Paper Mill for West Texas.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is lending encouragement to the establishing of a large gypsum plant at Sweetwater and in connection therewith a paper factory. Plans are laid to utilize the vast quantities of waste paper that is now being burned. Such a concern should attract general attention. The waste paper that is destroyed in town may turn to be recognized as a valuable commodity.

As cotton seed has grown to be a bother to the farmer and gin to be recognized as a leading commodity, so can the waste paper being destroyed be made to rank as a useful commodity.

Clyde Lee Fife Holding Meeting in New Mexico.

The Clayton newspapers give fine reports:

Clayton Citizen: "Clyde Lee Fife, world known evangelist, is excelling his own reputation, as great as it is. He is preaching to the people as the gospel has never been heard before in Clayton. We might say that he is in Billy Sunday's class, but that would be placing him wrong. He stands in a class by himself. Americans Must Meet the Challenge.

Walter B. Brown, editor of the New York Commercial, in writing of the awfulness of the explosion in the heart of New York last week says:

"I was on the scene not very long after the explosion took place and saw sights that one does not forget in a lifetime. I counted six dead men near the Morgan offices, while the injured were everywhere. Some had hands or arms blown off, but most of them were hurt by falling glass, which fell in showers from the windows of the great office buildings for blocks around. On the third floor of the Bankers Trust building, diagonally across from the Morgan building, a great chunk was taken out of the window sill, probably a cubic foot of solid marble.

"Directly across the way and within a hundred feet of where the explosion took place is the statue of Washington, on the steps of the sub-treasury building. The statue itself was uninjured, but the father of his country wore a mantle of dirt and debris that was sadly out of keeping with his character. In spite of all the excitement and turmoil, the incongruity of it all flashed through my mind, of the great Washington standing there in the attitude of one who is bestowing the great blessing of liberty upon a grateful people and of the abuse of that liberty, which was undoubtedly responsible for the disaster.

For there is no doubt in my mind that the explosion was due, not to accident, but to design. It is undoubtedly a challenge from the forces of revolution, a challenge which must be met by the sternest measures of which we are capable. There can no longer be the easy toleration for those who threaten the overthrow of the government. It means that those who have anarchistic leanings must be rooted out and placed where they can do no more damage. Especially must the parlor revolutionists be hunted out—those who dabble in anarchism as a fad, who play safe, as to personal injury, but who do incalculable damage with their tongues."

Prices of buggies run up to \$2,000. It is much cheaper to buy a second-hand motor car and they are easier to maintain. There's no money in making buggies now.

Public Enemies of Government.

The whole country was shocked last week by the terrific explosion in the financial center of New York, and it is almost positively proven that it was the work of anarchists. That element has been for years making threats and demonstrations against the capitalists and the government of the nation and at last they have had the nerve to attempt their reign of terror.

The department of justice and all the minions of the law are working to find the perpetrators and drastic proceedings are promised. There is no reason why our courts and officers should longer temporize with that rehand element. They are enemies of society and civil government. They now make their threats openly and brazenly announce their purpose to overthrow our form of government, murder the possessors of wealth and confiscate the industries of the country. When a man is known to have a murderous purpose in mind against another, the law provides that he may be apprehended, disarmed and punished, and it is far more important that when a powerful organization deliberately plans a campaign of murder, robbery and sabotage, the strong arm of the law should reach out and securely shackle such plotters.

It is dangerous to dally over the matter and wait for an overt act. If one is a member of that cult he is ready to carry out the orders and is already an enemy of law and order and should be treated with upon that basis.

Get in the line of civic progress. It is contagious.

Who ever expected Maine to do other than go republican?

This week winds up the business of party primaries all over the nation. Politicians will now quit fighting inside their respective parties and from now on it will be party fighting.

There were two robberies and a shooting scrape at Eastland last Friday. The robbers were captured. One is a woman and another is C. C. Mims of Fort Worth who confesses that he was one of the three who robbed the Graham bank several days ago.

The investigation of the Cox charges that the republican campaign managers were raising an immense fund to buy the presidency have been established by republican witnesses. The plan was to levy quotas on cities and counties and it seems most of the funds have come from the steel corporation and other big business concerns. That is getting back to the old time custom of tying the hands and feet of the president.

With a long stretch of open, warm weather there will yet be lots of cotton made and fall gardens are producing.

The Great Dallas Fair.

The Dallas State Fair was established 34 years ago. The gates were first thrown open on October 26, 1886, and it has been the Texas State Fair and Dallas Exposition every year since then. Gov. John Ireland of Texas and Mayor Henry Brown of Dallas formally opened the institution and it has fallen to every governor of the state since that time to proclaim the opening event.

From a small beginning the fair has grown to greatness in all departments and has proven a developer in popular education and in agriculture, livestock, invention and



the dissemination of social, industrial and economical life of the whole state.

Mexico is sending a large exhibit of agriculture and mineral wealth in charge of Luis Lupian, representing Gen. J. B. Trevino of the department of commerce. It is expected that 500 prominent Mexican business men will visit the Fair and cultivate friendly relations with our people.

The greatest showing of cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry will be on exhibition and every kind of machinery will be there. There will be 6,000 chickens and other fowls and farm products from all over Texas. Special railroad rates will induce a great attendance Oct. 9 to 24.

Martial Law to End at Galveston.

Gov. Hobby has announced an agreement with Galveston to withdraw the troops from that city and to declare martial law at an end on Sept. 30. He will send Rangers there to co-operate with the civil authorities in maintaining order and keeping the port open.

The sending there of soldiers has resulted in protecting laborers against the strikers and kept seagoing freight traffic from stagnation. Now the city authorities agree to enforce the law and save the traffic situation.

In terminating martial rule the governor says the freight congestion has been relieved and the strikers have been controlled and unless the Rangers and the police keep the business going and enforce the law the state will take hold again.

We notice all the Neff papers are using a question and answer squib in their editorial columns regarding Neff's age, without giving each other due credit for the item. Perhaps this is a furtherance of the land plank idea.—Taylor County Times.

Nobody knows exactly Pat's age any more than they know Joe's home. Those questions had no effect on the election. Nor did Neff's land plank cut much ice. People voted for Neff in spite of his land plank just as some voted for Bailey in spite of his attitude on prohibition and woman suffrage. It was Bailey's attitude toward the democratic administration that did the work.

West Texas now shows just how she suffered from the three years' drought that spread over that section a few years ago. West Texas has had her natural growth as has other sections. In many places now when the census figures are announced, these small towns and in many cases counties, show a decrease in population within the past ten-year period. The census, like the call of the bank examiner, always comes at the wrong time, when matters are at the low ebb. If the census of West Texas could be taken next year, a substantial growth would be shown all along the line, for never before have they been in clover as they are now.—Richardson Echo.

Even now a thorough count of the people would show far more than 9,003 in Scurry county. In fact it is believed there were more in the first of this year. The supervisor tried to get somebody to take the county census and no one wanted the job. Finally Col. Wilmett got a few enumerators and the extended time limit was then too short for thorough work and possibly several hundred were not counted.

Now that civic improvement is under way why not carry it to the building of sidewalks, taking special care of the thoroughfare to the Santa Fe and take steps to provide for a city park centrally located.

Hod carriers in Amarillo, getting \$7.50 a day and common laborers getting \$6.50 demanded a dollar raise. The builders refused to pay it.

The Signal has for a long time had in mind a first class block of land suitable for a city park and that land can be gotten for such a purpose if we don't wait too long.

The Signal has on hand about two columns of republican dope, edited presumably by J. A. Arnold of the party council, in which under subheads it tells us that Titus county is active for the republican ticket. In Navarro "Bailey men and republicans co-operating." "West Texas wants Culbertson" and wisdom like that, and maybe they think it so, but our faith in the solid democracy of Texas is unshaken.

The legislature of Connecticut took up the woman suffrage amendment early last week and ratified it by a unanimous vote in the senate and 116 to 44 in the house. Now, the Tennessee anti's will have to quit.

Lubbock, Plainview and Clarendon and Canyon and a few other plains towns pulled off successful county fairs this fall.

Announcement is made that Joe Bailey is to locate in Dallas to practice law and will establish a weekly newspaper in Fort Worth to teach democracy to the people of Texas. Bob Barker is to be manager of the publication, but no statement is made as to the part Luther Nickles is to play in the game.

If Ed Fischer knew from telepathy that an explosion would occur in New York on a certain day he must surely know in the same way who would bring it about.

If the Signal could afford to use up its space and labor to print all the political matter now coming in it would be interesting reading for some of the people, but there would be room in the paper for very little else. Our desk is well piled with dope from both democratic and republican headquarters but there seems to be no appropriation to pay for its publication and necessarily it must be thrown aside.

A public park would prove a boon to all the people alike. A way is opening for the getting of a city park that will be a source of pride and pleasure to present and future generations.

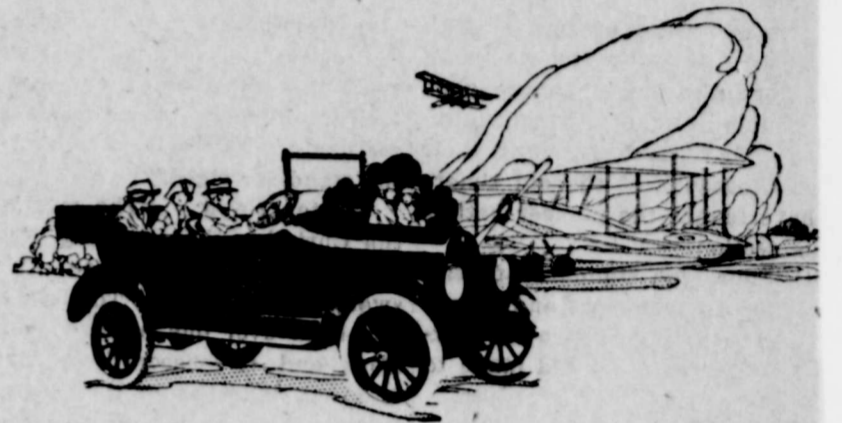

Democratic State Convention Pro-mulgates Platform.

Mr. Neff's land plank was not embodied in the democratic platform adopted last week in Fort Worth. There was no effort to bring it in. Mr. Neff said himself that he would not insist; in fact, he said in the outset that he has never thought it right for the nominee for governor to dictate the platform. That is the business of the convention and he took no part in framing that document.

So far as the land plank is concerned, Mr. Neff's ideas on that line are in harmony with the policies of Gov. Hogg and other statesmen, that non-residents should not be protected and made rich by the enhancement of land values by actual citizens while they hold their lands for speculation.

The convention in Fort Worth made a progressive and commendable platform. The only fight that came up was over the matter of establishing a West Texas A. & M. college. Delegates from the west fought solidly for such an enterprise. Our Judge Rosser made a strong speech in favor of it. Fort Worth's delegates favored it and Judge R. V. Davidson of Dallas did what he could, but South and East Texas wants everything located in their part of the country, and they outvoted our delegates. So long as West Texas is handicapped by unfair representation those sections will always outvote us. They would have millions expended to build up state institutions there and call on West Texas to furnish the taxes to do it.

Scurry County Baptist Association.

The last meeting of our association, which was held at Dunn last week, was possibly the greatest session of the association ever held. For several years the conditions have been such that but few people could attend and but little interest was taken. But from the very first service the interest was fine and the attendance large.

All the churches of the association but one were represented, both by letters and messengers, and the local attendance was very large. Quite a number of visitors were present, among them being C. E. Ball, Rev. Shepherd, Sam Malone, and others.

The session opened Thursday night with a sermon delivered by Rev. Shepherd of Abilene. His subject was "The Eagle-Winged Life." The business session opened Friday morning. The moderator preached Friday night, at the request of the committee and association, on the subject "Why I'm a Missionary Baptist." The message was heard by a great number of people. McGaha delivered a great message Saturday morning, which was heard and appreciated by many. Rev. Green of Lorraine delivered a fine message Friday morning.

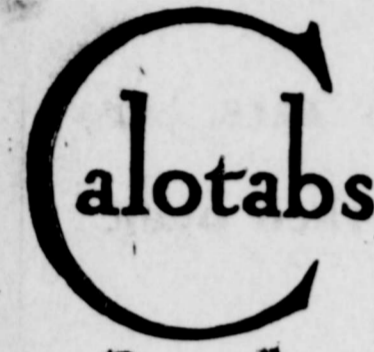

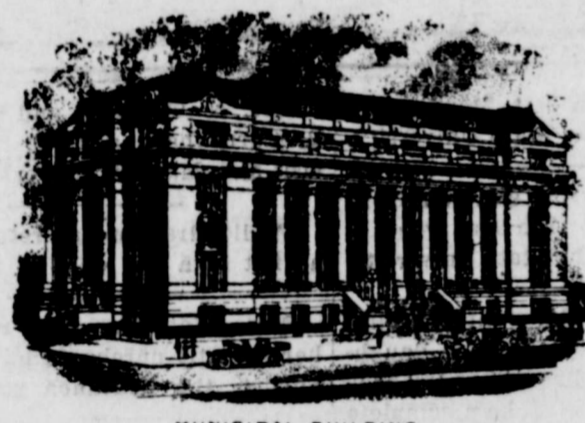
