HEAD OF FAMILY GETS \$2,000 EXEMPTION.

Two Hundred Dollar Exemption Allowed for Dependents Under 18, or Incapable of Self-Support.

Single persons, though required to file a return if their net income for 1920 was \$1,000 or more, are, if they are the heads of families, granted a special exemption under the revenue laws. Such a person is defined by treasury regulations as "a person who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation."

A married person living with husband and wife can not claim an additional \$2,000 exemption as the head of a family. His or her exemption is based upon the marital status, irrespective of the support of others living in the same household. The additional \$200 credit for dependents does not apply to the husband or wife of a taxpayer. For example, if a married man supports a father who is incapable of self-support, he is entitled to the \$200 credit for such person. If through force of circumstances he supports his wife away from home he is entitled to the \$2,000 exemption allowed a married person, but not to a \$200 credit for a dependent.

A son who has left home but who sends his mother more than one-half the sum required for her support is entitled to the \$200 credit, provided the mother can not support herself. Otherwise, the amount must be considered as a gift, and, therefore, the credit is not allowed. A son living at home and supporting his father, mother, or other relative may claim the \$2,000 exemption allowed the head of a family but not the \$200 credit unless such relative is under 18 years of age or incapable of self support.

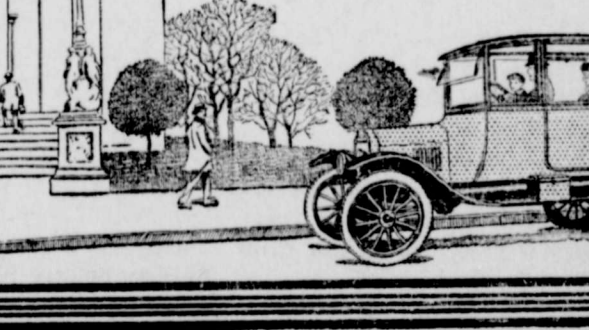

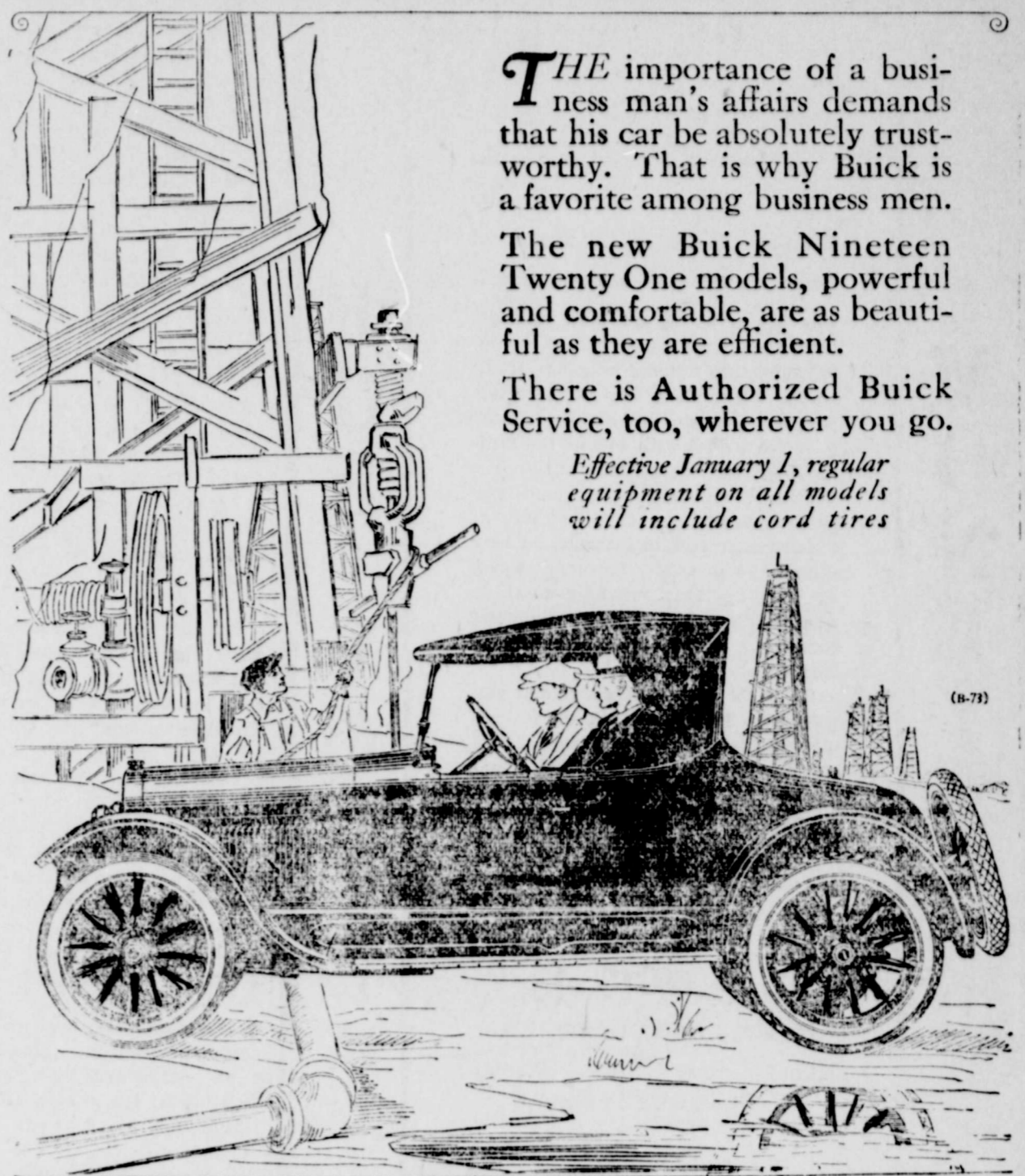

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of said Sanitary officer to make a bond in the sum of \$500.00 payable to the Mayor of the City of Snyder or his successors in office as a guarantee of good faith and proper performance of the duties of said Sanitary Officer.

Section 7. The foregoing ordinance and the provisions therein shall apply only to the property of residents or the tenants thereof with in the duly prescribed limits of the City of Snyder, Texas.

Sec. 8. All dead animals found within the City limits are to be cremated by said Sanitary Officer. Said Sanitary officer to receive the following fees for such service: Cows, horse, mule or other animal in same weight class, \$5.00 each. Pigs 50 cents each. Dogs 50 cents each. Cats, fowls or other smaller animals, 25 cents each. In each case the owner of said animal shall pay said fee or fees and his refusal to do so shall subject he or she to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 in each instance. The collection of these fees to be made by said Sanitary Officer and he report collections and refusals to the City Council. The council to retain 50 per cent of all such fees collected.

Section 9. Said Sanitary Officer shall empty trash cans from sidewalks once each week taking said contents to proper place of disposal. To receive from the City a fee of \$4.00 per month each month.

Sec. 10. Said sanitary Officer is to remove debris from the rear of business houses and receive from the occupant thereof a fee of \$1.00 per wagon bed load, and a fee of 50 cents for one-half wagon bed load or 25 cents for a less amount.

This ordinance shall be come effective from and after its passage and publication.

The following ordinance was introduced, read and adopted.

An ordinance creating the office of Policeman, His Duties and Compensations.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Snyder, Texas: That from and after the passage and publication of this Ordinance that:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Snyder, Texas, is hereby empowered to create the office of Policeman, and may use its own discretion in making such appointment, and at such times as said Council may deem such officer a necessity.

Section 2. The duties and authority of said Police Officer shall be as those of the City Marshal, however said policeman shall be under the direction and supervision of the said City Council or City Marshal.

Sec. 3. The person selected as such Police Officer must make a deposit with the Mayor a good and sufficient bond in the sum of One Thousand Dollars payable to the City of Snyder, for the faithful performance of his duties as such Police Officer.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the City Council to designate from time to time compensation for such services to said officer that will meet with the approval of the City Council and said officer.

This ordinance shall become effective after its passage and publication.

The City council met in call session at the City Hall on the evening of Jan. 11, 1921, with Mayor M. A. Fuller presiding, other officers present were Marshall O. P. Wolfe, and Aldermen W. M. Morrow, T. J. Blackburn, J. K. Blackard and H. L. Davis.

The Secretary was instructed to release bond of Arthur Brooks.

The following ordinance was introduced and read, and adopted.

An Ordinance Creating the office of Sanitary Officer, his duties, compensation for service and penalty for the violation or failure to comply with said ordinance:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Snyder, Texas: That from and after the passage of this ordinance that:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the City Council of the City of Snyder, Texas, to appoint a Sanitary officer whose duties shall be to personally remove or superintend the removal of all night-soil, garbage or other matter that may collect from time to time in the various and sundry privies and closets not connected with the City Sewerage system.

Sec. 2. That such removal shall be made at least once each month

and between the hours of sundown and sun-up and with as small disturbance and in as sanitary manner as possible. Said Night Soil, garbage or other matter shall at once and during the hours of between sundown and sun-up be carried to the City Incinerator plant and there disposed of in the regulated manner.

Sec. 3. That the said Sanitary officer shall have the right and may collect an amount not exceeding the sum of 50 cents for each and every closet or privy so cleaned during each 30 day period and said sum of 50 cents shall be retained by said Sanitary officer for his services.

Sec. 4. That each and every property owner or tenant who has received this service shall be required to regularly pay for said services as stated in Section 3 of this ordinance and failing to do so shall be subjected to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each and every offense.

Sec. 5. That it shall be the duty of said Sanitary officer to regularly report at least once in each month to the City Council in regular session any failure upon the part of any property owner or tenant to comply with the prompt payment of said sum of 50 cents for each and every closet cleaned, used by said property owner

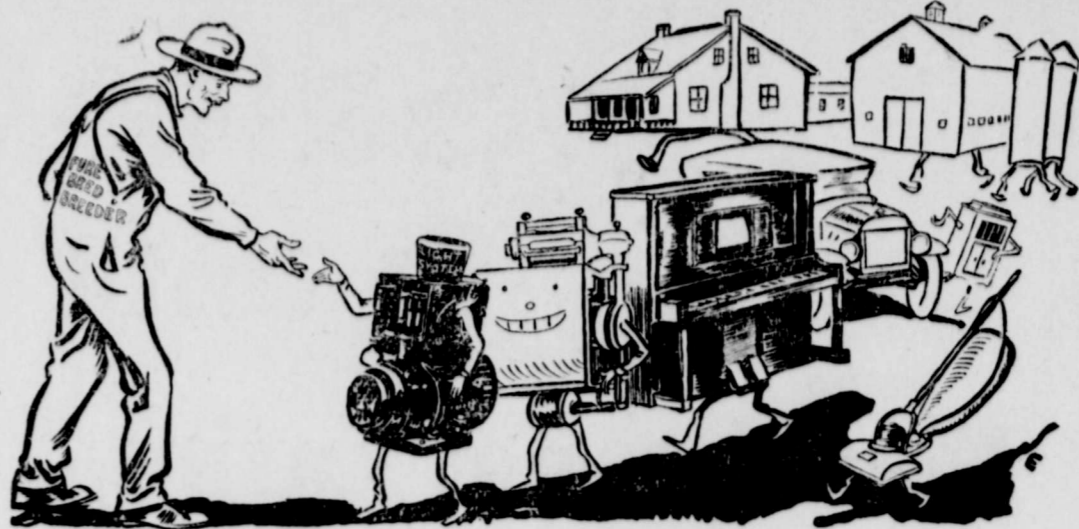



Notice of Election, School District No. 8.

The State of Texas, County of Scurry.

Whereas, on the 13th day of Jan., 1921, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common County Line School District No. 8 of Scurry and Mitchell Counties, Texas, on the question of issuing bonds to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building and equipping wooden school building and authorizing a tax upon

all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity, and

It appearing that said petition bears the requisite number of signatures of qualified property tax-paying voters of said district and is in every respect in conformity with the law and

It further appearing that said Common County Line School District No. 8 has been heretofore prop-

erly established in accordance with Section 50a, Chapter 100, Acts of the Regular Session of the Thirty-Second Legislature, as amended by the Thirty-Fifth Legislature, as follows:

1. By the Board of County School Trustees of Scurry County on the 18th day of Dec., 1920, which order is of record in Book 1, pages 24 of the Record of School Districts for said County.

2. By the Board of County School Trustees of Mitchell County on the 18th day of Dec., 1920, which order is of record in Book 1, pages 39 of the Record of School Districts for said County.

It further appearing that each order of said boards of County School trustees designates and names the County of Scurry to manage and have control of the public schools in said district; and

It further appearing that said Common County Line School District as so established contains an area of 21 14-19 square miles, and that no other district has been reduced in area below nine square miles by reason of the creation of this district; and

It further appearing that said district does not embrace any territory that was taken from any other school district (either common or independent) that had an outstanding issue of bonds at the date of such inclusion in this district.

Now, therefore, I, Horace Holley, in my capacity as County Judge of Scurry County, Texas, do hereby order an election to be held on the 5th day of Feb., 1921, at the School House in said Common County Line School District No. 8 as established by order of the Board of County School Trustees of Scurry County on the 18th day of Dec., 1920, which is recorded in Book 1, pages 24, of the Record of School Districts of said County, and by order of the Board of County School Trustees of Mitchell County on the 18th day of Dec., 1920, which is recorded in Book 1, pages 39, of the Record of School

Districts of said County, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said Common County Line School District in the amount of \$2,000.00, the bonds to be of the denomination of \$200.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 10, both inclusive, payable 20 years from their date, with option of redemption at any time after five years from their date and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building and equipping a wooden school building and to determine whether the Commissioners Courts of Scurry and Mitchell Counties shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property within said district situated within the respective counties sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

S. L. Brown is hereby appointed presiding officer or said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioners Court of this County, as is required by law for holding a general election.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of the Counties of Scurry and Mitchell, and who are resident property tax-payers in Common County Line School District No. 8 of the Counties of Scurry and Mitchell shall be entitled to vote at said election and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words

"For the Bonds."
And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words
