WHAT ONE LITTLE GIRL DID.

Nellie V. McElven in Progressive Farmer.

In February, 1919, my father gave me a sow and nine pigs about two months old.

I sold one of them to buy feed for the others. As they were all registered, I got \$25 for it.

I took the best of care of them, and in the following September I sold them for \$75 each and the sow for \$135. This amounted to \$735. I put \$700 in the bank and kept the other \$35 to buy my winter clothes with.

In January, 1920, I drew out \$150 and bought 50 purebred Brown Leghorn hens and five roosters with \$145 of it. I took the other \$5 and bought my brother a Christmas present; although it was a late one, he said that was all right, that it is not the time it is given or the present that is given—it's the giver.

From my 55 chickens I raised 130 young ones, and sold \$20 worth of eggs for hatching, and \$12 worth on the market. I also gave my relatives and neighbors a good many settings.

I have now with my father's and brother's help 240 chickens, 110 of them laying, and \$580 in the bank. This year I bought a fine Jersey heifer and a kodak with part of the money I saved from my chickens last year.

Girls, get busy. Get your fathers and brothers to help you. They will gladly do it.

MISS RUTH BUCHANAN ON HONOR ROLL OF U. OF T.

Austin, Texas.—Over three hundred students in the College of Arts of the University of Texas attained during the winter term recently ended the high scholastic average entitling them to a place on the honor roll issued by Dean H. Y. Benedict. In constructing this honor list account is taken of the number of courses passed, as well as of the grades made? Score is determined by giving twelve points for an A, nine for a B, six for a C, and three for a D. To be eligible for the honor roll a student is required to have a score of at least 48, except in the case of freshmen, where the minimum is 45. Thus a student taking five courses, which is the average number, should be eligible upon making two A's and three B's, while a student taking only four courses, would be required to make all A's, etc. About sixty students, comprising the highest two per cent, made scores of sixty or over.

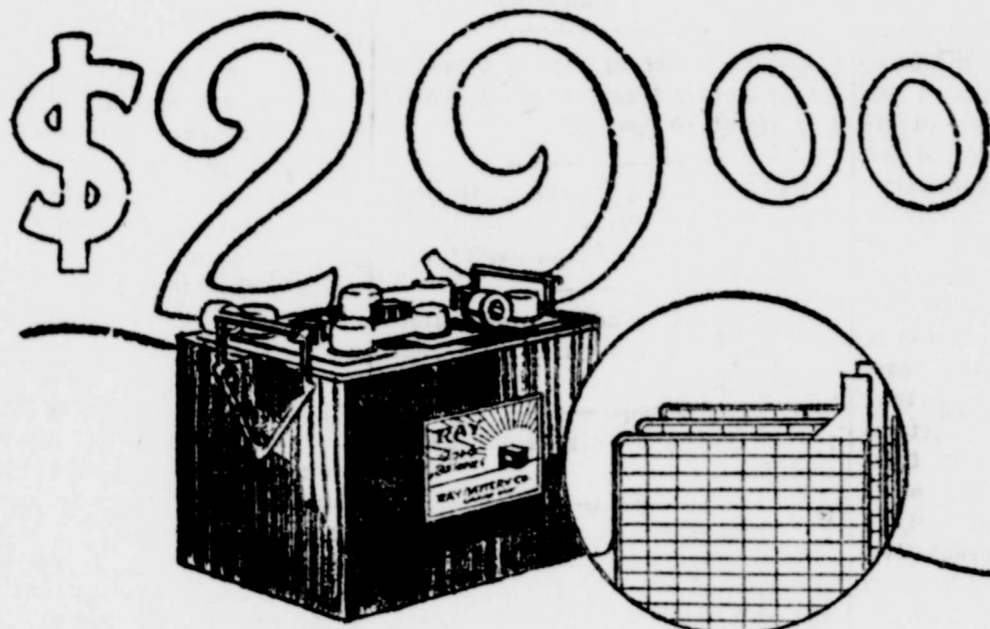

Making Glass of Rice Husks.

County Judge's Order. THE STATE OF TEXAS, County of Scurry.

Whereas, on the 12th day of April 1921, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School district No. 1, of this county on the question of issuing bonds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building and equipping a modern wooden school building and purchasing a site therefor and authorizing a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the principal at maturity; and

It appearing that said petition bears the requisite number of signatures of qualified property tax-paying voters of said district and is in every respect in conformity with the law; and

It further appearing that Scurry County contains a population of 9,971 according to the last United States census; and

It further appearing that said Common School District No. 1 has been heretofore on the 17th day of July,

1919, properly established in accordance with Article 2817, Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911, as amended by Chapter 26, Regular Session 34th Legislature, 1915, and

It further appearing that said district as so established contains an area of 21 square miles and that no other district has been reduced in area below 9 square miles by reason of the creation of this district; and

It further appearing that said district does not embrace any territory that was taken from any other school district (either common or independent) that had an outstanding issue of bonds at the date of such inclusion in this district;

Now, therefore I, Horace Holley, in my capacity as county judge of Scurry county, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 7th day of May, 1921, at Favor school house in said Common school district No. 1, of this county as established by order of the Scurry County Board of Trustees, which is recorded in book 1, pages 22 of school minutes, to determine whether majority of the legally qualified property taxpaying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said common school district in the amount

\$2,000.00, the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 20, both inclusive, payable 20 years from their date, with option of redemption at any time after 5 years from their date and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in a modern wooden school building and purchasing a site therefor, and to determine whether the commissioners' court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

J. W. Squires is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the commissioners' court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and of this county and who are resident property tax-payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the bonds."

The sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by posting three notices in three public places in said district, for three weeks before the election, and is further directed to have said notice of election published for three weeks prior to said election in some news paper of general circulation that has been continuously and regularly published for more than one year previous to the date of this order in Scurry county, Texas, the date of the first publication being not less than twenty-one full days prior to the date of election.
