### Aguirre signing with WT

Muleshoe senior Ricko Aguirre was expected to sign a national letter of intent Wednesday to play football at West Texas A&M University in Canyon.

Feb. 4 is the first day of the national prep signing period.

The 6-2, 290-pound lineman has already given a verbal commitment to the Buffaloes.

Aguirre was a two-way all-district selection this fall and helped the Mules finish with their best record in a decade at 5-5.

West Texas A&M, an NCAA Division II team, finished 7-4 under first year coach Stan McGarvey.

The Buffaloes are a member of the Lone Star Conference.

### Lotto reaches \$45 million

Just imagine making \$1.8 million every year for the next 25 years. If you happen to be the only winner Wednesday in the Texas lottery, that's about how much you can expect to get from the estimated \$45 million jackpot.

According to lottery officials, it is the highest jackpot since last November.

Local stores are reporting an increase in lottery ticket sells with regular buyers spending even more money and people who don't normally play deciding to try their luck.

One convenience store worker said that she has had customers spend more than \$500 on tickets. But on average, she said that the regulars are spending anywhere from \$50 to \$100 more, while new customers are spending \$2 to \$10.

Stores are expecting the big rush for tickets to be Wednesday, the day of the drawing. First, because people have a habit of waiting until the last minute, and second, many store clerks said that they have heard customers say time and time again that the ticket has to be bought on the day of the drawing to be lucky.

## Playoff hopes gone

### ■ Dimmitt sweeps MHS

The Muleshoe Mules' dream season has turned into a nightmare.

Expected to contend for a playoff berth, the Mules have tumbled to the middle of the District 1-3A standings and out of the playoff picture.

Dimmitt used a long-range attack and 13 second-half points from Charlie Sanders to beat Muleshoe 53-47 Tuesday, the Mules' third-straight loss and fourth in seven games.

Dimmitt (19-7 overall, 8-1 in district) rained in eight 3-pointers, including three in a row late in the game which proved to be the difference.

Derek Buckley banged home two 3-pointers in the fourth quarter, including the back-breaker with three minutes left that gave the No. 4-ranked Bobcats a 51-45 lead. Sanders led the Bobcats with 15 points and Jared Townsend supplied four 3-pointers and 12 points off the bench.

Dustin Cleavinger led Muleshoe with 22 points. No other Mule scored more than six points as poor outside shooting

## County law officers involved in another high-speed chase

Bailey County Law enforcement officers were involved in their second high speed car chase in just under two weeks.

Late Saturday night, Tracy Frazier of Albuquerque sped through New Mexico and three Texas counties before finally being stopped in Littlefield.

According to police reports, Frazier, 26, was traveling from Albuquerque to Dallas on Highway 84 around midnight when he was clocked at more than 100 m.p.h. between Clovis and Texico.

Frazier, who later admitted to police he was under the influence of drugs, was driving an extended cab Ford Ranger with his girlfriend and four young children.

Bailey County Sheriff Coy Plott said the suspect was clocked at nearly 100 mph while travelling through Muleshoe with city and county patrol cars in pursuit.

The Littlefield Police and Department of Public Safety deployed spikes near FM 54, which blew out two tires on the subject's truck but failed to stop him. Having no more spikes, DPS officer Sam Gonzales said they decided the only way to stop Frazier was to shoot out the rear tire.

According to Gonzales, Frazier cut across the

"Only this time I didn't have a knot in my stomach," Moore said. "We're very please and think it will be a very competitive district. And obviously, it will allow for a tremendous reduction in travel."

In the last two years, Muleshoe had to travel as far as 220 miles one way for District 1-3A games. In the new setup, Muleshoe's longest district trip will be about 80 miles.

"The community is ecstatic," Muleshoe head football

coach and athletic director David Wood said. "We thought something like this would happen. I was just afraid they would keep us in an eight-team district."

The announcement ended months of speculation.

Wood compared it to being a kid opening a present.

"I finally know what's going on and I can get busy," the second-year coach and athletic director said.

By mid afternoon, Wood had already worked out Muleshoe's 1998 football schedule.

The Mules will play non-district games against Portales, Denver City, Brownfield, Tulia and Dimmitt.

Another plus of the realignment is sub varsity programs will be able to schedule

all the teams in the district.

Most sub-varsity programs were forced to play zone schedules the last two years because of the extensive travelling involved in the current district.

With Muleshoe and Friona leaving, the remaining District 1-3A teams will stay put and form a six-team district.

In Class 1A, both Lazbuddie and Three Way were shifted into new basketball districts.

Lazbuddie, which moved down to the Class 1A small school division, will play in District 11-1A along with Amherst, Cotton Center, Happy and Spade.

Three Way shifts to District 13-1A, joining Medina, Ropeville and Whitharral.

Both six-man football schools will remain in District 3A.

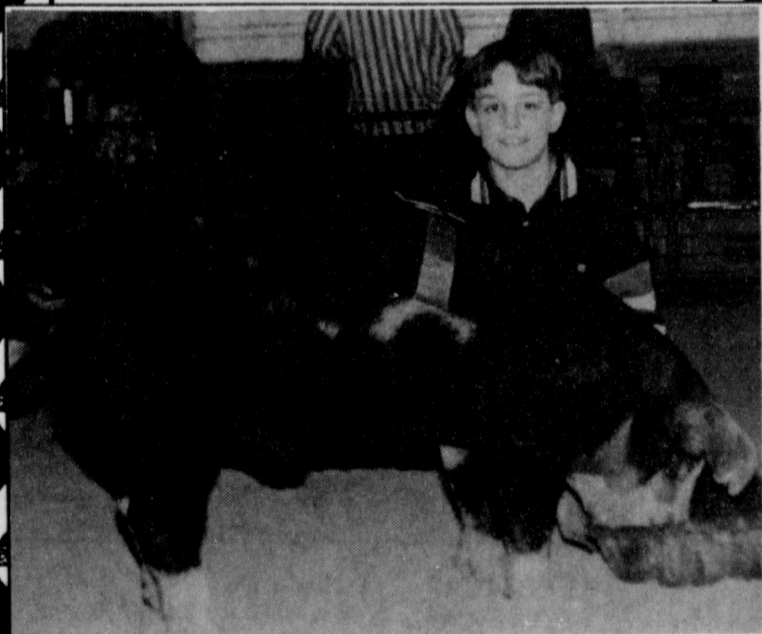

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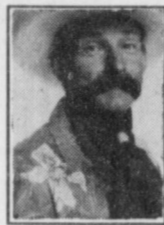
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# The Haflinger deal



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Two Jumps has a long history of famous horse trades in his native Tennessee.

According to him, at one time or another he could have owned Doc Bars, Gallant Fox, Midnight Sun, Naborr Fury, Trigger, Pegasus and a big gelding offered to him by an enlisted man in the Trojan Army. But things just didn't work out.

More typical was his Appaloosa-Haflinger trade. A feller from up the holler named Mr. Salchucker owned a team of Haflingers. For those of y'all who are unusual-equine impaired, they are a breed of 'draft ponies.'

Good, stout horses, maybe 14 hands and useful for pullin' things in tight places.

Accordin' to Two Jumps, Mr. Salchucker had used hem to pull a wagon but he was willin' to trade these splendid log pullers for Appy mare that had been on display in Two Jumps front pasture by the road.

Two Jumps had seen the Haflingers and thought they looked pretty flashy, so a deal was made.

On delivery Two Jumps hooked them up to his nice little surrey for a test drive. Then the phone rang in the barn. Two jumps answered and it was one of the local irritants. This is the kind of feller that will call and talk for hours about your horses

or cows or lands or Haflingers, but never buy anything.

Burin' the conversation, Leroy, Two Jumps resident horse trading consultant and test crash dummy, wandered in and pointed at the Haflingers tied outside. Meaning, could he take them for a spin?

Two jumps covered the mouthpiece and said, "Sure, but take them to the arena. I'm not sure how broke they are."

Fifteen minutes later while Two Jumps was still scratching the local irritant, Leroy stumbled back through the barn door. His shirt was ripped off, his hat looked like a hippopotamus cud and one spur was bent sideways.

Leroy's story, as embellished by the Two jumps was as follows: "They seemed calm enough so I took 'em out through the pasture... Pusher (the miniature stud horse) came over the hill... spooked 'em all... broke for the woods... and Two Jumps, part of your surrey is in the pond... part of your surrey is in the cedar tree... and I don't know where the other part is!"

Two Jumps got a call ten days later from an officious sounding gentleman in Franklin. He had heard of the Haflingers and was interested in buying but, "... wouldn't pay more than a thousand apiece."

'Perfect timing,' thought Two Jumps, who had just unloaded them at the Murfreesboro sale barn last weekend. For \$250.

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The flag that was "still there" when Francis Scott Key wrote the "Star-Spangled Banner," is still there today and can be seen at the National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

## Most local teachers meet state standards

The number of certified teachers in Muleshoe Independent School District is just barely higher than the state average.

According to Superintendent Bill Moore, only seven of the 129 teachers, or 5 percent, in the district are not properly certified.

Statewide only 3.96 percent of teachers fail to have the proper certification, according to a report by the State Board of Certification.

Out of the seven teachers locally that are not properly certified, most only need to take and pass a test to get official

authorization from the state, Moore said. Many are already certified teachers, however not teaching in their area of specialization and lacking the endorsement for the particular subject they are currently teaching.

For Muleshoe ISD the number of uncertified teachers is attributed most to secondary teachers teaching on the elementary level, said Moore.

In a report by the state, officials report an increase in the number of certified teachers teaching in areas other than their specialization.

In fact the agency reports

that of the 3.96 percent of uncertified teachers, many are actually certified, but not working in their teaching field.

The agency attributes this trend to a fast growth of student populations in urban areas, coupled with difficulty in recruiting teachers in speciality subjects, such as foreign languages, special education and other advanced electives by some of the rural districts.

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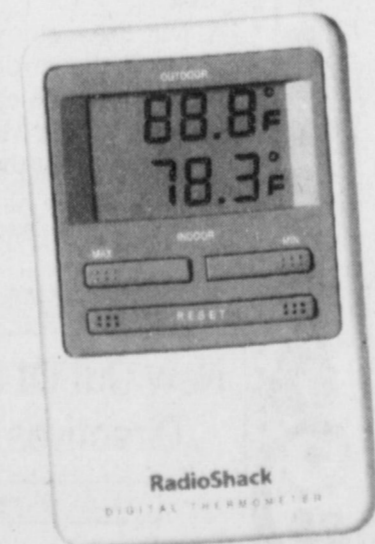
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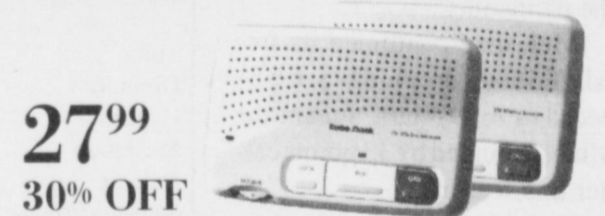
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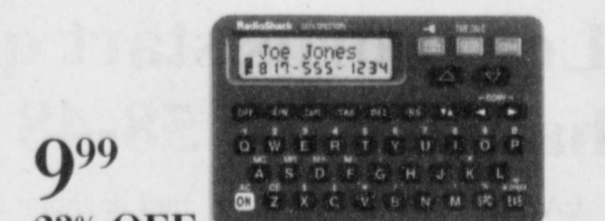


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# Makeshift lineup sparks Muleshoe

DALHART — With several starters in foul trouble, Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey hoped to steal a few minutes at the start of the third quarter in Friday's District 1-3A girls basketball game.

The Muleshoe coach got a lot more.

Going with an undersized lineup that included four reserves for most of the third quarter, Muleshoe played Dalhart to a near standstill.

Long enough for Erin Wilhite to take over.

Wilhite, who sat out the third quarter with three fouls along with leading scorer Lindsey Field, tossed in 14 of her game-high 17 points in the fourth quarter as Muleshoe slipped by Dalhart 51-42 for its fourth-straight win.

Wilhite scored eight-straight Muleshoe points during one stretch and converted 8 of 10 free throws as Muleshoe (15-10 overall, 6-4 in district) kept its faint playoff hopes alive.

LAZBUDDIE — Lazbuddie's biggest obstacle Friday wasn't a 12-game district losing streak or the sharpshooting Happy Cowgirls. It was a strength-sapping flu bug.

Happy jumped out to a quick double-digit lead and held off the flu-ridden Lady Longhorns 45-36 in a District 3-1A girls basketball game.

More than half the team was suffering from the flu, according to Lazbuddie coach Carey Sudduth.

Sudduth said his team expended so much energy defending the Cowgirls' motion offense it caused them to struggle at the offense end.

"We didn't shoot the ball well because we didn't have the legs," Sudduth said. "If we were healthy, we win the game."

Happy (14-11 overall, 2-4 in district) charged out to a 13-3 first-quarter lead. The Lady Longhorns (14-11, 0-5) played them even the rest of the way.

# Mules fall again 61-51

DALHART — The only button Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason hasn't pushed lately is the panic one.

Muleshoe continued its free fall Friday, dropping a 61-51 decision to Dalhart, a team the Mules thumped by 33 points earlier this season.

Floundering in fourth place in the District 1-3A boys race, the Mules (17-9 overall, 4-4 in district) have lost four of their last six games, a streak that has left the players and coaching staff searching for answers.

"I could see it after the Dimmitt game (a last-second loss that started the losing spell)," Mason said. "I don't know what it is. I haven't been able to hit the right button to turn it around."

Muleshoe was sabotaged again by poor shooting, connecting on just 32 percent (19 of 58) of its shots against Dalhart. Up by three at halftime, Mules managed just four points in the third quarter.

Jason Chaffin helped Dalhart (12-11, 3-5) polish off the Mules by making five of six free throws and scoring seven points in the

Sharpshooter Josh Morris staked the Longhorns to a 13-0 lead four minutes into the game with a trio of 3-pointers. But

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

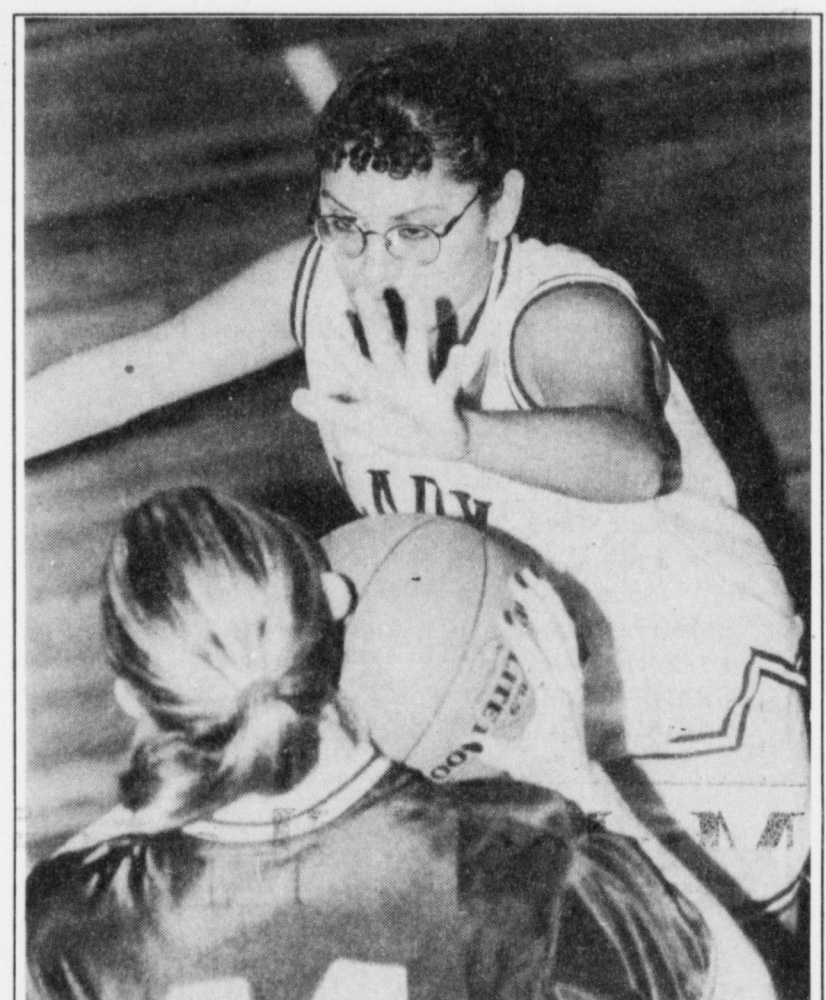

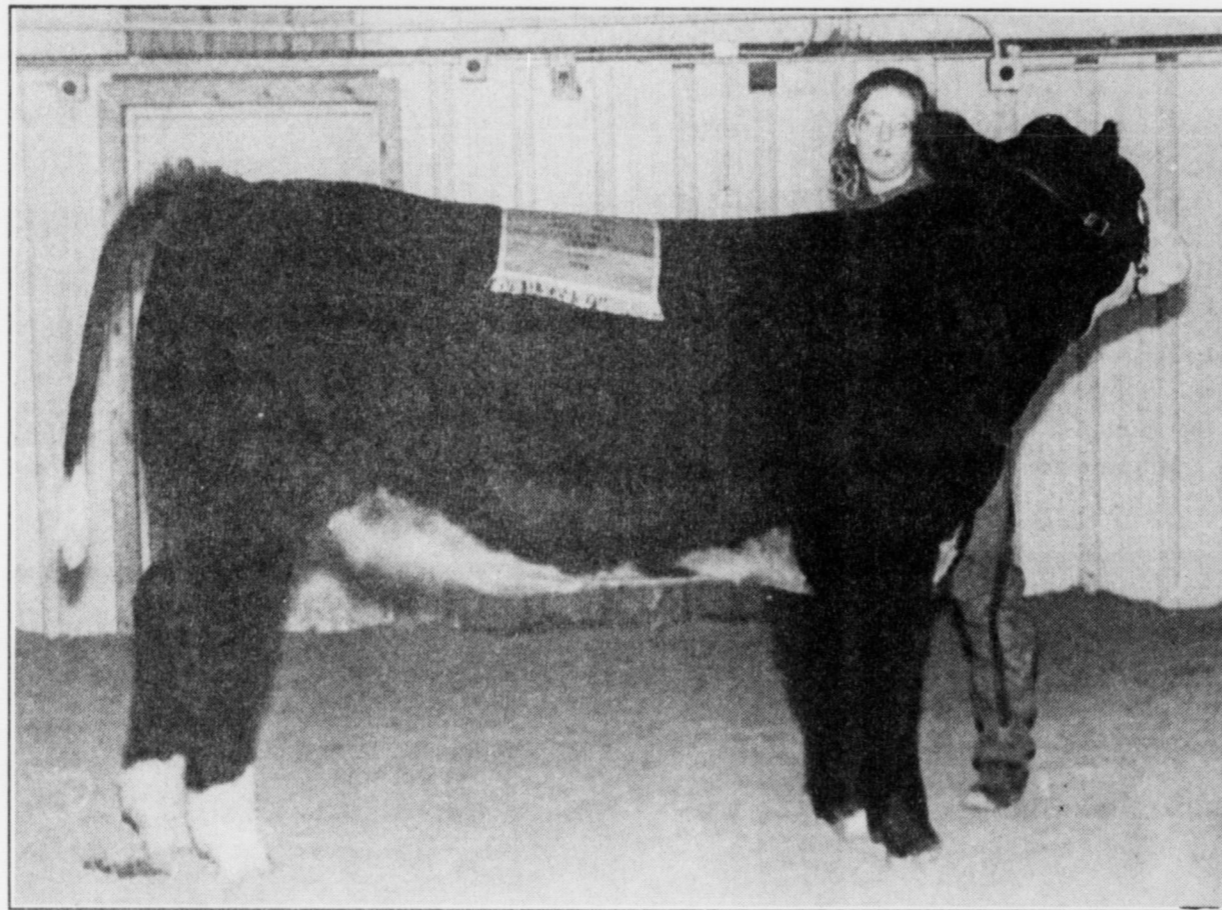

## Counting fat grams best way to monitor food intake

HOUSTON — Counting fat grams is more effective than keeping food records, according to a study conducted by researchers at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Houston in Houston.

"For years, dietitians have used the food-record rating system to calculate how much total fat patients eat," said Dr. William Insull, professor of medicine and director of the Lipid Research Clinic at Baylor and The Methodist Hospital.

"Fat-gram counting is a simpler alternative and is less time-consuming for both the dietitian and the patient."

The food-record rating system requires dietitians to know standard recipes and exact serving sizes to "match" certain foods to a table of foods in a computer database. Foods are scored according to their cholesterol-lowering ability. The process can take up to an hour.

"Unlike the food-record rating which gives you more information than you need, like caloric content, fat-gram counting only gives out the fat gram value," Insull said.

Insull and registered dietitian Donna S. Roy collaborated with a research team of dietitians and recruited 78 study participants were randomly assigned to a fat-gram counting group and food-

record rating group led by dietitians to test the effectiveness of both methods. Each participant completed four three-day food records which were evaluated by food-record rating for one group and by fat-gram counting for the other group.

The dietitians used the fat-gram counting method on one group and the food-record rating method on the other group.

"We found no significant differences in dietary adherence in the two groups," Insull

said. "The patients in the fat-gram counting group were just as well-instructed as the other group."

Insull says fat-gram counting is easier to teach to patients and is an effective self-monitoring tool.

"Patients don't need a computer, they can look at a tale of foods," he said. "The new food labels make it even easier to watch your fat intake."

The DeBakey Heart Center is a joint program of Baylor

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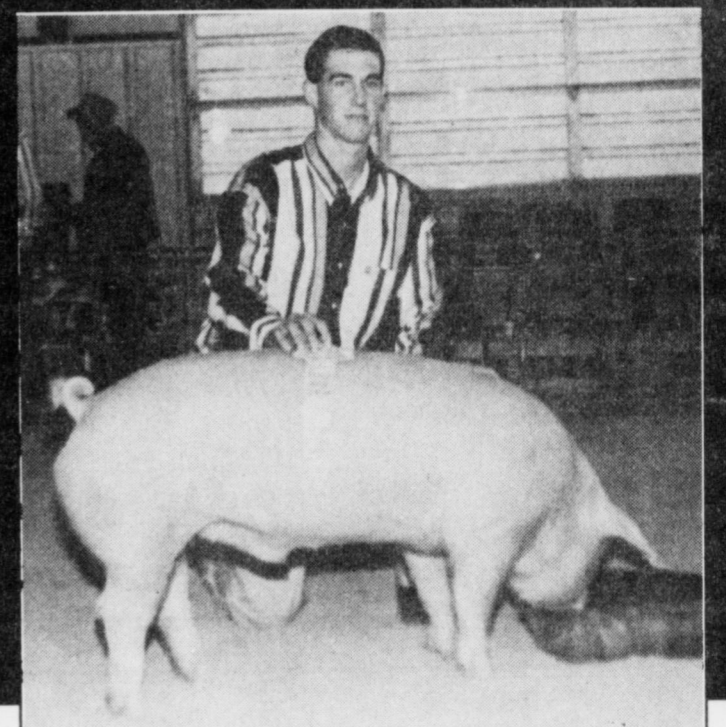

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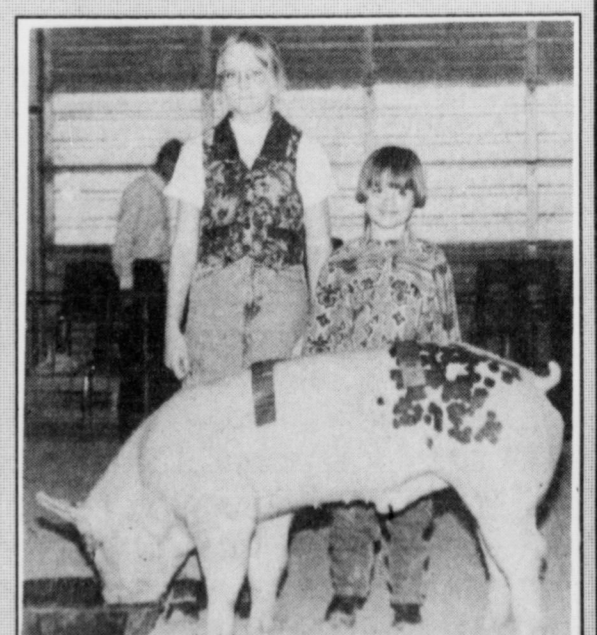

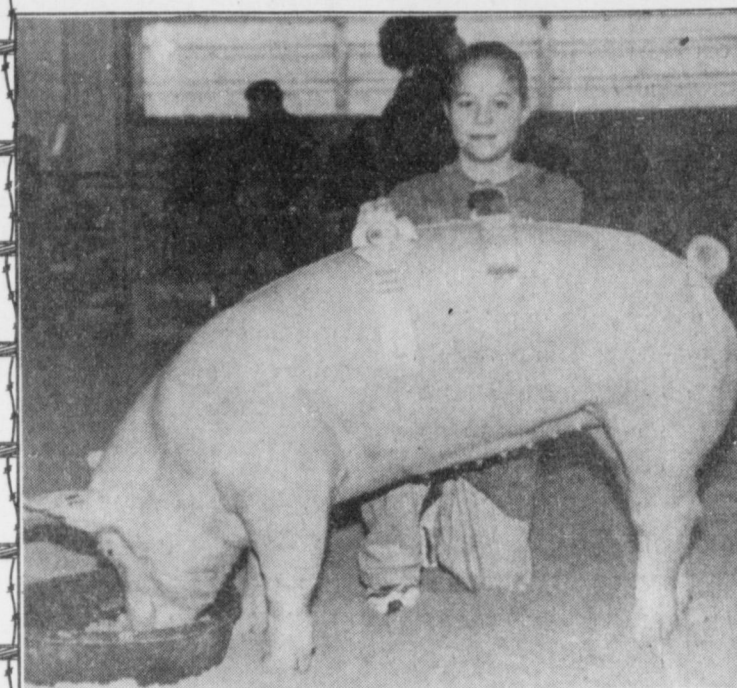

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# Time for college-bound high school seniors to start sending in applications

GEORGETOWN — If you're a college-bound high school senior, add this to your list of New Year's resolutions: getting a jump-start on your college applications.

Most universities and colleges are now processing applications from students who want to enroll in fall 1998, and many will begin making financial aid and scholarship awards in February, says John Lind, vice president for enrollment management at Southwestern University, a selective national liberal arts college located in Georgetown, TX.

Even more incentive to act quickly: students who apply early get better choices for on-campus housing and are at the head of the line for financial aid.

But where to apply? "Some high school seniors already have decided what career path to follow, which makes choosing a college and a specific major easier," Lind says.

"But the vast majority are unsure about their plans, making the task of finding the school right for them rather intimidating."

He says students shouldn't feel pressured to choose a major before reaching the college classroom. Those who need help should visit with their high school guidance counselors for access to information about all sorts of colleges-subjective guides, objective guides, audio-visual packages and, in some cases, computer pro-

grams that can connect students directly to college or university admission offices.

Lind said that within the last few years, many colleges and universities, including Southwestern, have created World Wide Web sites, which students can access by using the Internet and using a search function to find the college or university that interest them.

At the sites, students can find information about the school's academic and social opportunities or even take a "virtual" tour of campus.

The average student today will change majors at least once during a college career, nationwide figures indicate. Futurist John Naisbitt predict that the

typical student will change careers three or four times during a life span-the result of a job market that will continue to undergo major technological advances.

"Students really need to look carefully at themselves," says Lind. "What are they like? What is their ambition? In what type of environment are they most comfortable? So they need to relate individually to their teachers? Do they want to stay in-state?"

But don't rule out colleges on cost alone.

"Too many people begin by looking at cost and ultimately exclude some viable options. Students should determine what type of college suits their

needs best, and if turns out to be one their family can't afford, they should consider applying for financial assistance."

Application processes vary widely. While many schools rely solely on objective criteria like a student's class rank and standardized test scores, others look at the strength of the college preparatory background, recommendations

from counselor and teachers, impressions in a personal interview, and the ability to write, as demonstrated in the traditional essay section found in many selective colleges' application materials.

"A test score by itself is not generally a good predictor of college success. The single best predictor of succession college is the student's academic per-

formance in high school, the quality of the courses taken and the competitiveness of the high school a student is attending."

Lind said applicant should take the process seriously, prepare themselves adequately and present themselves well at college interviews.

"College is a lifetime investment. That's why it's so important to make it right choice."
