Signal Reporter Visits Foch

We have been planning for some time to make a trip to Foch and Saturday morning we had an opportunity to go and leaving town about 8 o'clock we expected to reach Foch in about an hour but wait, the flivver got out of whack or the gasoline or the driver, or well, something was wrong for it was a fact we stopped once not knowing the nature of the critic or coaxing had no effect. We worked and plead for some time finally securing a little pint can we ped, and not knowing the nature of it again and on and on until we finally reached the city about 11:30 o'clock. Foch is a good little town surrounded by a fertile agricultural country. It has a very wide trade territory east, west, north and south. A good many miles each way. The people of this community are very prosperous this year having made better cotton than most communities and an abundance of feed which places them in a fine condition for the coming year. The Hemleigh Hotel is the first important place and this is about the first place we found. This is a very comfortable and pleasant hostelry with lots of good things to eat. It is presided over by Mrs. Brooks and Mr. Brooks is the blacksmith. Then the First State Bank, an institution that has grown up with the town is next in order. By a glance at the financial statement of this bank in last week's issue of the Signal it shows something over \$200,000 on deposit. Mr. Gentry, Mr. Billingsly and Mr. Neyemier are the men who handle the coin and dish out the exchange to the people. Next is the Drug Store. Dr. Morrow and Mr. Karnes own the Drug Store and do a good business. Then comes the Post Office. Mrs. Leverett keeps the post office. Adams and Leverett have a grocery store in the same building. D. S. says he makes the living distributing the necessities of life, such as flour, sugar, potatoes, toothpicks, etc. They have a good business. Then there is J. W. Jackson, who has a store. He told them how to manage their income tax returns, makes legal instruments, deals in real estate, etc. He has built up a good business. Elmer Gardner keeps the butcher shop. The Barber Shop is owned by Mr. Mobley and the house was full, all waiting for their turn in the chair. Mr. Ely is across the street and handles Hardware and Groceries. That is the place where you can get all kinds of nice things for the kitchen and parlor. Mr. Rector has the Dry Goods store. That is the place where you can dicker up look pretty and get all kinds of good clothes to wear. Mr. Werner has a Tailor Shop in here. He puts you in a barrel and presses your clothes while you wait. Fargason Bros. have a grocery store. They were very busy waiting on their customers. Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. have a big lumber yard. Mr. Bouchier is the manager. You can read what they have in their ad in the Snyder Signal. Mr. Tubbs has a harness shop and J. G. McKinnon makes over your shoes in the same place.

J. W. Wemken, R. C. Herm, had the same broad smile and many other familiar faces whom I would like to mention if there was room in this paper. Foch has four churches, three gins, two railroads and one oil well, no, I mean a derrick up. We saw this derrick about a mile and a half south of town. They claim this to be the biggest derrick in the county. The derrick is complete and they hope to spud in in the near future. J. R. Coker is manager of the Fuller Gin and T. H. Bills, the one galls the onther one. I believe, the third gin, is not running this season. Kemp & Harlan are dealers in grain and livestock and they know their business. C. P. Editor Signal

You asked a write up of my visits to the Rural Schools:

I will say that it was the most pleasant that I have been permitted to do for several years. In fact it was the first opportunity that I had been allowed since Judge Yonge was County Judge, at which time I visited all the schools then in session in the county at that time.

Now there is sure some difference in the schools now and then. At that time there were but very few two or more teacher schools in the county, and now there are but few one teacher schools. At that time the houses were nothing to compare with what they are now. The poor school houses that we have now are better than the best that we had then; but since that time, about 15 years, I think, we have been making pretty rapid progress.

I think, no doubt, that the cause is primarily, we had no county superintendent at that time separate from the County Judge, and they had their hands full of so many other duties that they could not possibly give the rural schools the attention that they so much needed. I can not think otherwise than that the people of the rural districts have been greatly stimulated to strive for better things under a Superintendent.

I would be so glad to mention each school that we visited which was about fourteen, and tell of the good that we saw with our own eyes made us rejoice to see the children so eager to get knowledge and ascend to a higher plane of citizenship; and the teachers all seemed to be enthusiastic over their work.

I am glad to report that out of about five hundred students who I am sure are as good as any that the big state of Texas has in any county, without a solitary exception, agreed with an uplifted hand to strive to be still better both in their homes and in school; I am sure that they meant it, because many an eye glittered with a tear when they made the promise. Take them all in all, I do not believe that I ever in my life looked into the faces of more promising pupils than those that we visited.

The work is so great that I do not wonder that our County Superintendent is so earnest, and so zealous. I do not blame him to be willing to sacrifice better and more paying positions than the Superintendentcy and work at it for there is a pleasure in doing that which will help to make better any people.

Perhaps I will write more on the subject of Rural Schools later.

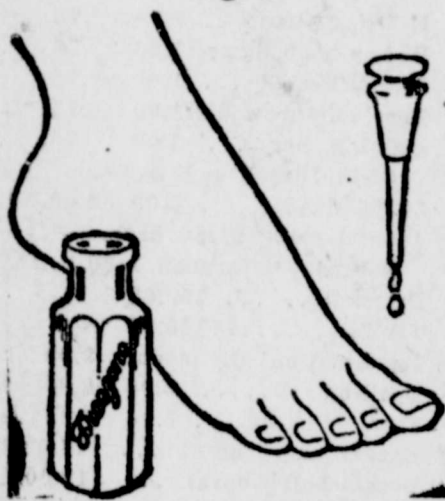

MAY COMPROMISE

The Militarist party who have recently come to the front in Germany may bring about a compromise with President Ebert and his cabinet. The call for a strike was responded to by so many of the people that practically all industries would shut down and starvation would be the result. Dr. Kapp, the new chancellor, saw the danger and realized that anarchy would surely sweep the country and because of that danger, a compromise was suggested and Ebert may be restored to the presidency. Dr. Kapp says Germany will respect the peace treaty, so long as it doesn't lead to annihilation, and that restoration of monarchy has no place in their plans for the future. Kapp claims to be interested only in restoring permanent government in Germany.

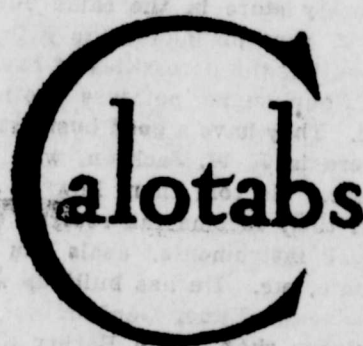

How Six Hundred Children Live Together in One Big Family

By Coleman Craig

The largest orphanage in the United States is in Texas, located seven miles out from Dallas, and is known as the Buckner Orphan Home. This institution has an interesting history. It was founded by the late R. C. Buckner in 1879.

Began with Three Children
This home, which now takes care of six hundred children, began with just three children, in a rented cottage in Dallas. In 1881 the first building was erected. From this small beginning the institution has had a marvelous growth, and during its history has taken care of many thousand children. There are now four large buildings, several cottages and 1800 acres of land. During all its history, it has been non-sectarian in its ministrations, and children have been admitted regardless of creed, though it is under the control of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

A City Within Itself.
A visitor to the Buckner Orphan Home is impressed with the man-

ner of inmates. With this in view, architects were called in, and work is now going forward in remodeling the old buildings, and in the planning of new ones, which will take care of the children in groups of thirty each instead of caring for them as a single unit of six hundred. The present buildings are now being remodeled so that each unit of thirty children will have its own apartment, with private bath and toilet. Each child will have a wardrobe where he may keep his own personal effects. Each unit will have a cozy little sitting room, tastefully furnished, and with artistic pictures and decorations. The units will each have a junior matron, who will be under the direction of the senior matron. By departmentizing and caring for the children in small groups, a long step will be taken in getting away from the institutional idea, which always exists where a large number are cared for under one management.

In further carrying out this idea, the new buildings that are to be erected out of funds provided in the Baptist 75 Million Drive, will not be large dormitories caring for several hundred, but will be cottages with a capacity of about fifty children. The management plans the erection of ten of these cottages during the next few years.

Planning to Take Care of More Children.

During the next five years the capacity of the Home will probably be doubled.

The cottages which are soon to be erected, will enable the Home to take care of an increased number. The new policy of the Home will also favor the admittance of more half-orphaned children who have lost but one parent, but who, in the majority of cases, are in as desperate need of the Home as are the orphans.

A Big Business Enterprise.

The cost of providing the living and educational expenses of a large family of 600 is enormous. These children have to have shoes and stockings and clothes the same as other children. The increased cost of living has run the daily expense of the Home up to the figure of about \$500 per day. Eighty to ninety per cent of these expenses are cared for by free will offerings of the people of Texas. The industries and farms of the Home provides ten to twenty per cent of the expenses. The expenses of the Home for the next fiscal year will call for contributions to the amount of \$175,000.

Daily Life of Children.

A child's life at this Home is regular, and so arranged as to give it practical experience, combining the elements of play, work and education. In the morning the children go to school. In the afternoon they can be found out on the expansive grounds playing and frolicking—happy like other children. For the older boys and girls there is work to do—not burdensome and

fold activities that go on within its own bounds. The Home has its own farm; a fine dairy, stocked with good milk cows; a power plant for heating and lighting; a laundry, a bakery; and a grammar school, and the first two years of high school; a regularly organized church with its own pastor; a Sunday School; a library of 3,000 volumes, and a museum, composed of two famous collections, with many thousands of geological, mineral and zoological specimens and fossils, curios from all over the world.

War-chest from Battlefield of Waterloo in Museum.

Among the many interesting relics in this museum, which is at all times accessible to the children, is an old steel bound war-chest, which came from the battlefield of Waterloo. Tradition has it that this old chest belonged to the Duke of Wellington. A handsome helmet, said to have been worn at one time by Napoleon, is also in the historical collection. The museum is also the final abiding place of a crude old log cabin, which was the first residence ever built in Dallas county. For a time it served as the first post office for Dallas, and was also the first court house.

A Real Home.

Buckner Orphan Home is more than a charitable institution. It seeks to be a real home. Dr. Buckner, who died last year, was loved by all the children, and the visitor who happened in at the home would in all likelihood see the old white-haired man entirely surrounded by children of all ages, who clambered up on his knees with the same freedom and familiarity as does Johnny when "daddy" comes home from the office. Dr. Buckner was affectionately known as "Father Buckner" by all the children.

Missionary from China Takes Up Father's Work.

When Dr. Buckner died, his two sons took up his work. One of them, Rev. Hal Buckner, was a missionary in South China, but upon his father's death, he returned and became general secretary. Mr. Joe D. Buckner, who had been associated with his father in the administration of the home for several years, became general manager.

A New Departure in Orphanage Management.

It has always been the object of this orphanage to make it as much a home, and less an institution, as is possible in taking care of such

servile, for it is equitably divided, and the work is of such nature as to give the boys practical training in many of the trades and professions in which they will later make their own living; and the girls, training in home economics and management. Its record has been unexcelled. So far as the records go, an inmate of this home has never been before any court on any criminal charge. From the Home these boys and girls go into the great outside, work-a-day world, prepared to make their own livelihood, as honest and law-abiding citizens.

TEXAS ROADS ASK HIGHER RATES

Washington, March 15.—A sweeping and flat increase of 29 per cent in the freight rates in Texas will be asked of the Interstate Commerce Commission by Texas railways at the hearing next Monday, unless present plans are altered. This will be done in order that Texas roads will be enabled to earn sufficient money to pay a flat dividend of 5 1/2 per cent on all rail investments in Texas, as is provided in the new railroad law.

Will Have Bad Effect

If the 29 per cent increase is granted it will have the effect of placing such an increased burden on West Texas industries that many may not be able to survive.

In any event the disastrous effect will be so far-reaching that it is hard to predict what the eventual result will be.

"Such an increase in rates will come as a fitting climax to the terrible service West Texas has experienced during the past year.

The proposed increase in the long run will also affect the consumer most seriously, because it will be he who will have to pay the freight. West Texas interests are preparing to bitterly oppose the proposed increase regardless of what protest will be made for the state as a whole.

TEXAS STANDS PAT ON RED RIVER CLAIM

Austin, Texas, March 15.—Developments in the Red River boundary situation broke fast today, the outstanding feature being Governor Hobby's declaration that Texas was determined to hold the disputed area by force until the Supreme Court of the United States has spoken finally in the Oklahoma-Texas boundary case, now pending in that court. The governor announced that a sufficient force had been ordered to hold the land. It is known that three state rangers left Austin last night to reinforce the seven rangers who for some time have been in possession of the land, and it is understood that additional reinforcements will move promptly in event their services are necessary.

Governor Hobby took this action following a receipt of an opinion from Attorney General C. M. Curation to the effect that the recent order of Federal Judge Youmans at Enid, Oklahoma, granting injunction to the Judsonia Developing Association against Sam Sparks and other Texas claimants to the property and fixing the boundary at the South bank of Red River, is "void and without jurisdiction in law," and a request by Judge George Calhoun of the Fifty-third District Court of Travis county that the executive power of the state be used to enforce the orders of his court in the appointment of a receiver and issuance of an order of injunction.

RURAL CHURCH WORK WILL BE DEVELOPED

BAPTISTS PLAN TO REACH 15,000 COUNTRY SUNDAY SCHOOLS THIS SUMMER.

PROVIDE BETTER TEACHERS

75 Million Campaign, With Assistance of Sunday School Board, Makes Extension Program Possible.

In what is believed to be the most extensive campaign for the development of rural Sunday Schools that has yet been undertaken by any single denomination, the forces of Southern Baptists, especially through the Sunday School Board, are planning to reach 15,000 country Sunday Schools this summer.

Ness, corresponding secretary of the Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville.

The work is made possible by the larger funds available from the 75 Million Campaign and will be carried on by the forces of the eighteen states of the Southern Baptist Convention in co-operation with the Sunday School Board. Additional workers will be put on in every state and a large number of Sunday School institutes will be held in the hope of reaching a great majority of the rural Sunday Schools in every state. Normal Sunday School institutes will be held in fifty counties of Tennessee, for instance, and over 500 rural centers will be reached with the better system of Sunday School teaching and methods of administration. Similar methods will be followed in all the states.

Every State Enlarges Work. Over \$300,000 a year will be expended on Sunday School field work in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, it is announced, and every state organization will greatly enlarge its Sunday School force, giving especial attention to the development of the rural schools.

In order that an adequate number of instructors may be available for carrying on this larger program, a thirty day normal school will be held in Nashville, beginning May 31, in the instruction in which a large regular faculty of Sunday School experts and many special lecturers will be employed.

The Sunday School Board at Nashville has just established a department of Sunday School administration which will deal with all questions of Sunday School organization and equipment. This department will be in charge of Arthur Flake, who has been a member of the field force of the Sunday School Board for quite a while and who was formerly superintendent of the Sunday School of the First Baptist Church of Fort Worth, Tex., said to be the largest Sunday School in the South.

Build Better Church Houses. Another department of the Sunday School Board is giving attention to the encouragement of better church houses and pastors' homes in the rural districts, furnishing architectural plans for this purpose and detailed suggestions without cost to churches which contemplate buildings along these lines.

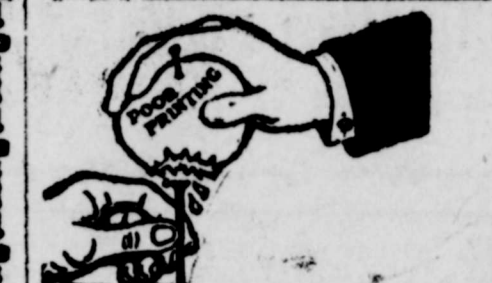
Scarcity of Domestic Help

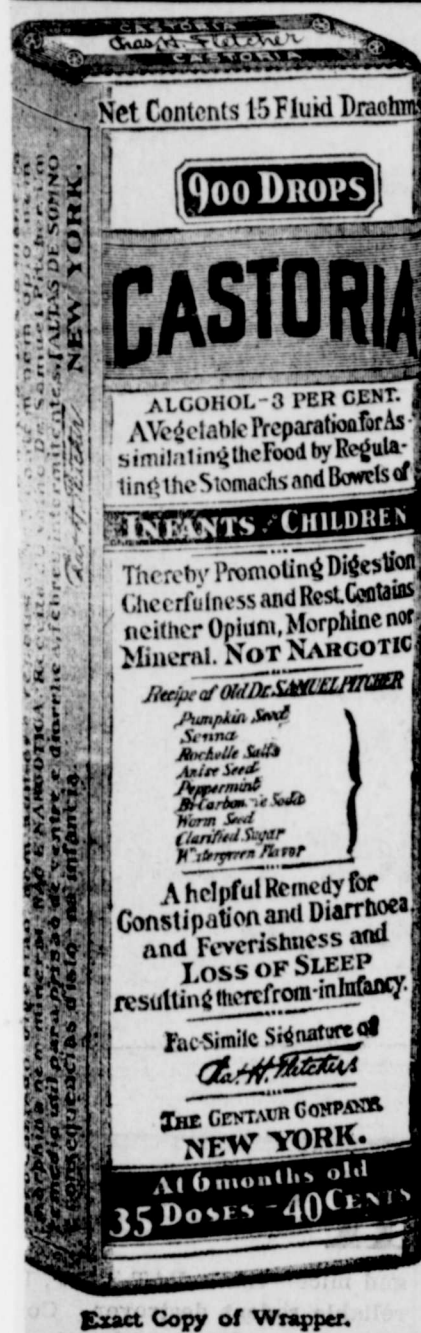

OLDEST UNIVERSITY IN STATE TO CELEBRATE 75TH ANNIVERSARY

The oldest educational institution in the state of Texas, Baylor University at Waco, is to celebrate its seventy-fifth anniversary at its commencement exercises, to be held in June. For several weeks now plans have been materializing to make this event in the educational history of the state one of the most unique celebrations ever staged. Invitations are being sent out to every student who ever attended Baylor, to return to his alma mater on this occasion.

Ex-President Taft to Be Present.

Many prominent speakers will be present to speak, among them ex-President William Howard Taft. Secretary of the Navy Daniels has been appointed by President Wilson to act as his personal representative at the celebration. Among the noted preachers who will be commencement speakers are Dr. Geo. W. Truett, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas, and one of the most distinguished ministers in the United States; and Dr. Geo. W. McDaniel, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Richmond, Va.

Among the features of the diamond jubilee celebration will be the presentation of Bach's masterpiece, The Passion According to St. Matthew. To present this great musical program will require a massed chorus of five hundred voices, and it will be the first time in the history of the South that a college or university has attempted to give The Passion.

Other preparations include the erection of a huge rustic arbor which will seat 10,000 people. A staff of trained newspaper men will be present at the celebration to cover all the program, and from these reports a book reciting the history of the occasion will be published.

BRITISH PREMIER CANNOT VISIT AMERICA THIS YEAR

David Lloyd George, British Premier, who was invited to attend the annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Washington next May will not be able to attend the meeting, according to a letter to Dr. J. B. Gambrell of Fort Worth, who is the president of the Southern Baptist Convention. At the last meeting of the convention in Atlanta last year, the body of 4200 Baptists voted to invite the distinguished premier to visit America during the meeting of its next session at Washington. Dr. Gambrell was appointed to head the committee which sent the invitation. In reply Lloyd George wrote as follows:

"I shall be grateful if you will kindly convey to the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention my sincere thanks for their kind invitation to me to be present at the convention which is to meet this year in Washington. I should cordially welcome such an opportunity of meeting my fellow Baptists in America and of paying tribute to their devotion to those principles which are essential in the life of the community. The cordial relations which have for many years existed between your great country and the British Empire, and which have been considerably strengthened by their common experiences during the last five years of struggle and turmoil, are full of promise for the future. It would give me great pleasure to visit the United States, but I very much regret that the demands upon my time are such as to make it impossible for me to promise to visit your convention this year."

BAPTIST CAMPAIGN WILL EMPHASIZE EVANGELISM

The new campaign which the Baptists of the state are to conduct during the next sixty days will emphasize the winning of souls, according to a statement issued by Dr. F. S. Groner, of Dallas, the general secretary of the Baptist Executive Board. Though an effort will be made during the latter part of April to increase the subscriptions to the 75 million campaign to the sum of 100 millions, the effort will largely be confined to churches that were not reached in the other campaign, and the evangelistic feature of the campaign will be stressed.

Simultaneous revival campaigns in the larger cities in which all the churches will conduct their meetings at the same time, are planned during the next two months. "The campaign for the 75 million was a glorious success," continued Dr. Groner in his interview. "More than ninety millions was subscribed, and with this encouragement it was decided to attempt to reach \$100,000,000. However, this effort to reach this huge sum will not in any way interfere with the main object of the campaign to reach the unevangelized of the state. It is planned that in the period of March and April, every church of the cities and larger towns will hold special revival meetings. The smaller churches of the country will probably prefer to hold their evangelistic services in the summer and early fall. To meet this preference, the summer months of 1920 were designated for the evangelistic period for the smaller churches."
