## ANY FARMERS CASH THEIR TURKERS AND THUS BRACE UP COTTON LOSSES

In the midst of the prevailing low price of cotton we are all inclined to be discouraged, especially about the future which is calculated to cause our remuneration just now. But there is a bright side to all dark clouds and the sun is bound to shine on the other side of the ether. For instance the farmers who have Turkey chickens, eggs, etc., for sale indeed fortunate for it seems with no great effort those things can be had in great abundance around the barn and it is an important fact from the following figures that it does pay and that the raising of Turkeys, chickens and eggs is a very pleasant oasis in the midst of prevailing conditions. We are very much surprised when we learned that the White Produce Company of which R. L. Terry is manager, had bought and shipped out turkey county in the past 10 days 33.68 worth of Turkeys and they are due to come in daily. We give a few names below who marketed Turkeys in those ten days: J. T. Adell \$205.16, J. E. Jones 0.14, E. A. Birdwell \$212.00, E. Everts \$187.92, Mrs. Mary Adams \$109.40, Andy Trevey \$93.60, A. Grant \$79.68. This is only a few who have realized off of their keys. Let's raise more of this kind of stuff so that we can add more names to the list who have become independent of cotton and see the dawning of a new era on the farm.

### LOW, SOW, HEN VS. COTTON.

Perhaps the best thing to do about cotton growing is to quit it as much as possible, and in most cases that depends on what the farmer wills to do in the matter.

The experience of the exclusive cotton grower is that of a hard time. He is loaded with mortgages from year to year. Heavy debts weight him down from the time he begins to prepare his land for a crop until the crop is harvested and then if he lacks even he is fortunate. There have been a few exceptions to the rule, but seldom when conditions generally are normal. The only independent farmer is he who raises his own living and does not have to rely on it.

A fine combination is that suggested by the Pairs News of the cow, pig and hen. That paper makes the assertion that these three will yield much more revenue as cotton does and will assist in growing just as much cotton on half the acreage now devoted to it. "That is trite," says the Pairs News, "and has been said so many times, everyone grows weary when they hear it. But occasionally some one acts upon it and that makes constant reiteration worth while.

How many farmers are trying to double the yield of cotton and cut the acreage half in two? That very thing can be done and is done in board county, but it's not general. With less risk, and a stronger guarantee of increased revenue the cow, pig and hen can be more safely relied upon than can the cotton patch, for with the proper attention these will pay 100 per cent profit, and that beats cotton.

The remarks of the Paris News on the subject calls forth these words from State Press of the Dallas News: "Cow, sow and Hen compose a firm that can make any Texas farm owner rich if he will give them a fair chance to thrive. The trouble with that firm's popularity in most parts of the South is that the members of it require a good deal of waiting on and considerable care and patience in handling. This is objectionable to many of our very best people. They prefer to give their land to a hit or miss tenant to raise a crop of cotton on. There is no use in quarreling with this condition. It was inherited and is all but ineradicable. Meat and bread and butter crops are grown throughout the world by high-class labor accustomed to good-living standards. Cotton is grown throughout the world by Hindus in India, fellahs in

Egypt, coolies in China—and American citizens in the United States. This means precisely that American cotton farmers, producing a world staple, have to compete with the cheapest labor on earth, whether as meat and bread and butter farmers compete with the higher priced labor of earth. Is it any wonder that very often our cotton raisers are reduced to poverty? Can our cotton growers, competing with the pauper labor of Asia, afford to buy their foodstuffs? They can not. And that's all there is to it."

### BLANTON WILL FIGHT ANY SALARY RAISE

Washington, Nov. 25.—Talk of raising the salary of senators and congressmen is again being heard here. At present the salary is \$7,500. The talk is that this will be raised to \$10,000 or \$12,500.

It is no secret that senators and congressmen, unless they had other sources of income, have found it difficult to live in Washington on the salary now received.

Bound up with the gossip of increased pay is the question of cutting down the present membership. The house membership is now 435 and if the apportionment is not changed it is likely that there will be more than 500 members in the 68th congress, which convenes in 1923. This would not only make necessary an enlargement of the house chamber, which will be a difficult architectural feat, but it will also require the enlargement of the house office building at a cost of approximately \$2,000,000.

The first congressman to announce that he would fight an increase in his own pay is Representative Thomas L. Blanton of Texas, who says his present pay is large enough.

### NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

McCallum of Amarillo, who has just returned from a meeting of the executive committee held at Abilene, in the Church of Heavenly Rest. Besides himself Mrs. R. C. Ledford, representing the woman's auxiliary, and Will Stith of Abilene were present. Several resolutions were passed and the one of the campaign threshed out. Mr. McCallum spoke twice there, in the morning giving a general outline of the movement, and in the evening on parish organization. A great deal of interest was evidenced.

The canvass this year will be in general a renewal of the pledges made last year, but it is hoped that Mrs. A. Fredeck of Abilene is here to attend her mother, Mrs. J. W. Massey, who is reported quite sick. The year's education in giving will bear fruits in increased pledges, since the diocese last year went only seven per cent its assigned quota. The date set for the every member canvass is Nov. 21. It is therefore hoped that by December 1, this phase of the campaign will have been completed throughout the diocese. ### EVANGELIST CLYDE LEE FIFE ARRIVES THURSDAY

His Family Accompanying Him to Begin His Work for the Community of Snyder. Preaches Opening Sermon Sunday at 11 a. m.

Evangelist Clyde Lee Fife wired Snyder that he will arrive Thursday morning via Sweetwater, having come out of St. Louis on the Sunshine Special Tuesday evening.

Closing his campaign in Texhoma, Okla., on Sunday, the evangelist will have been constantly on the trains since Sunday night at eleven. He met his family in Illinois and is coming direct to Snyder.

The noted evangelist greatly appreciated the message sent Sunday by his friends in Snyder saying that he would be joyfully received here to his new work and home.

Dr. Fife comes to Snyder with seven years of unbroken success in Union Evangelistic campaigns in all parts of America. In single sermons he has preached to over one million people, in his combined audiences, and added thousands to all religious bodies. He comes here with an eye ointment to the upbuilding of the Kingdom of God in the larger sense of that term and to have some home life with his family.

The opening sermon on Sunday morning by the evangelist will be "The Atonement of our Lord—He Took My Place." And at night a ringing appeal for better conditions in the homes entitled: "Six Sins of Society and the Better Way." A large chorus choir will be organized and drilled under the personal direction of the evangelist who will sing also a special soul saving song at each service. After seventeen years preaching and singing on the road, his voice is sweeter and better than ever.

The report of State Treasurer John W. Barker, shows that at the close of the fiscal year, ending Aug. 31, 1920, there was a balance of \$8,840,768 to the credit of general revenue which is the highest in the history of the state. Also school bonds to the credit of the permanent school fund increased more than \$3,000,000 during the last two years. The available school fund amounts to \$1,713,817, which is much in excess of any balance ever held by that fund at the close of the fiscal year.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 22.—Governor Hobby today issued a proclamation designating Saturday, Dec. 11, as Cotton Reduction Day in Texas. He invites the attention of those engaged in the growing of cotton to the reasons that may be set forth for the limiting of the acreage to be planted in cotton next year.

Governor Hobby recommends that the County Judge and Commissioners' Court of each county take charge of this matter; that they bring it before their citizens in such manner and take such steps as are deemed necessary to meet the situation that confronts the cotton growing industry.
