## Latest War Bulletin

EL PASO, TEXAS, THURSDAY, JUNE 22 (4:15 P. M.)—THE VERY LATEST NEWS CONCERNING THE UNITED STATES-MEXICAN WAR SITUATION WAS RECEIVED AT THE SNYDER SIGNAL AT 4:45 THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

### THE REPORT SAYS:

"EVERYTHING IS QUIET HERE TODAY AND THE CITY OF JUAREZ IS BEING EVACUATED BY THE MEXICAN SOLDIERS. THE AMERICAN ARMY IS EXPECTED TO PEACEFULLY OCCUPY THE CITY OF JUAREZ AT ONCE.

A LITTLE CLASH OCCURRED IN THE INTERIOR LAST NIGHT. IT IS AN ESTABLISHED BELIEF THAT IMMEDIATE WAR IS INEVITABLE.

THERE IS NO IMMEDIATE DANGER IN THE CITY OF EL PASO AND EVERYTHING LOOKS GOOD.

A COMPLETE OCCUPATION OF THE COUNTRY BY THE UNITED STATES TROOPS WILL FOLLOW.

## S. P. BROOKS AND DANIEL E. GARRET

Wednesday was the date for the coming to Snyder of Dr. S. P. Brooks of Waco, a candidate for United States Senator. Quite a bunch of citizens were on hand when the east bound Santa Fe came and met Dr. Brooks and Judge Daniel E. Garrett, of Houston, candidate for Congress from the State at Large.

By 3:30 p. m. a large crowd of people had gathered in the District Court room.

Judge M. E. Rosser, introduced Judge Garrett who spoke but a short while. He spoke of his services as Congressman, when a member of Congress. He said when he was elected in 1912 he owed his time and energies. He refused to quit his post of duty to come home and campaign for re-election and he was defeated. He feels that he did right and has never regretted it. He says when a Congressman comes home, leaving his job to be re-elected, he ought to leave his salary in the treasury. He doesn't promise many things, but will help in everything that looks good. Nobody has ever challenged one of his votes in Congress.

Judge Rosser then introduced Dr. Brooks as a man who, by his own efforts has gone from the surroundings of a poor farmer boy in Johnson county to the presidency of one of the leading Colleges of Texas and has made good at every point in his life. Dr. Brooks was already known to many of our people and was given a cordial welcome.

He modestly reviewed some of the early struggles in his Johnson county home and pointed to his record as president of Baylor University.

He is a man of recognized ability, as an educator and his life is clean and above reproach. He has a clear vision of the science of politics. He would conduct the political affairs of the country on the higher lines of justice and right. He favors a merchant marine sufficient to meet the needs of ocean traffic. He opposes the constant increase of the Federal Pension budget. He has faith that President Wilson will safely conduct the ship of state for the material and moral betterment of the world. He favors two new Cabinet Departments, a department of Health and a department of Education.

He favors a National Marketing System so that the people may know each day what the conditions may be. He manifests a clear knowledge of statesmanship, but there is not a tinge of the demagogue in any of his utterances.

He is in favor of Nationwide, Constitutional prohibition of the liquor traffic. He would have such a constitutional amendment submitted for ratification to the voters of each State, instead of to the several state Legislatures.

The speech has been generally complimented by people who heard it. Dr. Brooks and Judge Garrett left early in the evening for Sweetwater, where they were billed to speak Wednesday night.

## Difficulties American Troops Must Encounter in Mexico



## BATTLE IS FOUGHT BELOW BORDER

El Paso, June 21.—A detachment of American cavalry clashed with Carranza forces at Carrizal, about 90 miles south of El Paso early today, both sides suffering heavy casualties, according to unofficial reports received by Mexican military authorities in Juarez tonight.

According to the report which the Mexican authorities are investigating 40 Americans were killed by machine gun fire in surprise attack. The Mexican casualties were said not to have been so heavy but General Felix Diaz is named as being among the Mexican dead.

The American command is said to have been part of a scouting patrol from Guzman, returning to General Fershing's line of communication. Carrizal, named as the place of the encounter, is about nine miles southeast of Villa Ahumada, the Mexican field base in northern Chihuahua.

Later General Francisco Gonzales, Mexican commander at Juarez, gave out a statement in which he announced officially that the Mexican command had taken seventeen American prisoners. He also said that General Gomez's death had been confirmed but said he had no official report as to the number of casualties on either side.

### Naval Forces Ready.

The navy department has ordered the tender Panther and six torpedo boat destroyers of the Atlantic fleet from Santo Domingo to Key West. This fleet, comprising two divisions of the torpedo boat flotilla, will be held in readiness at Key West for any service in Mexican waters for which they may be called.

The navy department also ordered the cruiser Dolphin, flagship of Rear Admiral Caperton, of the cruiser squadron from Santo Domingo to Guantanamo, where it will be available to respond to an immediate call.

There are four vessels of the Atlantic fleet in Mexican waters, navy department officials said. The Machias and Marietta are at Tampico, the Nebraska is at Vera Cruz and the Wheeling is at El Carmen.

The navy department announced this afternoon that additional ships would be sent to the west coast and east coast of Mexico.

### A Visiting Preacher.

Rev. W. R. Chandler of Marlow Oklahoma, preached last Sunday and Sunday night at First Baptist church in Snyder. He is a forceful pleasing pulpit speaker and is a consecrated Christian minister. He expressed quite a favorable impression of Snyder and our people.

### First Car of Snyder Wheat.

Mr. H. B. Winston shipped out his first car of 1916 wheat Thursday. It grades No. 3 and he paid 96½ cents a bushel. The shipment was 950 bushels. The first shipment last year was on June 26. The price is five cents better this year than last though quality probably not so good. Mr. Winston says there is about 60 per cent less wheat on the market than last year.

## HON. R. L. HENRY SPEAKS IN SNYDER

Congressman R. L. Henry of Waco, candidate for United States Senator, addressed a good sized crowd of voters at the court house in Snyder last Saturday afternoon. He was introduced by Mr. F. I. Townsend,

one of our most prominent workers in the Farmers' Union.

Mr. Townsend told of the good work done in congress by Mr. Henry in the interest of the cotton planters of the south in general and the farmers of Texas in particular.

Mr. Henry started out by giving a short sketch of his early life in Texas, following his career up to and including his 20 years in the congress of the United States.

He has been in position to study the condition of the farmers in Texas and when the cotton crop of 1914 had to be dumped on the market at 6 or 7 cents, he began to study the reasons. He found the money centers, the spinners, the speculators and the gamblers reveling in the ruin of the farmers and he set himself to the work of relief.

He found the government put up the necessary funds to hold the stock markets steady and he introduced a bill to place \$30,000,000 in reach of the farmers to be loaned on cotton at a low rate of interest. He met with scoffs and jeers, but he continued to push his measure. If the government could come to the rescue of stock brokers, it ought to furnish relief in time of distress to the cotton farmers.

He declared himself in line with the democracy on financial legislation. He is in complete harmony with Wilson's foreign policies and stands four square for the administration on all points of foreign and domestic activity. He says Mr. Culberson should not be re-elected to the senate because he is physically unfit.

He charges that Brooks has one single hobby and that Colquitt is not a democrat and ought to be lined up with the standpat republicans.

He considers that the race is between himself and ex-Gov. Campbell, and while here he wired Mr. Campbell the following challenge for a series of joint discussions.

Snyder, Texas 6-17-1916.  
Hon. Thomas M. Campbell,  
Palestine, Texas.

Inasmuch as you are now authoritatively established as the candidate of the anti-saloon league, with the national prohibition amendment as your chief issue, which is being opposed by me, I invite you to engage in ten joint discussions, the details to be arranged later.

And since you antagonized my cotton relief bills, introduced in Congress during the year 1914, and opposed the plan of rural credits urged by me, it is plain that there are radical differences between us that should be presented in joint discussions. I hope that you will agree to this suggestion in order that I may thus present my views and you may defend your position in repudiating the San Antonio platform and explain, if you can, your attitude against my plan for relieving the cotton growers and establishing a rural credit law.

I will appreciate an early reply.

## WILSON AND MARSHALL HEAD TICKET

The National Democratic Convention in St. Louis has done well. Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey and Thomas Riley Marshall of Indiana for President and Vice President of the United States.

These nominations were by acclamation. The platform bristles with Americanism throughout. The achievements of three years of the democratic administration are outlined showing the most extensive and beneficial record of legislative enactments ever recorded in the same period of time by any administration.

Wilson's constructive humane and uniformly wise and just course is fully approved and his renomination and the prevailing harmony in the party are a guarantee of a sane, sound and far reaching continuation of national enactments for the progress and prosperity of the country with a guarantee of equal rights to all men. The platform congratulates the country on keeping out of wars, entangling alliances and this condition is attributed to President Wilson's wisdom and firmness supported by a loyal congress and a patriotic people.

The only question that caused any sort of a ripple on the harmonious waters was the equal suffrage plank. Gov. Ferguson of Texas made a strong fight to keep out an expression on that question, but the minority report was defeated by a tremendous vote.

The suffrage plank finally adopted recommends provisions, state by state for giving the voting franchise to women the same as to men.

This provision preserves the principle of state sovereignty, but it is not going as far as suffragists wanted.

For more than a year this country has been troubled with men and agencies of foreign nations going about sowing seeds of discord and seeking to embarrass the United States in its attitude of neutrality and while the platform recognized foreign born citizens, and those of foreign extraction as good American citizens a strong stand is made against foreign meddlers.

The president's suggestion for a plank on Americanism was incorporated in the platform. The declaration is strong in its insistence on whole-hearted support of the government by all citizens. It is understood that all parties are called upon to spurn political support from any organization of foreign-born citizens which endeavors to influence this government's policy in international affairs. Confidence is expressed in the great body of citizens, and "America first" is emphasized as the creed of all.

The platform points out that the administration has avoided war, and at the same time has preserved American rights and secured certain guarantees of freedom of intercourse with other nations. The policy of the administration with respect to weaker nations is upheld. It is pointed out that the policy of this government is and should be to refrain from interference in the extreme cases, and at the same time to assist them to become prosperous.

The platform declares in favor of keeping the troops in Mexico long enough to insure against further uprisings which might endanger American territory.

### JUDGE SMITH CLEARS MAIL ROUTE MATTER

The following correspondence relative to the Dunn-Ira-Snyder mail route in Scurry county is submitted to show Judge Smith's attitude in the matter:

House of Representatives,  
Washington, D. C., June 5, 1916.

Snyder, Texas.

Dear Friend:

Your letter of the 24th ultimo was duly received. I supposed that the old story about my interference in the Ira mail route matter had died out. I know of nothing more unjust for I had absolutely nothing to do with it. Immediately upon receipt of your letter I called at the Post office department and asked them to write me a letter giving the reasons why the department changed its mind about establishing the service between Snyder and Ira and stating whether or not I had anything to do with it and I received in reply the letter which I herewith enclose.

My dear Mr. Smith:

With reference to your personal call at the Department today, when you made inquiry concerning the proposition to establish service on a route from Ira by Knapp, to Durham, and another from Ira to Snyder, returning by Dunn to Ira, Texas, I beg to inform you that this matter was carefully considered in March, 1914, and advertisements were issued inviting proposals for carrying the mails on the routes mentioned. The lowest bids received in response to the advertisements were defective and as protests of Dunn patrons were submitted and the changes proposed would involve an increase in cost of operation over the existing service of about \$1000 per annum, it was decided to make no award of contract but to continue the service as then and now arranged. This conclusion was based on the facts as above stated and not because of any recommendation made by you. The files relating to the case show that no recommendation whatever was made by you in the matter.

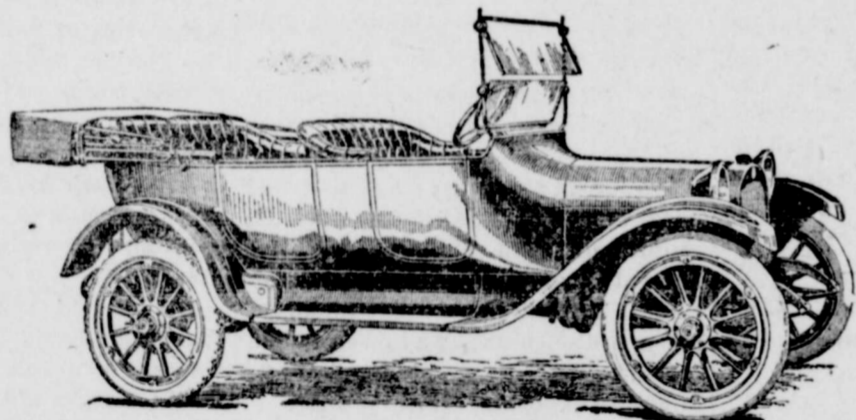

A bridge on the I. & G. N. near Laredo was burned Monday night. The Ursuline Convent at Laredo was attacked by Mexicans Monday night and badly damaged.

A thousand peons have come into Jaurez from Southern Chihuahua and crossed over to El Paso in search of work and food. They are destitute and actually starving.

At Guamas orders have been issued calling Mexicans to arms and ordering arrest and imprisonment of all Americans.

**REPUBLICAN NEGATION AND DEMOCRATIC POSITIVENESS**

Judge Buchanan says if he goes to the State Senate he has in mind the introduction of a bill to establish a lunatic asylum somewhere in West Texas. It ought to be done. It is a heavy expense on a West Texas County to send an insane patient to Terrel, Austin or San Antonio. The fare of the officer and the patient amount to a big sum and then the patient is so far from home that his family cannot visit him or contribute to his comfort unless they are people of considerable means. Humanity and public economy are therefore joined in calling for an asylum nearer home.

**EDITORS AS ELECTION GUESSERS**

The Texas editors took a straw vote last week on the senatorial race and gave Brooks first place, but the other candidates are going on with their speech making just as though the question were still unsettled. Fact is since returning and finding a lot of people talking about Henry and Campbell we have privately decided that it is better to let the election decide the matter and see how nearly the editors came to guessing right.

**MILEAGE OF CONGRESSMEN.**

Candidate Blanton is having a good deal to say about the mileage of Congressmen being excessive, and tries to leave the impression, that Congressman Smith is opposed to any reduction in mileage.

### CONCERNING COMMISSION FORM OF CITY GOVERNMENT

I have been asked by some individuals to explain the law on the Commission form of Government such as is available to Snyder, and at their request submit this article.

In 1913 the Legislature of Texas, enacted a law whereby a commission form of government was made available to towns of less than 5,000 population and is found in Arts 1070 1076a R. S. 1911. This law provides that at any time 10 per cent of the voters of the town shall petition the Mayor of the town for an election to be held on the question of a commission form of government, it becomes the duty of the Mayor to order such an election and at said election two commissioners are to be voted on and if the majority of the votes cast are for the commission form of government the entire city government is turned over to these two commissioners and the mayor and all other city officers go out and this commission appoints the police force, tax assessor and collector, etc. and has absolute control over their appointees to discharge, etc., at their own will.

These new commissioners and the Mayor will receive \$5.00 per meeting for all regular meetings held and \$3.00 for all special meetings, provided they shall not be paid for more than 5 special meetings per month. Or in lieu of the per diem the Board of commissioners in towns of not less than 2,000 population may pay the mayor any sum not exceeding \$1200 per year salary and the commissioners not exceeding \$600. per annum salary.

Art. 1075 above referred to provides that with the exception of the changes mentioned above, the same law shall govern as governs under our present form of city government.

That this commission form of government only changes the manner of administering the government, but no more taxes can be levied and no more power given in any way other than mentioned.

Thus we find the only difference in the commission form of government and what we have is a centering of power in three individuals whereas it is held by the people and delegated to 6 aldermen and Mayor and we have the privilege of electing our own police force and other city officers, whereas in that form of government we would not have this power.

Some often refer to other towns where greater power is given but if you will investigate you will find that the towns having the power to levy heavier tax rate and a commission form of government are towns of more than 5,000 inhabitants. Towns of more than 5000 inhabitants can vote a commission form of government on themselves and have the legislature delegate additional power upon them but those of less than 5000 strong can not do this although they can have the commission form of government.

Under this condition we fail to see wherein our town would in the least be benefitted by a change in the form of government. I believe the people will be better satisfied to exercise their own choice in officers than they will to elect three men to elect them for the town and hence believe we should try to be satisfied to remain as we are.

### MEXICAN ACTIVITIES CAUSE ARMY RE-ENFORCEMENTS

Resident Mexicans Arouse Uneasiness in the Interior.

Mexican bandits including Carranza soldiers raided a ranch near San Benito, Col. Parker and a squadron of cavalry followed a hot trail into Mexico and cleaned up a nest of bandits. Then the Carranza officers notified the Americans that they must get back on American soil or they would be attacked and Gen. Ricaut promised to run the bandits down. Then Col. Parker started his men back home and were attacked in the rear by Mexicans.

This and other outrages and war like demonstrations by Mexico, caused the President to issue an order Sunday for the National Guards in every state to hurry to the border. This will give Gen. Funston 200,000 troops. Mexicans have cut telegraph and telephone wires and Americans yet in Mexico are in great danger.

Gen. Pershing refuses to move his army out of Mexico and Trevino's bluff goes unheeded.

The country is being assured that Pershing can defend himself.

The Government has started seven warships to Mexican waters so as to guard against any danger from the outside.

History is making so fast that every day is supplying a new chapter. The temper of Mexicans is such that nothing short of absolute subjugation is apt to bring them under control and if the United States shall have to establish a protectorate over that country we may reasonably expect at least five years of guerrilla troubles.

The American policy of temporizing with them has caused Mexicans to think we will not fight, and it seems that nothing but actual demonstration will change their notion.

The situation is serious. Mexico is a hot bed of revolution and as has long been suspected our efforts to assist the defacto government to a state of quiet is resulting in our having to fight all the factions combined.

All along the border and for long distances into the interior of Texas there are thousands of Mexicans. These resident Mexicans and laborers are giving allegiance to Mexico and are apt at any time to turn on unsuspecting American communities and do immense damage before our people could organize for defense. It is but an act of wisdom on our part to perfect local organizations and be ready for emergencies. It is said that in a number of towns Mexicans have purchased guns and ammunition and since the people are waking up to that fact, such a feeling of precaution is aroused that merchants are being requested to refuse to sell such things to Mexicans and steps will be taken to have these people sent away.

### OUR MEXICO TROUBLES.

Observers in El Paso last Saturday discovered evidences of unusual activity among the Mexican soldiers in Juarez and very soon a report came that 5000 Carranza troops were mustered along the railroad south of Juarez and that 1500 were drawn up at the border opposite Ysleta. These movements caused an order for the entire garrison at El Paso to put itself in readiness for action.

It was further announced that a large force had mobilized on three sides of Gen. Pershing's position 120 miles from the border and that Gen. Trevino acting under direction from Carranza had notified Pershing that any move south, east or west would be construed as a signal for hostilities. Pershing is said to be amply equipped for defense and he has notified Trevino that he is subject to no orders except from his own government.

While these movements are in progress marauding bands continue to cross the river, perpetrate a robbery or attack on an isolated community, and rush back under cover of Mexican guns.

The cover is off now and everybody is convinced that there is no distinction between bandits and Carrancistas. Gen. Carranza couldn't control his people if he wanted to.

With the accumulated conditions last Sunday, the country believed a war is now longer, avoidable.

An order was sent out Sunday to move all the militia of all the states to the border and be ready for what ever may come.

A raid Saturday near Brownsville led to a ruining fight and the cleaning up of a nest of bandits.

The soldiers are on the alert and ready for action.

It will be only a few days till enough warships will be lined up at Vera Cruz and other ports to command the situation on water and the land forces are being made stronger as fast as troops can be moved.

President Wilson and his countrymen have done all they could to prevent war with Mexico, and now if it must come, it should come in earnest so as to be over as soon as possible. It is going to cost money and American lives, but in the end the honor of our country will be maintained and let us hope that Mexico may be re-established on saner lines than ever.

Stephenville, Texas, June 15.—One of the worst storms in the history of Erath county visited Stephenville and vicinity last night, doing damage estimated at between \$150,000 and \$200,000. Hallstones fell estimated in size from a hen's egg to six inches in diameter.

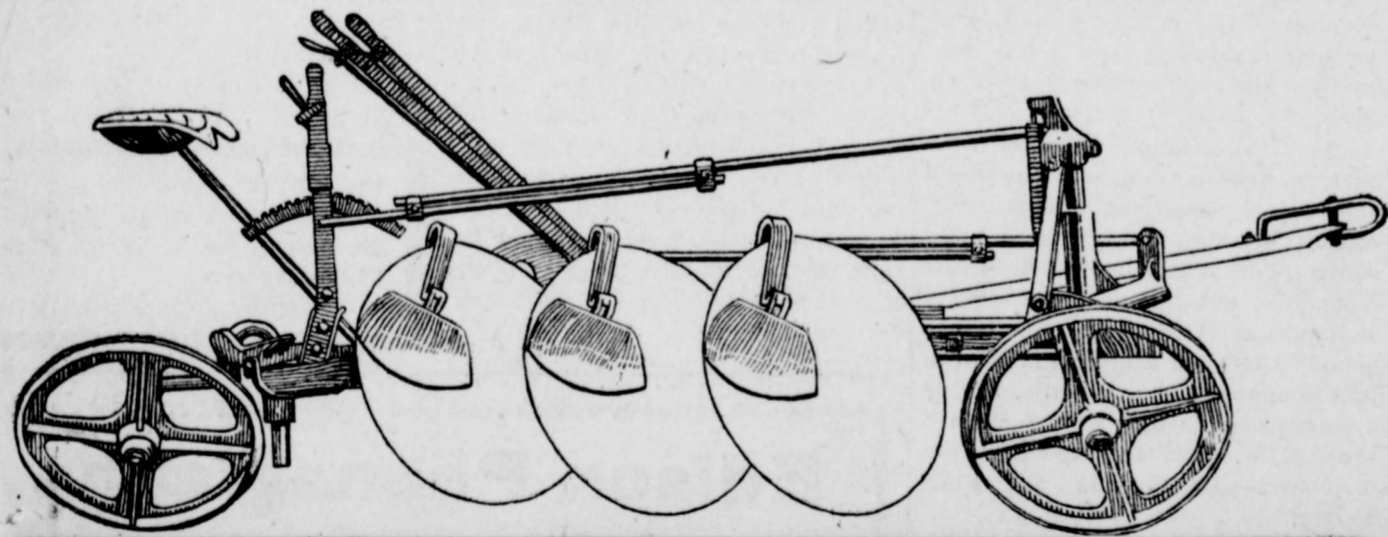
