Cotton cannot be eaten nor can it be worn. If you cannot sell your poultry, your eggs, your cream or your hogs and cattle, you can consume at least part or all of them at home. Make up your mind to make your living from something else besides cotton; if you arrange matters on that kind of a basis your cotton crop will be either all profit or all loss.


