Public Confidence in Wilson

Because the business of the country did not go all to pieces and business men refused to lose faith in each other over the recent national election. Socialist papers are ready to say that Woodrow Wilson will be a tool of the trusts. It makes those papers grow green with disgust because stocks in New York went up instead of down. The facts in the matter are that the country has by its usual faith in business and by overwhelming vote, demonstrated a popular confidence in Wilson and the Democratic Congress to handle the affairs of government for the public good. We do not expect radical legislation. We do expect a gradual and decided reduction of tariff duties and we expect a schedule so that the rich will bear their just proportion of the expenses. Of course capitalists believe that Wilson will maintain a sane, safe, business administration and that is what all reasonable people want. No man of reason wants to see the credit of the government impaired by repudiation or a reckless disregard of the rights of investors.

Democrats believe that the protective tariff system has fostered the trusts and thus brought on this period of high cost of living and among the first things that the democratic administration will do will be to set on foot move for tariff reduction. We do not expect Socialist papers and some of the socialists to approve anything that the administration may do. It is probable that trust barons may be displeased, but the country is decidedly in harmony with democratic effort and we expect the party leaders to push their work regardless of what other schools of politics may think about it.

European War Crisis

The Balkan situation after a half century of false alarms has at last developed into a real crisis. Austria-Hungary is jealous because Serbia wishes a port on the Adriatic sea and feeling is so intense that she has dispatched a steamer to take off her subjects when the Serbian troops reach Durazzo. The Bulgarian's entry into Constantinople is resented by Russia which fears they might wish to keep possession, but it is thought that Bulgaria will willingly withdraw after peace is assured, so this situation is not so serious.

Russia is mobilizing her forces and preparing transports on the Black Sea, most probably on account of the activity of Austria Hungary as Russia is upholding Serbia. The most hopeful sign is the fact that moderating influences are being brought to bear by Germany, the ally of Austria-Hungary and by Bulgaria, Serbia's comrade in arms.



CITATION BY PUBLICATION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
County of Scurry

To the Sheriff or any Constable,
Scurry County—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon H. C. Jordan by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not then in any newspaper published in the 39th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest district to said 39th Judicial District; to appear at the next regular term of the county court of Scurry County to be holden at the court house thereof in the town of Snyder on the first Monday in January, A. D. 1913, the same being the sixth day of January, A. D. 1913 then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 14th day of November A. D. 1912 in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 513 wherein W. E. Head is plaintiff and H. C. Jordan is defendant and said petition alleging that plaintiff resides in Scurry County, Texas and defendant's residence is unknown and after reasonable diligence cannot be ascertained. That heretofore, to wit on Jan. 1 1910, the defendant H. C. Jordan and one J. B. Jordan executed and delivered to the plaintiff their joint and several promissory note for \$350.00 due two years after date, bearing 10 per cent interest per annum, providing for 10 per cent attorney's fees if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection or suit brought on same, payable at Snyder, Texas, bearing credits as follows, Dec. 31, 1910 interest paid up to Jan. 1, 1911; Feb. 1, 1912 credit by order of W. E. Head \$100.00; 10-7-12 credit \$21.70. The defendant and J. B. Jordan have failed and refused to pay the balance of said note and it is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection under an agreement to pay the attorneys the 10 per cent provided for as attorney's fees and that said fee is a reasonable one. That by reason of the failure to pay said note the plaintiff is damaged in the sum of \$317.47.

Plaintiff asks for writ of attachment and prays for judgment for his note, interest, attorney's fees and costs of suit, and for foreclosure of such liens as he may acquire by attachment and for the establishment of his debt and for general and equitable relief.

LATE BALKAN WAR NEWS

American marines have been sent ashore from the Scorpion at Constantinople.

Negotiations for an armistice have failed and the Bulgarians opened the attack against the Turks all along the Chatalja lines.

The Turkish fleet participated vigorously in the defense of the Marmora end of the line and, presumably, Turkish warships assisted in the Black sea end, also.

Nazim Pasha, the Turkish Commander in chief claims to have repulsed the Bulgarians' attack and destroyed three Bulgarian batteries.

Every day brings fresh dispatches recording the terrible spread of the cholera. It is now stated that there are one thousand cases daily, with a mortality of fifty per cent.

Ambassadors of the powers have taken prompt measures and are landing detachments from the foreign warships to protect foreign residents and property.

The war continues at other points. The Montenegrins have captured San Giovanni di Medua and the battle for the possession of Monastir is now going on. All the approaches to that town are reported to be in Servian hands.

Demonstrations of sympathy with the Balkan aspirations are causing trouble in the Bosnian Diet which has publicly protested against the Austrian government's attitude in favoring the Albanians and opposing the Servians.

The town councils of Spalato and Sebenico, in Dalmatia have been dissolved on account of their pro-Servian sympathies.

A strong Montenegrin division, after severe fighting has succeeded in occupying the fort of San Giovanni di Medua as well as all contiguous territory.

It is said that all the Bulgarian troops have departed from Adrianople, the investment of which has been left solely to the Servians.

Monastir has been captured by the Bulgarians.

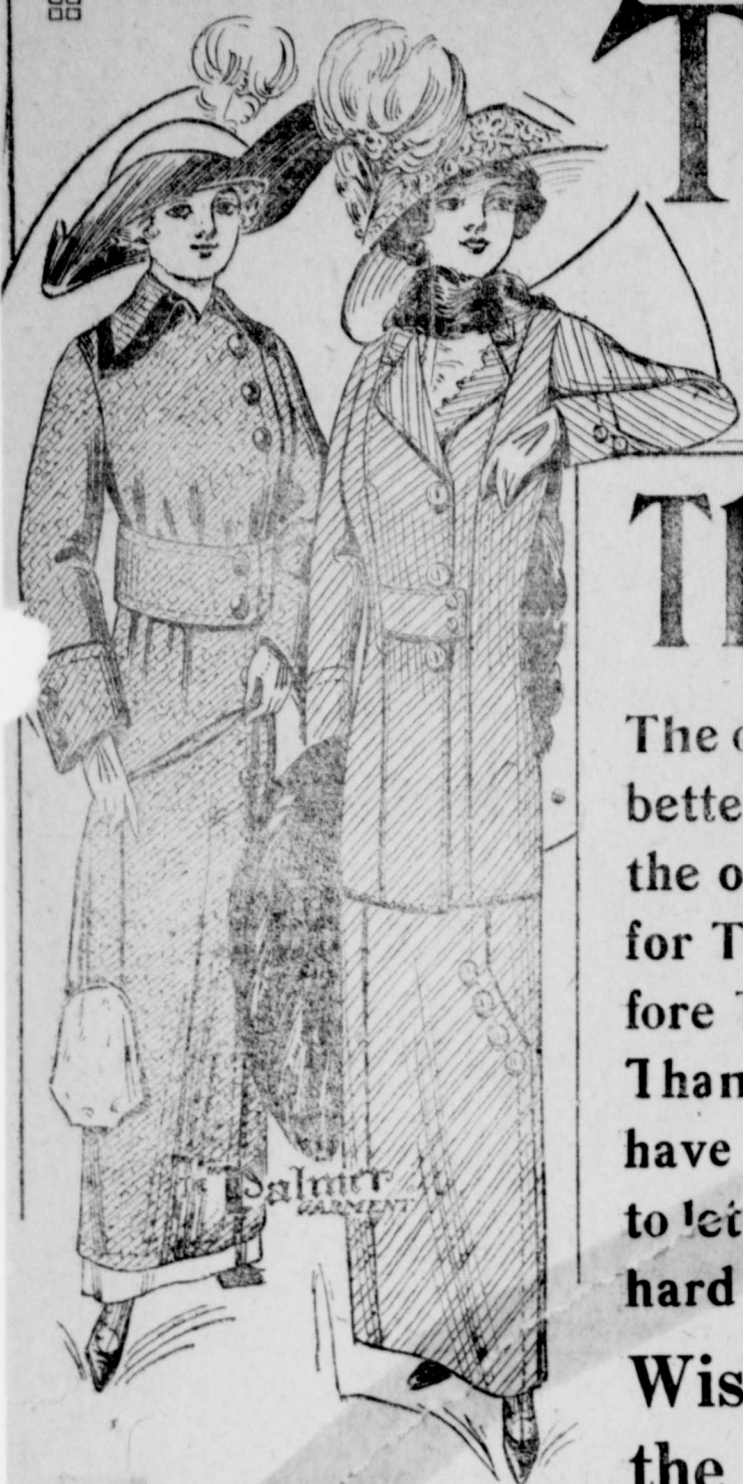

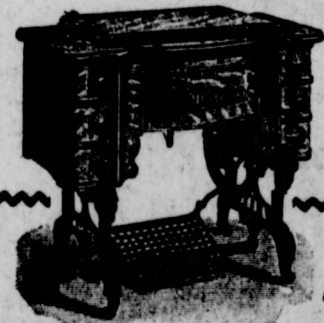

FARMERS UNION PRESIDENT ACCEPTS NEW POSITION

Fort. Worth, Texas, Nov. 21—
Pete Radford, of this city, was
elected manager of the Farm Life
Commission at Dallas last Satur-
day at a meeting of the Executive
Committee of the Texas Commercial
Secretaries and Business Men's As-
sociation and will open up offices in
this city in the Wheat Building on
December 1st.

Mr. S. A. Lindsey of Tyler was
elected chairman of the Commission
and a directorate of fifteen mem-
bers was selected to direct the work.
Mr. Radford is serving his second
term as President of the Farmers
Union and has been prominent in
the councils of that organization.
For several years and his general
knowledge of farm life, his native
ability and wide personal acquain-
tance and influence thoroughly equip
him for the position.

The Commission will study every
phase of agriculture with a view
to making farm life more attractive
and the business of farming more
emunerative.

The Commission will work thru
agricultural organizations encourag-
ing the farmers to unite in an ef-
fort to promote their interests and
Mr. Radford will spend a consider-
able portion of his time in travelling
over the state in the interest of the
movement.

AN ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the City Coun-
cil of Snyder, Texas, this Nov. 18,
1912, that Section 3, of the Ordinance
creating a sanitary district in the
city of Snyder and providing for
water and sewer connections therein
be amended and added to, as follows
to-wit:

Immediately after the language
making exception, that only one sewer
connection shall be required
where two or more buildings are oc-
cupied by the same party, firm or cor-
poration, the following language
shall be inserted: "Provided that
where two or more tenants occupy
owners of said lot, premises or build-
ing thereon, said lot, premises, or
building all belonging to the same
party, firm or corporation, it shall
be optional with the occupants or
owners of said lot premises or build-
ings whether they make more than
one sewer connection or not, but
each of said occupants shall be re-
quired to pay the regular water ren-
tal, the same as if connection was
made with the sewer for each sepa-
rate lot, or building thereon, as
provided in this ordinance."

Provided further that it shall be
optional with the owner lessee or user
of any lot premises or buildings
within the sanitary limits of the
City of Snyder, where the monthly
rental for the use of such lot, prem-
ises or buildings is less than \$7.50
per month whether connection be
made with the sanitary sewer or
whether said owner, lessee or user
pay the regular water rental without
making such connection.

Upon the failure or refusal of any
party, firm or corporation to select
and comply with one of the options
above granted in cases where such
options apply, said party, firm or cor-
poration shall be punished as pro-
vided in this ordinance for a failure
to connect with the sanitary sewer.

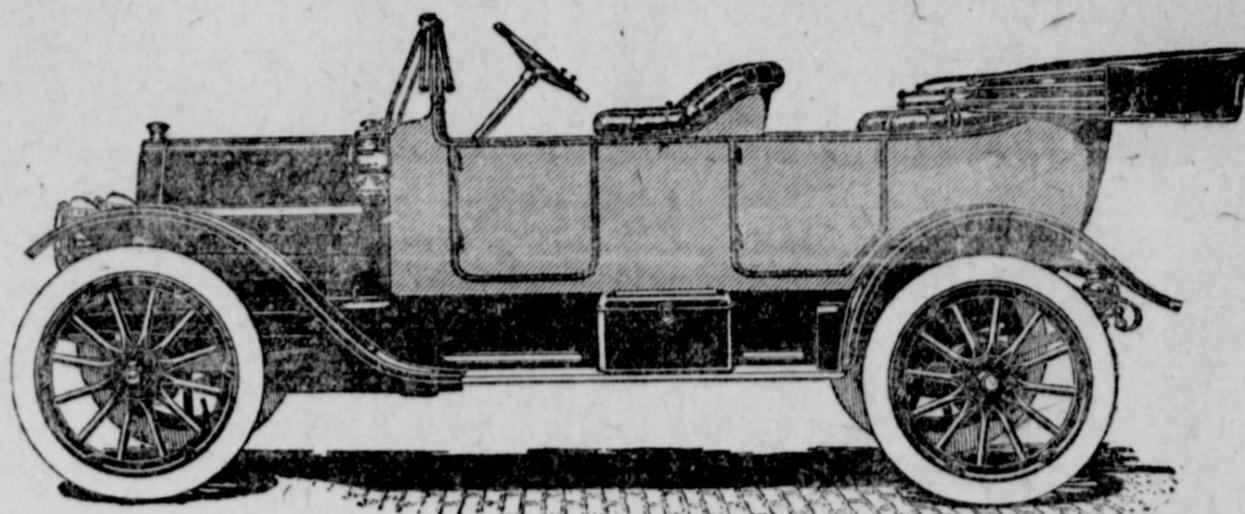

BIG RANCH TO BE CUT UP

The J. A. Ranch in North Plains to Be Sub-Divided by Irish Owner

The world famous Palo Duro ranch, technically the "J. A." ranch is to be cut up.
Mrs. Cornelia Adair, owner stopped in Fort Worth, Wednesday night on her way from England to make final arrangements. She will leave the railroad at Clarendon.
"We must keep up with the spirit of the times" Mrs. Adair explained. The settling up of the country has created a big demand for lands I do not believe in the large land holders standing in the way of progress.
The J A Ranch, more familiarly known by its headquarters, Palo Duro, lies on either side of the Palo Duro Canyon through the counties of Armstrong, Donley, Hall and Triscoe.
The extent of the property has been variously estimated, but it includes 350,000 acres. It is one of the most magnificent ranch properties in the world.

TRUMBULL OPPOSES REPEAL OF STOCK AND BOND LAW.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 22—Frank Trumbull, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the M. K. & T. Railway Company agrees with Senator Culberson that the stock and bond law should not be repealed. Friends of Mr. Trumbull have directed attention to his statement before the Texas Welfare Commission is session at Houston on April 30 in which he said in part:

"My own conviction about this stock and bond law is that it would be a great mistake to repeal it. I think the good in it ought to be preserved. I think it ought to be supplemented with permissive clauses; first so that there would be no difficulty whatever about getting securities for improvements. If we should announce for instance that we wanted to spend five million dollars on the M. K. & T. lines in Texas, I think that your laws should be such that we can get a mortgage lien for that five million dollars regardless of what the previous capitalization of the railroad was.

Mr. Trumbull also suggested that any company which had obligations outstanding, prior to this law, should be permitted to issue new obligations to take their place as they matured and a third amendment suggested by Mr. Trumbull was that new lines be permitted to issue bonds prior to completion of construction.

A Breeder of Trusts

The protective tariff is the direct breeder of trusts, and therefore of high prices. The proof is easily marshaled. Suppose there are twenty-five men or companies engaged in the manufacture of a certain article of general use, a necessity. They find that by adding twelve per cent of the amount each has invested to the production and sale cost they can sell it at about \$2.50. Competition between these manufacturers keeps the price of that article to about that figure. Some financier down in Wall street eager to make a few unearned millions by promotion notices that there is a forty per cent tariff on this specific article. Forty per cent of \$2.50 is \$1.00. He calls a meeting of these twenty five independent manufacturers and points out to them that if they would consolidate all of their plants into one establishment under one ownership, they could secure \$3.50 for the article for which they have been getting \$2.50, because the tariff keeps out foreign competition.—Bryan's Commoner.

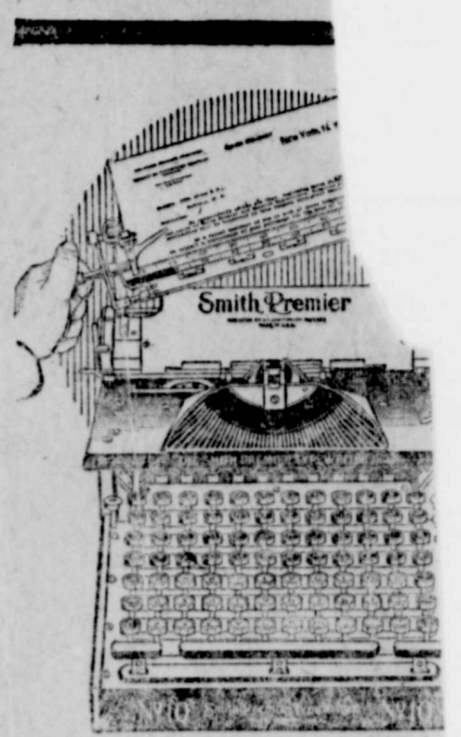

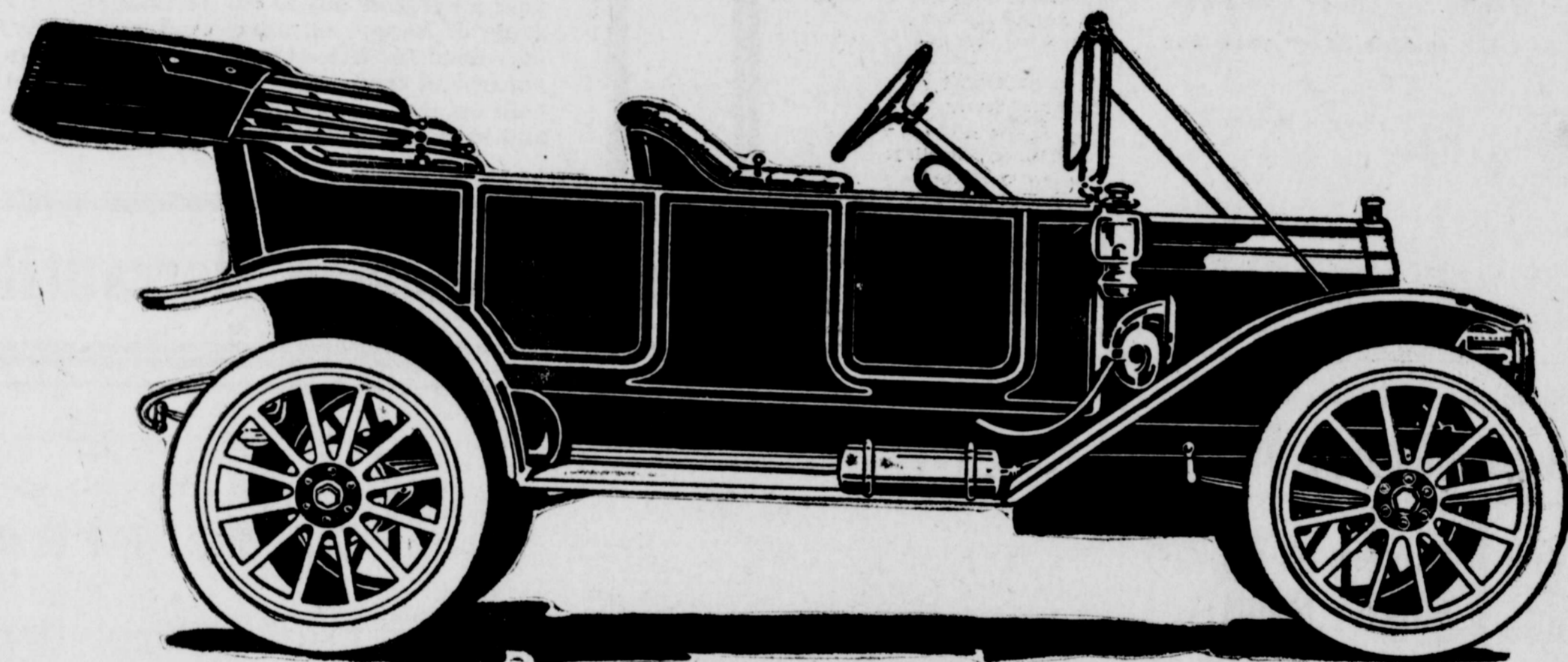

SAMPLES OF FETERITA ON EXHIBITION HERE

E. W. Whinery Has Proved the Value of This New Feed Crop To the Farmer

Mr. E. W. Whinery of Dunn was a pleasant caller at The Signal office a few days ago. He brought in some heads of feterita, the new feed stuff which he grew on his place last season. He saw the seed advertised and learned that it had been successfully grown in Oklahoma. He sent to Washington or some of the seed and planted about a half acre on the 23rd of May and it produced at the rate of 25 bushels to the acre, without rain or irrigation.

Mr. Whinery found ripe grains in his crop within 63 days after planting.

The feterita is of the sorghum or maize family and the head resembles maize, though long and slim. He believes it will prove a profitable crop and well adapted to the soil and climate in West Texas.

The test in Oklahoma proved this new forage plant to yield at least 15 bushels more per acre than kaffir or milo and the yield of fodder is also great.

Samples of feterita are on exhibition at The Signal office.

MRS. AGNES ORNER TO BE TRIED AT MIDLAND.

Midland, Texas, Dec. 28.—Mrs. Agnes Orner, charged with the murder, by poison, of her 7-year old daughter has been removed to Midland and will be tried here in the February term of court.

Mrs. Orner was first tried at El Paso where the verdict of the jury was guilty and the penalty life imprisonment. She secured a new trial and the case was then heard at Pecos, where it resulted in a hung jury.

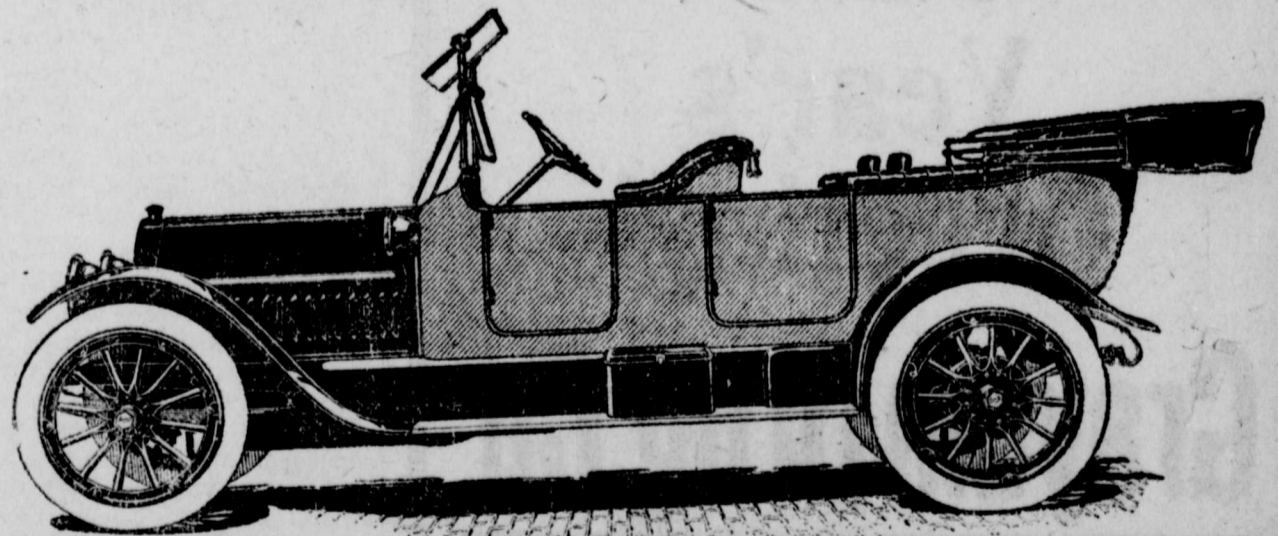

"The City Problems of Today"

In one of the midweek meetings at the Presbyterian church recently when the topic was "The City Problems of Today," after many interesting speeches pointing out such perils as the Foreignizing of whole sections of our large cities; the Shun evils which so stubbornly resist improvement; the "sweat shop" tyranny; the saloon strong hold, municipal politics and political "bosses," etc. Mr. E. B. Barnes read the following paper pointing out the remedy and the more hopeful view, and was unanimously requested to allow the publication of the paper that others may share its contents.

The paper follows:

"Only those who have not studied history lose heart in great reforms. Some great soul has not dreamed of centuries ago. The reformer is ever an optimist. There are two classes of people with which we come in contact daily, one class declares the world is growing worse and the other declares it is growing better, that these are the best times the world has ever known, and he who claims this, all revelation, all history and all science witnesses is right, and will be right for evermore. The world today is perhaps witnessing the greatest reformation that history records,

yet we do not expect it to bring us by a near cut route to the millennium. Social progress is slow, but if we read aright the history of the mighty past, we become braver prophets of the future and more cheerful workers in the present. We see the Eden flowers spring fresh from the blood and ashes of old civilization, and the march of progress goes steadily onward and upward.

It is not our purpose in this short discussion to trace man from the caves and dens and dark abodes of his primitive existence to his present surroundings and environments in great and powerful cities; but rather to deal with some of the problems that confront us because of these present conditions. The tales of horror, want, misery and degradation as they exist in many of our great cities are familiar to all who read the daily papers, and these conditions exist not alone in the slums and hovels of the poor, but embrace every branch of the social, moral and political fabrics of our city governments. New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and San Francisco have all but recently held up to the gaze of an astonished nation the putrefactions as they exist in almost all the different ramifications of the body politic. But in every instance a Moses has

arisen to arouse the public conscience and the alarms have been sounded from the hill-tops, even until the great political parties have caught up the slogan of reform and there is now no knowing when or where the investigation will end, or what yet remains to be brought to light.

Hence the reform that would eradicate the evils from the cities of our land must deal not only with the vices of the slums and tenement houses and aggregations of the poor emigrants, but must also seek to purify the elements higher up. To combat these evils that seem to menace the very foundation of our government on every side, many reforms have been inaugurated during the past few years participated in by the leading philanthropists, ministers, educators and statesmen of the time.

To relieve the congested condition in our larger cities a movement has been started to induce young men to remain on the farm and to better the rural home and make country life more attractive in every particular. More stress is being placed on the dignity, independence and results financially to be attained from the farm; while in the cities the public parks are being improved and increased in numbers, more playgrounds are being provided and excursions by land and water arranged for the children of the poor. Better homes are being built for those who rent. Anti-child labor laws have been passed in many of the cities and states pensions granted to the worthy, pure food and drug laws enacted, preventable diseases circumscribed, our immigration laws enforced, free text book and compulsory education in many of the states, and last but not least the sure and rapid banishment of the nefarious saloon and liquor traffic, all of which surely tends to

given a "square deal," yet just as sure as "the sun brings morning," there are too many boys running the streets both day and night, delinquents from school and from home, and this condition exists in every city village and hamlet in the land. With the proper environments and teaching juvenile crimes can be reduced to a minimum. Industrial and reform schools and juvenile courts have been established in many places for the protection of society and those who have not advanced to the degree of a hardened criminal. Thus we see the good work for the uplift of humanity going on all over the land, and today as never before is it engaging the best thought of the progressive men and women of the land, and we doubt not but that the ultimate end will be complete success."

the betterment of society and to lesson the perils of life in the city as well as to hasten the coming of a better day for our land, the home of the brave and the free.

Back of all these agencies however must be the reformation of the individual. Reform the individual and man will then be able to find for himself the kind of organization that best suits him. Improve his intelligence, strengthen his body with wholesome food and clothing, better his place of abode and he will construct in a large measure his own future and will find the path that will lead him back to the Eden of his fondest hopes.

The uneducated of our land are many generations behind the educated classes. The distance between these two classes must be lessened. The ignorant are easily the prey of the cunning and fraudulent. It is on this class that our best efforts must be expended. We must elevate and instruct them. We must teach them the duties they owe society and what they have a right to expect in return from society. As a people we must realize where our responsibilities rest and be prepared to meet them. We must construct and re-construct the man of the city and the future of our country will then be safe.

To accomplish this the Bible, the book of Divine truth and light must be taken as the rule and guide to our faith and practice. A careful study and faithful practice of its divine laws and moral precepts is the surest remedy after all for our moral and social evils.

There is no deception in its teachings. It is the safest, surest and best guide in all things, and the only cure for spiritual degeneracy. The best way to make a man is to commence with the boy, and here rests one of our gravest problems. It is a question of deepest human interests, but how best deal with it, I am unprepared to say.
