## SNYDER SCHOOL ART DISPLAY

Splendid Showing of School Work at Opera House This Week.

The people of Snyder are greatly interested this week in the great art display at the Opera House.

The great feature of interest, however, is in the display of class work of the pupils of Snyder's excellent schools. There are exhibits of drawing, composition and class examination in all departments of the school from the kindergarten and primary through all the grades embracing the senior work in the high school.

This display of art and school work will be open the rest of the week, afternoons and nights. The little folks from Central school will

render a program Friday afternoon and the north Ward pupils will have exercises on the stage Saturday night.

Our people cannot know the good work being done in the school unless they see it—then we feel proud of our children and of the teachers.

The proceeds of these entertainments will go to the benefit of the school library and will be a great help to the school.

## WEST TEXAS BANK ROBBED

Two Men Escape After Locking the Cashier in Vault at Seminole

Seminole, Texas, Feb. 15—Two masked men rode up to the Seminole National Bank in a sand storm early this afternoon and finding the Assistant Cashier there alone, locked him in a vault and got away with \$3500 in money, but overlooked the largest package of money in the bank.

Within thirty minutes after the robbery, an armed posse led by the sheriff F. Lord was in pursuit of the robbers.

No report from the posse had been received up to a late hour.

## TWENTY FIVE BLOCKS BURN

One Thousand People Made Homeless—Property Loss of Over \$6,000,000

A fire broke out in the heart of the Industrial district in Houston at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning and a swath was burned out a half mile wide and a mile and a half long, embracing twenty five blocks.

Two or three large cotton houses were burned and nearly one hundred thousand bales of cotton and much other valuable property and industrial concerns.

The fire loss is estimated at over six million dollars. Two hundred and fifty homes were burned and a thousand people were left without shelter.

THE CONDITIONS IN MEXICO

Views of Snyder Man Who Was an Army Officer in the Revolution.

Abel G. Barrientes, the most prominent Mexican in Snyder and the leader of his people in this section of the country is greatly interested in the political affairs in Mexico.

He was the captain of a Company during the Madero Revolution in that country last summer and did valiant service for the cause. After the success of the revolution was assured he was honorably discharged and returned to private life in Snyder. He is however watching the turmoil going on over there.

A Signal reporter knowing that

Abel was posted regarding the Mexican troubles asked him to tell what the anti-Madero movement is all about. He said that the start of it was that the revolutionists wanted Gomez for president and Madero for vice president. Madero is not strong. He is not firm enough. He is too apt to yield to both sides. He was true to the common people, but when he went to the city and was surrounded by men of wealth and influence, he is charged with forgetting the great masses who had supported his ambitions and a wave of discontentment got started.

He promised that he would have the public domain divided up, giving 350 acres to each soldier and sell the rest to citizens on 40 years time. The people are impatient because that has not yet been done.

Abel says as for him, he is willing to wait. He knows it will take time and Madero is trying to work the thing out according to promise.

When asked what plan Madero would probably have to get the great bodies of land forfeited to the government, Mr. Barrientes said, there are vast claims held there by Americans, Germans, English and even some Mexicans without any real title to them. Men and companies have held lands by straw title. It will be the policy of the government to dispossess such holders and these lands will become public domain. No one who has a just title to land will be disturbed.

Captain Barrientes says it will take time to straighten out these things and he thinks it would be better if the people would exercise patience and leave the government in peace till matters can be brought around to a just, sane settlement.

The case is so much in the public mind that people continue to discuss it in hotels, on street cars and elsewhere and a fatal tragedy was enacted on a street car Tuesday, because of a dispute over the case.

One-third of Business Portion is Destroyed—Loss Estimated at \$25,000

PLAINVIEW, Texas, Feb. 20.—About one-third of the business portion of Crosbystown was destroyed by fire which started at midnight last night.

The Citizens National Bank the Snell Mercantile company, the Lamar store building, Mathews barber shop a restaurant and a small office building were burned.

The approximate loss is estimated at \$25,000 partially covered with insurance. The burned area will be rebuilt with brick at once.



## FAMOUS MURDER CASE IS ENDED

Mrs. Minnie Streight, Who Killed Her Husband Was Acquitted Yesterday.

GATESVILLE, Tex., Feb. 19.—One of the most noted criminal cases in the courts of Texas came to a culmination here Saturday, when Mrs. Minnie Lee Streight of McGregor, who on June eighteenth, nineteen hundred and ten, shot and killed her husband, T. E. Streight, editor of the McGregor Mirror, was pronounced not guilty by the jury, and a long drawn out and a much prolonged trial came to its final end.

The history of the trial of the case runs through the period of two years and has attracted a vast amount of attention from people all over the state of Texas, and in fact all over the United States, and has been prolonged from trial to trial until today, when the decision was rendered Mrs. Streight a free woman.

On the night of June eighteenth, nineteen and ten, while her husband was lying in his bed, Mrs. Streight shot and killed him at their home in McGregor. Her plea was that of cruelty done her and that her husband tried to kill her.

In November, nineteen ten, in the trial at Waco, a life sentence in the penitentiary was given Mrs. Streight but the court of Criminal Appeals granted a new trial, which resulted in today's acquittal.

The state tried to prove in the trial that Streight was murdered while he was asleep in bed, while the defence tried to prove that Streight was trying to kill his wife. Judge Richard Munroe, at the habeas corpus hearing refused the defendant bond, but the presiding justice, W. L. Davidson of the court of Criminal Appeals heard the testimony and granted bond in the sum of \$10,000, whereupon the people of McGregor hanged him in effigy. After a new trial was granted the case was transferred to Coryell county.

### First Lagrippe then Bronchitis

### IN THE COAST COUNTRY

Interesting Letter From a Citizen to The Snyder Signal.

Matagorda, Tex., Feb. 15.

Dear Editor and homefolks:

As I sit this afternoon and look upon the broad expanse of the waters of Matagorda Bay and watch the howling wind toss her to and fro, I am reminded of the wind that blows through the whiskers of the boys in Scurry county. Last night the wind blew, the rain fell and did fill me with fear. Then I wished to be in Snyder where I could hear a kind voice say, fear not father I think the worst is over. Now don't gather from this that I am a coward, but I am a believer in the milk house dug in the ground, and large enough to accommodate a few visitors too.

Maagorda is the third oldest town in the state (so claimed) and there are here some of the old houses (residences) that were built during the slavery times and they are in a fine state of preservation.

The town is small, only about five or six hundred population, I would guess. The people appear to be a good easy going people, don't think they are over flowing with energy.

I have been in this country from the north to the south and from the east to the west and find but very little of it under a general farming system: i. e. cotton, corn, ribbon cane etc., but instead, they have in year's past, had the greater part in rice farming and that did not prove profitable and was given up. About ninety per cent of the land in the county is level prairie land and in my opinion is not susceptible to general farming, from the fact that there is not a sufficient natural drainage.

The greater part of the land is black, sticky, clammy soil, very tough and hard to work.

Palacios is a thriving little town of about two thousand population on Matagorda bay and the people are boosting their town and the country; they can show you (on paper) the wonders of their soil and the productiveness and some times they make good money on truck farming, but when they raise a bumper crop, there is no market for it and it will not pay for the gathering and the freight, so the farmers tell me.







One bale brought 11 cents a pound and the other 10 7-8. Mr. Bynum said, they don't often beat that grade in Texas or even come up to it.

This goes to prove the contention of Public Weigher Tom Jenkins that Scurry county can grow as good a sample of cotton as the famous long staple product of Red River county.

#### Will Grow Hogs and Sorghum

Mr. R. W. Ramage of Ennis Creek president of the Scurry County Farmers' Union was in town Saturday and he says he is not a candidate for any office, but is interested in raising hogs and sorghum. He made up a lot of Sorghum molasses last

year and it was good. He is going to plant more this year and make up some of the juice to sell.

He will urge his neighbors to plant and will supply them with seed. He wants them to make up all they can use and some to sell. He says too, that he is urging his neighbors to grow beans and fruit and tomatoes and arrange to can them up. He says if we will grow what we need of these things, we can supply the home market and break up the practice of keeping the smoke house and pantry in other towns.
