When the ships of the Byrd Antarctic Expediiton arrive in the United States in June, one of the most interesting members will be Sea Scout Paul A. Siple of Erie, Pennsylvania, youngest of the party, who has won highest commendation from Admiral Byrd for the work he has done since the expedition left New York nearly two years ago.

Information to this effect was onbained in a letter received by Scout executive A. C. Williamson, Sweetwater, ,who visits Snyder troops often, from the national Scout office in New York.



Sea Scout Siple, who is an Eagle Scout, the highest rank which a Scout may obtain, was selected from among thousands of Boy Scours at the invitation of then Commander Byrd, to be his personal aide. He sailed from New York on August 25.

Ship Weighs Anchor.

On March 23, the "City of New New York" weighed anchor with Siple aboard as an able seaman. On about April 14, the ship stopped at Papeete, Tahiti, to take on coal and for necessary repairs. After a few days at Tahiti, the "City of New] York," accompanied by the "Eleanor Bolling," second ship of the expedition, will cross the Pacific to the Panama Canal. This is the longest stretch on the homeward voyage, a distance of 4,509 miles. Shall Texas Manufacture Its Cotton?

It is quite natural that attention should be directed to the Texas region as offering such advantages that an ultimate movement of the cotton manufacturing industry to this region might be conceived as possible. A very recent survey of the situation has been made to study the conditions which would encourage or discourage an expansion of the Texas cotton mill industry.

"This survey shows that the labor in Texas is overwhelmingly native-born, and of a stock similar to the mountaineer native in the Appalachians. In addition, there is native and imported labor of Mexican type. Experience in the existing cotton mills has shown both of these classes to be quite efficient.

"Restrictive legislation limiting the conditions under which operatives may work in cotton mills is not so severe n its provisions as in the northern states. Night work for women is allowed: and while the standard time is 55 hours per week, operatives may work five hours longer provided they are paid for overtime. The legal age for the employment of children is 15 years.

"Texas has an abundant source of power in its vast fields of oils and natural gas. The whole state is cover-




