"If I had good looks, they never would have convicted me," she asserted. "You never hear of them convicting a beautiful woman."

That sounds silly, but is it? How many really beautiful women have you ever known to be convicted?—Abilene Daily Reporter.

In other words, a homely woman should never commit murder. Unless a woman is extremely good looking she should fight shy of crime. Thus we virtually admit that our jurors are not immune from the female smasher when she is being tried for crime. However, we hardly think good looks are guiding Texas jurors in administering justice in Texas. The mistake of jurors along these lines is the too prevalent custom to apply a sort of unwritten law in reference to prosecuting women. This unwritten law or special protection of women by reason of her sex was done away with when she was given equal privileges under the statute with her male brother. A female murderess, whether pretty or ugly, is just as dangerous to society as the male criminal.

"I would take a husband in preference to a career," is the statement of Miss Alice Robertson, Ex-Congresswoman and missionary. She stated that she would give all past honors for a good husband. In addition to all her political honors she says she would throw in her friends if she could trade for a first-class husband. Miss Robertson, who is the founder of the University of Oklahoma, and who has raised thirteen adopted daughters, styles all her honors and charity as naught compared to the loss of a mate. The crowning God-given destiny of every woman is to wed some good man and to raise children. The modern ways that set aside these things in the interest of politics does not bring true happiness to womankind. God ordained the woman for the home and the man for the provider of the home. In this age of extreme tendency of woman to forsake the home for man's estate is alarming, and if the sentiment and custom for women to usurp the place of man in a few years we may expect to see the home further neglected, and woman taken out of the home altogether. No nation can continue great at the sacrifice of the home. Homes can not be built and maintenance of extreme tendency of women in the home. The Oklahoma Congresswoman expresses the position of all true women. Careers void of the comfort of home life are empty honors as far as womanhood is concerned.
