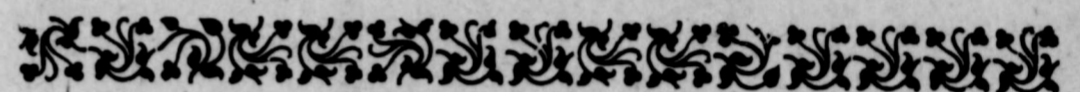
