COL. J. Z. NOBLE ELECTED MAYOR

Mr. Maxwell Only New Man in Council. Improvement of Water System Uppermost.

The City election on April 1st, resulted in the election of J. Z. Noble for Mayor, P. M. Bolin, alderman, Ward one; J. C. Maxwell Ward two; and S. R. Fickas, Ward three. The vote in all the wards was very light. Bolin and Fickas were members of the old board and were re-elected. In the third Ward Mr. Fickas and Fred A. Grayum were on the ticket and Mr. Fickas received a majority of thirteen votes. Neither man made any special effort to be elected.

There was but one candidate in each of the other wards and but one for mayor. The people may feel assured of a safe City council. They are all good business men and property owners and will carry out a safe and sane policy.

Mayor-elect Noble is a man of considerable experience in handling city affairs and has already made a careful study of the needs of Snyder.

He says he has not fully outlined the policies that he will advocate and just now will only say that it shall be his purpose to follow out a line of as much economy as is consistent with a progress in city matters. His first concern will be to meet the floating indebtedness of the city and to properly handle the water works system so as to put it on a self-sustaining basis.

The water works is an institution that must receive patronage if it is to be a paying institution and Col. Noble will insist upon the people connecting with the City mains so as to not only provide a living revenue, but because the ease and convenience of city water giving better opportunities for keeping gardens, lawns and for domestic use generally.

The Signal hopes the people of Snyder will co-operate with the mayor and city council and develop a water system that will be the pride of the city.

SANTA FE HAND CAR GOES IN DITCH

A force of section men on the Santa Fe composing the crew working for F. G. Fossett, the foreman were making a run on their hand car east of town Thursday morning, and when near Chorn switch about six miles out, the car jumped the track and four of the men were hurt. R. C. Brough, the time keeper for extra section crew, received the most serious injuries, being severely hurt about the head and back.

Three Mexican laborers were injured more or less.

Louis Garcia, sprained wrist, Louis Ramos, arm broken, Jesus Garcia, was hurt internally and when first examined it was hard to tell the extent of his injuries.

The men were all brought Thursday to the company physician and their injuries were dressed.

Foreman Fossett gave his personal attention to his men to see that they were properly cared for.

DR. BROWNING WAS ACQUITTED

Tried on Charge of Shooting J. F. Dowdy at Fluvanna. Jury said "Not Guilty."

The work of the March term of the district court has been concluded and the court house is now inhabited only by the regulation personnel. Judge Thomas has carried on the court with a firm grip and Sheriff Boles has stood with the court in the matter of keeping the business moving along.

As stated in last week's Signal the case of Dr. A. W. Browning of Fluvanna, charged with shooting J. F. Dowdy at Fluvanna, several months ago, was set over from last Monday week to be called on Monday of his week. The postponement was due to the fact that the wife of the defendant was too sick to attend court. Later the lady was taken to a sanitarium at Abilene and was unable to be here Monday. The defense moved for a continuance but the motion was overruled and the case went to trial.

The following list of jurors were chosen to try the case: L. R. Bright, A. H. Trice, J. H. Myers, T. P. Martin, E. D. DeShazo, W. T. Brooks, J. H. Day, E. S. Carden, J. M. Cuthbertson, F. M. Brownfield, E. E. Grimes, W. A. Doak.

Soon after the case was opened it developed that the theory of the defense was alibi, that the defendant was not the party who did the alleged shooting. The prosecuting witness was positive that the accused was the man and the defendant was equally positive that he was not present when the shooting occurred.

The case was argued Wednesday morning and the case was given over to the jury early Wednesday afternoon.

The jury deliberated over the case until Thursday morning and returned a verdict of acquittal.

Dr. Browning was heartily congratulated by friends upon being cleared of the charge.

GRANDMA RAGLAND PASSES AWAY

Mrs. M. A. W. Ragland, mother of Mrs. T. J. Broxson, died at 9:15 last Sunday night at the home of her daughter in this city, after an illness extending over several days.

Grandma Ragland was a quiet, earnest, good woman, and she has gone to inherit the reward of the just.

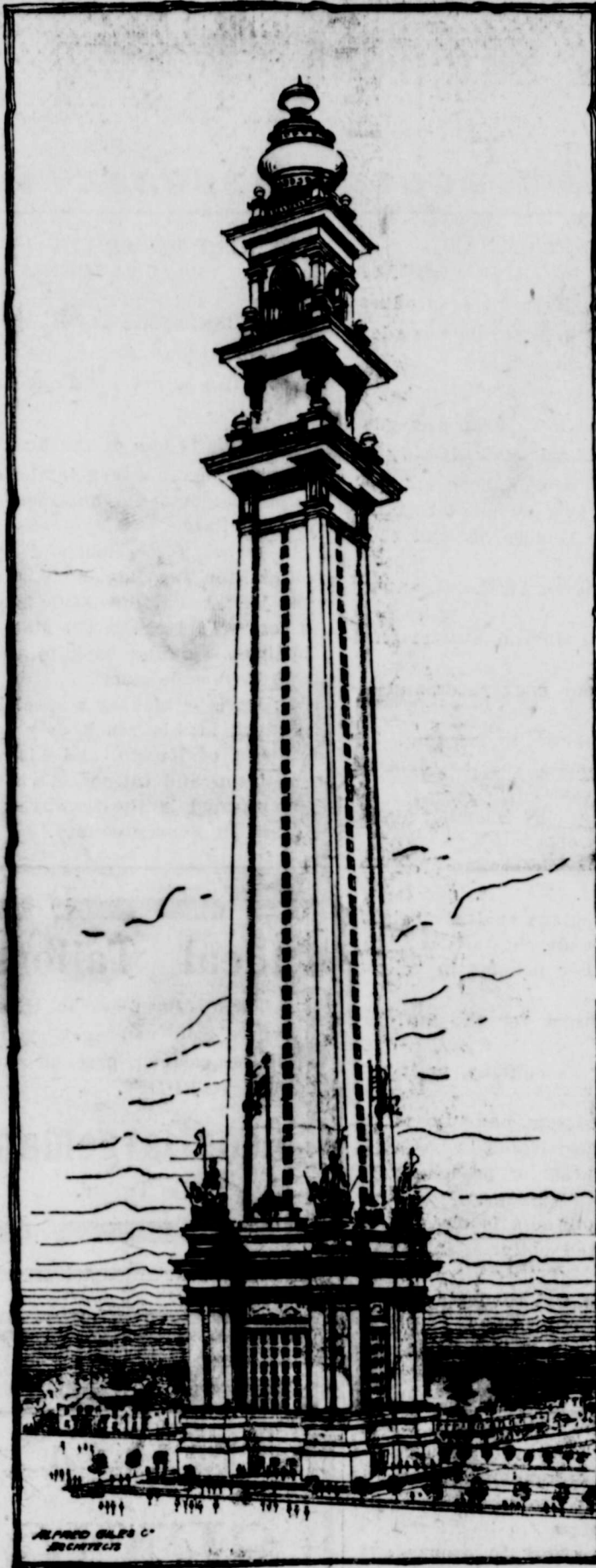
She was born in Elbert county Georgia, July 4, 1832. Died in Snyder Texas, March 30, 1913, aged 80 years 8 months and 26 days. She made a profession of religion at the age of 16 years and united with the Baptist church and has since lived a true consistent Christian life.

She was married in 1851 to Peyton Ragland and they moved to Texas in 1855. Her husband, Peyton Ragland died in 1875. She is survived by her only child, Mrs. T. J. Broxson and has seven grand children and 31 great grand children now living. She has made her home with her daughter and her grand children since the death of her husband, coming from Johnson county to Scurry county with the family in 1901.

The neighbors and friends of the family were kind and attentive to Grandma and did everything possible for her relief and comfort, and many hearts throb in sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. Broxson in this time of their deep sorrow.

STATE TRAINING SCHOOL BILL CONSIDERED BY GOVERNOR

The governor is considering the advisability of vetoing the bill providing a state training school for feeble minded on the ground that the appropriation is excessive. He believes that much money could be saved by establishing the institution with the state epileptic colony at Abilene.

Governor Colquitt has vetoed the bill by Breisford of the Senate creating a central West Texas normal in the Breisford Senatorial district. The veto was made on the ground that the state should develop the four normals it already has rather than go to the expense of establishing others.

W. C. Crowder and E. W. Hancock have organized a real estate exchange in Snyder and propose to do a general loan, insurance and investment business. Mr. Crowder was formerly in a mercantile business at Dunn. Mr. Hancock has lived in Snyder for the past year or more.

MR. AND MRS. MAC TAYLOR HEAVY LOSERS IN FIRE

The people of Snyder feel a sincere sympathy for Mr. and Mrs. Mac Taylor whose home in Dallas was destroyed by fire last Friday night. As is known Mr. Taylor was attending court in Snyder and Mrs. Taylor and the children were visiting at Denton.

It is learned that they lost every vestige of their household goods including relics, keepsakes, family pictures and their library valued at \$700.

It is learned also that they had only \$700 or \$800 insurance on the entire belongings. This total loss falls heavy on them since they had so recently located there among strangers and had just started to establish themselves amid new surroundings.

SANTA FE PEOPLE EXTEND THEIR WATER SYSTEM

Certificate of Approval Received This Week By Superintendent E. A. Watson

It is indeed gratifying to the friends and patrons of the schools of Snyder, and all the people, to know that the Snyder High school is recognized by the State Department of Education, as a High school of the first class.

Our superintendent, faculty and school board have been working continually to put our school up to the highest points of excellence and they have done it.

Superintendent Watson, is a thorough school man, his whole soul is in his work and he has a firm and comprehensive grasp on the situation in all departments and is supported by a faculty in full harmony with his methods and they have the full endorsement of the board of trustees.

It has all along been Mr. Watson's purpose to put the school up to that standard of merit to secure full affiliation with the State University, and it gives us all great pleasure to know that the desired standard has been reached and that the Snyder High school is the open door to the great University and that our graduates may go from here to the University with out examination.

The following certificate of approval was received this week by Superintendent Watson, of Snyder High School.

State Department of Education, Austin, Texas—Certificate of Approval.

This is to Certify that the Snyder Public High school located at Snyder, Texas, has met the requirements of the State Department of Education and of the laws of Texas for approval as a High School of the First Class.

And this certificate is given in recognition of the attainment of the standard prescribed for a High school of the Class indicated. It is expressly understood that a special report may be called for, or an inspection of the school may be made, at any time; and that if, for any cause the Standard of the said High School should fall below the requirements, this certificate of approval shall at once be withdrawn.

RAILROADS AND DELAYED TRAINS

Young Men's Business League Inquire into Reasons for Delayed Trains and Mail.

Some time ago Mr. E. J. Anderson, secretary of the Young Men's Business League, sent a letter to Railroad Commissioner Allison Mayfield to urge an investigation of the causes why the passenger and mail trains on the Texas Pacific habitually run late. Mr. Mayfield laid the letter before Mr. T. J. Freeman, first Vice President of the T. & P. and Mr. Freeman's reply has been received here by Mr. Anderson. Mr. Freeman tells at length of their connection arrangements with the I. & C. N. and Iron Mountain at Texarkana and how the through trains from St. Louis to El Paso are not delivered to the T. & P. on time.

Then the express and mails are very heavy so that the trains are retarded enroute. He shows how they are trying to arrange schedules that will be satisfactory to the public. Where their No. 3 is especially late they have been making up an extra No. 3 at an increased expense to the company without any increase in revenues.

He points out that since February 23 they have been running No. 7, from Fort Worth to Sweetwater and Roscoe and this train is usually on time. Mr. Freeman contends that it is impossible to arrange a schedule to meet all roads that cross them but hints that the Santa Fe and the R. S. & P. could aid in solving the troubles at Snyder. If they would make a little effort to make connections at Sweetwater and Roscoe.

Mr. Freeman says in part: "In connection with some of the complaints sent you, especially the one from O. P. Thrane, cashier, who complains that his mail is as much as three days getting from Dallas; if this is local mail from Dallas, the delay would be caused by the fact that the Santa Fe or the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific, do not connect with local train No. 7, because this train, since the 23 of February, has practically been on time at Sweetwater and Roscoe. If he refers to getting his mail on 5 and 3, we should not be held responsible for this delay, as the trains were not received by us from the Iron Mountain on time."

Of course we do not know all the details that the railroad people have to meet, but we have been having unsatisfactory mail service and we hope the matter will be kept before the commission and railroad people until we do get relief.

A FATAL CASE OF SCARLET FEVER

It is learned that the baby of Mr. and Mrs. Roe contracted the fever and was dangerously sick for some days, but on Monday of this week the family had hopes of its recovery.

The initiative and referendum will be voted upon by the people, as it is quoted else where in these dispatches, as the Senate tonight concurred in the House amendments.

SHOULD UNIVERSITY AND A. & M. COLLEGE UNITE

The agitation of the proposition to consolidate the A. & M. College and the State University has gained remarkable headway in a remarkably short time, and but for the conservative caution of some of the legislators, it is probable that a bill would have been railroaded through by now to that end.

A measure of such magnitude as that in which all the people of Texas are supposed to be interested should be given more thought.

The A. & M. College is an industrial school. It is there that we teach agriculture and mechanics, soils, climate, cultural methods and experiments, engineering, architecture and such other things as equip the young men of Texas for practical life, are taught there. The University, teaches the sciences, language, history, literature and the other lines of learning to make scholars and professional men.

The purposes of the two institutions are not the same and the chances are that if the student body and the curriculum of the A. & M. is merged into that of the University, the industrial and agricultural interests of the state would feel the lack of training along those lines. It is now probable that the people may be called upon to vote on the proposition and unless we have misappreciated the feeling of the Texas people, they are apt to say keep the two institutions separate.

OHIO RIVER VALLEY SADLY STRICKEN

Hundreds Perish in Floods. Cities and Country Submerged. Freezing Weather Adds Misery.

The great floods in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and other states along the Ohio river and its feeders last week was reported the worst calamity in the history of this country, barring the Galveston flood of Sept. 8, 1900.

From newspaper reports it appears that the city of Dayton, Ohio, was the greatest sufferer, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Covington, Ky, both suffered heavy losses in lives and property. In other towns the death lists were at first over-estimate. In two towns where 500 lives were reported lost it has been found that in one

there were 25 and in the other, 20.

Property losses in all the submerged territory is reported at \$100,000,000.

City mayors and state governors have been prompt in sending supplies Up to Saturday night the water was still rising at Cincinnati and Louisville, but was stationary at Pittsburg, Pa.

The cities lower down, Cairo, Ill; Hickman, Ky; Memphis, Tenn.; Vicksburg, Miss.; were hurrying the people from the lowlands and levees were being made stronger. The onrush of water is expected to swell the lower Mississippi to the danger point, but since there has not been so much rain in that tributary country the local rivers are not considered menacing, however the Ohio has been higher than ever known and

it may come down in sufficient volume to break through and flood the lower plantations.

The police forces and the militia in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky towns have had much to do to suppress thieves and ghouls. One thief was caught trying to get away with \$50,000 in diamonds stolen from a Dayton jeweler.

People ran away from the floods leaving their household goods and their live stock. This made easy work for thieves and they improved their opportunities.

The floods, starting far up the country by heavy rains were augmented along the way by the breaking of great reservoirs and the waters rushed down on unsuspecting homes, washing away houses, wrecking factories and catching people in

the rush.

To add to the horrors of the flood the weather turned to bitter cold, and the people who had sought refuge from the floods were exposed to the rigors of freezing winter.

The associated Press reports hundreds of special cases of suffering, narrow escapes, acts of heroism and other incidents of the calamity.

The whole nation is horrified and human sympathy has been aroused and supplies are being sent from all parts of the country to the flood stricken regions.

"I make this appeal feeling confident that there will be a liberal response from the Texas people. We must never forget how nobly the people of other states came to the rescue of our afflicted communities in times past.

"I respectfully ask the newspapers and boards of trade and commercial bodies in all cities and towns of the state to open subscription lists, and request that all contributions be forwarded promptly by telegram, either through me or directly to Mabel T. Boardman, chairman National Red Cross society relief board, Washington, D. C.

COL. J. Z. NOBLE ELECTED MAYOR

Mr. Maxwell Only New Man in Council. Improvement of Water System Uppermost.

The City election on April 1st, resulted in the election of J. Z. Noble for Mayor, P. M. Bolin, alderman, Ward one; J. C. Maxwell Ward two; and S. R. Fickas, Ward three. The vote in all the wards was very light.

Bolin and Fickas were members of the old board and were re-elected. In the third Ward Mr. Fickas and Fred A. Grayum were on the ticket and Mr. Fickas received a majority of thirteen votes. Neither man made any special effort to be elected.

There was but one candidate in each of the other wards and but one for mayor.

The people may feel assured of a safe City council. They are all good business men and property owners and will carry out a safe and sane policy.

Mayor-elect Noble is a man of considerable experience in handling city affairs and has already made a careful study of the needs of Snyder.

He says he has not fully outlined the policies that he will advocate and just now will only say that it shall be his purpose to follow out a line of as much economy as is consistent with a progress in city matters. His first concern will be to meet the floating indebtedness of the city and to properly handle the water works system so as to put it on a self-sustaining basis.

The water works is an institution that must receive patronage if it is to be a paying institution and Col. Noble will insist upon the people connecting with the City mains so as to, not only provide a living revenue, but because the ease and convenience of city water giving better opportunities for keeping gardens, lawns and for domestic use generally.

The Signal hopes the people of Snyder will co-operate with the mayor and city council and develop a water system that will be the pride of the city.

SANTA FE HAND CAR GOES IN DITCH

A force of section men on the Santa Fe composing the crew working for F. G. Fossett, the foreman were making a run on their hand car east of town Thursday morning, and when near Chorn switch about six miles out, the car jumped the track and four of the men were hurt.

R. C. Brough, the time keeper for extra section crew, received the most serious injuries, being severely hurt about the head and back.

Three Mexican laborers were injured more or less.

Louis Garcia, sprained wrist, Louis Ramos, arm broken, Jesus Garcia, was hurt internally and when first examined it was hard to tell the extent of his injuries.

The men were all brought Thursday to the company physician and their injuries were dressed.

Foreman Fossett gave his personal attention to his men to see that they were properly cared for.

DR. BROWNING WAS ACQUITTED

Tried on Charge of Shooting J. F. Dowdy at Fluvanna. Jury said "Not Guilty."

The work of the March term of the district court has been concluded and the court house is now inhabited only by the regulation personnel. Judge Thomas has carried on the court with a firm grip and Sheriff Boles has stood with the court in the matter of keeping the business moving along.

As stated in last week's Signal the case of Dr. A. W. Browning of Fluvanna, charged with shooting J. F. Dowdy at Fluvanna, several months ago, was set over from last Monday week to be called on Monday of his week. The postponement was due to the fact that the wife of the defendant was too sick to attend court. Later the lady was taken to a sanitarium at Abilene and was unable to be here Monday. The defense moved for a continuance but the motion was overruled and the case went to trial.

The following list of jurors were chosen to try the case: L. R. Bright, A. H. Trice, J. H. Myers, T. P. Martin, E. D. DeShazo, W. T. Brooks, J. H. Day, E. S. Carden, J. M. Cuthbertson, F. M. Brownfield, E. E. Grimes, W. A. Doak.

Soon after the case was opened it developed that the theory of the defense was alibi, that the defendant was not the party who did the alleged shooting. The prosecuting witness was positive that the accused was the man and the defendant was equally positive that he was not present when the shooting occurred.

The case was argued Wednesday morning and the case was given over to the jury early Wednesday afternoon.

The jury deliberated over the case until Thursday morning and returned a verdict of acquittal.

Dr. Browning was heartily congratulated by friends upon being cleared of the charge.

Grandma Ragland was a quiet earnest, good woman, and she has gone to inherit the reward of the just.

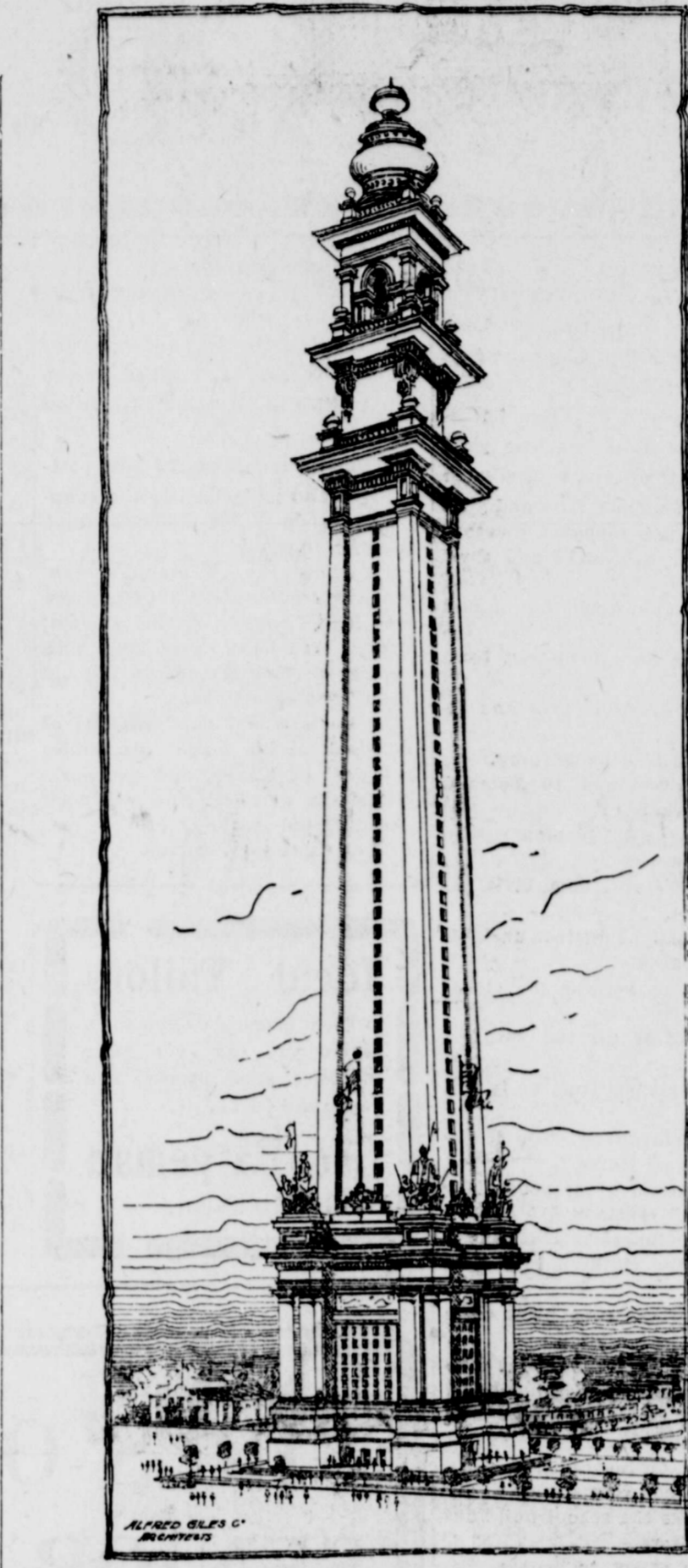

STATE TRAINING SCHOOL BILL CONSIDERED BY GOVERNOR

The governor is considering the advisability of vetoing the bill providing a state training school for feeble minded on the ground that the appropriation is excessive. He believes that much money could be saved by establishing the institution with the state epileptic colony at Abilene.

Governor Colquitt has vetoed the bill by Brelsford of the Senate creating a central West Texas normal in the Brelsford Senatorial district. The veto was made on the ground that the state should develop the four normals it already has rather than go to the expense of establishing others.

W. C. Crowder and E. W. Hancock have organized a real estate exchange in Snyder and propose to do a general loan, insurance and investment business. Mr. Crowder was formerly in a mercantile business at Dunn. Mr. Hancock has lived in Snyder for the past year or more.

It is learned also that they had only \$700 or \$800 insurance on the entire belongings. This total loss falls heavy on them since they had so recently located there among strangers and had just started to establish themselves amid new surroundings.

RAILROADS AND DELAYED TRAINS

Young Men's Business League Inquire into Reasons for Delayed Trains and Mail.

Some time ago Mr. E. J. Anderson, secretary of the Young Men's Business League, sent a letter to Railroad Commissioner Allison Mayfield to urge an investigation of the causes why the passenger and mail trains on the Texas Pacific habitually run late.

Mr. Mayfield laid the letter before Mr. T. J. Freeman, first Vice President of the T. & P. and Mr. Freeman's reply has been received here by Mr. Anderson.

Mr. Freeman tells at length of their connection arrangements with the I. & G. N. and Iron Mountain at Texarkana and how the through trains from St. Louis to El Paso are not delivered to the T. & P. on time. Then the express and mails are very heavy so that the trains are retarded enroute. He shows how they are trying to arrange schedules that will be satisfactory to the public. Where their No. 3 is especially late they have been making up an extra No. 3 at an increased expense to the company without any increase in revenues.

He points out that since February 23 they have been running No. 7, from Fort Worth to Sweetwater and Roscoe and this train is usually on time. Mr. Freeman contends that it is impossible to arrange a schedule to meet all roads that cross them but hints that the Santa Fe and the R. S. & P. could aid in solving the troubles at Snyder. If they would make a little effort to make connections at Sweetwater and Roscoe.

Mr. Freeman says in part: "In connection with some of the complaints sent you, especially the one from O. P. Thrane, cashier, who complains that his mail is as much as three days getting from Dallas: If this is local mail from Dallas, the delay would be caused by the fact that the Santa Fe or the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific, do not connect with local train No. 7, because this train, since the 23 of February, has practically been on time at Sweetwater and Roscoe. If he refers to getting his mail on 5 and 3, we should not be held responsible for this delay, as the trains were not received, by us from the Iron Mountain on time."

Of course we do not know all the details that the railroad people have to meet, but we have been having unsatisfactory mail service and we hope the matter will be kept before the commission and railroad people until we do get relief.

A FATAL CASE OF SCARLET FEVER

The agitation of the proposition to consolidate the A. & M. College and the State University has gained remarkable headway in a remarkably short time, and but for the conservative caution of some of the legislators, it is probable that a bill would have been railroaded through by now to that end.

A measure of such magnitude as that in which all the people of Texas are supposed to be interested should be given more thought.

The A. & M. College is an industrial school. It is there that we teach agriculture and mechanics, soils, climate, cultural methods and experiments, engineering, architecture and such other things as equip the young men of Texas for practical life, are taught there. The University, teaches the sciences, language, history, literature and the other lines of learning to make scholars and professional men.

The purposes of the two institutions are not the same and the chances are that if the student body and the curriculum of the A. & M. is merged into that of the University, the industrial and agricultural interests of the state would feel the lack of training along those lines. It is now probable that the people may be called upon to vote on the proposition and unless we have miscalculated the feeling of the Texas people, they are apt to say keep the two institutions separate.

OHIO RIVER VALLEY SADLY STRICKEN

Hundreds Perish in Floods, Cities and Country Submerged, Freezing Weather Adds Misery.

The great floods in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and other states along the Ohio river and its feeders last week was reported the worst calamity in the history of this country, barring the Galveston flood of Sept 8, 1900.

From newspaper reports it appears that the city of Dayton, Ohio, was the greatest sufferer, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Covington, Ky., both suffered heavy losses in lives and property. In other towns the death lists were at first over-estimate. In two towns where 500 lives were reported lost it has been found that in one

there were 25 and in the other, 20. Property losses in all the submerged territory is reported at \$100,000,000.

City mayors and state governors have been prompt in sending supplies. Up to Saturday night the water was still rising at Cincinnati and Louisville, but was stationary at Pittsburg, Pa.

The cities lower down, Cairo, Ill.; Hickman, Ky.; Memphis, Tenn.; Vicksburg, Miss.; were hurrying the people from the lowlands and levees were being made stronger. The onrush of water is expected to swell the lower Mississippi to the danger point, but since there has not been so much rain in that tributary country the local rivers are not considered menacing, however the Ohio has been higher than ever known and

it may come down in sufficient volume to break through and flood the lower plantations.

The police forces and the militia in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky towns have had much to do to suppress thieves and ghouls. One thief was caught trying to get away with \$50,000 in diamonds stolen from a Dayton jeweler.

People ran away from the floods leaving their household goods and their live stock. This made easy work for thieves and they improved their opportunities.

The floods, starting far up the country by heavy rains were augmented along the way by the breaking of great reservoirs and the waters rushed down on unsuspecting homes, washing away houses, wrecking factory districts and catching people in

the rush.

To add to the horrors of the flood the weather turned to bitter cold, and the people who had sought refuge from the floods were exposed to the rigors of freezing winter.

The Associated Press reports hundreds of special cases of suffering, narrow escapes, acts of heroism and other incidents of the calamity.

The whole nation is horrified and human sympathy has been aroused and supplies are being sent from all parts of the country to the flood stricken regions.

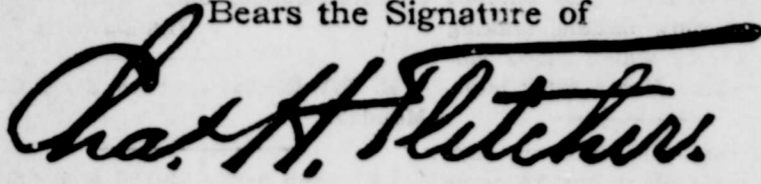

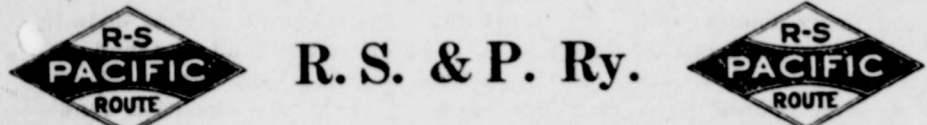

"To the People of Texas: The flood waters of the Ohio river having inundated much of the country and many cities and villages in the states of Ohio and Indiana, causing destruction of millions of dollars of property and the loss of many thousands of lives, warrant the making of an appeal to the sympathetic and habitably inclined citizens of Texas for contributions for the relief of the suffering.

"I make this appeal feeling confident that there will be a liberal response from the Texas people. We must never forget how nobly the people of other states came to the rescue of our afflicted communities in times past.

"I respectfully ask the newspapers and boards of trade and commercial bodies in all cities and towns of the state to open subscription lists, and request that all contributions be forwarded promptly by telegram, either through me or directly to Mabel T. Boardman, chairman National Red Cross society relief board, Washington, D. C.

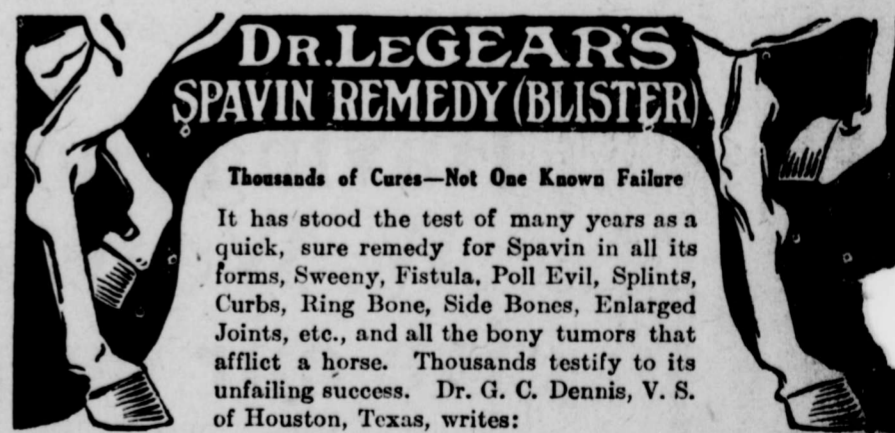
