**BOOM TOWNS AND COUNTRIES**

In the history of all towns and countries there comes to them a period of inflation—or booms as they are commonly called. There are today in some sections of the country booms on that are causing many people to emigrate to those sections. In these booms all classes of citizens are drawn, some that are assets to the country and some that are not. Some come into the country and help develop same and some come to be helped. As a result after a while reaction sets in. Immigration and new money ceases and the country finds a larger population on its hands than it can support. This we might call inflated population. The surplus of population becomes a liability to a country instead of an asset.

Countries and towns can develop too fast. Can put on more population than they can support, and as a result a period of adjustment sets in—adjusting the population to real needs of the country. A town can grow too fast and it can grow too slow. There should be a middle ground, which are populations and enterprises commensurate with the real needs of the community. The town that grows too fast will have to eventually throw off some of its surplus population. The town that fails to add sufficient population to meet the normal demands is handicapped also.

The best way for a town or community to grow is to gradually add such population as it can absorb. A steady, continuous growth for a town is much better than inflated growths. But in the meantime a town or country does not want to be over-conservative in these matters less it fail to grow at all. There should be something doing in the way of town building all the time. When one enterprise is put over another ought to be started, thereby keeping the citizenship occupied and a go-forward effort should be maintained at all times.

Snyder and Scurry county passed its inflated growth years ago and since then it has settled down to a steady growth, adding yearly just such population as the county can absorb and the enterprises it can maintain. Every business concern coming to our town deserves and should have legitimate patronage. To overdo any one line of business is to hurt all lines of business. Therefore no more business concerns should be added than patronage justifies or the population of the town and country can maintain. When we weaken one link in our commercial chain we weaken the entire structure, therefore when one business concern fails of a healthful support it weakens every other business concern in the town.

Touching on Snyder's growth we want to point to the danger of becoming over-conservative in these matters and fail to make forward progress we are entitled to make. Snyder is a rattling good town, but can be made better by well matured plans of civic and commercial progress. We have reached a stage in our history when surrounding conditions which include population and trade territory importance, when we should put forward extra efforts this year to accomplish some worthwhile things in a civic way. The square and principal business streets should be paved before the close of 1924. The point has been reached in our towns history when paving is absolutely necessary. The value of our merchandising storcks around the square demands that paving take place. The convenience of travel and other items of necessity suggest that we should enter a paving program. When once paving has taken place and the people see the importance of same other paving programs will be added. Let the Snyder people get ready to start the paving program. The time has come when this should be done, and to delay it longer will place us in the class of over-conservatives.

Hon. R. C. Crane of Sweetwater was elected President of the West Texas Historical Association at its recent organization meeting. Mrs. Dallas Scarbrough of Abilene was elected treasurer and Rupert Richardson of Abilene, secretary. The purpose of the organization is to take immediate steps looking to preservation of the early history of West Texas. The work of this kind of an association will fill in a much neglected place in West Texas affairs.

**FAITH BUILDS CITIES**

It has been said of Messrs. Anderson and Prichard, owners of the oil corporation by their name, that they came to Colorado as the location for their Texas refinery because of the faith they had in the future of the Mitchell County oil field.—Colorado Record.

Yes, truly cities are built on faith, as well as life itself is built on faith. The citizenship of any individual town must have faith in what they possess in order to impress others. In other words a town must of necessity be first sold to its citizenship. During the Tech contest last year much stress was placed on selling the proposition of locating the school. Through agitation faith was built up in all contesting towns in their chances of getting the school. The reaction in many of the contesting towns after they missed the location hurt to a more or less degree. But its constant faith in our towns that counts and that brings other people to the point where they become impressed with our advantages. If faith is lost sight of in town and individual living all would become stagnated—all would be lost. Colorado is going steadily forward and enjoying a growth second to none in West Texas, and it all can be attributed to the faith the Colorado people have in their town. Of course Colorado has other resources, such as oil field adjacent, but oil fields do not built towns of themselves. The people themselves build towns. No town can become any greater than its people determine to make it. As no stream can rise higher than its source, neither can a town become any greater than its citizens determine to make it. Snyder is enjoying steady growth also, but not in proportion to Colorado, and some of the towns on the Plains. Snyder is perhaps enjoying growth sufficient in some ways and insufficient in other ways. Colorado has put over considerable amount of paving recently which has added materially to the substantial status of the town. Snyder, while now enjoying the beneficial effects of an oil boom, there are many things we could do to better our condition and invite outside confidence and investment in the town. We speak of paving as the present outstanding need of the town. Nothing will add stability to the town like a well defined program of paving. We do not believe in booms for towns and believe that steady growth is the best for any town. There is always a reaction that ultimately follows boomed towns and countries.

May was ushered in with weather disturbances. In many states in the Union cyclones and tornadoes took their toll of human life. Very little wind or hail has visited West Texas so far. On the Plains there were hail storms in stretches of that section that did considerable damage to the wheat.

The political pot is boiling in Texas in regard to national affairs. Governor Neff seems to have stirred up a hornet's nest among the machine leaders and rulers in Texas Democracy. Neff demands that Texas send an uninstruced delegation to the Convention. The McAdoo people, among whom are the old machine guard, is asking for instructions for McAdoo. Governor Neff is independent in Texas politics and does not belong to the political machine and association of political bosses that have dominated Texas politics so long. Once in a great while some independent throws a monkey wrench in the party machine and tears it up. Repairing the machine, they come again. Neff has been on the stump for the past several weeks in the interest of an uninstruced delegation to the National Democratic Convention. He has a large following in Texas, and has stirred the political bosses to renew activities. Neff's position is correct. The country wants neither McAdoo, Underwood nor Smith. There must of necessity be found a man that can occupy middle grounds. There are two extremes in national politics, both with the Democrats and Republicans. One extreme calls themselves Progressive, and the other, Stand-patters. There is a middle ground that must be found. What is known as progressivism in both parties is socialism in disguise. What is known as standpatism is composed of various ideas of government, embraced in which is anti-prohibition, anti-woman suffrage, and anti everything else that leads to advancement. As stated there is of necessity a middle ground on which all can stand. This middle ground is a return to our ancient government ideals, of a government for, by and of the people. We must find a man for President that occupies the middle-ground between these two extremes, and for this reason it seems folly to instruct our delegation for any one of the three announced candidates. Sentiment growing out of McAdoo's blood relation to President Wilson and his administration is practically all that is behind McAdoo.

The army and navy are vieing with each other in long distance flights by balloon and plane. The object is for governmental purposes, for testing air currents and further developing the idea that the flying machine is practical both for defense and offense. The work is hazardous in the extreme, and men are risking their lives daily in these test flights. Just what kind of nerve a man is possessed with that will attempt these risky flying tests is beyond us. It is certainly a state of mind bordering on recklessness when men take their lives in their own hands. It is not for worldly gain in point of pay, but the motive must be to obtain an objective, to follow a course of investigation in a competitive sense.

The present century has seen many changes and general advances along the lines of human voice carrying. The radio coming last has been the most far-reaching advancement in any past period of the world's history.

Indiana sends its governor to the penitentiary for a long term of years and an assessed fine of \$10,000. He got tangled up with Uncle Sam in mail matters. His name is Warren T. McCray. He avows his innocence and goes to serve his long sentence with a satisfied conscience. McCray was a wealthy man when he got mixed up in politics, and now he is just a piece of human wreckage floating on the tide of human affairs. Evidence of wrong doing convicted him. He asserts his good intentions, and there is no one to judge but Him who reads the intents and purposes of a man's heart. Circumstances condemn a man in the eyes of the law and in the opinions of men, but who can look deeper into the human heart? Who can go beyond the surface in these matters? Who can look into the heart and read the mind of man? None save the Creator and Preserver of our souls. It is sad when men high in the council of their fellows are overtaken in crime, or even suspected of wrong doing. We are commanded to avoid the very appearance of wrong doing. Men and women do things through misguided judgment or a lack of proper discretion. With men in public office, when the eyes of the public are turned on them, watching for this or that opportunity to find fault, it is indeed important that they circumspect their every step and action. The past few years one governor after another has been removed from office and in instances prosecuted for wrong doing. There were in every case strong chains of circumstances connecting them with wrong doing, but back of it all were deep animosity on the part of political or private enemies. Politics have become so rotten in America that no sooner a man enter public life than his enemies seek to destroy him. Their destruction is not always the desire to see righteousness prevail but enmity on the part of those who oppose them politically. Men adopt unfair methods in both politics, business and other matters incident to this life. Men cloak themselves in imaginary righteousness, when at the bottom of their hearts enmity is their ruling passion. Oh, that all men could show mercy, and act justly towards their fellows.

Oh, yes, we forgot to add our comment last week on the decision in the Thaw case. Thaw was adjudged sane in one of the New York courts recently. Thaw has been trying to establish his sanity for 18 years. He killed a man named Sanford White for debauching his home, and the wife whom he sought to revenge and protect has hounded him all these many years. Thaw entered the mad house a young man, now he is old and broken. Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw has contested every effort with success Thaw's efforts to establish his sanity. Thaw is wealthy and his former wife is evidently after his property. We have read of mad houses and mad house victims in the far away age of the world, but here in America in the 20th century age we see men robbed of their liberty and allowed to rot in mad houses to satisfy some one's selfish purpose. The wife of Thaw failing to see him convicted for killing the miserable wretch and seducer turned to insanity as a means to get rid of her husband. The usual divorce, but Evelyn Nesbitt did not take advantage of the customary divorce course.

**Denton Publisher Seeks Lieutenant-Governorship**



WILL C. EDWARDS

Denton Editor Who is a Candidate for the Democratic Nomination for Lieutenant-Governor.

Edwards, past president of the Texas Press Association and Texas Daily Press League, came to Denton from Alabama a small boy 41 years ago and has lived there since. He has been connected with the Denton Record-Chronicle since 1896 and has been its publisher since 1899.

In 1922 Edwards' home people drafted him to run for the Legislature—the only public office he has ever held—and this is his first political contest entered voluntarily. He is president of the Denton Chamber of Commerce, served eight years as Democratic County Chairman, two years as State Democratic Executive Committeeman, three years as Red Cross county chairman four years as president of Denton County Texas-Eyes.

Friends say 95 per cent of the Democratic vote of his home county will be cast for Edwards and that he has practically the solid support of Texas newspapermen.

**ACTIVITIES OF TEXAS BAPTISTS**

DALLAS, Texas, April 1.—There are more Baptist schools, and colleges, hospitals and orphanages in the Baptist general Convention of Texas than any other group of Baptists in the world, according to Dr. F. S. Groner, general Secretary of the Convention of Texas. Dr. Groner is directing the spring pay-up drive of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign in which an effort will be made to obtain \$5,000,000 in payment on the pledges which have been made to the denominational work in this state. Four Baptist hospitals are now in operation in Texas, exclusive of the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at El Paso, which belongs to the Home Mission Board. Another Hospital is ready for opening and yet another is in the course of construction. Last year 13,500 patients were treated in the hospitals and \$231,855 worth of charity work was done in these institutions. Including the charity work done by the physicians who assist at the hospitals, the total amount is \$600,000.

The denominational school system in Texas directed by the Baptists from the standpoint of the character of work, the student bodies and the size of the institutions are equaled by no other denominational system, Dr. Groner asserted. Much of the improvement in these institutions has come about during the last four years as a result of the added gifts which have been made possible by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign.

More Baptist preachers and missionaries have gone out from Baylor University at Waco than from any other denominational school.

## What The Acquisition Of The W. B. T. & S. Ry. Means To Us

If the acquisition of one industry can be said to be worth more than another to Beaumont, cost and value considered, it is doubtful if the city has ever been more fortunate than it is at this time. In the immediate prospect of securing, at a not distant date, a new railway outlet, namely, the Waco, Beaumont, Trinity & Sabine, of which Col. R. C. Duff, a former citizen of Beaumont, is president and chief promoter.

Business men and those realizing the need of rail connection with central and north Texas need not be told of the importance of this project. The history of the Santa Fe and its penetration of the timber belt, and subsequent development of the city, proves what such projects mean to the life of a young and growing metropolis. A little over 20 years ago Col. Duff was made president of the Beaumont, Sour Lake & Western railroad. Some said then, as they say now, that Col. Duff was a dreamer, but fortunately, sometimes, the dreams of dreamers come true, and the line was built and is now a part of the famous Gulf Coast lines which give us direct connection with the Gulf seaboard of Mexico, and penetrating rich and lucrative territories in Louisiana.

Col. Duff's latest proposition, and in which all of Beaumont and Jefferson county is interested, is to build a direct line from Beaumont to Waco. The road of which Col. Duff is the head already owns and operates a line from Weldon, in Houston county, to Livingston, in Polk county. His latest proposal, application for the construction of which is now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, and the Texas Railroad Commission at Austin, is for extension of the line from Livingston to Beaumont, thence to Port Arthur and

West Port Arthur, and in this district construct terminals and other facilities in keeping with the importance of the institution.

Other plans contemplate the completion of the line to Waco from Weldon, thus connecting the Beaumont industrial area with central and north Texas by direct route, tapping some of the richest timber, mineral and agricultural districts in the state in line with the development, eliminating long detours now necessary by other lines, dispensing with a freight differential of no mean proportion and in many ways enhancing the prospects of future development along the Beaumont waterway.

The main line of the road from Weldon to Livingston, and the Sabine division from Trinity to Colmesneil, traverse the heart of the yellow pine district of Texas, the principal industry of which is, or was until recently, lumbering. The operation of sawmills have more or less denuded the territory of timber which makes it necessary that agricultural development set in. To encourage this is one of Col. Duff's objects, for he sees in this section great agricultural possibilities in the future. At the same time many miles of the proposed road will penetrate lumber districts yet in their virgin state, and the road will enable sawmills to do for those districts that which they did for districts already exploited. It should be borne in mind that civilization reaps three virgin harvests from the soil; the timber as found in its native state, what minerals underlie and the agricultural harvests which follow.

Part of the extension in question will furnish direct rail connection between the oil fields of Batson, Saratoga and Sour Lake and furnish them a short, direct route to Beaumont

and Port Arthur for the movement of oil, oil well and drilling supplies and machinery. As a consequence it is believed that markets for crude oil at Beaumont and Port Arthur will be

reduced approximately 50 per cent. That part of the line from Beaumont to Port Arthur will serve a pressing need at this time as it will serve a district which has just re-

Honesty of purpose is characteristic of the true professional teacher, who is ever seeking for new ideas that may contribute to the successful accomplishment of his plans.

I am convinced that the public school system, properly administered, is the hope of the nation. It is

I acknowledge the obligation that I owe to the State and to this community for the training which I have received; and as an expression of my gratitude, I, here and now, in the presence of these assembled witnesses, cheerfully and unreservedly pledge myself ever to give such support to the public schools as my financial ability will permit and always to exert my influence as a citizen of Texas to uphold their ideals and to increase their usefulness in the preparation of the boys and girls of today to be the men and women of tomorrow.

You will understand, of course, that this is merely suggestive. I have no disposition to exercise any

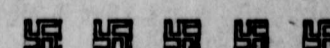
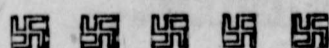

**CIVIC LOYALTY**

Few of us ever pause to consider how our town came into being. We have taken its existence for granted and have been willing to let the other fellow assume all the responsibilities of management. But our town did not just happen. A definite force called it into being at the very point at which it grew, and that same force continues to exist. The life of a town depends partially upon economic conditions and partly upon the character, energy and enterprise of its citizen. The progressive community center must be a social structure for the promotion of friendliness, which, after all, is the most important thing in the world — Lubbock Avalanche.

Social friendliness is the big asset to any community. A spirit of making strangers feel at home is important in the growth of towns and communities. Older towns in point of settlement less inclined are its people to be friendly. There is too often a prevailing spirit of old-timer feeling towards strangers and new comers into old settled communities, wherein the old-timers seem to want to take strangers on probation. The doors of society are closed for an indefinite period against those coming into the community. A spirit prevails wherein a new comer must be tried out before it is decided that he is a fit subject to join the inner circle of the social set. New comers are forced to live in a community until they prove themselves before they are invited out. All new comers are looked upon with suspicion, and with a sort of pre-judgment of their fitness. In some communities of old settlement you see the first families of Virginia spirit prevailing. Towns divided up in casts and inner circles and the stranger may be required to knock repeatedly before he is admitted. The contrary rule governs new towns, where a more cosmopolitan spirit prevails. In new growing towns and communities everybody to more or less degree stands on equal footing. Strangers are welcomed in social, church social and business ways—and a spirit of this kind proves an asset to the town and community possessing same. Enterprise must be coupled together with social features—of friendly welcome of strangers and new comers. This is truly democratic and marks successful towns and communities everywhere. A town with a big city citizenship—of an exclusive spirit, seldom draws strangers to their midst.

The Claude News becomes grand eloquent in describing the knocker. Here is a sample of his product:

"Tell us not in mournful numbers that this town's on the bum; rouse up from your peaceful slumbers; get out and make things hum. If we go to work in earnest we can make things hit on high; 'dust thou are, to dust returnest,' is a song of by and by. All the past is done forever—you can't call one moment back—and the future may come never, this is true, so help me Mack. Now's the time to do your boosting, do not wait tomorrow's dawn, in the grave you may be roosting, all your boosting chances gone. Lay aside your little hammer, grab a horn and toot a few; squelch the kicker's dadblamed hammer with a joyous blast or two. This old town is sure a pippin', and we ought to boost it big, when we hear some growler yippin', we should smite him on the wig. Mighty oaks that grow and flourish came from acorns plain and small; with your boosting you may nourish something that may prove a blessing to the toiling sons of men—that's the point that I am stressing—boost and boost, then boost again. People love the smiling booster, and for him they loudly cheer, but they hate the knocking rooster, long to pelt him in the ear. Boost your country and your business, boost the people in your town, they will dub you wise and witty and you'll gain a wide renown."

Life is one big laboratory where man is constantly making experiments. Experiment after experiment is made to be rejected and a search made for something better. We are continuously searching after the truths of life, making this or that experiment in order to attain the highest point of intellectual and religious development. It is well that this is the case or man would not reach the heights of civilization. Our efforts lead to perfection if directed in the right way.

If any daily paper should, for one week, eliminate all news that smacks of murder, rape, disgrace, etc., it would be termed, by a majority of its readers as a paper with no news in it.—Claude News.

The daily papers are giving the people just what they want. The public mind is clamoring for the sensations of life, for light reading—cartoons and pictures as a Sunday diet, and divorce and sordid things for the week days. We see the state of the public mind reflected in music and play. The public mind has a jazz tendency in music and vaudeville for their entertainment. You can pick up a daily newspaper most any day and the first page will contain numerous references to murders and divorces—homicides and suicides. Our news services have been improved to the extent that items of world happenings are quickly obtained, and the population of this nation where the murder per cent runs wild it is an easy matter to fill the daily news columns with items of this nature. The bad of all towns and communities are featured more than are the good things. Items of murder and sensationalism bring towns and communities into prominence in a way.

Better Home campaign is important, and the subject embraces many important features. Better homes mean more than temporary dwelling places, but better homes are need from many angles. Yes, better American homes are needed—homes where the divorce spirit does not rule—homes of better understanding and co-operation among husbands and wives, and a more tender regard of children for parents and parents for children. Let us build better American homes — for upon this structure rests the destiny of the nation. God grant that better homes and more harmonious homes may come to the American people.

We are in the season of spring time, of blossoming time — mating time. A season when nature is robed in its best, and when hearts are turned in harmony with same. Life slumbering in winter's silent chambers springs forth in nature, and every seed springs up to bring forth its kind. It is all symbolic of human and spiritual life. These bodies of ours will some day enter the long winter season of the grave to wait the quickening power of the Eternal God when they spring up to bear fruit after its kind. If sown in righteousness they will come forth righteous, if sown in sin they will spring up unto Eternal damnation.

**DO YOU KNOW?**

1. That one egg is equal to four tablespoonfuls—this may help when you have either yolks or whites left and you want some way of measuring a part of them. Measure in a cup.
2. That one cup equals sixteen tablespoonfuls.
3. That one tablespoonful equals three teaspoonfuls.
4. All measurements should be level.
5. More accurate measurements are obtained, when a part of a spoonful is required, by making the division lengthwise rather than crosswise of the spoon.
6. Flour is stirred more easily into a liquid by using a salad fork.
7. That there are four general classes of white sauces and the proportions of flour and liquid determine the use.

(a) Thin white sauce is made by using one tablespoonful of flour to one cup of liquid. It is used for cream soups.

(b) Medium—Two tablespoonfuls of flour to one cupful of liquid, used for creamed vegetables and gravies.

(c) Thick—Four tablespoonfuls of flour to one cupful of liquid, used for croquettes.

(d) Very thick—Six tablespoonfuls of flour to one cupful of liquid, used for souffles.

White sauces often have a pasty taste which is due to insufficient cooking of the starch.

A very important consideration in the cost of oils is the kind of container in which they are purchased. Olive oil, for example, has been shown to cost three times as much when bought in a four-ounce bottle as when bought in a quart can.
