RURAL SCHOOLS SHOW INCREASE

The scholastics of the Rural schools of the county show a healthy increase over last year, says the county superintendent, Miss Nealey Squyres. The schools in the county have not opened yet on account of the cotton but most of them will begin in Oct. or Nov. Last year there were about 1800 scholastics in the county and this year there are 2004. This is a healthy growth for the rural districts for one year and shows conclusively that conditions in our county are considerably better than previous years.

Besides the increase of pupils over the county several of the districts have voted bonds for the building of new school houses. Bethel, Favor, Gannaway, China Grove, and county Line, have voted bonds for the erection of new buildings. Bethel and China Grove have just about completed their buildings and will be ready for this school term.

Miss Squyres said that all schools had secured their teachers for the coming session and there was an undertone of optimism for all schools regarding the outcome of this year's session.

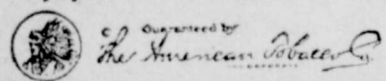

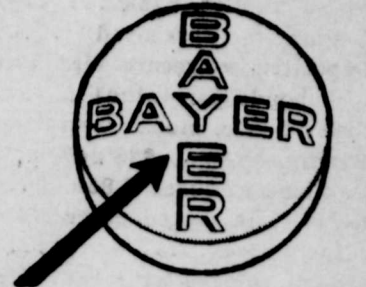
