Senator Johnson Hears From Home

Senator Johnson is a republican candidate for president and has been very busy to find an issue that would discredit President Wilson and the democratic administration. To that end he has fought against ratification to the peace treaty which Wilson helped to formulate. Johnson is a Senator from California and would naturally expect his own state to line up for him, but it became known in Washington last week that many of the leading people in California including at least six of Johnson's campaign committee are in favor of ratification of the treaty as it is without reservations, and now Mr. Johnson has received direct word from home. A Washington correspondent sends out this message:

Washington, Sept. 28.—Senator Johnson, Republican, California, is asked in a telegram signed by a number of Judges, state officials and business men to withdraw his opposition to ratification of the peace treaty. The telegram made public by the league to enforce peace said:

"We have heard the President's message on the peace treaty and the league of nations. We have also considered carefully all the objections offered to ratification. This issue is the most important presented to the American people since the civil war.

"Far above all personality of partisanship, we are convinced that the treaty should be ratified without amendment of reservation. Peace and peace on a permanent basis of open arbitration, inquiry and discussion before resorts to war is vital to the welfare to the American people and welfare to the world. America must not be false to herself and refuse such a peace except for the most weighty reasons. The objections to ratification are not weighty, should not hold us back. We appeal to you to withdraw your opposition. We are confident that in this we speak for an overwhelming majority of the people of California and that your present position does not represent them truly."

Mrs. T. J. Thompson has received her letters from her people at Sinton and Aransas Pass. Her brother's home was almost entirely destroyed and he lost his cotton crop. At first he was worried over his own losses, but after working a few days to take care of the people he seems to have forgotten his own misfortune. He has found so much suffering and devastation that his entire time and attention has been absorbed in rescue work. He has charge of a relief squad who have gathered up and buried 115 people.

Mob at Omaha Lynched the Mayor

A negro at Omaha, Nebraska criminally assaulted a white girl. Such a crime causes Caucasian blood to boil in the North or West the same as in the South. The sheriff had the negro in jail and had a big force of deputies to help protect the back brute. A mob of several thousand white people demanded the prisoner. The new court house was set on fire to smoke the officers and prisoner out. The sheriff finally surrendered the negro to save the lives of his deputies, the mayor of the city attempted to plead for law and order and the mob started to lynch him. He was strung up till almost dead and the chief of police barely escaped the fury of the mob. State troops have been sent to restore order.

It is later reported that as soon as the Mayor regained consciousness he asked what had been done to the "Colored man." That shows why the mob turned attention to the Mayor.

Mexico and the Fair.

There are those who will censure Gov. Hobby for his notion that this country should intervene in Mexico and that Mexico should not be permitted to exhibit her resources at the Dallas Fair. We are inclined to the notion that it would have been mutually good for Texas and Mexico to establish more amicable relations through the Fair and yet the attitude of President Carranza toward his country for the past three or four years has been enough to justify permanent contempt for him and deep seated suspicion of his motives, however, if he could be induced to come to Dallas and see the trend of American pep, ambition and enterprise he would probably see the foolishness of his former conduct.

Time may iron out the crimps and wrinkles now noticeable in the human character and finally there may come about a democratic sentiment in the minds of people and there may set up a disposition to surrender self interest in order that equal justice may be accorded to all peoples, great or small, but we are a long way from that state of altruism now. There is more selfishness being manifested now than ever before.

When Reaction Comes.

Because the United States Government paid unheard of wages during the war as a means to get preparedness pushed along, all wages in private industries were forced to go higher than ever known. These high wages necessitated higher prices for all sorts of products and now, labor is not willing to go back to pre-war wage scale and therefore everything that people consume is abnormally high in price. These conditions are not apt to hold so high a level of prices and when commodities begin to fall to a lower level, wages will have to come down. Many business concerns will cease to exist and laborers will be out of employment, and as a result we may expect to see an army of unemployed men and women tramping over the country seeking handouts.

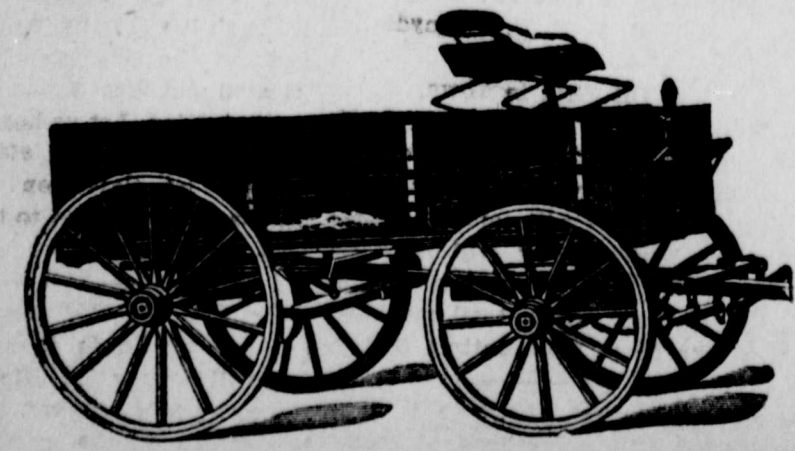

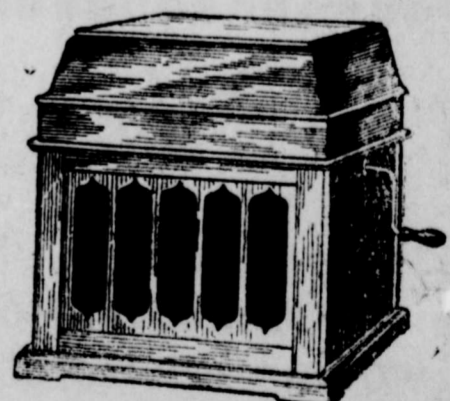

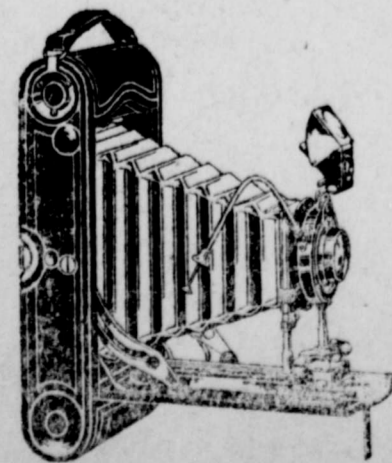

OIL TALK HERE AND THERE

A Fort Worth oil reviewer sends out an analysis of the general situation and these two paragraphs affirm his report:

For several days reports have come from Desdemona that many of the townsite wells are losing rapidly in production and that some of them have begun to flow salt water and even some of the larger wells have registered declines. This is, of course, a natural decline in any field but the recent losses seem to be greater than they should be.

There was new important development in the Desdemona district during the week. That was the deeper drilling of the Lewis well of Hamil et al, which recently established a two-mile extension of the field to the northwest. This well has been making only a few hundred barrels daily but when it was deepened the flow increased to 1,200 to 1,500 barrels daily. This makes the new territory look better and also gives an indication that nothing to determine the western limit of the pool has developed.

The Cowan well in Lynn county has been abandoned and the casing drawn. The drill had gone 2750 feet and got nothing, but the local people are not willing to give it up. They are making up a fund to drill another well and will go 3500 feet.

From the best information we can gather, all that intense excitement about oil in the Sears well at Merkel, was much ado-about-nothing. Some body seems to have pulled a hoax, but doubtless there was money in it. Not all the swindlers are in the penitentiary yet.—Roscoe Times.

Makes one think of the Urban and several other boasted propositions.

The Alert Oil & Gas Company with headquarters at Denver and holdings at Burkburnett Brown county and other proven fields report their second well on the sand and arrangements are under way for a deep test. They announce their stock will go up on Oct. 20th.

The Brown-Worth expect to declare a dividend before Christmas.

There are three derricks now ready in Scurry county and Riley well is drilling. Fred Grayum had on the board Monday mornin the Southeast quarter of Section 612 a mile southeast of the Riley location cut into 10 acre blocks at five dollars an acre and sold out before night.

Andy Trevey was here Monday from Knapp and stated that two land owners in his fine mile block are still holding off from signing and thus activities are delayed in that favorable proposition.

The Fluvanna people are expecting their drilling machinery and the Scurry county Oil Association will start up as soon as their tools arrive

The Sweetwater Reporter said last week:

Derrick timbers are being placed on the Toliver & Lambert block near Roscoe. This test is to be drilled by the Ranger Extension Co., a California concern, of which H. H. Harrison is field superintendent. Mr. Harrison is on the ground now and will personally direct operations of this company. Two strings of tools are enroute and are expected to arrive by the time the derricks are completed.

The Wichita-Nolan Co., is making good progress on their deep test on the Kutman ranch, twelve miles southwest of Sweetwater. Drilling is between 1200 and 1300 feet.

WILSON INVADES HOUSE OF FOES

CARRIES HIS BATTLE FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS INTO HOME OF HIS ENEMIES.

GIVES COST OF GREAT WAR

Informa Them of Lives and Treasure Poured Out to Save Civilization.

(By Mt. Clemens News Bureau)

Aboard President Wilson's Special train—Carrying his war against those who oppose the adoption by the United States of the peace treaty and the covenant of the League of Nations into their households, President Wilson last week invaded California.

And there, where the question on which league opponents have hammered the hardest, that of Shan Tung—is of most interest, the president found the same enthusiasm among the people for peace and for insurance against future wars. The people want the long controversy ended. They want this country to be able to again turn its undivided attention to social, economic and industrial development. Their leaders may not feel this way, but judging from the expressions which met the president on every side. The leaders have overstepped the limits of the peoples patience in their stubborn determination to force a change in the great document.

Must Take This League.

"We must take this League of Nations," said the president, "for there is no way in which another can be obtained without compelling reconsideration by the powers. And it would sit very ill upon my stomach to take it back to Germany for consideration."

"All over the world people are looking to us with confidence our rivals along with the weaker nations. I pray God that the gentlemen who are delaying this thing may presently see it in a different light."

Germany, the president declared, is taking new courage from our delay in ratifying the treaty and her newspapers and public men were again becoming arrogantly outspoken.

Deeply impressive were the figures of the cost of the late war, in lives and dollars. It was the first time that the official statistics have been made public and the tremendous totals shocked the president's audiences.

Shows Cost of World War.

"The war," said President Wilson, cost Great Britain and her Dominions \$38,000,000,000; France \$26,000,000,000; the United States \$22,000,000,000; Russia \$18,000,000,000; Italy \$13,000,000,000 and a total, including the expenditures of Japan, Belgium and other small countries, of \$123,000,000,000.

"It cost the Central Powers as follows: Germany \$39,000,000,000; Austria-Hungary, \$21,000,000,000; Turkey and Bulgaria \$3,000,000,000.

"The United States," the president said, "spent one million dollars an hour night and day for two years in its struggle to save civilization. All this, however, fades into insignificance when the deaths by battle are considered," declared the president. Russia gave 1,700,000 men; Germany 1,600,000; France 1,380,000; Great Britain 900,000; Italy 364,000; the United States 50,300. In all, almost 7,500,000 men perished in the great struggle, or 1,500,000 more men than died in all of the wars of the previous 100 years.

Should Remember Recent Horrors.

"These are terrible facts, and we ought never to forget them. We went into this war to do a thing that was fundamental for the world and what I have come out on this journey for is to determine whether the country has forgotten or not. I have found out. The country has not forgotten and it will never permit any who stands in the way of the fulfillment of our great pledges, ever to forget the sorrowful day he made the attempt."

Arbitration and discussion, the president pointed out, must replace force of arms in the settlement of world controversies. Constantly he dwells upon the fact that all the nations in the League agree to do one of two things, first to submit their differences to arbitration, in which case they agree to abide by the decision rendered, or, if unwilling to arbitrate, to have their case discussed by the Council of the League, in which case six months is granted for discussion. Three months must elapse following the result of this last step in arbitration before the nation concerned can declare war.

Holds Out Hope for Ireland.

The president took advantage of questions propounded by the San Francisco Labor Council to give the inference that he believes Ireland can bring her case before the League of Nations for settlement when the League is actually in existence.

Shan Tung, he declared, will be returned to China. Japan, he said, had given her solemn pledge to that effect. And with the League of Nations in force, said the president, we can, if occasion arises, stand forth and say, "This shall be done."

COAST DRIVE FOR S. A. IS GIVEN UP

Stricken Cities Released From Obligation. Money Sent With Workers

Relief work for the stricken section of the coast of Texas is being pushed with all possible speed by the Salvation Army, according to Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, commander of the southwestern division, who is now in Corpus Christi.

Clothing has been rushed into the stricken area from each of the Salvation Army post stores. Special appeals have been made in all leading cities for food and clothing. These supplies have been collected and shipped by the Salvation Army workers to Roy Miller, chairman of the Corpus Christi relief committee.

Commissioner Estill, commander of the western territory, has been appealed to for aid. A message was sent to the Chicago office by Lieutenant Colonel Wood before he departed for the coast that special offerings be taken in every large city in the west for the relief of the suffering on the coast.

Every city in the southwestern division falling under the jurisdiction of Lieutenant Colonel Wood has been asked for assistance. Prompt responses are being made to all appeals according to southwestern officials.

The Salvation Army has withdrawn the coast counties in the stricken section from the home service campaign scheduled for September 29. The amount in quotas withdrawn reaches \$100,000. The decision was reached after a conference between John Henry Kirby, chairman of the state advisory and executive committee, Lieutenant Colonel Wood and Herbert B. Ehler, southwestern financial director.

SCRAPPERS INDUCE MEN TO TAKE WORK

Salvation Army Chairman Influenced by Attitude of Oversea Veterans

Soldiers and sailors who saw service overseas have been instrumental in many cases in drawing prominent Texans into the county and state organizations for the Salvation Army's \$600,000 home service campaign, according to W. P. "Billy" Walsh of Tyler, Texas, who attended the Dallas district session of county chairmen Monday.

"One of the most harrowing war tales I have ever heard of the war drew me into the Salvation Army Service," Walsh told the county chairman. "We have a young soldier in our town who tried to enlist a half dozen times. Each time he was rejected because of a bad heart. Then along came the draft."

"His heart was all right when the draft board physicians got to him. He went overseas. Within six weeks of the time he was drafted he took part in an action on the Toul sector. He went over the top and got two machine gun bullets through his shoulder."

"Well, the boy says he stumbled into a shell hole. With him were two more wounded men. One of them had been shot through the stomach. He was terribly thirsty but dared not drink for he had heard that water in the stomach was sure death when the stomach's walls had been pierced by a bullet. The other man had a mangled leg."

"These boys lay there from 2 o'clock one day until after 10 o'clock the next day. The soldier with the mangled leg and the one shot through the stomach died. Then help came. The first person to that boy in the shell hole was a Salvation Army man with a pitcher of chocolate. That is why I am chairman in my county."

SALVATION ARMY IN STRICKEN DISTRICT

Relief Workers Rushed to Area Swept by Tide and Storm at Corpus Christi

Relief workers from Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana Salvation Army posts under orders from Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, commander of the southwestern division of the Salvation Army are now working in devastated Corpus Christi, according to reports from the forty corps cities of the southwest.

Lieutenant Colonel Wood was in Enid, Oklahoma, when the storm struck Corpus Christi. As soon as he had learned the extent of the storm he ordered workers from all posts to the scene of the disaster. He immediately followed the workers, arriving Wednesday afternoon in Corpus Christi.

Supplies and money were sent with the workers. They were ordered to report to Roy Miller, chairman of the relief committee at Corpus Christi. All the finances and workers with the maximum amount of supplies available, were placed at the disposal of the relief chairman in the stricken city.

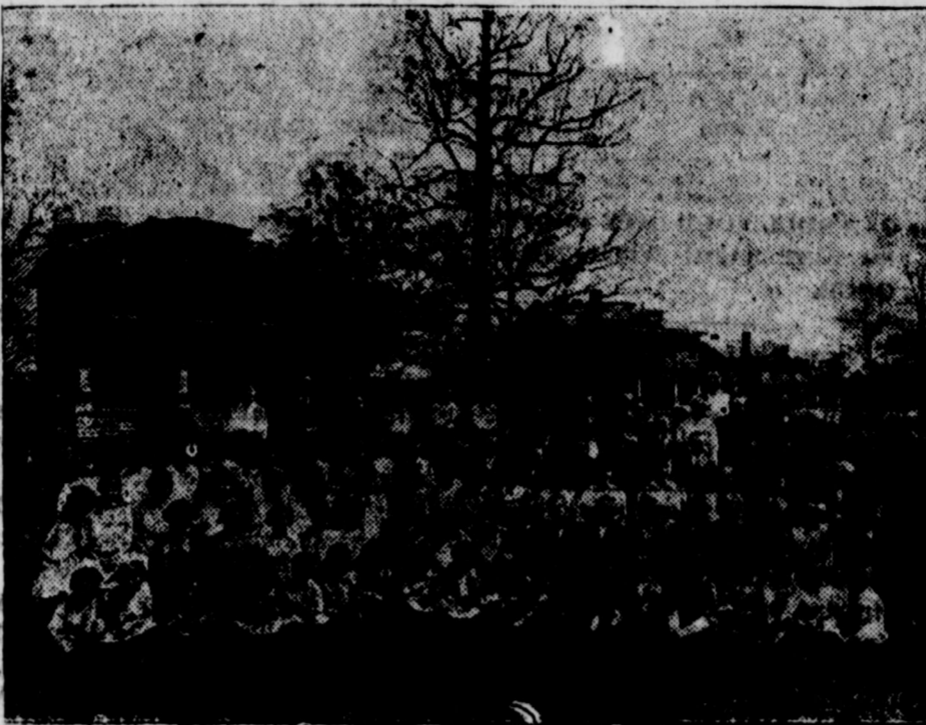

5,000 Helpless Orphans in South Are Asking the Privileges of a Home

Baptists Are Providing For That Many at Present in Fifteen Institutions But as Many More Are Waiting For Admission—The 75 Million Campaign Plans to Meet That Need.

Does your heart go out to the worthy boy and girl bereft by the Grim Reaper of father and mother, and left alone in the world without the fostering care of those to whom they are naturally most dear in the world?

Then you will understand why Southern Baptists have established orphanages in fifteen states, are caring for 5,000 such children in those homes and training them for useful lives in the world.

But the need is far greater than the ability of these institutions to meet it. While five thousand children are being cared for in these orphanages, there are on the waiting list of these institutions fully five thousand more equally worthy, fatherless and motherless boys and girls who want the privileges which these orphanages afford but which must be denied them for the present because there is no room with which to shelter more of them.

So when the Baptist 75 Million Campaign was launched for the enlargement of the work of the denomination along general lines in an effort to meet growing spiritual needs in the homeland and throughout the world, the sum of \$4,700,000 was apportioned to the orphanages, this sum to cover a program of five years, as the \$75,000,000 sought in the campaign will be raised in cash and five-year pledges during Victory Week, November 30-December 7.

In the homes that have been provided for the orphans facilities are provided for giving regular schooling of the same character that is afforded in the public schools, beginning with the kindergarten and continuing to the tenth and eleventh grades in the

high school. This work in the school room is supplemented, however, with practical training along industrial and other lines. For instance, the boys are given courses in practical farm work on farms which have been purchased and are operated by the homes, livestock production, carpentering, tin work, plumbing, laundrying, and the like, as well as courses in business for those who show special adaptation for that line of work.

The school room work for the girls is supplemented with the study of music, domestic science, stenography and the like. Large attention is given to the religious life of the children, also, and this is given emphasis in the daily chapel services, and in the Sunday School and preaching services on the Sabbath.

The orphan children respond readily to the opportunities and privileges afforded them and there have gone out from these institutions a number of the most useful men and women in the various states. While taking pride in the accomplishments of the boys and girls who are in the homes at present, as well as those who have gone out from there to make their own way in the world, the superintendent and teachers are saddened by the fact that there are so many other helpless children who ought to be aided but can not be by reason of the limitations of the homes.

Enlargements are necessary for all of the fifteen orphanages fostered by Southern Baptists which are located in the following states: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

13 MILLION WHITE PEOPLE NOT SAVED

THIS IS ONE OF THE PRESSING STATE MISSION PROBLEMS IN THE SOUTH.

THE SITUATION IS OUTLINED

Baptist 75 Million Campaign Has Apportioned \$11,000,000 To Be Employed During the Next Five Years in Meeting Need.

Within the eighteen states comprising the territory of the Southern Baptist convention are 13,000,000 white people who are not only not identified with any church, but who do not claim to be christians, according to information gathered by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign. To try and reach these people with the gospel is one of the aims of the campaign and to meet the problem the state mission organization in the various states will set themselves. To help these organizations in meeting that problem the sum of \$11,000,000 has been apportioned from the total of \$75,000,000 that is sought for all purposes, and during the next five years the state mission forces will seek to reach these millions of people right here at home with the gospel and enlist them in some phase of christian work.

According to this same source of information, it is learned that there are 3,391 towns and villages in the South with a population of 200 or more in which there are no Baptist church organizations or no Baptist houses of worship. Inasmuch as these towns influence more or less the surrounding territory an effort will be made to reach them and the territory surrounding them during the five-year program of the Baptists, it is announced.

There are seventy-four county seats

in the South without a single Baptist church or meeting house, it has been ascertained by the campaign headquarters. By reason of the large number of public officials residing there, and the large number of people who go there from every section of the county to attend the sessions of the various courts, pay their taxes and the like it is regarded that the county-seat towns are of especial importance and it is hoped that before the next five years have passed there will be an active Baptist church in every county-seat in the South.

Engaged in the work of state missions at present are 1524 missionaries, and while this may seem like a reasonable number, when the vast territory to be served is considered it has been found that fully 1,000 extra men and women are needed at once, for in addition to reaching the people who are not christians there are many weak, struggling churches which need assistance and whose members need development. In the several states of the Southern Baptist convention, for instance, there are 9,000 churches with a membership of many thousand which give but very little to any interest of the denomination and which are doing but very small things for the uplift of their communities.

In addition to these very weak churches, many of which have no pastor there are in the various states a total of 19,653 churches which have preaching services only once a month, 3,900 churches which have services only once a month, and only about 2,200 full time churches. Part of the \$11,000,000 apportioned for state missions will go to the strengthening of the weak churches and the bringing of them to full-time pastorates where possible.

Leaders in the campaign have sought to care for every interest of the denomination in the \$75,000,000 that is asked in cash and five-year pledges during Victory Week, November 30-December 7, when the final drive will be made but they recognize that the future development of the church depends in a great measure upon the development of the churches at home which is the peculiar task of state missions.

How long must this kind of misrepresentation continue? In so far as it is believed, it not only breeds discontent, but results in injustice to our industry.

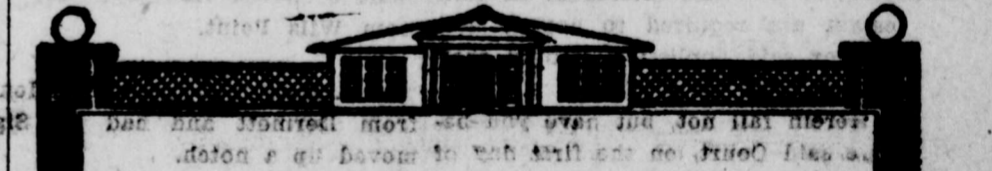

As a result the contract signed by State Fair officials calls for the appearance, twice daily in front of the grand stand, of the original polo team.

The original polo team was formed in 1913 and is the only polo combination to tour the world, playing auto polo contests in the various countries over the globe. The war stepped in after the 1915 season and scattered the combination to the four winds, but the players were reunited this spring.

The team has just returned from Canada, where in an international series the Canadian title was annexed. In the series here during the Victory Fair the original American team will defend its title of world's champions against a combination from the Pacific coast.

The Pacific coast boys have been putting up a sterling article of polo for the past two years, and believe they are on a par with any other combination in the universe.

Two games are scheduled daily, a 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon and a 8:30 o'clock in the evening before the grand stand, in connection with the Hippodrome performance, at the Victory Fair, Oct. 6th to 19th, at Dallas.
