"Six Cylinder Love" ran for 51 weeks in New York and after that a full season at the New Harris theatre in Chicago. During the last few months it has been produced for the screen.

Practically all of the soils of the southwest are deficient in organic matter," says H. M. Bainer, Director, The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association. Continuing, he says, "New soils are always well supplied with organic matter, but unless provision is made to maintain this supply, it will gradually decrease as the land continues to be worked. In many sections of the southwest, more than fifty per cent of the original organic matter has already been lost.  
"A soil that is well supplied with organic matter will retain more moisture than one where the supply is low, thus tending to carry crops through periods of drouth. Careful determinations show that a pound of organic matter will hold seven and one-half times as much moisture as a pound of sand. Sand will lose its moisture, through evaporation, three and one-half times as fast as organic matter. A clay soil will store about one-fourth as much moisture as organic matter and lose it, through evaporation, twice as fast.  
"Sufficient organic matter improves the physical condition of the soil and makes all tillage operations easier, it also reduces baking, cracking, washing and blowing. Organic matter is food for the indispensable bacteria of the soil, such as those that change over the nitrogen into the available nitrate form. Organic matter and nitrogen go hand in hand and when one is deficient, the same thing is true of the other. A soil is known for its fertility, in proportion to the amount of organic matter and nitrogen it contains. Low wheat yields and poor quality of wheat are, therefore, largely due to a lack of these two elements.  
"Much can be done towards restoring this lost fertility through crop rotation systems that include alfalfa, sweet clover, cow peas and soy beans, and occasionally it is an excellent practice, to plow under such crops, while they are still green. All crop residues, such as straw, stubble and stalks, should be plowed under, rather than burned."

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**THE BOY AND GIRL PROBLEM**

"A girl is at the bottom of every boy's action, be it good or bad," is the statement of Mrs. Eva Belcher, Houston policewoman who handles all the juvenile cases of that city. She says: "The story of Adam and Eve is correct. Most every boy who gets into trouble has been led astray by some girl. Once that pair of brown eyes get fixed on his, and the acquisitive instinct all women possess starts to manifest itself, the poor fellow might just as well sign away the liberty of his own action. He is no longer to be held responsible to anybody, not even himself. The rule works the way around," continued the policewoman. "When a boy is good, do not give him any credit. There is a girl at the bottom of it all. She deserves the credit. Keep the girls right, and the boys will be perfect gentlemen," she concluded.

The boy and girl question is a big question and one that is occupying the minds and commanding the best thought of the best thinkers of this nation. Realizing that our future civilization hinges upon our present generation, and its success and greatness is to be measured by the standard of our boys and girls of today, the importance of the situation has been pressed home to us. It is an undisputed fact that there is an alarming situation existing among our young people to a more or less degree as to their morals. There is a manifest trend toward recklessness and immorality among both the boys and girls, and just how to check same is the question. It seems that home discipline has broken down, and in some quarters the arm of the law has been resorted to as corrective and punitive measures. The Times-editorial writer has some well defined views on the situation. We agree with the statement of the Houston lady in regard to the influence of the girls over the boys, yet we do not advocate a double standard for the sex. Woman has always had the greater shares in molding the character of the race. No nation can rise higher than its womanhood. Civilization is largely in the keeping of our women, and it is with them to lead us to a higher and more noble Christian civilization or sink us lower in the scale of human living. The influence of women upon the male race is great—for better or worse. Give us women of noble character and aspirations and we will have men of the same type.

But the immediate question at issue is the staying of the tide of immorality among the sex, and herein lies the responsibility of the hour. The Times has come to the viewpoint that the boys and girls are not as much to blame as the older ones. We as parents are reaping just as we have sown. Our children are following in our footsteps, and we need not expect them to rise any higher in their ideals than that of their parents. Punitive measures will not check the tendency of the young generation toward reckless living. They must be taught, both by word of mouth and by example lived before them. Like father, like son, like mother, like daughter. Solomon knew what he was talking about when he said: "Bring a child up in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart therefrom."

Each parent must study the child situation from an individual standpoint and undertake to interest them in higher and nobler ideals. Such case is an individual case. No two children in the same home are alike, nor can they be raised alike. We need not turn to the courts nor other extreme measures with the hope of finding a solution for the boy and girl problem. The problem must be worked out individually with more constant thought as to our own living and example set before them. There is a way to reach every boy and girl in this land and to interest them in the higher ideals of life. The change can not be brought about immediately, but must be the result of gradual teaching, training and living before them.

One hopeful sign of the situation is that people are alarmed everywhere and the boy and girl question is being studied with deep earnestness. The pendulum will soon begin to swing the other way. The boys and girls will come through the trials through which they are passing and will eventually reflect credit upon future generations. Let us be patient with them, let us be prayerful. Do not try to drive them, but lead them, gently and lovingly toward the higher ideals of life.

**THE IMMIGRATION SITUATION**

Congress has been having some stormy times over the pending Johnson Immigration Bill. The bill has been passed, protecting the United States against the hordes of aliens that have been pouring in on our shores for so many years. The cause of the immediate discussion was an exclusion clause in the immigration bill in reference to Japan. Japan threatened this country should the bill pass in its present form, and the Senate resenting the interference of Japan voted practically solid against the Japan entrenchment to these matters. After the war a bill passed Congress limiting the immigration to three per cent of their population, and the new bill still lowers the number that can come to this country. We can not place too many restrictions around immigration. For a hundred or more years the United States has been made the dumping ground of the scum of Europe in our too liberal immigration laws. There need be no misunderstanding among American people in these matters. The average physical, mental and moral efficiency of aliens who are arriving in the United States contributes directly to the lowering of the American physical, mental and moral standards. The introduction of aliens in this country the past fifty years has appallingly increased the perplexities of the United States government and of American society. So long as the old American element and people of similar strains were in large majorities, they were able to absorb limited numbers of foreigners. Today through the alarming increase of aliens we the stable elements, custodians of the principles of Democracy, strength and cleanliness upon which this country was founded, find themselves close upon the borderland of the minority. They must and will protect themselves and the priceless heritage which has been committed to their care, in the exclusion of undesirables from the old world.

We have no objection in excluding the Japs and we should exclude all other nationalities of an undesirable nature. No foreigner should ever be allowed to enter this country who can not produce a clean bill of health—as to morality and literary training.

The area of forest land swept by fire each year is about twice the size of the area cut over annually by logging operations, state forestry officials. Records kept by the Forest Service show that an average of 36,000 forest fires occur each year, burning over 11,000,000 acres of land, and causing a loss of \$16,500,000, exclusive of the indirect damage to young growth, watershed protection, animal life, and recreation.

The Universities are setting a fast pace for our public schools in way of athletics. We begin our school term with football, then basketball, then baseball, etc. It is one continuous round of athletics from the time the boy enters school in the fall until he gets his books and hurries home in the spring. Honest, don't you think we are going too strong on athletics? In the old days gone forever we played town ball at recess and noon, and if there was any athletic training it was done at home. Are we turning out any better scholars today than we did 25 years ago? We think not. Again referring to athletics, won't some one figure in dollars and cents just what athletics in our public schools is costing the taxpayers of this nation? The cost would be staggering if time was kept track of.

Hon. W. C. Edwards, candidate for Lieutenant Governor of Texas, and editor and publisher of the Denton Record-Chronicle, paid Snyder a very appreciative visit last Saturday. He came down from the Plains where he made partial canvass of that section. Mr. Edwards has lived in Denton county 40 odd years and comes with the solid endorsement of the people of that county. He is a member of the House and has made a very useful public servant. He spent Saturday afternoon here meeting old time Denton county friends and making new ones. The Times editor has known Will Edwards for 25 years and know him to be a man of splendid qualifications and reputation and quite capable of serving the people of Texas as Lieutenant Governor. He is opposed by Barry Miller of Dallas, a former leader of the anti-liquor ring of Texas. Two years ago Miller was repudiated in Dallas county in his political aspirations. He has very little if any following in West Texas, and if Edwards can beat him throughout the State with overwhelming majorities then he should take out. The Times is unqualifiedly for Edwards for Lieutenant Governor and predict for him a brilliant majority at the polls in the July primaries.

**DEPARTMENT OF LABOR TO FURNISH FARM LABOR**

Larger usefulness to the people of the State, especially to wheat growers and cotton farmers and to laborers in need of employment, is the aim of the State Department of Labor in formulating plans for an efficient and economic distribution of labor to

meet the emergency demands that are sure to arise in connection with the wheat and cotton harvests during the coming summer and fall. Profiting by the experiences of last year, when the Department rendered much helpful service to the farmers during the wheat harvest and cotton picking season, the work of labor distribution will be organized upon a larger basis, according to Joseph S. Myers, State Labor Commissioner. Last season free employment offices were established by the Department in San Antonio, Laredo and El Paso for the purpose of supplying information to the large number of farm laborers originating at those points and directing their movement other sections of the State where acute shortages of labor, especially farm labor, existed. Offices also were maintained at Waco, Dallas and Fort Worth to act as distribution centers for this surplus labor. The results were so gratifying, the assistance rendered was so timely and helpful and the work was accomplished so economically that Commissioner Myers feels warranted in organizing the work for the forthcoming season upon a much more comprehensive scale, he said.

During a recent visit to the Panhandle section of the State the Labor Commissioner held conferences with officials of the Panhandle Wheat Growers Association looking to perfecting plans for supplying the demand for extra labor for the wheat harvest in that section, which usually opens about the middle of June. The tentative plan agreed upon was that these officials are to begin immediately the collection of information as to acreage, condition of crop and prospective yield, location and distance from distribution centers, probable requirements for labor, etc. It is the hope of the wheat growers to enlist the aid of county demonstration agents in collecting such data. This information will in turn be transmitted to the Labor Department, where it will be sorted and systematized. Then, when the harvest opens, the Department will have available information that will enable it to promptly and economically supply the requirements of each individual farmer or of any particular community. Meantime offices will have been opened in those cities of the

State where surplus labor in large quantities originates. This plan, it is believed, when completely worked out, will result in the elimination of much duplication of effort on the part of various agencies, both public and private, and in considerable economy in the item of transportation for laborers. Heretofore lack of definite information has caused considerable confusion in the work of bringing the man and the job together. Frequently laborers have been sent to certain localities upon mere rumors of a demand for workers and upon arrival learned that either the rumor was wholly unfounded or that the requirements for labor were not so great as indicated. Situations of this kind result not only in needless expenditure for transportation but also in loss of time. In an acute situation of labor shortage, such as the saving of a large wheat crop already matured, the loss of time often is disastrous to the producers.

To further obviate these defects in the problem of labor distribution, to make the services of the Department available to a larger number of citizens of the State and to still further promote economy in the whole system of cooperative effort in this regard are the objects sought in plans now being perfected by the Commissioners of Labor.

In order to meet the early demand for farm laborers in all sections of the State a free employment office was opened by the Department in the city of San Antonio more than a month ago. This office is now supplying many laborers to work in the growing crops and will be continued as a nucleus for the establishment of other offices when the larger demand for harvest workers begins.

The work of the Department in the matter of free employment agencies has met with such gratifying success, expressions of appreciation from farmers and other employers, as well as from the workers, have been so general and the service has been administered with such efficiency and economy that Commissioner Myers now has under contemplation a plan for permanently maintaining a number of these agencies. The advantages of a system of free employment agencies, located in various sections of the State, all co-ordinated

and working in complete harmony under the direction of the State Department of Labor, can readily be seen. Approval of the idea has come from many sources. A communication just received by the Department from H. R. Christian, a former director of the United States Employment Service, a man of large experience in labor problems, comments upon the plan in the following language:

"If such offices are established, with the cooperation of the Federal employment service, the Labor Commissioner will constantly be in close touch with labor conditions in other States, as well as know absolutely each day where labor is most needed in this State, and where there is a surplus. Always during the cotton picking season in the South it has been found that about one-third of the surplus labor supply is constantly in transit, one-third waiting to be

employed and one-third at work. This, you can readily see, is a considerable loss of man power. Under the plan suggested all offices would report promptly to the Department the number of applicants for work, the number of positions open, etc. This would enable the Department, as central headquarters, to advise employers promptly where laborers might be procured for any particular class of work, and direct the laborers to such employment as they might desire. The Department could, in fact, act as an efficient clearing house for the whole State in the matter of labor supply, and thus a service could be rendered which the numerous private employment agencies cannot possibly render."

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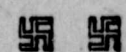

**FORECAST OF 1924 COTTON MARKETS**

Straws denote the way the wind blows and the cotton mills denote the way the prices are going to trend.

During March of this year there were 31,125,000 spindles on an average active as compared to 40,408,000 spindles in March of last year, a decline of 30 per cent according to Government statistics. For the past several months there has been a gradual decrease in spinning with a comparative increase of raw stocks. Somewhere along the line the cotton manufacturers are going to recoup their losses for the past high cotton year and are going to buy cotton for less money than they are paying for it today. If conditions could have only been reversed this year with low spot cotton at this time guaranteeing a smaller acreage there would be sound reason to expect another year of good prices this fall, but if anything like a normal crop matures on the tremendous acreage planted there will be more cussing of cotton this fall than has been heard since 1914 when the bottom dropped out completely. It has taken just ten years for men who swore at that time that they would never plant another acre to forget that they could not sell their crop for even 5c per pound and to lose their minds planting every acre possible to cotton.

**ROBERT E. LEE AND MR. McADOO**

(From Santa Barbara (Cal.) Press)

The insistence of Mr. McAdoo that there was no impropriety in his accepting fat fees for representing law clients before the governmental departments in Washington to which his position of former Secretary of the Treasury gave him access on terms more favorable than those enjoyed by the run of lawyers has recalled the attitude of Robert E. Lee when he was placed in somewhat similar position.

After the close of the Civil War an insurance company offered General Lee a position at what was considered an exceedingly high salary in those days. To this offer General Lee made this reply:

"You do not make this offer for any knowledge I may have of the insurance business. You seek to buy my influence with the people of the South. It is not for sale!"

**PROGRESS OF THE SOIL SURVEY IN TEXAS**

The field work incident to the detailed soil survey of Wichita County was completed this week, and the work of compiling a complete report and map is now in progress. Publication of the report and map will be made by the Bureau of Soils, United States Department of Agriculture, and will require several months. The field work, the mapping and writing of the report have been in charge of W. T. Carter, Jr., Chief of the Division of Soil Survey, Texas Experiment Station, under a cooperative arrangement with the Bureau of Soils. Mr. Carter will turn his attention next to field work in Milam County, Nacogdoches and Hidalgo Counties are also in process of being surveyed.

The soil survey has now been extended to 193 counties in Texas, cov-

detailed survey, the remainder having only been given a reconnaissance survey which serves general purposes where large areas of uniform soils occur until such time as a development of farming activities may call for the more exhaustive detailed survey. This reconnaissance work has been done in the western part of the State and much of the territory will likely not require detailed service for some time yet. Excepting the Trans-Pecos region, the entire western two-thirds of the State, and covering 134 counties, is now surveyed in reconnaissance. Within this area several counties and smaller areas have also had a detailed survey. The unsurveyed counties farther east will, no doubt, be surveyed in detail as rapidly as they can be reached. Reconnaissance surveys would not be very practical in most of these counties owing to their varied soils.

The territory which has, so far, been surveyed in detail, comprises 40 counties and 19 areas in other counties, ranging in extent from 64,000 acres in several cases to \$540,000 acres, as in the case of the Brazoria area which covers nearly all of Brazoria County. The Willis area of 215,000 acres in Montgomery County, surveyed in 1901, was first to receive this service in Texas. Since this time, one to five areas have been completed each year, in some instances as many as four entire counties receiving a detailed survey in a single year. The first reconnaissance survey was made in 1909, covering San Patricio, Nueces, Hidalgo, Cameron, Starr, Duval, Zapata and Webb Counties, an area of 10,759,680 acres. In 1910 two areas were surveyed in reconnaissance, one covering 12 counties in the Central Gulf Coast area and the other covering 26 counties in the Panhandle. Ellis County was also surveyed in detail in 1910, making about 24,000,000 acres surveyed that year, though most of it was only in reconnaissance. This was the largest area surveyed in any one year, though in 1922 when Harris, Reeves, Dickens and Coleman Counties were completed in detail, covering 4,231 acres, and 29 counties in the West Central Texas area comprising 18,000,000 acres were surveyed in reconnaissance, the greatest single year's accomplishments were recorded.
