Making fair-weather friends

Indian ritual forecasts above average rain

LAZBUDDIE — Each spring, Weldon Crim makes his share of friends and enemies.

It just depends on which way the wind blows.

Crim gained a few more fair-weather friends Saturday when he predicted a wet spring and a good crop year.

Crim forecasts the spring weather each year on March 22 using a centuries-old Indian ceremony performed at sunrise.

Crim said the ritual was passed down from his grandfather, who lived with the Indians near El Paso around the turn of the century.

Just before sunrise Saturday, Crim lit a tee-pee shaped woodpile and waited for the yellow-orange sun to climb over the horizon. Using direction of the wind when the sun is halfway above the horizon, Crim predicts the weather.

The wind blew out of the north this year as Crim was joined by about dozen family members at his home northwest

of Clay's Corner. A north wind means an above average spring rainfall.

A northeast wind is the best and a southwest wind the worst, according to Crim.

"A southwest wind means you pack up the squaw and children and move to Oklahoma because it's not going to rain," Crim said.

Crim said he is right about 85 percent of the time.

The National Weather Service's extended spring forecast for 1997 calls for rainfall to be about 5 to 10 percent above normal.

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Chief pledges increased patrols

Muleshoe Police Chief Rick Henegar said being seen is the most important aspect of law enforcement.

"Just being seen is the biggest deterrent to crime," Henegar said. "My main concern when I came here was increasing patrols."

"In the last week, several people told me they've actually seen police cars. We need to be out there protecting citizens and their property. That's our job."

Henegar said traffic control along U.S. Highway 84, juvenile crime and drug intervention were his other big concerns.

On traffic along U.S. 84:

"People are traveling way too fast. We don't want to turn in into a speed trap. But we've got to get people to slow down."

Henegar said he thinks that can be accomplished by increasing the department's visibility along the highly travelled highway that serves as the area's pipeline to Lubbock.

"We need to be stopping people, although that doesn't necessarily mean writing out tickets. People just need to know we're out there."

Henegar said an average of 20,000 vehicles a day travel through Muleshoe along Highway 84.

"I'm surprised we don't have at least one or two accidents a day out there."

On juvenile crime:

"Nearly 75 percent of the crime that I've seen since I've been here has been related to juveniles. That's way too much for a town of this size.

Right now it's mostly criminal mischief. But

CANYON — Fifty Muleshoe High School students joined efforts Saturday to win the University Interscholastic League District 1-3A academic meet at West Texas A&M University.

In the overall standings for Academic Sweepstakes, Muleshoe collected 332.5 points to capture first place. Dalhart was second with 318.5 points while Friona captured third with 250 points.

Two Hobbs men stabbed in late-night brawl

A Hobbs, N.M. man was stabbed in the stomach early Saturday morning during a drunken brawl outside a Muleshoe residence.

Artimo Hinojosa, 23, was treated at Muleshoe Area Medical Center for a deep stab wound to the lower abdomen, according to a hospital spokeswoman. He was later

transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. No further information on his condition was available.

Three other men were treated and released at MAMC for injuries suffered in a fight at about 1 a.m. in the 500 block of E. Avenue G.

Juan Sigala, 26, of Hobbs suffered a small stab wound to his

right arm while Manuel Vasquez, 21, of Sudan and Albert Wentz, 22, of Muleshoe were treated for minor head injuries.

Muleshoe Police Chief Rick Henegar described all four men as being "very intoxicated."

Henegar estimated that up to a dozen people were involved in the fight that spilled onto the lawn and into the street.

No charges have been filed and the case is still under investigation, Henegar said.

Police are looking for an unidentified Hispanic male who is suspected of stabbing Hinojosa and Sigala.

No weapon was recovered.

Details are still sketchy, but Sigala told police he was defending himself when he was stabbed.

He did admit to hitting Vasquez and Wentz with a tree limb.

Witnesses told police the four men were members of rival gangs but Henegar has not been able to confirm it.

Henegar did say if the MPD is able to identify the men as gang members, they will be charged with felony organized gang activity.

County considers drug testing additional employees

The Bailey County Commissioners Court Monday discussed an increase in the number of county employees who must undergo random drug testing.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of random drug tests for all employees who drive county-owned vehicles. Even the commissioners themselves, who occasionally drive county-owned vehicles within their respective precincts, would be included in that group.

"If we ask our people who work to do it, we should do it too," Precinct 1 Commissioner Bennie Claunch said.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER'S COURT

The Texas Department of Transportation requires all county government employees with commercial drivers licenses to submit to random drug test. Nine Bailey County employees are currently tested.

According to County Judge Marilyn Cox, commissioners first discussed the option of testing additional employees when those with CDL licenses were required to begin testing more than a year ago.

"The idea got put on the back burner for awhile," Cox said.

Cox said she will seek advice from officials in area counties before pursuing the

matter any further. In other County business, commissioners renewed the County's insurance policy with the Texas Association of Counties.

Unlike years past, the County combined its automobile liability, general liability, public officials liability, law enforcement liability, automobile physical damage and property insurance into one lump package, which will run \$43,411.

Cox said such an arrangement will allow the County to renew the different policies all at once in the future. Until now, each separate policy expired at different time during the year,

forcing to County to receive bids throughout the year.

"This will make it more convenient for the County," Cox said.

The only type of insurance not included in the policy was medical, which the County will renew at a later time.

The county also authorized First Bank of Muleshoe to release securities pledged to Bailey County.

Since the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC) only insures \$100,000 per depositor in any given bank, First Bank uses securities to protect county deposits in excess of \$100,000.

Last year, Crim correctly predicted an average amount of rainfall. According to the weather service, the Panhandle received 20.59 inches of rain in 1996. The average is 19.56 inches.

Crim said the last time he missed his prediction was in 1993.

"And when you miss it, your neighbors want to run you off the road," Crim said, who minutes earlier told a friend who called "to plant plenty of corn because it's going to rain."

Crim is retired now, but when he farmed and ranched, he took the ritual seriously. He said he would plant extra corn whenever the wind predicted a good year.

"It's just a family tradition," said Crim, who is not of Indian descent, but is still called "Chief" by many.

Crim took over performing the ceremony in 1983, three years after his father passed away.

"Our friends convinced us not to let (the tradition) die out," Crim said.

Now farmers hope he's not just blowing smoke.

In computer science, Heath Brown claimed the top spot, followed by Cameron Turner, Blake Mimms and Edward Terry.

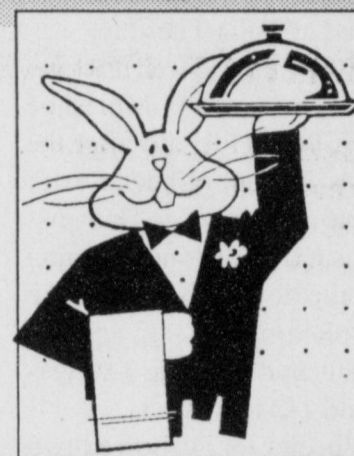

Jeffrey Wheeler pitched a four-hitter and Muleshoe made judicious use of five hits in a 10-1 win over Dalhart Friday in a District 1-3A game at the city baseball field.

Muleshoe's second-straight win moves the Mules (6-5 overall, 2-1 in district) into a tie for second with Tulia, a half game behind undefeated Sanford-Fritch (2-0).

Muleshoe was scheduled to play at Tulia Tuesday.

"We've played well now two games in a row," Muleshoe coach Brad Hill said after the Mules backed Wheeler with errorless defense. "This district is wide open and it's going to come down to who gets the best pitching."

Dalhart dropped to 3-9 overall and 1-2 in district.

Wheeler (3-2) allowed two hits and a run to the first three batters of the game before settling down. The senior right-hander struck out six and walked three.

Lady Mules tracksters do it again at Hereford

HEREFORD — The Muleshoe girls track team continued its impressive March.

Showing great depth in the distance events, the Lady Mules captured the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce Relays Division II title Saturday held in Hereford.

It was the Lady Mules second-straight team title and third win this month.

Piling up a season-high 177 points, Muleshoe nearly lapped the Division II field which included two District 1-3A teams.

River Road was second with 96 points and was Friona fourth with 83 points.

Muleshoe finished 1-2 in the 400 through 3200 meters.

Cari Faver swept the 1600 and 3200 meters for the fourth-straight week and freshmen Bobbie Benham and Stacy Locker added wins in the 400 and 800 meters respectively.

Muleshoe also got wins from JoBeth Gilleland in the 300-meter hurdles, Kendra Benham in the shot put and from the 1600-meter relay team.

Faver ran the 1600 meters in 5 minutes and 28.28 sec-

onds and the 3200 meters in 13:58.38. Locker was second in the 1600 and Priscilla Aguirre second in the 3200 meters.

Faver is top-ranked Class 3A runner in the Panhandle in both events according to the Amarillo Globe.

Locker ran a season-best 2:31.06 in the 800 meters. Freshman teammate Lindsey Field was second.

Gilleland broke the 50-second mark in the meters with a time of 48.56 and also posted her best time of the season (17.22) while finishing second to Friona's Whitney Ellis in the 100-meter hurdles.

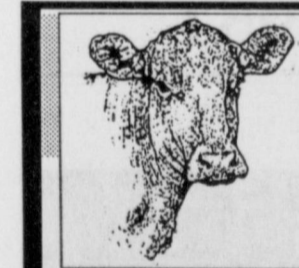

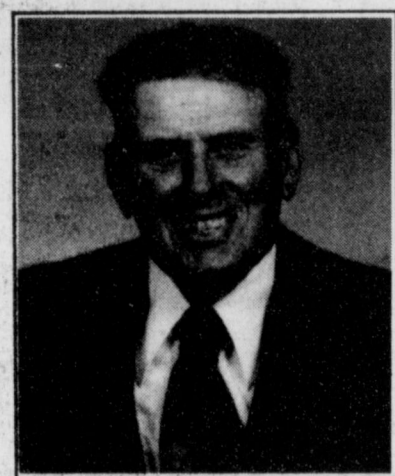

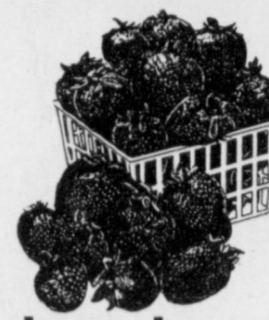
