Claunch, Kennedy claim grand champions

■ Claunch's Exotic Cross tops field in steer show

Jacen Clauch emerged from a field jam-packed with quality to win the 1997 Bailey County Junior Market Steer Show Jan. 18 at the Civic Cen-

It was the second time in three years the son of Jim Pat and Susie Claunch had exhibited the Grand Champion. The 1,275-pound champion Exotic Cross caught the eye of judge Chris Skaggs, a professor at Texas A&M. Claunch had also exhibited the 1995 Grand Champion.

There were 43 steers exhibited during the show, with the quality evident in each and every class and breed.

The Reserve Grand Champion was exhibited by Ky Kennedy, the son of Steve Kennedy of Muleshoe and Sheri Kennedy of Lubbock. His steer was also the reserve champion Exotic Cross; a 1,250 pounder that won the weight class just under the Grand Champion. It was the second-straight year Kennedy had exhibited the Reserve Grand.

Skaggs, who has judged a number of major shows in recent years, including the San Antonio Livestock Exposition and the New Mexico State Fair, offered hope for those exhibitors from Bailey County. He continually petitive" down the road at the majors.

■ Copley brings Dalhart to town for 1-3A contest

Andy Copley is excited about coming back home.

But the former Muleshoe High School basketball standout has a little business to tend to first.

Copley now coaches the Dalhart boys basketball and the Golden Wolves will have revenge on their minds when they visit Muleshoe Friday for a District 1-3A game (7:30 p.m.) at WJHS gym.

Muleshoe edged Dalhart 66-64 in overtime in Dec. 20 in the district opener for teams.

"The best part about playing in

Muleshoe is that all of my family will be able to see us play and I'll be able to visit with them," said Copley, who averaged 20 points and was selected all-district as a senior in

The Golden Wolves (13-10) picked up their first district win last week, beating Friona 73-61, after an 0-5 start.

Expectations run high at Dalhart, Copley said. The Golden Wolves have qualified for the state playoffs the last three years and four times in the 90s.

"Up to this point, the season has been real disappointing," said Copley, 35-23 in his two years as head coach at Dalhart. "This year, we have struggled shooting the basketball. At times, we've struggled to score points."

Dalhart is led by Josh Reynolds, who quarterbacked the Golden Wolves to a 41-0 win over Muleshoe this fall. Reynolds, a two-time alldistrict hoopster, is averaging 15 points, six rebounds and four assists a game. Trevor Scott adds 10 points a game.

Board discusses help for at risk-students

Muleshoe High School students at-risk of not graduating will soon get a helping hand.

MHS Principal Al Bishop Monday discussed plans for academic acceleration of identified students during the regular bi-monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District.

Bishop told board members students who fail or

are considered at risk of failing one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test (TAAS) will receive extra tutoring.

"We've contacted parents with letters, in English and Spanish, as well as teacher/parents conferences," Bishop said. "These will be mandatary tutorials. We won't take any excuses for not coming. We'll contact

employers and family to work out scheduling problems."

Several MHS teachers, as well as instructors from other MISD campuses, have volunteered their time to tutor the students. Teachers have offered to work with students before and after school, as well as conference periods during the school day, Bishop said.

San Antonio man offered city position

City officials have offered a San Antonio man the job as Muleshoe's economic development director.

Jeff Rogers, associate director of the Center of Economics at the University of Texas at

San Antonio, was chosen by Muleshoe city officials to fill the newly developed position, City Manager James Fisher told the City Council during a regular meeting Tuesday.

Rogers has yet to ac t on the

According to City Manager James Fisher, Rogers has 30 days to respond or the city will rescind the offer.

Rogers, one fiveapplicants, was the only person interviewed for the position.

"(Rogers) had the qualifications and experience we were looking for," Fisher said.

If hired, Rogers will earn a yearly salary of \$35,000, plus benefits. His salary will come from an economic development tax local hotels have been paying for the past three years.

The city has a balance of nearly \$400,00 in the fund earmarked for attracting new businesses and expanded present ones.

The council approved also hired a Levelland organization to secure housing grants for the residents of Muleshoe.

The Council Tuesday awarded South Plains Commu-(SPCA) Action nity Association the task of securing HOME grants from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

The purpose of HOME grants are to assist qualifying low income households by providing assistance for the maintenance of their homes. The grants allow such families to bring their housing into compliance with federal housing quality standards, as established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Families whose income is 50 percent or below the median income for the area can qualify for grants of up to \$20,000. Families with incomes between 51 and 80 percent of the area median income can qualify for deferred loans of up to \$20,000.

Joe Embry, a representative of SPCA, told council members that SPCA has successfully obtained similar grants for the cities of Levelland and Denver

The council had originally hired consultant Bruce Spitzengel to help obtain the grants. Fisher said he didn't feel comfortable with the Council's original choice.

Report predicts bleak future if boll weevil left unchecked

LUBBOCK —High Plains regional business sales are expected to drop by \$500 million a year if impending boll weevil populations are left unchecked, a Jan. 17 report estimates.

The drop will come from a 30 percent loss of cotton production and this translates into a decline of more than \$190 million a year in gross farm income and 9,000 fewer jobs in the region. This also suggests the loss of up to a third of the cotton gins in the region.

"Evidence indicates that the boll weevil has firmly established on the Texas High Plains and can survive harsh winters with existing habitat," said Dr. Ron Lacewell, agricultural economist and assistant vice chancellor of agriculture at Texas A&M.

This comes from a study completed this week by the 18member Texas A&M/Texas Tech Boll Weevil Assessment Task Force.

Though the cotton boll weevil has plagued growers across the southern U.S. growing region for more than 100 years, the Texas High Plains has been relatively free of the pest due mainly to the dry climate, harsh winters and an effective diapause program since 1964 which kept the insect from overwintering there.

But in recent years, researchers, county extension agents and crop consultants

have reported seeing boll weevils in alarming numbers.

"Compelling data and experiences have accumulated that indicate the boll weevil has adapted to the High Plains," said Lacewell.

The analysis used information from agricultural economists, entomologists and consultants to determine the potential weevil infestations up to 10 years in the future. These projections were used to estimate the most likely changes from and adjustments to boll weevil infestations.

Task force members didn't address the question of a region-wide control program. Their results simply indicate that the boll weevil left unchecked on the High plains leaves the area at an increasingly competitive disadvantage for cotton production, Lacewell said. The 30 High Plains counties annually produce about three million bales of cotton, some 20 percent of the U.S.

"Serious economic damages are expected as far north as Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Briscoe and Bailey counties," Lacewell

Dr. James Leser, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said trap catches by the end of 1996 had increased almost 40 percent over those captured in traps by the end of 1995.

John R. Hunter, Texas Tech professor, consultant and task force member, noted that he began using boll weevil traps as part of his field scouting technique about three years ago near Lubbock. Since then, he has seen a steady increase in the weevil population.

"It is obvious that the boll

weevil cost at least \$100 per acre to some of my clients in 1996," he said.

Though the project strongly suggests serious economic impacts in the absence of a regional weevil control program, the task force acknowl-





Mules return to running

Cleavinger's 20-20 effort paces Mules

The gears were grinding a bit as Muleshoe shifted into full-time overdrive.

Pushing the pace from the outset, and powered Dustin Cleavinger's Herculian effort, Muleshoe raced to 76-60 District 1-3A win over stubborn Sanford-Fritch Friday at WJHS.

Cleavinger dominated the paint, scoring 26 points, grabbing 20 rebounds (10 offensive). The sophomore post added six blocked shots.

"Dustin worked harder and longer than any time I can remember," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "I hope it's a sign of things to come."

The win keeps Muleshoe (15-9, 4-2) on the heals of district co-leaders Tulia and Dimmitt. Both moved to 6-0 Friday with easy wins.

After bogging down offensively in the second half of losses to Tulia and Dimmitt, Mason felt the Mules needed to a full-time return to the uptempo style that proved so effective earlier in the year.


Mason hoped the Mules could adapt to playing at different tempos, but realized he was keeping his young team for doing what they do best -



edged that the study has some limitations.


"The movement and adaptation of the boll weevil is a biological phenomenon and no one cam accurately predict how quickly this insect will move across the High Plains," Leser said.

Dr. Don Rummel, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entomologist, noted that the study also considered only current technology since it is not known at this time what future developments might include, and the analysis used weather patterns for the past 10 years as an indication of what weather will be like in the future.

Due to uncertainty on the rate of future movements and levels of infestation of the boll weevil, a worst case and best case situation also was evaluated, according to Dr. Don Ethridge and Dr. Eduardo Segarra, agricultural economists with Texas Tech University.

The best case situation showed a reduction in regional business activity of \$57 million compared to an \$820 million loss for the worst case.

On a more optimistic note, the developments from biotechnology, cotton genetics and integrated pest management (IPM) practices can help reduce the potential cotton losses on the Texas High plains by the boll weevil, Lacewell noted.
