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## SENATOR JOE BAILEY TO RETIRE FROM POLITICS

Announcement the Greatest Sensation  
of the Day—The Political Waters  
are Stirred.

## PATRY LEADERS LOOKING FOR SUCCESSOR

Senator Bailey Says His Decision is Final—Has Guarantee  
of More Lucrative Engagement in New York  
City. Campbell and Colquitt  
now in Limelight.

Gainesville, Texas, Sept. 6.—United States Senator J. W. Bailey wires home from Washington and has today confirmed the announcement sent out last night that he will not be a candidate for re-election when his present term expires, in 1913.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 6.—The greatest sensation that has come to Austin since adjournment of the Legislature was the announcement last night of Senator Bailey's determination to not stand for re-election at the expiration of his present term.

It has been the sole talk in the political circles today. There has already come to the front a number of names to be considered in connection with the selection for a successor to the Gainesville man.

Among those suggested are: O. B. Colquitt, Jake Wolters, T. H. Ball, T. M. Campbell, Cone Johnson, M. M. Crane and Wm. Poin-dexter. It seems this morning that Colquitt, Wolters and Campbell are considered the lead-

ing probabilities at this stage.

It has been suggested verbatim and said it was emphasized that the anti may unite on either Wolters or Colquitt.

### Galveston Turns to Colquitt

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 6.—It was interesting to note here this morning that Colquitt was the only comment. The Governor's friends here are considering him the logical candidate to succeed Bailey.

### Gainesville Talks About It

Gainesville, Texas, Sept. 6.—Senator Bailey's friends here have pressed him today to give a more extended statement of his declension to remain in politics, but he refused to amplify his brief announcement of last night but repeated that announcement verbatim and said it was emphatic and irrevocable.

A few of the Senator's most intimate friends evidently know his reasons in detail, but they refuse to pass the information along.

Some of them venture to say that Bailey will engage in law practice in New York City after his Senatorial term expires on March 4th, 1913 and they say he will be associated with one of the largest and strongest firms in the Metropolis where he has the guarantee of an income ten times as large as he receives as Senator.

Friends here at his home say that Bailey's reputation as a constitutional lawyer has brought him this flattering offer to identify himself with Eastern firms. It is said here that Bailey's son will finish his law course in the University and later be associated with his father in the practice of law.

Bailey's announcement was not generally known in Gainesville till this morning, when excited crowds gathered in the streets to discuss the matter and many were heard to express regret.

### Riddle Explains Bailey's Act

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 6.—George W. Riddle who was prominent last year as chairman of the Anti-Bailey Campaign Committee organized last year in Galveston said today that Senator Bailey saw the hand writing on the wall and that he had lost much of his strength in the last year or two, and that his friends were getting tired of having to apologize to for him so much and many of them had deserted him.

### Sheb Williams Not Surprised

Paris, Texas, Sept. 6.—Hon. Sheb Williams, Chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee said today of Bailey's announcement: "It is not a great surprise to me. Bailey may retire from official life, but he will not retire from political life in Texas. I have known for some time that Joe Bailey would not accept election to the Senatorship, burdened with either side of the prohibition question.

## RACE WAR IS ON IN OKLAHOMA

Blacks Make Hasty Preparations  
to Leave Community. Ver-  
sions of Trouble Differ

In a battle between negroes and masked white men at the home of a negro named Daniels, about a mile south of Caddo, Ok., last night, Horace Gribble, a white farmer was shot through the heart and instantly killed. Excitement prevails in Caddo today as the result of the killing and although the few remaining negroes are making hasty preparations to leave another clash is feared.

A message from the chief of police this afternoon stated that over the killing and rumors of retaliation were rife.

Versions of the trouble last night differ widely. It was first reported to officers in Caddo shortly after midnight by four white men who stated that they had been fired on while passing the home of the Daniels negro, where two other negroes were hiding and one of their party had been killed. Officers found Gribble's body lying in the road about fifty yards from the negro's home. His right hand clutched a revolver, three of the chambers of which contained empty cartridges. A rifle ball had penetrated his breast causing almost instant death. Gribble was about 27 years old. He resided on a farm west of Caddo and had lived in the community about 8 years and was regarded as a substantial citizen. He is survived by a wife and two small children.

Near the house, the officers found a stick of dynamite with the fuse partly burned. The negro's version of the trouble is that one of their number who was sleeping in the yard was aroused by the white men, who threw the dynamite at the house and then commenced firing into the hut. The three negroes fled to shelter behind the house

and from there returned the fire. Until the officers arrived the negroes said they did not know they had killed Gribble. They were arrested and brought to Durant by Sheriff Hamilton this afternoon.

The encounter was the outgrowth of race trouble which has kept the county in turmoil for the last four weeks, during which time one negro outrage and three attempts have been reported.

Many negroes lived in and around Caddo, some of whom owned considerable property.

Following the killing of Mrs. Campbell, wife of a farmer north of Durant, by a negro four weeks ago, notices were circulated warning negroes to leave Caddo.

A panicky exodus followed. A white farmer, said to have been in the battle last night was indicted for circulating these notices. The negroes have sacrificed their property and crops in this haste to leave the county. Two sales of crops aggregating \$2,500 were reported at Caddo yesterday. Officers state that none of the negroes had refused to leave the community and that the Daniels negro has signified his intention to get away as soon as possible.

### Mexican Cattle Shipments

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 6.—Shipment of 20,000 head of cattle bought from the Terrazas ranch in Chihuahua by J. P. Robertson of this city and W. R. Bigham of Merkel will not begin until November 1. Mr. Bigham went to Chihuahua tonight to close up the final details. Six thousand of the cattle are calves and the remainder cows and stags.

## READY TO STRIKE DEMANDS REFUSED

ILLINOIS CENTRAL EMPLOY-  
EES EXPECT ORDER TO  
QUIT WORK

CONFERENCE IS NOW ON

Sympathetic Walkout by Engi-  
neers and Firemen Likely if  
Leaders Say the Word

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 6.—All Illinois Central employees, members of the nine international unions composing the Federation of Railway Employees in Memphis are said today to be ready to leave work in case the expected strike order is received from the Federation and the International Union leaders in Chicago.

A strike order would affect 1200 men in Memphis all of whom are employed by the road. Should the movement take the proportions of a sympathetic walkout, this number would be augmented by many hundreds more of men employed in Memphis as engineers, firemen, switchmen, etc.

Any strike order coming will be by wire. A member of the executive committee stated it was not likely a bulletin would be posted but word silently passed to the men and work stopped.

Such an order may come at any time.

A prominent member of the committee from this city who attended the Chicago conference on last week stated today that he did not see how a strike was to be averted, basing his statements upon the press reports that President Markham had sent a letter to Secretary Kramer of the International Union, refusing the grant of the interview requested for today.

Forty Governors Meet

Spring Lake, N. J., Sept. 5.—For the first time within recent American history, the governors of approximately forty of the forty six states, will meet in conference here Tuesday, September 12.

Thirty seven chief executives have accepted the call outright, several from nearby commonwealths have yet to be heard from and of the small remainder those who can so arrange their duties will attend for, at least, a portion of the time.

The original conference at the Whitehouse, held upon call of President Roosevelt in 1907, was attended by 33 conferees.

The full five days of the program will be devoted to discussion of questions now uppermost in the minds of statesmen, while social affairs will be kept in the back ground.

Last year at Louisville a round of entertainment was provided, which took so much time that the business of the conference was curtailed. When they adjourned to meet at Spring lake, the Governors told Gov. Wilson that they wanted to come this year for serious business and would leave the social ends to their wives and others who might accompany them.

Accordingly, Governor Wilson and the committee have refused to allow any entertainments to be arranged, except a reception, which he and Mrs. Wilson will give at the State Cottage at Sea Girt, Sept 12 and a dinner to be given the following Thursday.

On the program, which has already been announced, are topics of wide spread interest. To the discussion of employers' liability

and workmen's compensation laws, an entire day will be given and the State control of public utilities will be discussed for another full day. Gov. John A. Dix of New York will discuss the new inheritance tax law passed last winter and the question of fixing intrastate traffic rates will also be considered at a separate session.

Gov. Herbert S. Hadley of Missouri will be a speaker on this subject.

Added interest to the gathering will be given by the presence of two prominent Democratic governors, Judson Harmon of Ohio and Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey.

President Taft may be present for one day and address the meeting, but this has not been definitely arranged.

Governors of the Western States will leave Chicago on Sunday night Sept. 10, on a special car, which will reach Spring Lake on Monday afternoon. Townspeople of Spring Lake are planning a big celebration for that night by way of welcome.

FOSTER PREDICTS WARM WEATHER

Predicts Warm Weather for September and October

The fact has been thoroughly proven that West Texas with good cultivation and a reasonable supply of moisture will beat many other portions of the State in production of crops.

Farmers of the west had opportunity to put their land in good condition for planting and they did it.

The crops have, generally been well cultivated and though there have been some times during the year that it looked as though the drouth would burn everything up it has turned out that several good rains have come and prospects are now favorable for the best crops grown here in four years.

It is admitted that with a reasonably late frost the cotton and feed stuff will make good and fall gardens are considered a sure thing.

We may get much encouragement as to a growing fall season from reading Foster's Weather Forecast. After reporting a disturbance from Sept. 11 to 15, Foster says:

This disturbance will average much warmer than usual for the five days centering on the warm wave dates. Rains will increase in lower Missouri and in and north of the Ohio valleys. Not much rain in the Atlantic and gulf coast states and the Central northwest. This will not be good for cotton where it has heretofore been too dry, but it will be generally favorable to the spring wheat sections, both for threshing and maturing late crops.

Much attention is now wheat sowing. October will be unusually warm and where moisture is sufficient early-sown wheat will make a large growth. Good rains may be expected during October, west of meridian 85, but that month will be very dry, east of the meridian 85. Of course there will be some small exceptions. November will average warmer than usual and moisture will be fairly well distributed.

These conditions suggest that best results will come from late sowing on account of insufficient rain in large sections, while a warm October suggests the fly in early-sown wheat.

If sown in good time, winter wheat will succeed up to Jan 1, but in large sections, the crop will not be good next year. The annual precipitation is always sufficient to make good wheat, but a drouth at a critical time is ruinous. Mid-winter thaws are also ruinous. I have completed my calculations for 1912 and am studying the prospects carefully. What I have said about wheat will largely apply to other grains.

In a general way my reasonable forecasts have proven wonderfully correct. Of course there are few small exceptions. Had my forecasts been followed by all, the average result would have been a saving of millions.

In 90 per cent of all cases it pays to follow these forecasts for agricultural purposes and during the crop growing season it will pay as largely for those interested in agricultural markets.

But in winter season, the big speculators often manipulate and often invest the markets. For that reason, I have concluded my duty is to advise all to stay out of the markets while they are being manipulated during the winter months. Farmers have uniformly made money by following my advice not to sell.
