The Pests of Our Country

I would like to suggest to the citizens of our county that we all get busy fighting some of the pests which are upon us.

The country is fast being infested with large rats which are destructive to fowls as well as many other things about the homes. Let us all put out poison baits fastened to a board and then spread potash around the bait so that the rat will get into the potash when he approaches the bait.

If he gets his feet in the potash he will lick his feet and get potash in his mouth and you have the rat. This will work on the ground squirrel, mice and prairie dog as well.

Put on the bait in this way, whether you use poison or not.

The English sparrow is another pest that is fast multiplying, infecting our poultry with mites, fleas, blood suckers, etc as well as disease. They are also destructive to young vegetables, fruit in the bud and bloom as well as when ripe. The time will come when they will destroy our grain crops in the field. Why not go to war on him. Put up a scaffold, out of reach of the chickens and bait the birds early in the mornings with maize or other grain

for several mornings until they become accustomed to feeding there.

Then poison the grain as you would for prairie dogs.

Without a united effort of the communities there would be little good accomplished in these things but if all will work together, we can accomplish much in exterminating these pests and the sooner we get at it the shorter will be the job.

If you want the blood-sucker, wrap the roost poles with gunny sacks and rags, let remain a few days and burn off, then use a good Stock Disinfectant according to directions on the can.

SNYDER BOY GETS HONORS.

Nominated for State Senator in California—A Democrat Endorsed by Republican Press

Report of the Grand Jury

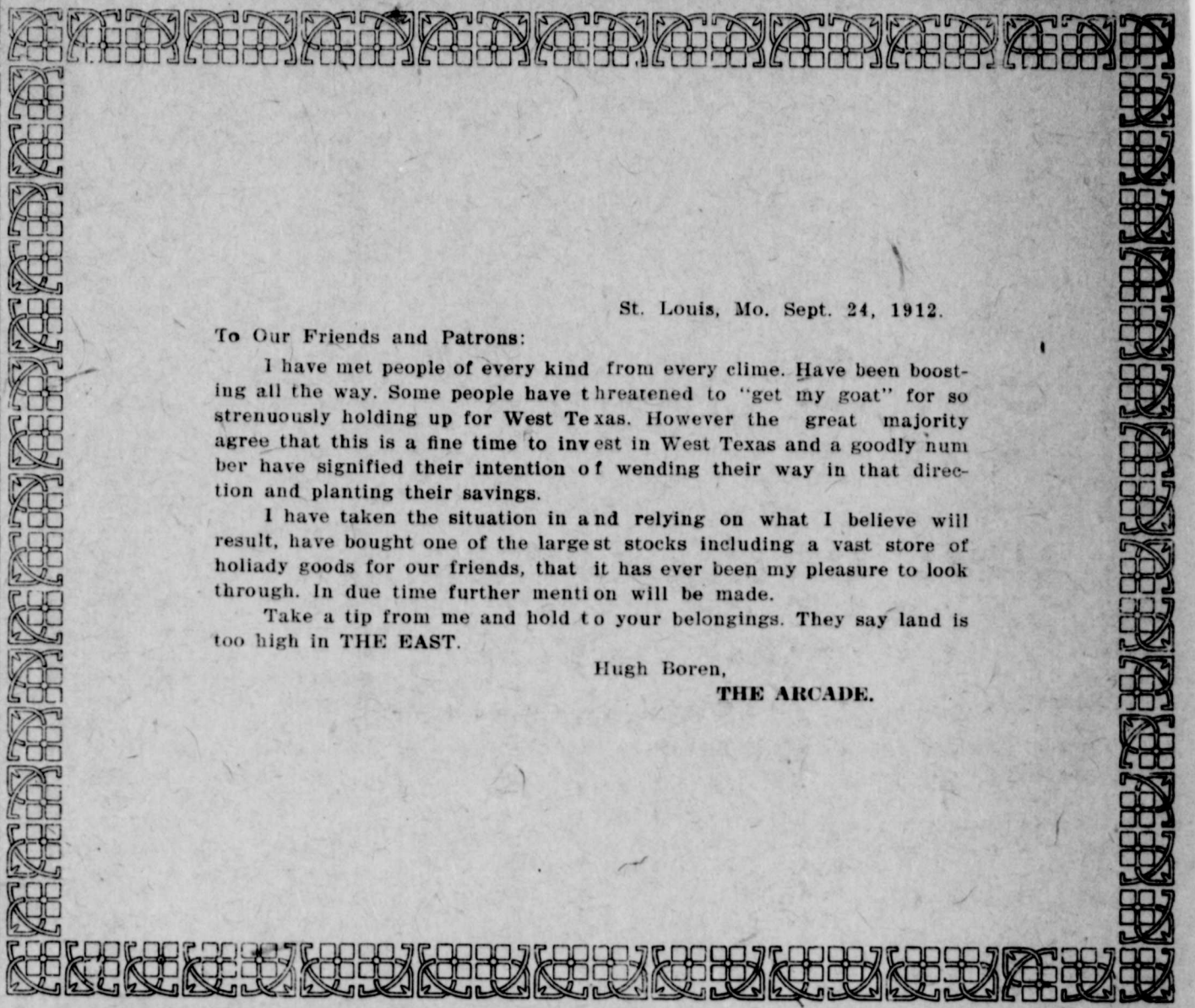
Snyder, Texas, Sept. 21, 1912 To the Hon. John B. Thomas,

Judge of the 39th Judicial District of Texas:

We, the Grand Jury, empanelled by you for the September term, 1912 of the District Court of Scurry Co., Texas, beg leave to submit the following as our final report:

This body has been in session for a period of six days and after diligent inquiry into all violations of law that have come to our knowledge and after mature deliberations have been able to present fourteen bills of indictment—four felonies and ten misdemeanors; during our deliberations we have examined about sixty witnesses summoned before us from all parts of the county and from the former reports of Grand Juries and the investigations which we have made believing the same to be thorough, it is the opinion of this body that there is no increase of crime in this county, but on the other hand the condition as to crime is on the decrease.

In our investigations we find that the officials of the county, charged with the enforcement of the laws are doing their duty and we take this occasion to commend them for their zeal and for the efficient services which are being rendered in this respect, and urge upon our officials a continuance of the enforcement of all laws without relaxation or compromise. We make this suggestion to the various constables and justices of the peace, sheriffs and County Attorneys, however to be a little more diligent in looking after the misdemeanors within the jurisdiction of the Justice courts and thereby relieve the Grand Jury of investigating matters of such character as could be promptly disposed of in such courts, not only as to a saving of time to this body and expense to the county where such investigation is to be had by the Grand Jury, but it is the experience of this body, if such cases are left for a grand jury investigation the important witnesses who have made temporary move and are out of the county when such body does con-

vene, thereby preventing the grand jury from getting any results even after an investigation is had.

The particular matter that we here call attention to is the violation of the local option law. The Grand Jury has reason to believe that this violation has been going on in our County and town and if these matters are watched closely between sessions of the Grand Jury we think this violation could be greatly lessened and we urge that when these cases are found that they be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

We have visited the properties of the county and find that matters in and around the court house are in good condition and also with the jail, we find no irregularities there, everything is kept in first class shape and prisoners can have no room for complaint for treatment received from our worthy officials of the jail.

Learning that there was a finance committee appointed by you for the March term 1912 and that committee having exercised all the diligence necessary in the performance of their duty and it being the custom to have this examined once a year and the citizenship of the county is familiar with the report of that committee, we did not deem it necessary that another be appointed at this time, hence the reason for not asking that this be done.

We further wish to commend the county judge and county commissioners for the excellent manner in which they have planned and are maintaining the court house square and lawn and the removal of the old court house, and that they and their successors in office will keep it up to this standard.

We wish to tender our thanks to the District, County and Assistant County Attorney, the Court, the Sheriff, his officers and the Grand Jury Bailiffs for the valuable assistance rendered us during our deliberations.

And having finished our labors we respectfully ask that we be discharged for the term.

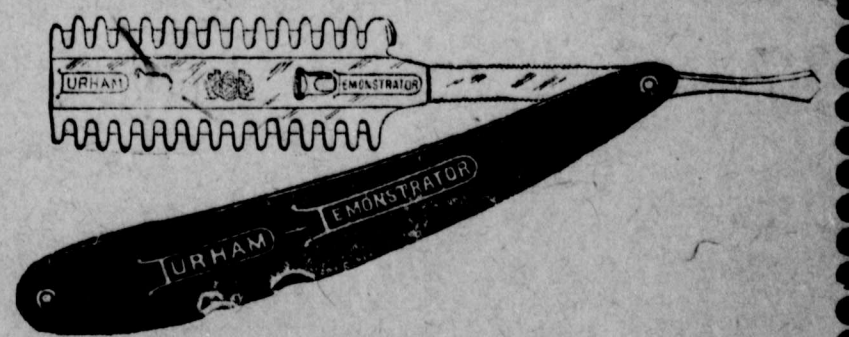

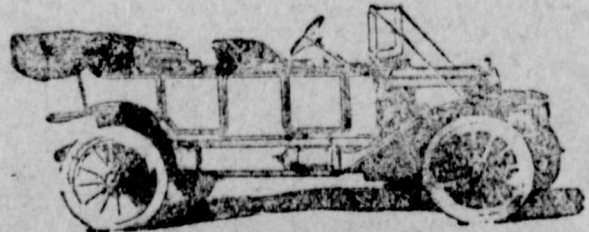

Treatment of Convicts.

There is probably not a person in Texas who does not approve the efforts of our Statesmen to stop the cruel treatment of convicts in the penitentiary and on the state farms. The spirit of gain had reached such a point among the lessees and overseers that such traffic in human blood could not longer be tolerated by decent people.

We are all glad of the efforts being made to stop it.

Now comes on another phase of the convict question. Some over zealous persons want the laws fixed so that convicts may be paid for all the work they may do above the expense of maintaining them. It is urged that when a family is deprived of the support of a husband or father, the State should provide support for the family. That proposition would remove a great part of the horror of the penitentiary sentence and would be putting a premium on criminality. It is probable that a majority of men who are sent to the penitentiary are non-productive and if they had families, did not support them and we fail to see any justice in the State becoming responsible for a duty that the criminal had failed to perform. In cases where a man is wrongfully sent up, and that fact is afterwards proved, justice would say that he ought to be remunerated but in the case of a real criminal the state would be doing good society an injustice to extend to the criminal a greater degree of protection than is provided for the law abiding citizen. It would be a mistake for the State to make criminality any less horrible or to guarantee to the criminal anything less than wholesome reasonable punishment.

Bitten by a Rattler.

Skaggs-McCombs

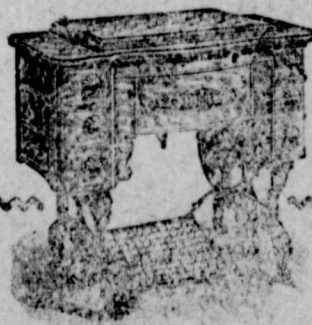

Surely Not Colquitt.

Governor Colquitt has definitely committed himself to the re-opening of the iron furnace at the Rusk penitentiary and will ask the next legislature to pass a law requiring cities to give the penitentiary system the use of all contracts for water and sewer pipes. The Reporter is sure to note this action of the governor and hopes that the scheme will prove a success—Abilene Reporter.

The Signal is disposed to believe Gov. Colquitt has been misunderstood as to his attitude toward the matter. It is contrary to Democratic teaching to throw arms of protection around a business institution to shield it from encroachments of legitimate competition. The lessees of the furnaces will be after operating them for profit for themselves and whether they can realize ten percent or any other percent of profit is not a matter of concern to the State.

If they will make as good pipe as other manufacturers and sell it as cheap, there is probably not a town in Texas or any other state that will not prefer to buy from them—partly for patriotic reasons, but mainly because transportation will cost less because of proximity.

For the State of Texas to say to a mayor, you must buy your water sewerage and drainage pipes from a certain factory it would be a vast more outrageous thrust at local government than to say to the people of a city, you shall not have right to recall an objectionable officer.

Surely the governor has no idea suggesting such a law, and even if he do so there will not be enough protectionists or socialists in the next legislature to do it.

Two farmers in Oklahoma were set upon by a mob and shot because they had brought negro cotton pickers into that country.

Three young men accused of killing Federal Enforcement officer Bowman in Oklahoma have surrendered at Tulsa. Northern Oklahoma is gaining quite a rep for outlawry.

A confidential friend of Colonel Roosevelt is said to have given out a statement to the press that Teddy himself, expects Woodrow Wilson to be elected president of the United States. The colonel will be satisfied if he can see Taft defeated.

The county attorney of Clay county has filed suit against the Texas Brewing Association for \$12,000 occupation taxes, alleging that agents for the Association have for two years solicited business in that county for intoxicating liquors.

It is announced from Washington that President Taft has decided to issue an executive order placing all fourth class postmasters under the civil service. This will remove the uncertainty of tenure for 36,938 postmasters. Evidently Mr. Taft sees that Wilson is going to be the next president and this step is to be taken to pinch jobs for all of that class of postmasters.

It usually tends to offend a fellow to refer to his short comings, but sometimes it does him good. It makes him think and a few minutes of honest examination may do wonders. If people always speak in praise of him he is apt to feel secure, therefore, since all men at times make mistakes, it is well enough to remind him.

She admitted that she saw Boyce during the time they lived in Dallas.

W. W. Smith has a force of workmen started in this week to rebuild his storehouse, next to the post office which was burned about a month ago.

Robbing the soil should be a crime in law as it is a crime in fact.

WHEAT CONFERENCE.

A Meeting of Farmers to Consider Ways and Means to Obtain More Bushels of a Better Quality—How to Grow the Best Variety So That All Wheat Shipped from Any One Station Will Be Free From Mixture of Weeds or Other Seeds.

Meetings are being arranged throughout the entire wheat belt around each mill and elevator to hold a conference of all the farmers in each community to discuss the grain problem and to agree upon a line of procedure which will improve the quality and quantity of the crop.

Applications are being made to the Agricultural Colleges to furnish speakers and demonstrators to attend these meetings. When the line of procedure is decided for each community every farmer is requested to sign an agreement to carry out the methods upon his own farm.

A wheat meeting covers the following subjects:

1. Methods of preparing ground.
2. What rotation and what should wheat follow.
3. Building up soil.
4. Preparation of seed bed.
5. How to select one best type of seed.
6. Where and how to get it.
7. How to induce neighbors to grow one variety.
8. When to apply manure and fertilizer.
9. Experiences with seeding.
10. Depth of plow and when.
11. Spring working.
12. Grading and fanning mills.
13. Hot water and formaldehyde for smut.
14. How much seed to acre.
15. Best time for seeding.
16. Effect of frost and ice.
17. When to harvest.
18. Threshing.
19. A graded price at elevator according to quality.
20. Milling value of wheat.
21. Marketing and shipping.

QUALITY IN WHEAT.

Food Value Depends Upon Amount and Quality of Flour It Will Produce—Care After Harvesting.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] Practically all the wheat produced is used in the manufacture of flour. Price nowadays prevents the use of any considerable amount as feed for stock. Consequently the value of our wheat depends upon the amount and character of flour it will produce. Quality of wheat depends upon: First, selection and treatment of seed.

Second, proper rotation of crops. Third, thorough preparation of the soil.

Fourth, sufficient moisture and plant food to insure maturity.

Take Care of Your Wheat. The responsibility of the farmer does not cease when he has matured a good quality of grain in the field. Exposure, while standing in the shock causes bleaching, sprouting, increase in moisture-content and consequent decrease in test weight per bushel. This means a lower commercial grade and, hence, a lower price. Sprouted wheat cannot produce good, sound flour that will make good bread. Also, taking up moisture while in the shock or in poorly built stacks may cause heating to take place, and the result will be "bin burnt" or "stack burnt" wheat, which is unfit for flour making.

The presence of smut balls from "bin" or stinking smut, imparts a disagreeable odor and a dark color to the flour as well as to the wheat. All these facts serve only to emphasize the importance of thoroughly good farming to produce quality as well as quantity.

PURE SEED WHEAT.

Do not Mix Hard and Soft Wheat and Expect to Grow One Variety.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] "Those of you who grow wheat should make every effort to have what you grow pure; all of it of one variety or type. If you grow hard wheat, sow only that in which every grain sown is hard wheat," said John Field, of the Oklahoma Farm Journal. "Millers who are equipped to grind hard wheat want it all hard, not just half of it or three-fourths or even ninety-nine per cent. And they will pay more for wheat which is all hard than they will for wheat which is mixed with soft."

"The man who offers mixed wheat for sale hereafter will have to take a lower price than if the wheat was all pure, hard wheat."

WHEAT/STEM MAGGOT.

Wheat stem maggots bore into the wheat straw and cause the heads to turn white. These pests are killed by burning or plowing under stubble as quickly as possible after harvest.

Of course, where grass is seeded with wheat it is not practicable to burn the stubble or plow it under.

In The District Court.

The District Court has been doing quite a good deal of business this week in the criminal department.

The case of Dr. A. W. Browning of Fluvanna charged with an assault on J. F. Dowdy with intent to murder was called Monday morning. There were many Fluvanna people here as witnesses in the case. The state was ready for trial but the defense asked for a continuance to next term of court because the wife of the accused is seriously ill. The court granted the continuance.

The case of Monte Bowron vs. Snyder Ice, Light and Power Company was on trial during the latter part of last week. In this case the jury rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$5,000.00. This suit was brought for personal damages. Plaintiff while working as a lineman for the telephone company came in contact with an exposed electric light wire at the southwest corner of the square and was severely burned. He fell from the cross arms of the pole to the ground and received injuries from which he has never recovered.

On Thursday night of last week the court held a night session to dispose of a suit of E. W. Clark against the Ice Light and Power company for judgment and foreclosure under deed of trust for \$15,000.00. There were other cases of similar nature brought by other plaintiffs. All together amounting to more than twenty thousand dollars. The court gave judgment as prayed for and set some date in November for sale of the property to satisfy these claims.

C. L. Johnson who resides in the south part of the county was arraigned Monday on charge of forgery. The prosecution was conducted by district attorney Stinson. The court appointed W. S. Payne attorney for the defendant. The defendant entered a plea of guilty. The witnesses stated what they knew of the affair and the jury gave Johnson a verdict of two years in the penitentiary.

Quite a good deal of interest was manifested in the trial of J. H. Parkinson and G. L. Kelly charged with burglary. One night several months ago the store of the Hermleigh Mercantile Company, at Hermleigh, was entered and the safe blown open and robbed. On the day preceding the robbery two strangers had been seen in the town working on their automobile which seemed to be out of repair. After the safe blowing, suspicion pointed to those men and later they were arrested in other counties. G. L. Kelly was put on trial here Monday. Attorney Stinson conducted the prosecution and Preston Martin of Weatherford was attorney for the defendant.

There were numerous witnesses here from Hermleigh where the burglary was committed and from Haskell county the hope of the accused. It was easy enough to prove that these were the strangers who were in the town with the broken down car but the state failed to connect them with the safe blowing and robbery.

This being the case the court instructed the jury to return a verdict of acquittal which they did. The companion case, that against J. H. Parkinson, was next called and upon motion of the District Attorney was dismissed.

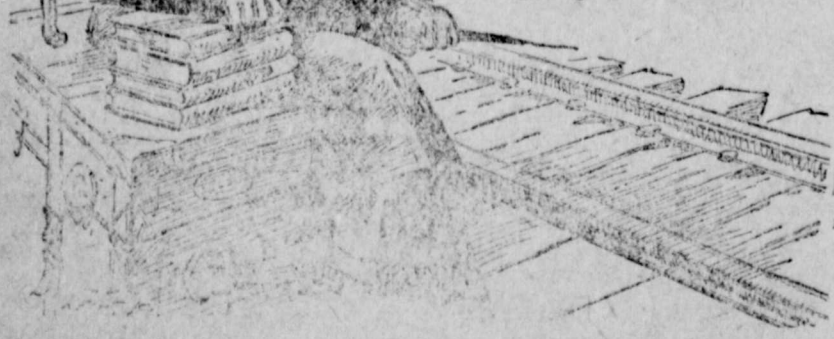

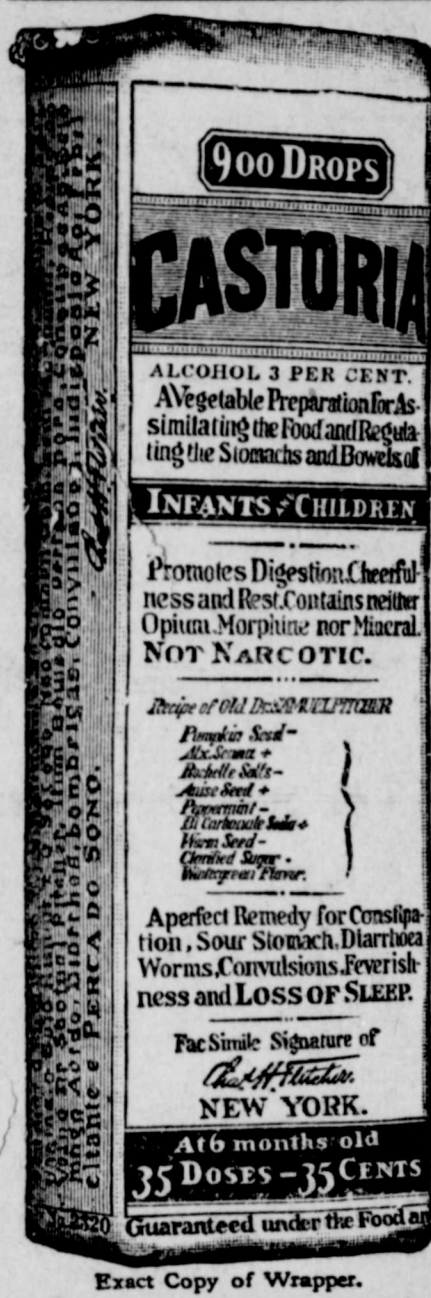

EDITOR SIGNAL—

Excuse me for butting in again. I think a man is guilty of negligent homicide when he sees his fellow man going into death's doors and does not warn. In the cold countries they tell me that the pleasures of sleep comes on one when he reaches a certain state of cold and if his companions do not wake him by warming him by rubbing with snow and cold water he will sleep the sleep that never wakes. That is not the condition that I see here, but nearly as suicidal and that is the tendency the people have of running from a drouth. Drouths are common to all sections. In humid sections, fifteen days without rain is a drouth. It rains an inch during the growing seasons every week in humid localities. For instance, South Carolina has nearly fifty inches of rain per annum. Yet between 1900 and 1909 sixty two drouths occurred. Michigan and Wisconsin average about forty inches annually, yet they experienced twenty seven drouths between 1900 and 1909 inclusive. One lasted 59 days and you will remember the great forest fires came then. The same holds good in East Texas. It was only last year that there was no corn made in all the rich corn growing belt of Texas and all of those flourishing towns of north east Texas that did not have artesian water had to buy it and it cost as much per barrel as Standard oil.

Therefore, I suggest to the man with a home here, don't lose your nerve. If you have a well and windmill, plant a fall garden of turnips, cabbage, English peas, lettuce and mustard and prepare to live well and contented, if you do not make any progress forward, you will not backwards. What we save is all we make any way and if we save the necessity of buying, if we produce at home the necessities of life we have made that much. Your cotton will soon be picked, your feed stuff all in, then prepare for the rain when it comes. In the cultivated portion of the land you can plow it. 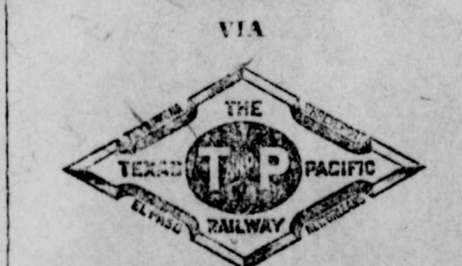
