SNYDER UTILISES SO. IMPROVEMENTS

A new Bessemer twin cylinder 185 horse power engine, was put into regular service last week by the local electric power, light and ice company. The engine installed about a year ago was the same make and half the size of the one started last week. This latter engine has been operated on an average of between 18 and 20 hours per day since being put in operation.

We have had electric service for a number of years, the service running from good to very poor. Quite a bit of money was put into the business in some way or another it was not a paying proposition and was fast depreciating as different managements took charge.

The present principal owners, Messrs. D. P. Yoder and W. B. McCormick, are putting their full time to the operation and care of the business. Mr. Yoder the president and manager, has had nearly twenty years experience in operating and setting engines and has been in this kind of business for a number of years. We have had practically uninterrupted service now for over a year and as this last engine replaces the only engine the plant had up to January of last year, the prospects for continued good service are the best we have ever had.

Mr. McCormick has spent practically all his life in the telephone business and takes care of the connection work, house wiring, and the work in which he finds use for electrically all his past experience. These men have expended something like \$30,000 in repairs and new machinery, including wire and poles extensions. The town is pretty well covered though widely scattered. Their efforts have been appreciated as shown by the fact that their business has more than doubled in receipts for current and the number of connections which is nearly as shown nearly the same increase. They furnish the power for operating meat markets, garages, news-ers, X-Ray machine, dentists machinery, carbonators, blacksmith shop and chop mill and many others. The ice is made from pure well water 180 feet deep. The output of 90 tons last year was less than half capacity of the ice plant, but was on account of power. The ice plant will be driven by motor this year and the outfit will be more than paid for.

We were fortunate in not having a shortage of ice last year in later as far as local demand was concerned. Shipments were made to this plant to Slaton and several to Post.

Plans for further improvement include a new power house and a large storage which will probably be in next fall and winter.

They maintain an uptown office at Mrs. W. B. McCormick is book-keeper.

C. OF C. MAKES TRIP TO DUNN

Twenty-six members of the Scurry county Chamber of Commerce made a trip to Dunn Friday afternoon in the interests of the extension work of the Chamber. After a general visit with the Dun Merchants and hello all around the delegation met the boys and girls at the school house and proceeded with the program of the afternoon.

Mr. J. C. Beakley assisted by Prof. Maples of the Dunn school had already been at work among the boys and girls and had the situation well in hand. PRODUCE MARKET IN SNYDER ON INCREASE

Snyder marketed 85,000 eggs, 3000 pounds of cream and several hundred pounds of live poultry for the week ending March 12th, produce that sold for considerably more than \$3,000.00. This is perhaps one of the largest weeks in the history of the produce business in Snyder and it is still growing by leaps and bounds. The Chamber of Commerce hopes to see these figures grow until before the year is out our market will be absorbing many times this amount. Figuring cotton on the basis of an average value of \$30.00 per bale this past week's sales of poultry and dairy products represents more than 100 bales of cotton. It is true these eggs, cream and poultry sales were made up of small amounts but they were not 12 months in the making and did not represent near the effort nor sacrifice that 100 bales of cotton did.

People are always hungry and there is always a market for something to eat. Get your good milk cows in good working order and make them pay their way; if they don't get rid of them and get cows that will sell cream and feed the skim milk to the pigs and chickens, set every incubator and hen on the place and cover the farm with chickens and turkeys. One man now milking 9 cows near Snyder is selling over \$100.00 worth of cream a month—his hogs are enjoying life on skim milk. Another man with about 450 leghorn hens is netting around \$70 per month from his eggs alone and is buying feed for them at the rate of \$50.00 per month. There isn't a half section of cotton land in Scurry county that will average this return over any five year period.

SIGNAL MAN AT DUNN THIS WEEK

A Signal reporter went with the Chamber of Commerce to Dunn last Friday to meet the good people there and talk about certain industrial and economic matters as are guaranteed to come in as real producers. The themes of these fellows were social and commercial co-operation and the value to all of us in the extension and co-operation in hog and poultry raising and greater interest in dairying.

Farming operations are waking up along the way and a few fields of left over cotton is still in sight. Pastures are showing green and blooming orchards are in evidence at every home.

Just a few farmers were in town, Mrs. Brown was in charge of the Beakley store, Blacksmith Jones was sharpening plows. Mr. Worley was found in his store ready to meet all demands. Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Ford have a nice stock of general merchandise and enrolled for the Signal. Mr. D. Olenbusch was interested in the hog and poultry line. He is a new citizen there. Came from South Texas and bought the Kidd farm near Dunn and intends to make it one of the prettiest farms in the county. He subscribed for the Signal.

Col. Beakley was everywhere looking after the business of the visit and lining up the young folks for industrial club work.

At the school Prof. Maples and three other teachers have about 120 pupils attending.

The meeting was held in the school yard and the children gave close attention. They mean business.

The farms about Dunn are already pretty well stocked with good quality chickens, and those people will be ready with some good stuff for the poultry show. Miss Lucile Gabbert has pure blood birds of the Ancona strain. Most of the girls reported Wyandotts, Leghorns and R. I. Reds. "Get it out of your head that anything but the supply and the world's ability to buy fixes the price of cotton."—Dr. Bradford Knight.

The truth about the cotton situation is that there is now enough cotton on hand to last the world for about two years. Every additional bale raised simply makes that much more against the price of cotton already on hand. Cotton is not the only thing our farmers can grow. On the sandy lands plant peanuts and more feed, on the tighter lands plant Sudan grass and more feed. You cannot raise too much produce that can be consumed on the farm. Cotton cannot be eaten nor can it be worn. If you cannot sell your poultry, your eggs, your cream or your hogs and cattle, you can consume at least part or all of them at home. Make up your mind to make your living from something else besides cotton; if you arrange matters on that kind of a basis your cotton crop will be either all profit or all loss.

KILL THE SNAKES.**

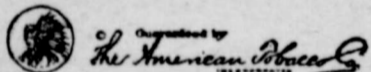

A press dispatch a few days ago said that the national administration will carry out the Wilson policies with no material changes. The only change they are anxious to make is to call the agreement an "association" instead of "League." They all know that the Wilson plans were just and right, and as nearly perfect as could be made at the time. The big thing with them is to keep from giving Wilson and the democratic party credit for it.

Reports from many Sunday schools in Amarillo that they are securing additional quarters because of overcrowded conditions. Indicate the preachers are waging a moral clean up contemporaneously with the city cleanup.—Amarillo Daily Tribune.

It is a good indication when we can have our Sunday schools and church services full. If we could have a moral clean-up the other would come smoothly.

A recent steer feeding test just closed at the experiment station at Spur has attracted wide attention among the cattlemen over the Western part of Texas. It goes to prove that the time is close at hand when the Texas livestock grower will not have to depend on the northern feeder for a market for his unfinished cattle and that he has all of the necessary means at hand to duplicate or even better what the northern buyer has been profiting on. This test was conducted for the purpose of noting just how much corn excelled maize and feterita as a feeding ration for beef cattle. Great was the surprise of the men conducting this feeding test when they found that maize had put on an average of 175.28 pounds at a cost of \$7.50 per hundred weight, feterita 182.64 pounds average at a cost of \$7.50 per hundredweight, while ground corn had only put on 176.91 pounds average at a cost of \$7.93 per hundredweight. A similar test was made fattening lambs and it was found that whereas it cost a little over 12 cents per pound to fatten the lambs on corn, maize and feterita averaged 9c per pound. It commends to look like the west Texas feeder will soon be able to finish his own cattle for the market. With meal and hulls right at our door, big grain crops and hungry cattle, Scurry should be finishing it's own beef for the market.

An almost certain crop for this section is Sudan grass. There is no better feed raised and it makes a big

yield. It makes fine hog and cow pasture. In our section of the state this should be one of the staple crops for forage. Too little attention is being paid to this valuable plant and Scurry county should have a big acreage in his year.

With the splendid season in the ground this spring there is no reason why a big acreage should not be planted to peanuts. In the sandier sections peanuts should be given a thorough try out. Hogs and cattle can not have better feed than this. A few acres of peanuts on each farm will very nearly ensure hog and cow feed for the winter.

COUNTY JUDGE'S ORDER

THE STATE OF TEXAS,
County of Scurry.

Whereas, on the 14th day of Feb. 1921, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School district No. 17, of this county on the question of issuing bonds to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in (a) Building and equipping a school building of wooden material and for the purchase of a site therefore, and authorizing a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity, said petition bearing the requisite number of signatures of property tax paying voters of said district and being in every respect in conformity with law, and,

It further appearing that said common school district No. 17, has been heretofore, on to-wit, the 12th day of August, 1903, properly established in accordance with Article 2817, Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911; and

It further appearing that said district as so established contains an area of more than nine square miles, and that no other district has been reduced in area below nine square miles by reason of the creation of this district; and,

It further appearing that said district No. 17, does not embrace any territory that was taken from any other school district (either common or independent) that had an outstanding issue of bonds at the date of such inclusion in this district;

Now, therefore, I Horace Holley, in my capacity as county judge of Scurry County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on (b) 2nd day of April, 1921, at (c) Ganaway school house, in said Common School District, No. 17, of this county as established by order of the Commissioners' court of the date of 12th day of August, 1903, which is recorded in Book 1, pages 122, of the minutes of said court, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property taxpaying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said common school district in the amount of \$2,000.00 the bonds to be of the denomination of \$200.00 each, numbered consecutively from one to ten, both inclusive, payable with option of payment any time after 5 years, (e) 10 years from their date and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually April 10th, of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in (a) Building and equipping a school Building of Wood-en material and for the purchasing a site therefore, and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this County shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

A. P. Ganaway is hereby appointed election

and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall, within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this county, as is required by law for holding a general election. The ballots for said election shall

have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE BONDS."
"AGAINST THE BONDS."

All persons who are legal qualified voters of this State and of this county and who are resident property taxpayers in said district shall be en-

titled to vote at said election.

The Sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by posting three notices in three public places in the said district for three weeks before the election.

Dated, 8th day of March, 1921.

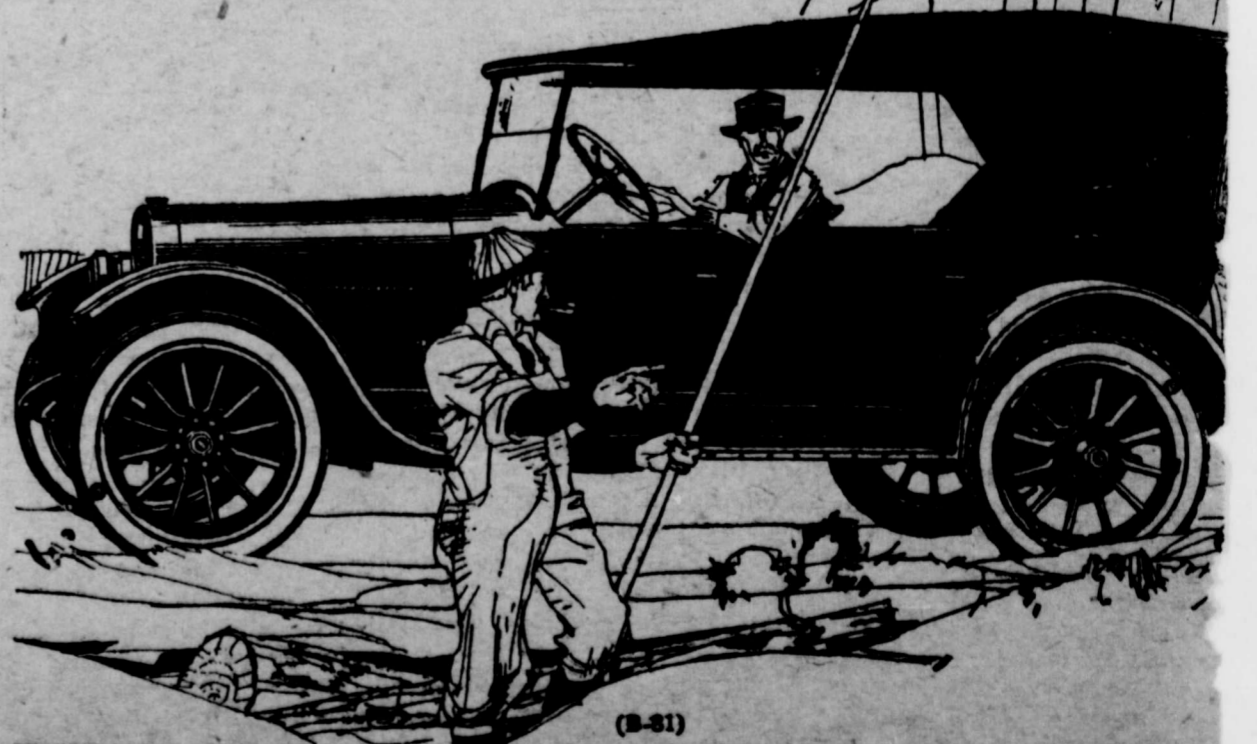

My enemy had recovered from his thrust and was making it extremely interesting for me, so I reluctantly gave my attention to the work in hand, but my mind was not upon the battle.

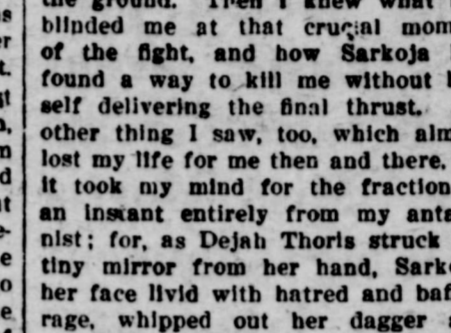
