AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance levying an occupation tax upon every person who peddles or offers for sale any produce, fruit or other edible commodity from any wagon or other vehicle upon the streets of Snyder: provided that persons offering for sale such products when raised or grown by themselves shall be exempt from said tax and providing that an occupation tax shall be levied upon every person who offers for sale any other article or articles on the streets of said city of Snyder, Texas, and providing penalty for violation.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Snyder, Texas:

Section 1. That from and after the passage and publication of this ordinance, there shall be levied and collected from every person who offers for sale or peddles any produce, fruit or other edible commodity from any wagon or other vehicle on the streets of Snyder, Texas, an occupation tax of Two Dollars per quarter, said tax to be payable in advance:

Provided that this section shall not apply to any farm or garden produce offered for sale by the person growing or raising same.

Section 2. That there shall be levied and collected from every person who offers for sale any other article on the streets of said City of Snyder, Texas, an occupation tax in the sum of five dollars per day for each and every day said person or persons shall so offer said article or articles for sale.

Section 3. Any person, or persons, convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance, by offering for sale of the articles, or things as set forth in this ordinance, without first paying said occupation tax, as provided for herein, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars: Provided that each day that said article or things are offered for sale without having paid such occupation tax, shall constitute a separate offense.

AN ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance regulating the sweeping of sidewalks within the business section of the city of Snyder, Texas, and providing penalty for violation.

Be it ordained by the City of Snyder, Texas, that from and after the passage and publication of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to brush or sweep any sidewalk surrounding or adjacent to any business house, occupied or unoccupied, within the City of Snyder, Texas whether said sidewalks be dirt, concrete, brick, wood or other material, until said sidewalk shall have been prepared or treated for such brushing or sweeping by the use of water, floor-sweep or other substance that will prevent the rising of the sweepings or dust from said sidewalk.

Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.
